Ten more HC judges likely to be appointed

Ten more judges are likely to be appointed soon in the High Court Division of the Supreme Court, according to highly placed officials sources.

There are 35 judges, 11 Division Benches and 12 Single Benches in the High Court Division of the Supreme Court

The Supreme Court Bar Association recently requested the President for appointment of more judges. They also met the Law Minister. The sources said that there has been a backlog of cases in the High Court.

Court rooms are being readied for the judges to be appointed. The Judicial Administration Training Institute and the Law Commission, both house in the old High Court building now, have been asked to vacate it for this purpose, the sources said.

Breakthrough in CHT peace talks likely

Negotiators from the National Committee on Chittagong Hill Tracts (NCCHT) are expecting a breakthrough in their talks with the Parbattya Chattagram Jana Sanghati Samity (PCJSS).

Highly placed sources said after three hours of talks with PCJSS leaders yesterday that NCCHT negotiators were hopeful of signing an agreed minutes to end the insurgency in the Chittagong Hill Tracts.

The talks, seventh in the current series, began at the state guest house Padma at 3-30 pm. The NCCHT delegation was led Chief Whip of Jatiya Sangsad Abul Hasnat Abdullah while the PCJSS team was headed by Jyotirindriyo Bodhipriyo Larma alias Shantu

The talks were adjourned at 6:30 pm till 10:30 am today after one and a half-hours of exclusive meeting between Abdullah and Shantu Larma.

Sources said the two sides picked up the unresolved issues dogging an agreement, following pressure by the PCJSS for some amendments to the draft agreed upon earlier by Shantu Larma. Abdullah slipped out of the

state guest house without meeting the waiting newsmen outside. No one from the NCCHT was on hand to brief the newsmen although indications were given earlier from the guest house that there would be a briefing at 7 pm.

Food import from SAARC states

Govt plans to withdraw radiation tests

By Morshed Ali Khan

The government is planning to withdraw the last remaining barrier — radiation tests —to import of food items from SAARC countries.

As a result, huge quantities of rice, wheat, corn, fruits and vegetables will pour into the Daily Star, commenting on the country unchecked.

According to sources in the commerce ministry, the proposed Import Policy for 1997-2000 has prescribed a total withdrawal of radiation tests on food items imported from India, Pakistan, the Maldives, Nepal, Bhutan and Sri Lanka.

In the current Import Policy effective since 24 April 1996, exporters are required to declare the origin of the item at any point of entry.

"Bangladesh has been a dumping ground for many substandard consumer items," said a commerce ministry official. "It is most likely that these traders would take all the advantage. All they need to do is to make a simple declaration."

Most of the food items are currently imported from India, Pakistan and Sri Lanka. Other SAARC countries export little or no food to Bangladesh. The government's 1996 deci-

SC Quetta Bench suspends Pak CJ

QUETTA, Nov 26: Two Pakistan Supreme Court judges today ordered the suspension of Chief Justice Sajjad Ali Shah, who is at the centre of a constitutional battle with the government, report agencies. The president's 1994 ap-

pointment of Shah to the top judicial post "is held in abeyance," a two-judge Quetta Bench of the Supreme Court ruled Shah "shall cease to perform

judicial and administrative functions and powers of the Chief Justice of Pakistan until further order," Irashd Hasan Khan and Khalilur Rehman declared. The interim decision was given on a petition challenging

Shah's appointment on the grounds that he was not the most senior judge when promoted during the government of former premier Benazir Bhutto. The petition was filed by Assad Ali, a businessmen in the Baluchistan capital of Quetta ast month. According to Pakistani law

the chief justice must be the senior most judge, which Shah was not when he was appointed to head the Supreme Court, said constitutional lawyer Aslam Chishti. It was not clear whether the
