## US, Malaysian investors keen to invest in various sectors

A five-member delegation of Malaysian investors, led by Aziz Mustafa, called on Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina at her office yesterday, reports UNB.

During the meeting, the private sector investors team expressed its willingness to invest in physical infrastructure projects and in the power, energy and transport sectors.

The Malaysian investors especially showed interest in investment in mass transit system and city railway projects.

Welcoming the Malaysian investors team, the Prime Minister said the present government is offering a very attractive investment package for the investors.

## 'Thwart any attempt to misinterpret Islam'

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday urged the people to be imbued with real teaching of Islam to thwart the ill-attempts of the vested quarters who were out to misinterpret it, report agencies.

"We will have to remain alert so that the vested quarters can not trade on religion taking advantage of our soft feelings towards religion," she said.

The Prime Minister was inaugurating the construction of the Islamic Foundation Complex building at Sher-e-Bangla Nagar here in the morning.

In the first phase, five floors of the 10-storey foundation complex will be built at a cost of Tk 10 crore. Another Tk 15 crore will be needed to complete the remaining construction works.

Sheikh Hasina said acceptability of the Islamic Foundation has risen among the people for its expanded activities on the socio-economic issues like imam training, mosque-based children and mass education, poverty alleviation, free treat-

ment and publication programmes.

She said Islam has made education obligatory for every Muslim men and women.

"If poverty is a curse, then ignorance is a more dangerous curse," the Prime Minister said, adding that only education can salvage this huge burden of illiterate people from the curse of poverty.

Hasina called for concerted government and private initiatives to make the nation free from the curse of illiteracy. Only the government budget and initiative are not enough for this gigantic task, she said.

She said the Religious Affairs Ministry can strengthen and make effective the Islamic Foundation's programme for imparting mass and child education with the help of lakhs of mosques across the country.

The Prime Minister assured possible help of the government for conducting and expanding mosque-based education programme for children.

In this regard, they blamed the AL government for what they said not accepting BNP's rightful demands and continuing undemocratic practices undermining the sovereignty of parliament.

The recently-signed peace accord on the Chittagong Hill Tracts (CHT), opposed by the BNP, also came up for discussion.

The BNP leaders also shared their 'bitter' experience about national politics, economy and law and order with the US Ambassador, said a leader attending the meeting.

the SKOP that it was none of their business to decide on privatisation."

The financial concessions given by the government was an alarming signal", it added.

"It negates the concern shown by the government so far to establish competitive economy. What is most regrettable is that the issues have not been discussed at the Tripartite Consultative Committee (TCC) which is the legally constituted apex body to determine labour-related issues," the statement pointed out.

"In the absence of any opportunity to discuss issues in the TCC, the employers' view points have been ignored which will also have an adverse impact on investment circles," the statement pointed out.

Secondly, it will set a limit on the privatisation process which will cause a setback to introduction of market economy.

Thirdly, the agreement will lead to retention of surplus manpower in the public sector enterprises.

It will also involve increased subsidy to the nationalised sector, the statement said.

"Quite clearly, this will put further pressure on the country's ailing financial institutions," it observed.

The statement said, the agreement will put a brake on the process of privatisation which will mean "perpetuation of inefficiency."

These 19 employees include eight who have already been suspended by the BB authorities.

The report also recommended an inquiry to find out why the BB's internal security did not take action to stop the violence. It should be investigated whether there had been any security lapses which resulted in the violence, the report said.

Meanwhile, the government has taken strict security measures in the BB, deploying some 250 policemen including riot police.

As per the decisions, Tk 9 crore 20 lakh were disbursed recently for creating accommodation facilities for another 4000 prisoners in the jails across the country.

Besides, 580 posts of prison staff for various jails have also been created.

The number of kitchens on the basis of one kitchen per 500 prisoners is also being increased, the sources said, adding that at present there is only one kitchen in every jail. There is only one kitchen even in the Dhaka Central Jail and the number is likely to be increased to four.

Separate interview rooms for convicted prisoners are also under active consideration. There are only 10 interview rooms in the Dhaka Central Jail where more than 300 prisoners meet their relatives through these cubicles every day.

## 10pc of traffic police suffer from jaundice or liver diseases

At least 10 per cent of the traffic police in the capital either suffer from jaundice or other liver diseases, according to a police official, reports UNB.

Black smoke, scorching heat and dust may be the main causes for jaundice as the traffic police are exposed to such hostile environment everyday while performing their duty.

As per records of the Dhaka Metropolitan Police (DMP), usually at least two or three traffic police take leave either because of jaundice or related complications every month.
