Bill to be placed in next JS session

Death penalty proposed for rail, road barricade

Obstructing rail, road and waterway communications is a criminal offence under a proposed bill, seeking a maximum punishment of death sentence

for this. A bill in this regard will be placed before the Jatiya

Sangsad in its next session. The draft bill, titled Prevention of Violence Against Women and Children and Anti-Terrorism Bill, was approved by the cabinet about three weeks ago. The bill, prepared by the

Ministry of Home Affairs, seeks to replace the Women and Children Repression Act, 1995. All. pending cases under the Act will be disposed of according to the provisions of the proposed bill, it passed by the Sangsad. The bill says, "Death penalty

or life imprisonment or rigorous imprisonment (RI) ranging from seven to 14 years may be awarded to anyone found guilty

of 'extortion'. "Of obstructing rail, road and waterway communication. setting fire to installation of

power and telecommunication, moveable and immovable property of government, autonomous, non-government organisations and embassies. "Of creating anarchy at pub-

lic places, industries, organisations, terminals. And "of planning to create obstacles or interfering in the invitation, distribution of ten-

der forms of institutions." Investigation of cases filed under the proposed bill will have to be completed within 60 days of the report on offence or order of the magistrate. The court may, however, extend the time limit by 30 days in the first phase and another 30 days

in the next phase. Any person directly accused of any offence under the bill

will not be granted bail during the investigation period.

Courts constituted under the bill will complete trial of the cases within 120 days of receipt of those. The bill further says, a max-

imum punishment of death penalty or life imprisonment with a fine of Tk one lakh may be awarded to anyone found guilty of attempting to kill or of killing a child or woman with explosive materials. "A maximum of seven years

and a minimum of three years RI with a fine of Tk 50,000 may be awarded to anyone for at tempting to throw explosive material on a woman or a child even if the person is not physically or mentally affected."

About crimes relating to trafficking of women and children, abduction of women, rape and dowry the bill says. "Death See Page 12 Col 2

General Ershad had resigned in the afternoon of the December 6, 1990.

The then Chief Justice Shahabuddin Ahmed as took over power as President and supervised the country's first ever free and fair general election on February 27, 1991 held under a non-party caretaker government. BNP was voted to power and Awami League to the seat of the main opposition.

President Shahabuddin Ahmed in a message on the occasion urged all irrespective of party affiliations to come for-

end to the prevailing situation in the country. "Sincere cooperation of all including the political parties are needed for continuation of hard earned democracy and for giving it a permanent institu-

tional shape," he said. Shahabuddin said all national problems should be discussed in parliament and it was the constitutional responsibility of members of both the ruling and the opposition parties to make the parliament effective. Otherwise, the President said the democratic process would be severely hampered.

some 400 kilograms of telapia fish from the lake in the city. But workmen and residents observing the department's fishing activities said there was hardly any fish in the 50-acre stretch of the lake water. Fishermen said they were getting almost nothing with their fine nets. "In one haul

there isn't even a kilogram of fish," said a fisherman trying to catch the last remaining fish before all the water is pumped out with the progress of the Dhanmondi lake development project. Fisheries Department offi-

PM lays foundation stone

Power from barge mounted plant likely by Aug '98

KHULNA, Dec 5: Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina today laid the foundation stone of the country's first private barge mounted power plant here expressing the hope that it would supply power to the national grid by August next year, reports UNB.

The 108-megawatt power plant of the Khulna Power Company is being installed at Goalpara on the bank of river

Bhairab. The Khulna power project is being run by three companies -Wartsila New Sulzer Diesel Power Development, Summit Industrial and Mercantile Corporation, and United Enterprise and Company. The total project cost is US dollar 100-105 million.

Official sources said in

Bangladesh, the per capita electricity generation is only 95 KWH and only 16 per cent of the country's population have access to electricity.

In order to increase access to electricity and advance economic development, the government decided to add significant power generation capacity over next several years.

According to the 1996 Private Power Generation Policy. such expansion will require investment of some 6.6 billion US dollars between 1996 to 2005, the official sources said.

Addressing on the occasion, the prime minister said, "It was a tough decision as the country has no experience to generate power in the private sector. This step would encourage fur-
