SEA financial crisis hits Indian rupee

BOMBAY, Nov 19: A sharp drop in the Indian rupee is a sign that the currency can't be completely isolated from the economic turmoil its neighbours are experiencing, reports

Some Indian business leaders want an even weaker rupee, so that their exports can compete with goods from Southeast Asian countries where devaluations have meant prices for foreigners are cheap.

The rupee, which is not freely traded, hit a 21-month low of 37.52 to the US dollar during the day Tuesday, but recovered when the central bank intervened. It opened at 37.43 Wednesday, down from its Tuesday close of 37.39.

India had watched from the sidelines as the currencies of Thailand, Malaysia, Indonesia and the Philippines plummeted in recent months, revealing weaknesses in economies once lauded as tigers. The Indian rupee fell only 4.3 per cent. thanks in part to government controls.

The Reserve Bank of India sold an estimated 150 million dollars in US currency Tuesday to protect the rupee, drawing the line at the 37.50 mark. RBI Governor C. Rangarajan said there was no ground for a further weakening of the rupee in view his faith in the Indian economy, and added the central bank wouldn't hesitate to step into prevent "overshooting."

Indian exporters have been calling for a weaker rupee to stimulate exports, which grew only 4.2 per cent during the first half of the fiscal year that

ended September 30, down from nearly 10 per cent growth in fiscal year 1996-97 and 20 per cent in 1995-96.

Ramu S. Deora, President of the Federation of Indian Exporting Organizations, told Dow Jones news service that he expected the central bank to gradually allow the rupee to fall to make Indian exports competitive and protect domestic industries from cheap imports.

Deora predicted the rupee would fall as low as 38 to the dollar. The last time the rupee traded at Tuesday's levels was in 1996. It hit at an all-time low of 38.40 on February 6, 1996.

5 nations agree to build special economic zone

BEIJING Nov 19: China and four neighbouring countries have agreed to push forward with plans to develop the region near the Tumen river delta into a special economic zone, staterun media reported Wednesday,

Senior officials from China, Russia, Mongolia, North Korea and South Korea agreed to seek more outside funding for the project, which is intended to build an economic hub in the undeveloped region along North Korea's border with China and Russia, the newspaper China

Daily reported. The agreement was reached at a UN-sponsored meeting in Beijing Monday and Tuesday. The United Nations Development Programme has pledged 3.4 million dollar in technical assistance for the project, in

addition to the five million dollars provided by other countries, the report said. The Beijing meeting was the latest called by the UNDP to discuss how to develop the 10,000-square-kilometer

(3,860-square-mile) Tumen River delta, where the borders of North Korea, China and Russia meet. The project, which calls for construction of a port, railroads, highways and an inter-

national airport, is expected to cost some 30 billion dollars over the next 20 years, according to UN officials. North Korea, in its first ex-

periment with capitalism, has opened a free trade zone within its part of the region, and is currently pursuing investors, but the Tumen project remains on the drawing board.



prices in South Korea rose Wednesday as investors awaited government measures to stabilize the country's quavering financial markets, but Tokyo boomeranged down. All other Asian markets fell, except for Taiwan, reports AP.

South Korea's Composite Index rose 1.6 per cent, or 7.93 points, to 502.59.

The South Korean government dismissed two senior economic ministers blamed for the country's financial troubles. and appointed a new finance and economy minister and chief economic adviser.

The new minister, Lim Chang-ryul, waited until after the stock market closed to announce a package of measures, including nearly tripling South Korea's bad-debt fund and opening the medium — and longterm guaranteed corporate bond market to foreign investors.

Lim also said mergers and acquisitions will be allowed among weak banks and merchant banks, and the central bank will ask foreign banks for around dirs 10 billion in loans this year.

"The market rose as the ex-

nancial market measures signals the new finance and economy minister's strong intention to tide over the current financial crisis," said Han Sukchul, a senior analyst at KFB Securities Co.

In Tokyo, the Nikkei stock average tumbled 884.11 points or 5.3 per cent to 15,842.46 in the largest point fall this year.

Fears over Japan's economic health returned following the dashing of hopes for an injection of public money into the baking system, which is burdened by bad debt. The Nikkei had gained 11 per cent on Monday and Tues-
