CHT accord
BNP may seek
President's
intervention

BNP lawmakers are scheduled to march through the city thoroughfares today, wearing black badges and carrying black flags, to protest the CHT accord.

BNP chief and Leader of the Opposition in Jatiya Sangsad is expected to lead the march, scheduled to start at 10 am from her Minto Road official residence.

The march aims at triggering protests and "resistance across the country against the black accord," said a BNP statement issued last night.

After parading the city streets, the Opposition lawmakers are due to move towards the Bangabhaban where a small group of party MPs will meet.

Border villagers host traffickers

As night falls, 'guests' start arriving

Almost every house along the Benapole border has some provisions for accommodating a number of paying guests. It may be a hut or an attractive pucca structure. And inside, the owners proudly display large rest areas including temporary beds, etc and cooking utensils, glasses, bowls — an indication of how many guests they can put up at a time and on short notice.

The house owners may be elderly men or women. They cater to hundreds of people travelling to India without passport. In the darkness, the clients are

simply led through the border and into India, a few yards away while in the distance BDR personnel in their makeshift outposts stand guard. Locally the travellers are known as *dhurs*.

During the day, these 'houses' near the border are empty, and look abandoned. But as night falls these village houses bubble with life. Women light up their cookers to prepare meals for the 'guests' who suddenly arrive, and keep on arriving throughout the night. They mingle with the occupants, have food and then wait for the

The government has extended the time for submission of the report of the task force on activities of trade unions in the nationalised commercial banks (NCBs) by three months.

A five-member team headed by Deputy Governor of Bangladesh Bank Ibrahim Khaledi is currently looking into the activities of the collective bargaining agents (CBAs) of the NCBs.

The task force report was supposed to be submitted by October 30. The Finance Ministry, after a long delay, extended the time till February 28.

The task force had distributed written questionnaires among the trade union leaders and interviewed all the managing directors of the NCBs and other officials.

According to sources, the task force discovered that contrary to law, there are CBAs in the branches of the banks. The law says, CBA should be in the head office, and there can not be any separate CBA in the branch offices.

The task force members have also found that managers of the banks branches often hold meetings with CBAs in their branches which have no

legal standing.

One member of the task force told The Daily Star that it would be more important and difficult to implement the report of the task force, rather than preparing it.

This is because the report may suggest some drastic measures to stop the draconian activities of the trade unions. Unless the government has enough political will to streamline the banking sector, it would be impossible to implement the recommendations," said the source.

Court rooms being set up at HC for new judges

of BJP

NEW DELHI, Dec 20: India's Hindu nationalists, within striking distance of power, said today people of different faiths had nothing to fear from them, reports Reuter.

The Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP), tipped to emerge as the largest single group in elections next spring, has been accused by rivals of a deep-seated prejudice against India's 120 million Muslims.

But in Bhubaneshwar, capital of the eastern state of Orissa where BJP leaders gathered for an election strategy session, the party signalled it was keen to dispel those suspicions.

"We pledge to build a society free of fear and hunger ... where the genuine social and economic problems of the minority communities shall be taken care of by a responsive and responsible state," a political resolution released by the party's elite national executive said.

In the four-page document around which the BJP will build its campaign for the 1998

14 succumb to cold bites in two days

At least 14 people died due to cold in different areas of the country in the last two days.

The mercury began dipping with the cool air blowing from the north from Friday.

Four persons died yesterday. An unidentified person was found dead at Daudkandi and three others — an elderly people — succumbed to bites of winter at Kazipur thana of Sirajganj and in the char areas of Gabtala, according to reports received in the city.

Ten persons died in the northern districts on Friday.

As the cold wind blew from the north, a veil of mist kept the horizon clouded most of the day in the city yesterday.

The haze which hung over the city in the morning and afternoon turned grey with pollutant smoke from auto-rick-

shaws, buses and trucks. It cleared later in the day, returning at night to mask the city streets.

Many BNP lawmakers disown statement demanding polls

Contradiction and confusion have surfaced among the top brass of main opposition BNP over the press statement by some of the party MP seeking immediate election to parliament, reports UNB.

A statement was issued on Friday in the name of 50 MPs of BNP, strongly protesting the CHT accord and observing that an immediate election has become necessary to overcome the present situation.

When contacted, a number of lawmakers shown as signatories, expressed their utter surprise about the statement and said they knew nothing about it.

"I've just seen it this morning in the newspapers ... I can't understand how my name appeared as a signatory to the statement," said Chowdhury Kamal ibne Yusuf.

He said possibly many of the signatories did not know about this statement beforehand.

Amanullah Aman told the new agency in the evening that

he has just arrived in the capital from his constituency. "I can't say anything about it, but there is a clear instruction from the party that a member will own any statement issued by the party," he said.

Similar ignorance about the statement was expressed by two other MPs — Col (retd) Oli Ahmed and Maj (retd) Akhtaruzzaman — who, however, were not signatories to it.

Standing Committee member Col (retd) Oli Ahmed told the news agency over phone from Chittagong that he has been demanding for a mid-term elections for last six months, but "I don't know about the Friday's press statement."

Maj (retd) Akhtaruzzaman said, "We don't know anything about it. Probably, it was the same group which has intruded into the party from different places and are now trying to split the BNP."

Sources said the issue of new election was not even raised at the BNP standing committee.

10 km-long queue of vehicles at Aricha

SAVAR, Dec 20: The traffic congestion at Aricha, Natakhola and Daulatdia ferry ghats, deteriorated further today following disruption of ferry services caused by thick fog during the last two days, reports UNB.

The congestion has been prevailing in the three ghats for the last several days as movement of ferries slowed down due to drastic fall of water level in the Padma and Jamuna.

BIWTC sources said some 5,000 vehicles remained stranded at the three ghats and a 10 kilometre-long queue of vehicles has been formed on the

Dhaka-Aricha highway today. About 2000 vehicles were waiting inside the terminals having BIWTC serial and the rest are outside the terminals.

The sources said ferry service remained inoperative for a total of about 12 hours on Thursday and Friday due to poor visibility for thick fog.

Meanwhile, the transportation of goods from the country's northern and southern region has virtually come to a halt, causing the prices of rice and other essentials to go up.

Traders said the usual delay at the ghats also raised the truck fare from nearly Tk 2,500 to Tk 14,000 to 16,000 for transporting goods from north-eastern districts.

Our Pabna Correspondent adds: About 1200 vehicles in a five-kilometre-long queue have been stuck at the Natakhola ferry ghat.

Direct road communications between the northern and eastern parts of the country are completely dependent on Natakhola and Aricha ferry services.

The other road link between the two parts of the country via Sirajganj and Bhauapur ghats was snapped about two months ago due to sharp fall in water level of Jamuna.
