

Aussies' India tour schedule

NEW DELHI, Feb 1: The Board of Control for Cricket in India (BCCI) on Saturday shifted the venue for the second Test match between India and Australia to Calcutta from Cuttack.

A BCCI spokesman told Reuters the change was made because of logistical problems pointed out by former Indian Captain Kapil Dev, who had been asked to assess all venues for the Australian tour.

The Australian Cricket Board (ACB) had also favoured scheduling a match at Calcutta's Eden Gardens, which attracts the largest crowd for Test matches in India.

Cuttack has now been allocated a match in the triangular one-day series between India and Zimbabwe, which was earlier scheduled to be played in Calcutta.

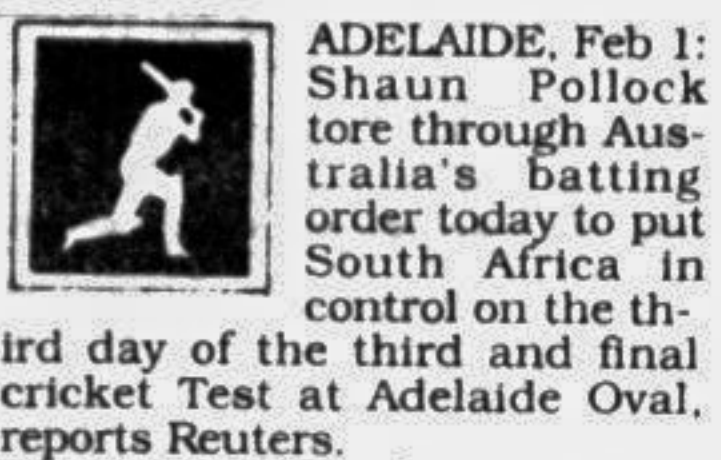

Taylor keeps Aussies afloat Pollock's perseverance pays



ADELAIDE, Feb 1: Shaun Pollock threw through Australia's batting order today to put South Africa in control on the third day of the third and final cricket Test at Adelaide Oval, reports Reuters.

Pollock, 24, finished with career-best figures of seven for 78 Australia collapsed to 327 for nine at the close, still 190 runs behind South Africa's daunting first innings total of 517.

Only captain Mark Taylor stood defiant as South Africa pushed for a victory to square the series at 1-1, finishing unbeaten on 157 after watching nine partners fall by the wayside.

He brought up his 17th Test century shortly before tea and fought on grimly in the final session as his teammates departed in quick succession.

The Australian captain had a life on 40 when he was dropped at third slip by Jacques Kallis and another on 45 when his edge fell just short of the slips but he was otherwise in control and grew in confidence as his marathon innings progressed.

In guiding Australia past 317, Taylor ensured that his team narrowly avoided the follow-on and that the visitors would have to bat a second time.

South Africa should have dismissed Australia before the cut-off point but paid the price for five dropped catches, a lapse which may ultimately save Australia from defeat.

Pollock, whose figures were the second best return by any South African bowler against

Australia after Hughie Taylor's seven for 23 in 1949-50, had two chances dropped off his bowling, including one off Taylor.

With South Africa's main strike bowler Allan Donald out with injury, the Proteas relied heavily on Pollock who responded magnificently.

Pollock's performance was all the more admirable because he achieved it on a wicket which offered little assistance to the bowlers and on a day of sweltering heat.

With temperatures reaching 42 degrees Celsius before a cool change late in the day, umpires Steve Randell and Doug Cowie allowed the players to take drink breaks every 40 minutes instead of the usual 60.

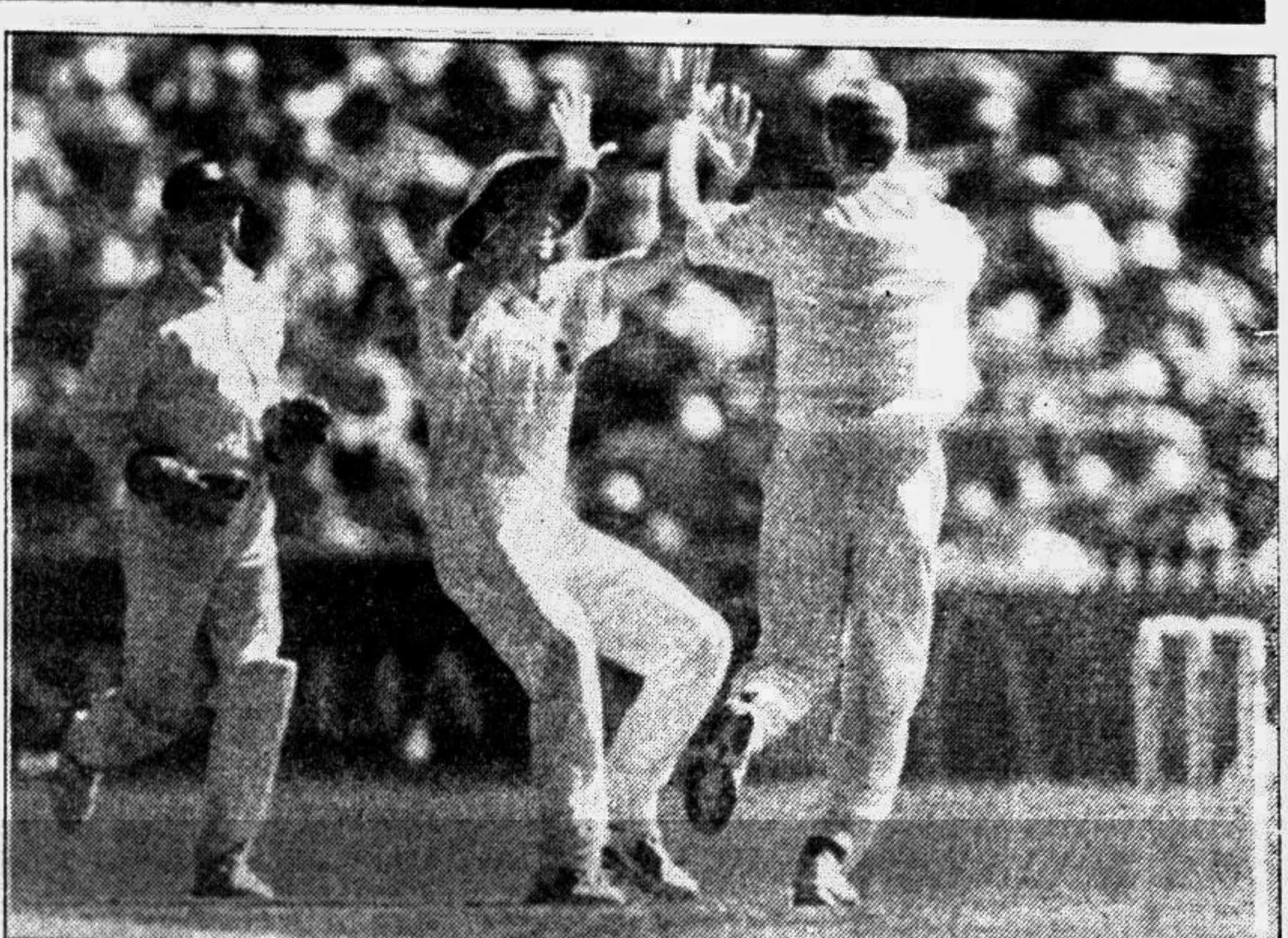

Sabina under microscope

LONDON, Feb 1 (AFP): Disgraceful, scandalous, sub-standard, shambles. Words usually associated with the English cricket team's performances on tour.

Only this time they referred to the state of the Sabina Park pitch in Kingston, Jamaica, which made history Thursday when a Test match was abandoned for the first time because it was too dangerous to play.

Photos of the cracked up playing surface and England batsmen ducking and weaving out of the way of the sharply rearing cricket ball were splashed across the front and back pages of the dailies Friday.

For the first time in the 121-year history of Test cricket, the match was abandoned after barely an hour's play because the batting area was considered unfit to play, it will be replaced by an additional visit to Trinidad Feb 5-9 prior to the second Test there the following week.

While the International Cricket Council announced Friday that former West Indies cricket great Sir Clyde Walcott would lead an investigation into the Sabina Park shambles, Thursday's chaotic scenes sparked angry reaction from former England players and cricket commentators.

Under the headline "The Killing Field" the tabloid Daily Mirror quoted former star all-rounder Ian Botham as saying there could have been a fatality. "In all my career I have never seen anything as bad," said Botham, who hit 5,200 runs and took 383 wickets in 102 Tests for England.

"Make no mistake about it. This was a death trap. I honestly believe that somebody could have been killed out there if the game had gone on very much longer."

Papers also quoted former West Indies star Michael Holding, one of the most feared of fast bowlers, as saying the groundsman involved should be condemned for producing such a poor pitch.

"I've never seen a pitch as dangerous as that," Holding said. "The people responsible should be brought to task."

The main picture on the front page of The Times showed the huge cracks on the red clay batting strip and the paper said that West Indian cricket might suffer as a result of the chaos caused by the game being abandoned.

"The repercussions for cricket in the Caribbean will be huge," said The Times.

Legal action is possible from disgruntled tour groups of England supporters several hundred of whom are on the island after paying 1,300 pounds (2,145 dollars) for seats and accommodation.

There was speculation in some of the papers that the pitch was prepared to guarantee a West Indies victory, especially after an embarrassing 3-0 series loss to Pakistan in November and December.

In the independent, cricket commentator Henry Blofeld asked several questions to Jackie Hendricks, a former West Indies wicketkeeper who now is president of the Jamaica Cricket Association.

"Did he ever look seriously at (the pitch)?" asked Blofeld. "Did he look and keep his fingers crossed? Or did he hope for a pitch which would give his Jamaica captain, Courtney Walsh, good (bowling) figures?"

Walsh took two of the three English wickets to fall and fellow pacesman Curtly Ambrose snapped up the other as the batsmen, who managed only 17 runs between them tried to fend off fast-moving deliveries that either reared up to hit them on the arms, hands and shoulder or shot along the ground. Only 10 overs were bowled before the officials intervened.

David Richards, the ICC chief executive, said Friday that Walcott's investigating committee will convene at the earliest possible date to decide what action to take after the fiasco.

Two key issues are whether the Jamaica Cricket Association are culpable in the preparation of such a sub-standard pitch, and what needs to be done to ensure no repeat of what happened Thursday.

It is helpful to the whole procedure that Sir Clyde was actually the Jamaica Test himself," Richards said, who also warned against over-reaction by people not involved.

"I agree that this whole sad affair has done damage to the image of cricket in the West Indies, but it is not for everyone else in the world game to go sticking their noses in."

Pitch spoils the show

Did the West Indian management do the right thing by replacing Walsh with Lara as captain? Can England defeat the West Indies and end a thirty-year drought? Has Curtly Ambrose come to the end of his career? These were some of the questions leading up to the first Test between England and West Indies at Kingston, Jamaica.

Former England player Jonathan Agnew predicted an "intriguing contest" in what was to be a very important match for both the teams. There was great excitement and expectation as everyone eagerly waited for a full five days. Unfortunately, it lasted for a little over half an hour.

It was the first time in the history of Test cricket that a match had to be abandoned because of unfit playing conditions. The two captains, the umpires and the match referee were all in agreement that the pitch was much too dangerous to carry on and that someone could get seriously hurt. As the England captain, Mike Atherton, pointed out, "players' safety is of paramount importance and therefore the authorities concerned did absolutely the right thing by calling off the match."

The pitch at Sabina Park was re-laid with red clay only eight weeks before the start of the first Test. According to the president of the West Indies cricket board this was done because the Sabina Park pitch had lost all its pace. But this ground has a history of producing notorious pitches dating back to 1968. In 1976 the Indian captain, Bishen Singh Bedi, declared his innings after only six batsmen were dismissed because he did not want to expose the tailenders to such conditions. In 1986, a Malcolm Marshall delivery rose from good length to break Mike Gatting's nose in a one-day international on the same ground. It is all very well that the West Indies board wanted to produce a pitch which would ensure a result, but this was truly going from the sublime to the ridiculous.

So, who is to blame for this fiasco? Is it the groundsman, the Jamaican cricket authorities of the board? It does not really matter who takes the blame just so long as they all make sure that such a thing is not repeated because it only undermines the standard of the game and the management in that particular country.

A little over a month ago a similar occurrence took place at Indore in India where a ODI had to be called off. Again the pitch was unsuitable for play. Just eighteen balls were bowled on that occasion. The ICC has to seriously contemplate setting up a panel which would make sure that pitches around the world are suitable for an international match.

The West Indies cricket board has responded quickly to both the parties willingness to play a full five-Test series and another Test is likely to be squeezed into the itinerary.

Is it fair on Mark Butcher that a duck has been registered to his name and that his average would suffer as a result for seemingly no fault of his own? Is it fair on all the people who had travelled all the way to Kingston from England for this single Test? Is it fair on Brian Lara to have to confront such a situation on his first Test as the official captain of the West Indies? Is it fair on us, the spectators around the world, who have literally been counting days till the start of the series? The answer to all these questions is no. Whoever said anything was fair.

European soccer scene

M United's first hiccup at home

UNDATED, Feb 1: Manchester United, the English Premiership pacesetter, Saturday suffered a shock first home defeat of the season while in Germany a record breaking goal inspired Bayern Munich to a 3-0 win over bottom club Hamburg and away in France, cup action hogged the headlines, reports AP.

ENGLAND: Veteran striker Tony Cottee fired Leicester's goal in a 1-0 victory for the Foxes at Old Trafford as United's lead was cut from five to four points in the Premier League.

Liverpool and Blackburn, who started the day five points behind, tied 0-0 at Anfield and each went down one place as Chelsea, 2-0 winners over last place Barnsley, moved into second on goal difference.

There was trouble at the Portsmouth-Sheffield United 1-1 tie in Division One when one of the visiting fans ran onto the field and attacked a linesman.

Linesman Edward Martin had alerted the referee to a foul by United goalkeeper Simon Tracey and the keeper was sent off. Martin then collapsed having been struck from behind by a fist. The fan was arrested and Martin regained consciousness after five minutes.

Some 55,000 fans at Old Trafford watched in disbelief as United, who are on course for a fifth league title in six seasons, went down to Leicester.

Former West Ham and Everton striker Cottee, making only his second start of the season at age 32, fired home for United defender Henning Berg had misjudged Robby Savage's cross.

Andy Cole and Ole Gunnar Solskjaer wasted easy chances and Leicester's United States international goalkeeper Kassy Keller made three good saves.

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Bolton's Scott Sellars fired home a rebound in the 21st minute after Per Frandsen's shot had hit the post. Five minutes later Noel Whelan levelled from close range after Wanderers failed to clear Paul Telfer's cross. Darren Huckerby put the sky blues ahead in the 58th minute after Dion Dublin had touched on a huge clearance from goalkeeper Magnus Hedman. He made it 3-1 seven minutes later from Dublin's cross and Dublin completed Bolton's misery with two more goals in the 73rd and 79th minutes.

Chelsea 2, Barnsley 0 (1-0): Gianluca Paliotti, captain Gianfranco Zola on the starting lineup, gave Chelsea the lead in the 23rd minute after Mark Hughes had headed down Eddie Newton's cross. Two minutes after the half time break, Hughes took a pass from Dan Petrescu and, after his first shot had hit the post, he headed in the rebound.

Crystal Palace 0, Leeds 2 (2-0): Rod Wallace, currently on the transfer list after turning down a new contract, beat the Palace off-side trap when he took a pass from Gary Kelly and ran through to shoot home in the seventh minute. Six minutes later Jimmy Floyd Hasselbank made it 2-0 with a deflected 20-yard shot.

Derby 2, Tottenham 1 (1-0): Dean Sturridge gave the Rams a 25th minute lead when he latched on to a mistimed back pass from Spurs, Clive Wilson. Ruel Fox levelled three minutes into the second half with a 12-metre strike after Juergen Klinsmann had pulled the ball back for him. Paolo Wanchope hit the winner for Derby 13 minutes from the end when Spurs striker Les Ferdinand, back helping his defence, hesitated and failed to clear the ball and the Costa Rican pounced to stab it home.

Liverpool 0, Blackburn 0: Rovers goalkeeper Tim Flowers, likely to be recalled to the England squad Monday, made two good saves from Michael Owen and Robbie Fowler and Fowler missed an easy chance 20 minutes from the end when he shot wide from close range. Liverpool also lost Steve McManaman and Jason McAteer through injury during the game.

Sheffield Wednesday 1, Wimbledon 1 (1-1): Mark Perbridge knew little about his 14th minute strike. Dean Blackwell's attempted clearance for Wimbledon struck him on the leg and rebounding back into the net. Michael Hughes made it 1-1 in the 21st minute when Andy Booth's header clearance went straight to him on the edge of the penalty box and he fired home with his left foot.

West Ham 2, Everton 2 (1-1): Trevor Sinclair scored only 10 minutes into his debut with a low header after he was left totally unmarked. Nicky Barnby headed the first equaliser in the 25th minute from a headed pass by Duncan Ferguson. Sinclair regained the lead for the Hammers three minutes into the second half, shooting home from a pass by Eyal Berkovic. But Mikael Madar made it 2-2 from Gareth Farrelly's cross in the 60th minute.

GERMANY: Brazilian striker Giovane Elber scored the fastest goal in Bundesliga history, 11 seconds into the game, and added another to pace Bayern to a comprehensive win.

As the Bundesliga resumed after a six-week winter break, the defending champions gained some ground on surprise leaders Kaiserslautern, who managed only a 1-1 draw at Schalke, the UEFA Cup Champions.

Kaiserslautern now lead Bayern by two points, 46-44, while Stuttgart are a distant third with 36.

In other matches Saturday, Hertha Berlin edged Wolfsburg 1-0, Hansa Rostock trounced 1960 Minsch 3-0, Werder Bremen rallied to beat Arminia Bielefeld 2-1 and Cologne escaped from the bottom by defeating Borussia Moenchengladbach 3-2.

Bayern took the lead from the kickoff, when Mario Basler looped a 40-metre pass into the Hamburg area. And while Hamburg goalkeeper Richard Golz and defender Stefan Boeger crashed into each other, Elber headed in the first goal only 11 seconds after the opening whistle, the quickest goal scored in Bundesliga's 35-year-old history.

Elber also notched the second in the 42nd, his eighth of the season, again in co-production with Basler, who produced the cross that allowed Elber to head home from 5 metres. The ball deflected off Hamburg defender Andrej Panadic.

FRANCE: Second Division Sochaux served up the shock of the third round of the French League Cup by beating First Division Cannes 1-0.

Lens, currently fifth in the First Division, squeezed through against Second Division Niort. They had to wait until the 22nd minute of extra time before a fine header from Anto Drobnjak won the tie.

First Division Marseille and Metz easily overcame Second Division opposition.
