CHT accord to be signed under constitutional framework: PM

CHITTAGONG, Nov 10: Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina today said peace would be established in the Chittagong Hill Tracts very soon, reports BSS.

"Inshallah, a permanent peace will be established very soon in the hill tracts," she said while addressing the regimental commanding officers conference at the East Bengal Regiment Centre (EBRC) conference hall here.

She regretted that while peace was being established in the region after a long bloody clashes, a particular quarter was trying to disrupt it. They are making propaganda and opposing the peace accord," she said.

Sheikh Hasina said that the previous government had held 13 meetings with the tribal leaders in India to reach an accord on the hill tracts. She said Awami League had its representation on the committee and it did not oppose the effort. She said there are two opposition members in the present committee and the opposition leaders could know about the treaty from their own party members.

"How can the national independence and sovereignty of the country be at stake if a peace accord is signed with the tribal leaders? Does it mean that national independence and sovereignty will remain intact if there is turmoil, confrontation and clashes?" she asked.

The Prime Minister said the details of a peace accord are not generally made public before the accord is signed.

The Prime Minister urged the commanding officers not to pay heed to any propaganda regarding the peace accord. She said sacrifice made by the soldiers to keep peace in the hill tracts was unparalleled and the nation would never forget it. She firmly said that the accord would be signed within the framework of the Constitution and by protecting country's independence, integrity and sovereignty.

Sheikh Hasina reiterated that the army would not be withdrawn from the area.

Chief of Army Staff Lt Gen Mahubur Rahman, Principal Staff Officer Maj Gen Mostafizur Rahman and EBRC Commandant Brig Jahangir Kabir also addressed the conference.

Earlier, the Prime Minister addressed the ceremonial parade at the parade ground of the Chittagong cantonment, marking the presentation of national standards to 'Adarsha Ekush' (Ideal 21) and the Daring Tigers, two battalions of East Bengal Regiment.

She handed over the national standards, adorned with military decoration, to the 'Adarsha Ekush' (Ideal 21) and the Daring Tigers as the mark of their services to the nation. She also reviewed the smartly turned out parade and took salute of the impressive march past.

bogey of India."

Repellin was addressing a Roundtable on "National heritage preservation" at Alliance Francaise de Dhaka, as the chief speaker. He cited the example of the Lyon city of France and explained how the city was preserved as a living heritage. He also showed many documents related to the subject.

For heritage preservation he said, keeping, demolishing, retaining, restructuring, renovation, rehabilitation, quality of human work, commercial purpose, size of buildings, low income housing and authentic signs are the most important points.

refugees, included in the agenda, and said the outcome of the consultation on the model would be studied with great care by "our own experts in the government."

Dr Shamsul Bari, UNHCR Director of the Regional Bureau for Central Asia, South West Asia, North Africa and Middle East, said that Bangladesh had played a key role in developing SAARC as a regional forum. "We are happy to see that the problems of refugees and migratory movements have now been added on its agenda, albeit in the non-governmental sphere at this stage," said Bari.

He assured of UNHCR's continuous cooperation in Bangladesh's efforts for resolving its problems with Myanmar refugees. Bari lauded the government efforts for peace in the Chittagong Hill Tracts (CHT).

Justice Habibur Rahman said there are 21,000 Rohingya refugees staying in camps in Bangladesh while tribal refugees are coming back home. He expressed the hope that a durable solution would soon be worked out so that no citizen of Bangladesh would in future be compelled to seek asylum elsewhere.

In his welcome address earlier, Dr Kamal Hossain, Chairman of Bangladesh Association for the UNHCR, said that the SAARC region witnessed mass involuntary movement of 35 to 40 million people in the past five decades. Kamal, who is a member of the five-man team that drafted the Model National Law on Refugees called for more "imaginative initiatives" for regional cooperation to address the causes of mass exodus in the region.

Other members of the five-member committee, headed by former chief justice of India Justice P N Bhagwati, are Rishikesh Shaha of Nepal, Justice Dorab Patel of Pakistan (died recently) and Bradman Weerakoon of Sri Lanka.

On the opening day, five eminent persons from India, Pakistan, Nepal, Sri Lanka and Bangladesh presented 'country update on refugee situation. Besides, participants mooted in separate working sessions on the topics of 'Model National Legislation on Refugees' and 'Policy Options and Standards for a Regional Approach.'

Chief Justice M K Anwar, former Chief Justice of Pakistan Nasim Hasan Shah, Prof C R Abrar of Dhaka University, and a good number of jurists, law practitioners, refugee experts from home and abroad, were also present.

on the tenure of the loan sanctioned to each individual project.

The modalities say that foreign banks will have to repay the money to the BB in installments which will be fixed for each individual withdrawal of funds.

A grace period will be given to the banks for repayment of the money, but banks will have to pay interests on the loans for the grace period.

After the expiry of the grace period, the BB will recover the money on quarterly basis, starting from the date on which the grace period expires.

The banks will have to apply to the central bank with names of the industrial projects against which they need refinancing, and other relevant information.

Sources said the World Bank and the Asian Development Bank were also reviewing different measures to provide long-term industrial loans. A separate company will be set up later to manage a large fund for industrial financing. The process of setting up the company is on and negotiations for funds from the International Finance Corporation and ADB will be completed shortly.

As a move to float industrial bonds had flopped because of a fear of deposit withdrawal from banks, the finance minister had sought suggestions from the foreign banks for their greater role in industrial activities.

After detailed study, the foreign banks submitted a report to the finance minister agreeing to provide industrial loans if they are given a 25 million dollar rediscount facility.

The speech written by Thakur was recorded in the voice of Khandaker Mushtaque and broadcast by radio at about 8 am," Roy said adding that after about an hour chiefs of the armed forces, BDR, police and the acting chief of Rakkhi Bahini came to the radio station.

The witness said he at that time saw the chiefs and Major General Ziaur Rahman and Brig Khaled Mosharraf talking to Khandaker Mushtaque Ahmed at the studio number 2 and Thakur writing the text of oath of allegiance by the chiefs.

He said the oath of allegiance by the chiefs — Major General K M Shafiqullah of Army, Rear Admiral M H Khan of Navy, Air Vice Marshal AK Khandaker of Air Force, Major General Khalilur Rahman of BDR, IG Nurul Islam of police and the acting chief of Rakkhi Bahini — were recorded in their own voice and broadcast in turns.

A military helicopter will carry PCJSS supreme Jyotipriya Bodhipriya Lama alias Shantu Lama and his delegation to the capital on Sunday for the talks, aimed at reaching an agreement to resolve the decades-old insurgency by Shantibahini, military wing of the PCJSS.

Mohammad Ismail, Deputy Commissioner of Khagrachhari, is leaving for Tripura on Thursday to meet his counterpart in Udaipur district on the repatriation of Chakma refugees.

He is likely to be given a list of returnees by the Indian officials, sources concerned said.

Meanwhile, PCJSS, Pahari Chhatra Parishad (pro-sanchoy), Pahari Gana Parishad (PGP) and Hill Women's Federation separately observed the 14th death anniversary of PCJSS founder Manabendra Narayan Lama. He was assassinated by a renegade faction of Shantibahini at his hideout in Kalyanpur, Tripura, in 1983.

Roy was shift-in-charge of the main control room at Shahbagh from 10 pm on August 14 to 6 am the following day. The shift also included technical operator Mohammad Ali, mechanic Anwar Hossain and another technical hand.

"I woke up amidst firing outside the radio station at about 4:30 am on August 15," said the witness who was resting in his office room after the broadcasting of external services programme was completed at 2 am.

He said, "A number of army personnel, brandishing arms, entered the radio station at about 5:45 am and at gun point, compelled the police guards to surrender. Roy said he witnessed the incident from the room of shift-in-charge."

"After two to three minutes, some army jawans and officers, also with weapons in the ready, entered my room through the FM transmitter room," the PW said adding one of them identified himself as Major Dalim.

Dalim loudly wanted to know who is the shift-in-charge and Roy introduced himself. "Displaying his weapon, he (Dalim) said in a crude language: Sheikh Mujib and all his gang have been killed. Army has taken over power."

Major Dalim also asked Roy to switch on everything, saying that they would make an announcement. "Being afraid, I with the help of my colleagues, switched on the equipment," recalled the witness who is now 52 years old.

Later, Roy continued, Major Dalim wrote an announcement on a piece of paper and pointing at a radio receiver he said that he would make the announcement. "Dalim also threatened that all would be killed if the announcement is not heard over radio."

BTV earns over Tk 55cr, Betar Tk 9.08 cr

Bangladesh Television earned over Tk 55.70 crore as revenue from advertisement during 1996-97 fiscal year. State Minister for Information Prof Abu Sayeed told parliament yesterday, reports UNB.

Replying to Moulana Delwar Hossain Saidee (Jamaat-Piropur), he said the income was Tk 14.84 crore more than what the state-run electronic media earned in fiscal 1995-96.

In reply to a written question of Mohammad Mosharraf Hossain (BNP-Feni), the state minister said Bangladesh Betar earned Tk 9.08 crore during fiscal 1996-97 by broadcasting advertisement for approximately 2160 hours.

The companies who were the major advertisers in the Betar were Aromatic Cosmetics, Lever Brothers, Social Marketing, Square Toiletries, Keya Cosmetics, Amin Manufacturing, Kohinoor Chemical, Bengal Carbide, Quasem Group of Industries and Danish Condensed Milk.

For BTV, most of the advertisements came from Lever Brothers, Aromatic Cosmetics, Square Cosmetics, Seckitt & Coleman, Trans Company, Beximco Ltd, Abul Khair Group, Berger Paints, Sagar Chemical and Keya Cosmetics.

Prof Sayeed tells JS Necessary steps taken to improve service of BTV

Minister of State for Information Prof Abu Sayeed yesterday told the Jatiya Sangsad that the government had taken necessary steps to improve the service of the national media, particularly the Bangladesh Television (BTV), reports BSS.

Replying to a supplementary question, the State Minister said the past governments during the last 21 years had not taken any steps to improve the services of the national media, like television. Rather they had indulged in politicising which degraded the quality of services of the national media.

He said due to the extreme politicisation by the past government, the Japanese government had stopped its grant for the modernisation and development of Bangladesh Television.

He said following the fruitful visit of Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina to Japan this year, the

Japan government has revived its grant. Once the grant amounting to Taka 94 crore is available, the government would take necessary steps, including procurement of equipment and recruitment of efficient manpower for improving the services of the television.

Referring to the proposal for enhancement of the duration of live telecast of the proceedings of the Jatiya Sangsad from the existing one-hour to two hours, the state minister said it would be possible only after improvement of the television service in terms of equipment and manpower.

Earlier, the state minister told Meer Shakawat Ali Daru (AL-Bagerhat) that the government had no plans to set up a television relay centre at Bagerhat. He said the areas of Bagerhat are well covered by the TV relay station located at Khulna divisional town.

'Help reach fertiliser to farmers at fair price'

Food and Agriculture Minister Begum Motia Chowdhury yesterday urged the fertiliser traders to help reach fertiliser to the farmers at a fair price, reports BSS.

Inaugurating a nine-day training programme on fertiliser marketing management the minister also asked them to help teach the farmers the balanced use of fertiliser.

The function was addressed, among others, by director of fertiliser association of India Dr S K Saxena, leader of Fertiliser Group of Germany Manfred Jeebe and acting president of Bangladesh Fertiliser Association Kalluddin Ahmed.

A total of 51 fertiliser traders and officials of Bangladesh, India, Pakistan, Nepal, Vietnam, the Philippines and Korea are attending the training programme.
