

Anand, Karpov split point

WIJK AAN ZEE, Jan 26: Grand Master Viswanathan Anand was held to a draw by FIDE world champion Anatoly Karpov after the Indian was in a better position to take the game in the eighth round of the Hoogovens Grand Masters chess tournament, reports PTI.

Karpov, who retained his world chess crown beating Anand in Lausanne earlier this month gave a fighting display to share the point, much to the disappointment of chess fans who hoped for a revenge from the Indian.

Despite drawing Karpov, the world number 3 Anand with 5.5 points maintained his lead in the tournament, which still has five more rounds to go.

The only win of the day was registered by Dutch player Jan Timman, who defeated the British Grand Master Michael Adams in 56 moves.

The remaining six games ended in draws here last night with Vladimir Kramnik of Russia, Valery Salov and Timman, all with 5 points each maintaining the second spot.

The world number 2 Kramnik drew with Salov, to end his third game in a draw, after making a brilliant start of the tournament by winning his first four games.

Lankans make a clean sweep

Jayasuriya jolts tourists

COLOMBO, Jan 26: Sri Lanka defeated Zimbabwe by four wickets in the third and final one-day cricket international.

to make a clean sweep of the three-match series at the Sinhalese Sports Club ground here today, reports AFP.

Chasing 282 for victory, Sri Lanka reached the target off the last ball of the 49th over when Upal Chandana hoisted a delivery from makeshift bowler Alistair Campbell for a huge six over long-on.

But it was opener Sanath Jayasuriya who set the pace for Sri Lanka with a blistering innings of 102 with 13 fours and one six, with his century coming in just 97 balls.

Jayasuriya was named both player-of-the-match and player-of-the-series with an aggregate of 200 runs.

"I thought we batted well in the first 15 overs to win the match," said Jayasuriya, who captained the side after Sri Lanka rested key players Arjuna Ranatunga, Aravinda de Silva and Roshan Mahanama.

Sri Lanka posted 94 runs while losing two wickets in the first 15 overs.

Newcomer Mahela Jayawardena contributed towards Sri Lanka's victory with 74 runs from 80 balls while adding 73 runs to the total with Jayasuriya in a third wicket alliance.

WELLINGTON, New Zealand, Jan 26: Hard-hitting opener Lorne Howell has been named in the New Zealand limited-overs cricket team for the first two internationals against Zimbabwe in early February, reports AP.

Howell, 25, was named Monday in a squad of 12 for the games at Hamilton on Feb. 4 and at Wellington on Feb. 6.

He won selection with some excellent displays at the top of the Canterbury order this season. In the last New Zealand domestic seasons, Howell has hit 862 runs at an average of 48, including two centuries and nine 50s.

He is the only new face in the New Zealand squad, with the other 11 players having survived from the one-day campaign in Australia.

Two openers have been dropped Bryan Young and Craig Spearman, while experienced medium-pace Simon Doull, who missed the second half of the one-day programme in Australia with injury, has come back for Chris Drum.

Drum replaced Doull in Australia, but wasn't required for any of the internationals.

The New Zealand squad will be re-selected after the second one-day against Zimbabwe and before Australia arrives for a four-match limited-overs tour.
