

Indian cricket organisers slagged off

COLOMBO, Dec 27: Cricket commentators on Saturday blasted Indian authorities for under-preparing the wicket for a one-day international against world champions Sri Lanka, reports AP.

The match was abandoned as a draw after three overs with Sri Lanka batting at 17 for one earlier this week.

In a country that has produced the current president of the International Cricket Council (Jagmohan Dalmiya), for such a turn of events to take place is shameful, said Sa'adi Thawfeeq, a leading Sri Lanka cricket commentator.

For the first time in cricket history, the one-day international was called off because the wicket was considered unsafe for batsmen. The match was played at Indore, a central Indian town.

"A sad day for one-day cricket," said Elmo Rodrigopulle, another cricket commentator.

Those who were in charge of preparing the wicket should have understood that his is not a game between two village teams. It was being played by world champions Sri Lanka and India who also were the champions of this game a few years back," Rodrigopulle said.

India won the opening game of the current three one-day matches series against Sri Lanka. The third and final one-day international will be played at Goa on Sunday.

To prepare wickets that could cause players injury, permanent or temporary, is not what is expected from a host country," said Rodrigopulle.

He demanded that the ICC impose fine or punish Indian organisers so that the action could serve as a warning to other countries.

"It is sad that it should happen at the Nehru Stadium, named after one of India's foremost prime ministers (Jawahar Lal Nehru)," Thawfeeq said.

Lepetelo knocks Vorapin out

BANGKOK, Dec 27: Underdog Zolani Lepetelo of South Africa captured the International Boxing Federation mini-flyweight championship Saturday with a fourth round knockout of Thailand's Rattanapol Vorapin in a match marred by racial insults, reports AP.

The fight was a crushing reversal in Rattanapol's promising career, as he had just signed a five-year contract with Don King, boxing's most powerful and controversial promoter, and was expected to be showcased to American audiences beginning next year.

But Lepetelo, who changed those plans.

The fighter, ranked the No 10 contender by the IBF, spent most of the fight retreating from Rattanapol (23-3-1). His soft right jab seemed unable to hold off the shorter, harder-hitting champion.

But Lepetelo caught the Thai with a straight left midway through the fourth round. Rattanapol stumbled back toward the ropes where Lepetelo unleashed a barrage of punches that had the Thai covering up.

The South African landed a sharp right hook followed by a straight left and the champion crumpled to the canvas. He was up by the count of two, but after a mandatory eight count, referee Willie Mills of Australia waved his hands in the air stopping the fight.

Rattanapol, clearly dazed, then tripped over his own feet and fell to the canvas again.

The victory was sweet revenge for Lepetelo.

Rattanapol, who had defended his title six times, taunted Lepetelo before the fight by bringing in a Thai covered with black body paint and carrying a club into the ring. The character was straight out of the racial stereotypes seen in Hollywood movies early in the century.

Both fighters, weighing in at 105 pounds (47 kilograms) were southpaws. The match was held in the city of Songkhla, 950 kilometers (590 miles) south of Bangkok.

Goa set to take the heat

NEW DELHI, Dec 27: World champions Sri Lanka will bid to level the one-day international series with hosts India in the final match tomorrow in the western state of Goa following a pitch fiasco earlier in the week, reports AFP.

India had recorded a shock victory in the opening match. But the second game on Thursday at Indore, in central India, lasted only three overs before officials decided the pitch was too dangerous following a series of fearful deliveries off the dusty surface.

The Sri Lankans, who had been expected to dominate the series through their world-class batting, will have to decide whether to persevere with their tactic of relying on five rather than six specialist batsmen.

The tactic failed dramatically in Guwahati, when the loss of three quick wickets — including Sanath Jayasuriya and Aravinda de Silva, regarded as two of the most feared one-day performers in world cricket — ended the tourists' chances.

At Indore, however, Sri Lanka had said they would again cut back their batting to make way for an extra spinner.

For India, the major question mark hangs over whether seamer Debashish Mohanty will be included. Mohanty played a key role in the win at Guwahati but was unexpectedly replaced for the second game by all-rounder Rishikesh Kantikar.

Meanwhile, Indian officials today sealed off the under-prepared pitch in Indore. Indore city municipal authorities fenced off the pitch and said it was being sealed to help former Indian captain Kapil Dev to conduct an investigation.

A local cricket match scheduled to be played on the controversial pitch earlier Saturday was also cancelled, municipal commissioner Praant Prashar said. Kapil Dev, heading a seven-member team of former Indian cricketers to probe Thursday's fiasco, will also study the suitability of various cricket grounds in India for international fixtures.

But French manager Arsene Wenger had a nervous time as his side buckled under a Leicester fightback, former England captain David Platt flicked in the opening goal in the 36th minute with a close range header of a free kick from Dennis Bergkamp.

Leicester captain Steve Walsh provided the second with a spectacular 56th minute own goal, the ball ballooning off his knee high into the air and then down behind goalkeeper Kasey Keller and into the net.

Neil Lennon pulled a goal back for Leicester in the 77th after England goalkeeper David Seaman, going through a hesitant patch of form, made a mistake.

Tottenham, Arsenal's opponents in the North London Derby on Sunday, were still without the returning Juergen Klinsmann and were ripped apart of Villa Park.

Collymore scored in the 82nd and 89th but also missed another gaping chance. Mark Draper scored Villa's other goals while Colin Calderwood hit Spurs goal in the 59th after the ball appeared to go in off his arm.

West Ham moved up to eighth place on 20 points, after beating Coventry 1-0 for their eighth win in nine league matches at home this season.

Newcastle had David Batty dismissed and dropped to 10th after losing 1-0 at Derby through fourth minute penalty from Italian Stefano Eranio.

Anand, Adams split first point

GRONINGEN, Netherlands, Dec 27: Indian Viswanathan Anand and Englishman Michael Adams settled for half a point each Friday in the first of their four-game FIDE World Chess Championship match, reports AP.

The winner will go on to challenge FIDE world champion Anatoly Karpov over six games in Lausanne, Switzerland, starting New Year's Day.

Adams, playing white, responded to Anand's Sicilian Defence by sacrificing a central pawn on move 7 for a slight advantage in space and a kingside attack.

But Anand (Elo rating 2765) defended diligently and though Adams (2680) won back his pawn during a burst of exchanges, the game transposed into a drawish endgame with rooks and pawns.

The two Grand Masters agreed a draw on move 55. There was a single white pawn remaining on the board, but Anand's black king was about to pounce on it.

It will be Anand's turn to play with the white pieces when the two Grand Masters return to the Martinihal for game two Saturday.

English soccer scene

LONDON, Dec 27: Champions Manchester United strolled to a 2-0 win over Everton and opened a six-point lead in the Premier league on Friday, reports Reuters.

Blackburn Rovers stayed second on 40 points after a 0-0 draw at Sheffield Wednesday while Chelsea were a point behind in third place after a mistake by defender Frank Sinclair gave Wimbledon a 1-1 reward.

But the biggest surprise of the day was provided by Aston Villa's Stan Collymore, who scored twice in his club's 4-1 rout of Tottenham Hotspur after being charged by police with assault on Wednesday.

The goals doubled the out-of-form striker's previous tally of two in 21 matches since he joined Villa from Liverpool for seven million pounds (11.7 million dollars) at the start of the season.

United's Norwegian defender Henning Berg beat compatriot Thomas Myhre in the Everton goal with a 14th minute header — his first league goal for the leaders and the first Myhre had conceded in English soccer.

Striker Andy Cole made it 2-0 in the 35th with a delightful chip for his 12th league goal.

United, with Danish goalkeeper Peter Schmeichel absent with influenza and striker Teddy Sheringham on the bench with winger Ryan Giggs, should have scored far more against a side that had just one shot on goal.

Everton, two points off the bottom, replaced injured captain Dave Watson with 16-year-old defender Francis Jeffers in the second half.

It was a baptism of fire yet Everton, with eight first team regulars absent and a sprinkling of teenagers making up the ranks, kept the goal down.

Cole picked up his third booking in three matches while Czech Karel Poborsky was booked for diving on a day when none of the bottom eight clubs won.

Liverpool moved up to fourth place on 34 points, ahead of Leeds on goal difference, after beating the fifth-placed side 3-1 at Anfield.

Michael Owen opened the scoring in the 46th minute and Robbie Fowler followed with two more. Leeds grabbed an 84th minute consolation goal through Alf Inge Haaland.

Blackburn manager Roy Hodgson declared himself happy with his draw but Chelsea probably felt sicker than most after Sinclair's poor back pass gifted Wimbledon's Michael Hughes an equaliser in the 28th minute.

Italian Gianluca Viali had put Chelsea ahead on eight minutes from close range, after a fine pass from Norwegian Tore Andre Flo, for his 12th goal of the season.

Arsenal ended their recent indifferent run with a 2-1 win at home to Leicester to stay sixth.

Stephen's unlucky eighth

MELBOURNE, Dec 27: Steve Waugh yet again stumbled just short of a Test century today when he was dismissed for 96 early on the second day of the first cricket Test against South Africa, reports AP.

It was the eighth time in 99 Tests that the 32-year-old Australian right-hander has reached the 90s only to miss out on a century.

Vaugh's gutsy innings ended with a brilliant catch by Healy in fast bowler Glenn McGrath's second spell after tea.

Last month Waugh was poised for a century against New Zealand but was bowled by Shane O'Connor for 96 in the second Test in Perth.

Waugh was twice stranded in the 90s when Australia were dismissed during the 1994-95 home series against England — 99 in the fifth Perth Test and 94 in the second Melbourne Test.

He was bowled by Waqar Younis for 98 in the second Test against Pakistan in Rawalpindi in October 1994 and fell for 92 against England at Old Trafford in July 1989.

Waugh suffered the anguish of back-to-back 90s against the West Indies early in his Test career in 1988.

He was out for 90 in the first Test in Brisbane and 11 days later was caught behind off Curtly Ambrose for 91 in the second Test in Melbourne.

Although he has scored eight 90s, he has gone on to post 14 Test centuries. The last ones came in the first and second innings of the three Test against England at Manchester last July.

Diego urged to bail out Napoli

BUENOS AIRES, Dec 27: Argentine soccer star Diego Maradona said Friday he was considering a proposal by an opposition faction within Italy's Napoli to make him president of the club, which is in dire economic and sport straits, reports Reuters.

In a television interview, Maradona, who announced his retirement as a player two months ago, said that in coming days he was sending a representative, Guillermo Coppola, to Italy to analyze the offer.

But he made it clear he wanted wide powers to try to bail out Napoli, now at the bottom in the Italian league standings.

A group, opposed to current Napoli president Corrado Ferlaino, proposed this week that Maradona be named president in order to attract fans and the backing of businessmen, thereby amassing more money to purchase players.

Maradona played for Napoli from 1984 to 1992.

Kirsten keeps Proteas afloat

MELBOURNE, Dec 27 (AP/AF): West African opener Gary Kirsten was left to fight alone in increasingly difficult batting conditions as Australia tightened the grip Saturday in the first cricket Test against South Africa.

Kirsten was 61 not out and Brian McMillan unbeaten on six in South Africa's 94 for four at stumps on the second day.

That was in reply to Australia's 309 all out thanks to a Ricky Ponting century.

Ponting's third ball and he clipped the ball off a variable bounce. South African batsmen struggled to put bat to ball and force the pace at the Melbourne Cricket Ground.

Pat's prediction MELBOURNE, Dec 27: South African off-spinner Pat Symcox said Saturday his side was far from beaten in the first Test against Australia despite a disappointing second day's performance, reports AP.

At a stumps on Saturday, South Africa were struggling in their first innings at 94 for 4, still 215 runs short of Australia's total of 309 on a wicket that was providing plenty of turn for the home side's main weapon, Shane Warne.

Symcox, who earlier in the day took his best Test figures of 4 for 69 including a magnificent delivery to get rid of Australian century maker Ricky Ponting, said the history of the team proved they could come back from difficult positions.

"If you look at the past history of this team, our team, then this Test match is a long way from being over, no matter what the scores are at this point," he said.

Symcox played a match-winning role in the Proteas' last "miraculous" triumph when he took 3 for eight in the second innings of the series-winning victory in Pakistan, when the home side was bowled out for just 92 after chasing 146 for victory.

Symcox provided one of the highlights of Saturday's play with the ball that dismissed Ponting. The Australian watched in disbelief as it spun back and clipped his off stump.

Test in a short career. He reached his second Test century with his 14th run, a clip through square leg off Shaun Pollock.

His maiden hundred also came during a crisis when he made 127 in the crucial fourth Ashes Test against England at Headingley in July after the Australians had slumped to 50 for four.

Waugh has been dismissed eight times in the 90s, a rather dubious world record which he now shares with West Indian Alvin Kallicharran.

After Waugh departed, wicketkeeper Ian Healy (16) played on to last bowler Allan Donald.

Waugh, now with 6,186 runs, passed Neil Harvey's 6,149 to become the sixth-highest Test run scorer.

Ponting and Paul Reiffel (27) put on 52 for the seventh-wicket before Ponting was surprisingly bowled around his legs without offering a shot to Symcox.
