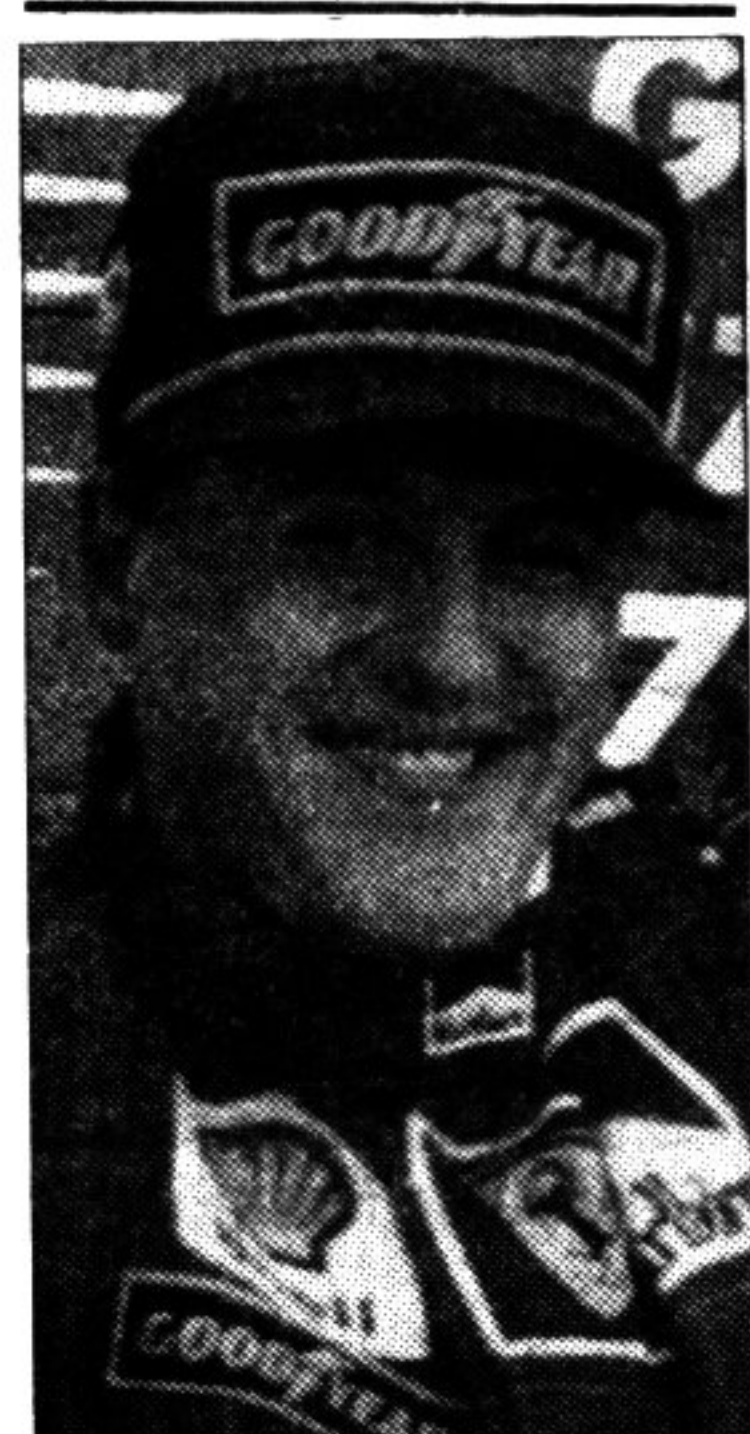

Tauziat tames Dragomir

CHICAGO, Nov 4: Nathalie Tauziat of France used strong net play Monday to defeat Ruxandra Dragomir of Romania, 6-3, 5-7, 6-2 in the first round of the Ameritech Cup, reports AP.

Tauziat, ranked 17th in the world, won three of the final four games after Dragomir took a medical timeout for a sore wrist. Dragomir is ranked 18th.

Tauziat's victory moved her closer to a berth in the season-ending Chase Championships in New York in two weeks.

The field for 450,000 dollars tournament includes 12 of the top 20. No 1 Martina Hingis withdrew last month with a heel injury.

Agrani survive a scare



A second half rally saved the day for Agrani Bank against Victoria Sporting Club as they managed to escape a defeat with a 1-1 draw in their Premier Division football league engagement played at the Mirpur Stadium yesterday.

Buoyed by their stunning 3-0 victory over Federation Cup runners-up Arambagh Krira Sangha last Friday, Victoria got into the match as a cohesive force and took the lead in the 32nd minute when midfielder Anwar, who scored two goals on Friday, sent the ball home with an angular shot after being brilliantly fed by Rinku from the left flank.

With the draw, both Victoria and Agrani Bank remained fourth and fifth in the 10-team Premier league having raised their collection to six and five points respectively on completion of their fifth match.

Zola vows to show his mettle



LONDON, Nov 4: Gianfranco Zola is determined to shine for Ruud Gullit's Chelsea to ensure that he doesn't spend another World Cup game on the bench, reports Reuters.

The diminutive Italian forward suffered a freezing night in Moscow last Wednesday as a substitute during Italy's 1-1 World Cup play-off match with Russia.

The chilly experience has given Zola extra incentive to prove to coach Cesare Maldini that he is worth a starting place for the return game in Naples on November 15 — where he started his career.

And that means turning it on for Chelsea this week against Tromso in the Cup Winners' Cup on Thursday and West Ham on Sunday.

Zola, whose recent form has

been below that which earned him the prestigious English footballer-of-the-year award last season said on Monday: "I've got a Cup Winners' Cup

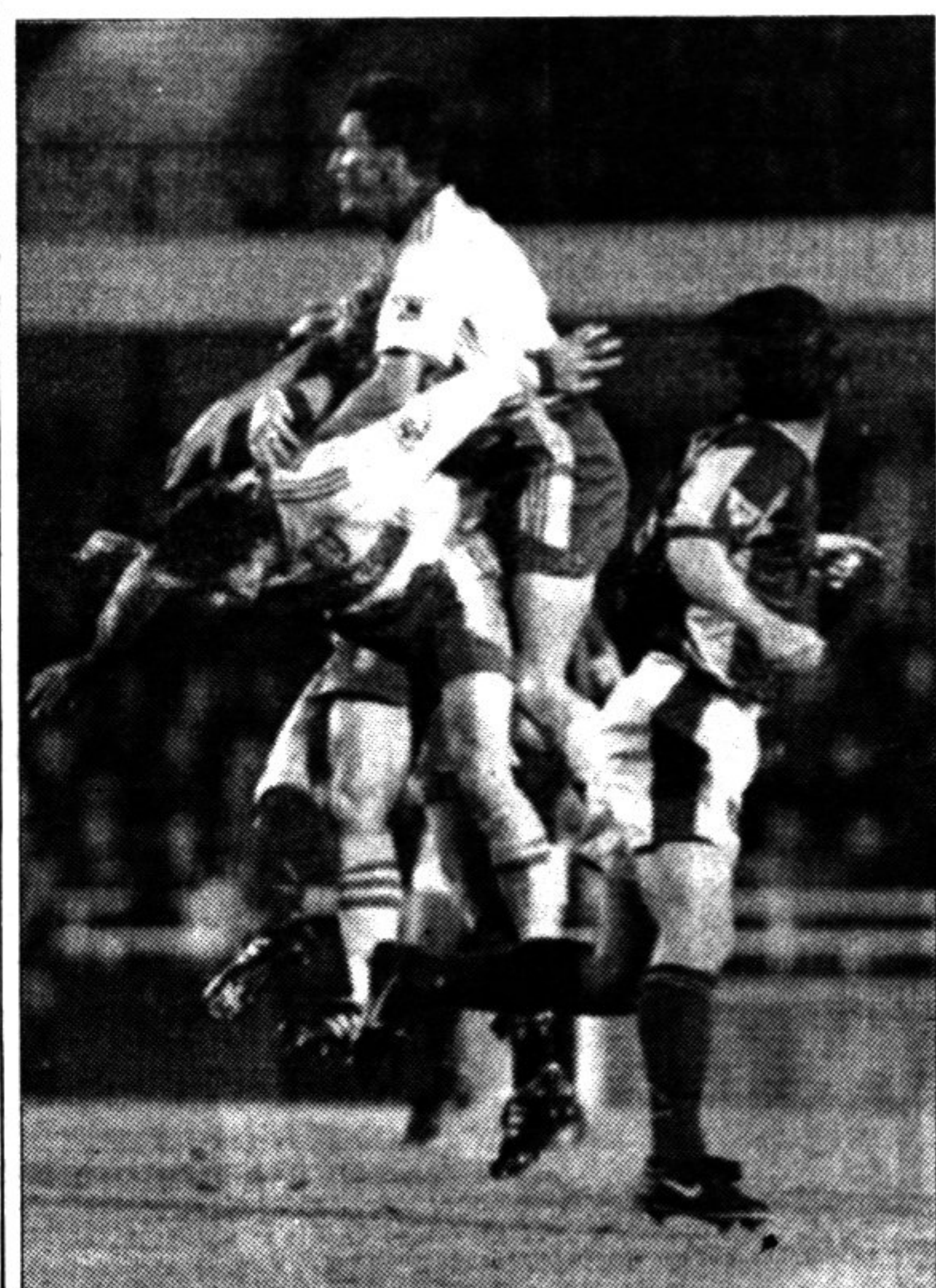
match and a Premier league game coming up in which to make up ground on the other Italian forwards. I want to convince the coach that I deserve the Italian shirt."

Zola admits he was upset to be left out against Russia. He explained: "It was a tactical problem — the same thing that curbed me against England. At Chelsea, I often play as the third forward dropping just behind two strikers and also on the left. But at the Olympic Stadium it didn't work like this."

"We are looking ahead to Naples where there will be a different atmosphere to Moscow, and we'll play a different game. Maldini regards Zola as a key part of his World Cup plans. He says: 'He is a fantastic man besides being a fantastic player.'"

"Before the match with England he said to me that for the good of the team he would be happy to sit out."

"Lately he hasn't seemed to me to be on his best form but for us he remains extremely important and nothing will stop him, even if we do have lots of choice up front."

Jap-Kazakh match may be delayed

TOKYO, Nov 4: FIFA has infuriated Japan by insisting that their crunch World Cup qualifying match against Kazakhstan be put back a day to Sunday, reports AFP.

Japan's hopes of reaching next year's finals in France rest on the Asian Group B match which FIFA has just said it wants put back a day to Sunday.

Japanese Football Association (JFA) general secretary Junji Ogura is to fly to the governing body's headquarters in Zurich in a desperate bid to get FIFA to stick to the original time.

Japan and United Arab Emirates are in contention for second place in the group, which would put them in a playoff for a World Cup place.

And FIFA has said it wants Japan to play Kazakhstan and the UAE to play South Korea at 1100 GMT on Sunday.

Japan had been scheduled to play their match Saturday, while South Korea's match in Abu Dhabi has also been brought forward by two hours.

All the countries involved were only told in a fax message sent today.

The JFA said no official reason had been given for the change, but FIFA's move is to make sure that neither side has the advantage of knowing the result of the other.

In the qualifying tournament in Qatar for the last World Cup, three matches were played at the same time to ensure no team had an advantage. Japan were knocked out then when Iraq scored a last minute equaliser.

But a JFA official said: "It will be physically impossible to accept the change." He highlighted difficulties in arranging a venue for Sunday and handling tickets sold for the Saturday fixture at Tokyo's National Stadium.

W Ham-Palace tie abandoned

LONDON, Nov 4: West Ham's Frank Lampard shot out the lights like a wild west marksman on Monday, plunging his club's Upton Park Stadium into darkness seconds after scoring a superb equaliser against Crystal Palace, reports Reuters.

The game was abandoned because of the failure of the floodlights after 65 minutes of the Premier league game, locked at 2-2 after Lampard's strike.

As the West Ham players celebrated the goal all four floodlights in the ground went out. Club officials decided the electrical fault could not be fixed.

The match will be replayed at a date to be decided. It was the second time a Premier league match had been abandoned this season because of floodlight failure. In August Derby's game with Wimbledon was stopped with Derby winning 2-1.

West Ham had battled back to 2-2 after first half goals from striker Neil Shipperley gave Palace a well-deserved 2-0 lead.

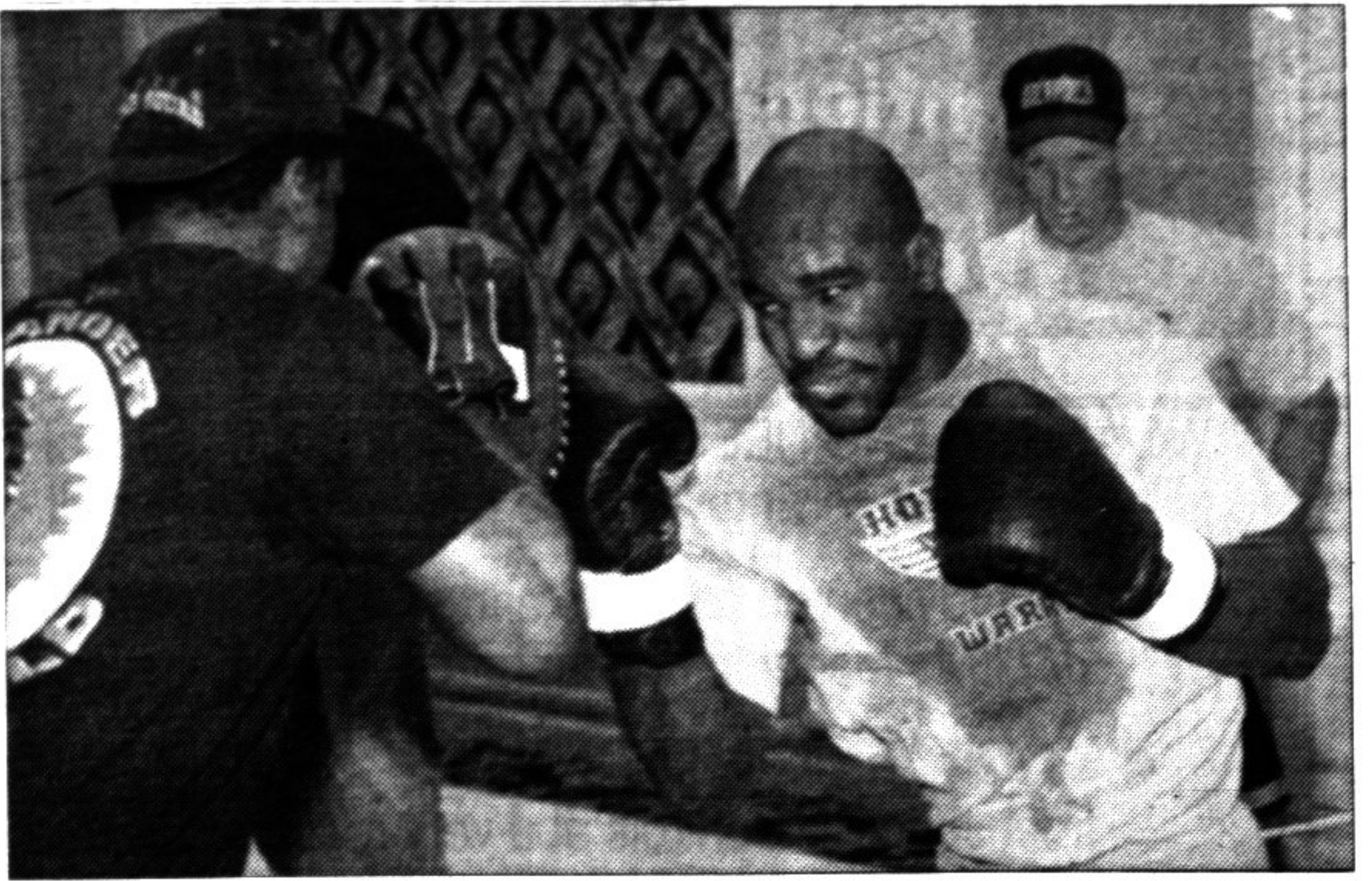
Palace dominated the first half and Shipperley made the most of a mistake by West Ham's Canadian goalkeeper Craig Forrest to open the scoring in the 19th minute.

Forrest made a weak clearance which was returned quickly to Shipperley in the penalty area to claim his second goal of the season.

Seconds before halftime Shipperley was fortunate to slip West Ham central defender Rio Ferdinand on the edge of the area but his left-foot shot owed nothing to chance, bending past Forrest to rebound in off right-hand post.

Two substitutions, one giving French striker Samassi Abou his English league debut, revitalised West Ham and John Hartson scored in the 53rd minute with a header as Palace goalkeeper Kevin Miller hesitated fatally.

It signalled a period of constant pressure for the Palace defence. Lampard, who had wasted a gilt-edged chance minutes earlier, pulled the home side level when he took a pass from Abou, advanced to the edge of the area and hit a sweet right-foot shot past Miller.

Andre to start from scratch



NEW YORK, Nov 4 (AP): Two months after reaching the fourth round of the US Open, Andre Agassi has decided to play in a Challenger tournament — the tennis minor leagues.

Agassi requested and received a wild card to play in the 50,000 dollars Luxor Las Vegas-USTA Challenger next week. The Associated Press learned Monday.

Normally, Challenger tournament fields are comprised of players ranked below 100th in the world. That's where Agassi is right now.

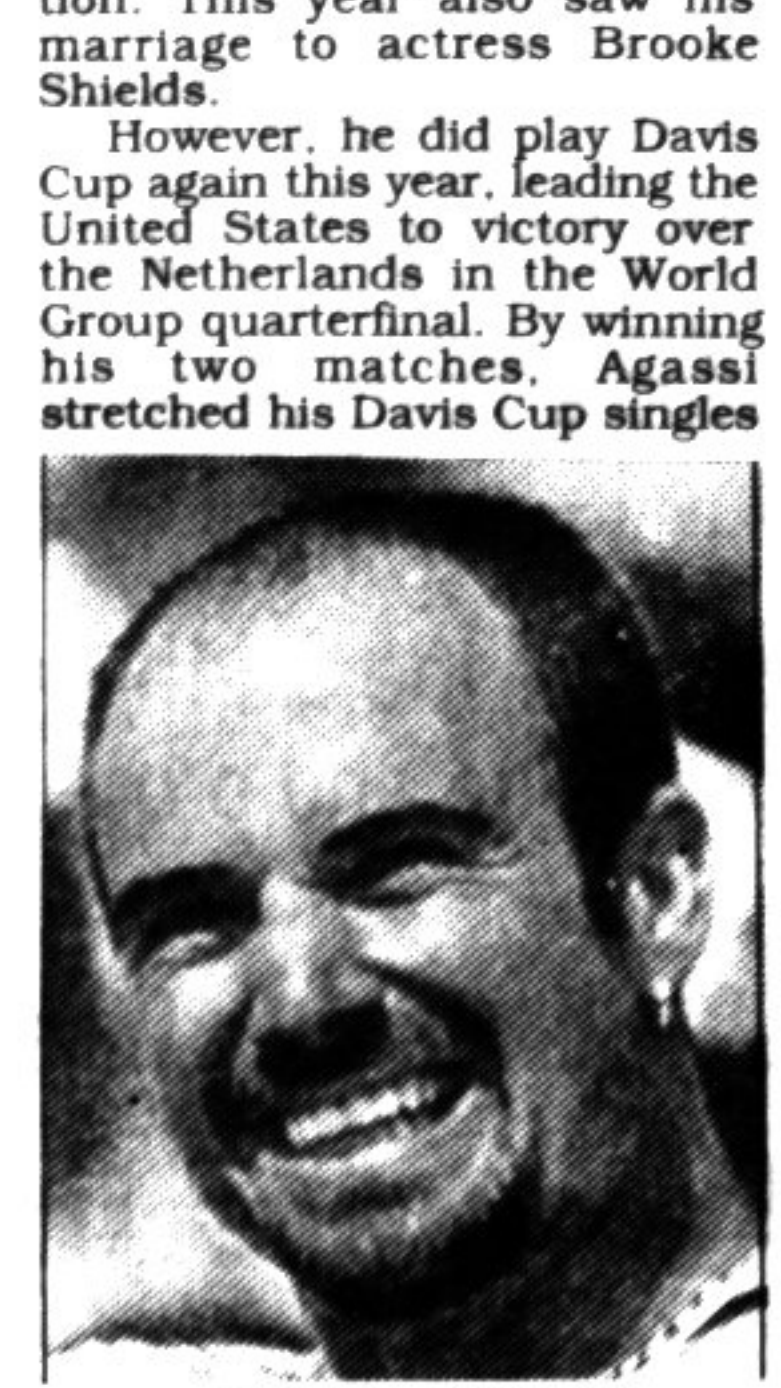
His ranking has plummeted in the last 11 months. Once ranked No. 1 in the world — in April 1995 — Agassi began this year ranked No. 8. As of Monday, he is 139th.

"Being on top of the rankings is different than being on top of my game," Agassi recently said. "The ranking was never that important for me."

Although he reached the fourth round of the US Open, losing to eventual winner Patrick Rafter, Agassi's year has been dreadful. He missed three of the four Grand Slam tournaments and lost in the opening round of eight of the 12 tournaments in which he played this year.

While the sudden free-fall has been partly attributed to a wrist injury, Agassi admittedly has struggled to find motivation. This year also saw his marriage to actress Brooke Shields.

However, he did play Davis Cup again this year, leading the United States to victory over the Netherlands in the World Group quarterfinal. By winning his two matches, Agassi stretched his Davis Cup singles

win streak to 15, just one short of Bill Tilden's American record of 16 straight.

Playing the Challenger is a start toward what Agassi hopes will be a return to the top. The Nov 10-16 indoor event will be played at UNLV's Fertitta Tennis Complex and will be the first professional tournament Agassi has played in his hometown, according to the United States Tennis Association.

"The siesta is over. I am looking forward to a full schedule next year," Agassi said after losing in the first round at Stuttgart, Germany, two weeks ago.

He also is expected to play a second USTA Challenger tournament later this year, in Burbank, California.

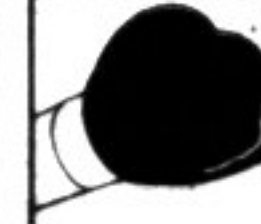
Last week, Agassi asked for and received a wild card into the Australian Open in January, the first Grand Slam event of 1998. Wild cards are usually reserved for up and coming young Australians, but one was given to Agassi because he won the Australian Open in 1995.

His other career titles include Wimbledon in 1992 and the US Open in 1994. He has been in four other Grand Slam tournament finals: the US Open in 1990 and '95, and the French Open in 1990-91.

Agassi is playing the two Challenger events to get match practice, something he feels he desperately needs in order to compete with the top players.

"For a player of his level to go back to the small tournaments the minor league if you like, is quite incredible," said Paul McNamee, a former top pro and now the Australian Open tournament director. "Obviously with the good tennis brain he has, Andre realises he needs to get some matches under his belt, and hopefully that means he will be better for it when he gets here."

Tyson fears the worst



NEW YORK, Nov 4 (AP): Mike Tyson believes he will not regain his boxing license, suspended by the Nevada Athletic Commission because he bit Evander Holyfield twice during their heavyweight championship fight.

In an interview Monday night on ABC television, Tyson was asked by Alex Wallau whether he thought the commission would reinstate him next year.

"Truly, I think I'll be banned for the rest of my life," Tyson said.

Wallau asked the ex-champion why he believed that. "I truly think everyone hates me," he said. "I truly believe that. Because no one gets punished more than I am. But I understand. I'm a big boy and I believe big boys have big ordeals to be dealt with."

Tyson was suspended by the commission following the Holyfield fight last June at Las Vegas. He can request reinstatement after one year.

Tyson said he believed people want him to beg for mercy. "I'm not that way with anyone," he said. "This is who I am and may be sometimes it's the insecurity. I want to be the defiant person. That's part of my insecurity, but you know, it's just who I am."

Tyson said he feels "disgust, disdain and humiliation" when he watches tapes of the Holyfield fight.

"I shouldn't have done that," he said of the biting. "It was just striking out and totally hatred right there. I shouldn't have done that because for that one moment, I just forgot he was a human being."

"It was extremeness. There was some serious stuff going on in my head. I just snapped. I was no longer playing under the rules. Any kind of functional thinking, any kind of rational thinking, that was totally out the window."

Tyson wishes he knew why. "It's pretty embarrassing," he said. "Once the boundaries were crossed, I had no more respect for the rules or principles of rules, and they were just... open game. I just totally lost it."

Tyson also commented for the first time since he was hospitalised after sustaining broken ribs and a punctured lung in a motorcycle accident.

The incident occurred last week as Tyson and some friends were riding motorcycles to his mansion in suburban Farmington, Conn. The group was on a highway ramp trying to turn around when Tyson's 1,100 cc Honda drifted too close to a friend's motorcycle.

"I fell asleep and I was driving all day and for that split

second, I woke up and I was on top of my friend," he said. "I had to throw the bike down before I ran him over."

Tyson, who was joined for a segment of the interview by his wife, Dr. Monica Turner, and three of their children, said he has been in therapy since the Holyfield affair, trying to change some things about himself.

"It's kind of scary to change and feel a little helpless in changing," he said. "We're working on it and hopefully it'll turn out better. I don't know why I'm afraid to change. I change in increments, it's not going to happen overnight."

Silberstein stuns Costa

SANTIAGO, Chile, Nov 4: Gabriel Silberstein, a wild-card entry from Chile, upset eighth-seeded Carlos Costa of Spain 6-2, 6-4 Monday in the first round of the Chevrolet Cup tennis tournament, reports AP.

Fourth-seeded Julian Alonso of Spain beat Dinu Pescarici of Romania 6-4, 6-7 (1-7), 6-1, and Mariano Puerta of Argentina downed No. 6 Galo Blanco of Spain 6-4, 6-3.

Also advancing to the second round were Marcello Craca of Germany and Radomir Vasek of the Czech Republic.
