Some 20,750 Rohingvas are living at Nayapara and Kutupalong camps in Cox's Bazar, the remains of about 250,000 Rohingyas, the ethnic Arakanese Muslims who fled to escape per-

secution back home in 1992. Most refugees have gone home under the auspices of the UNHCR. But extremist elements seized control of two camps where refugees rioted staging demonstrations, declining to go back last year before expiry of clearance for 7,000 refugees eligible to return by July.

"We have discussed the issues related to repatriation of the remaining refugees. We want them to go back. We have urged the UNHCR to help negotiate with the Myanmar authorities to resume the repatriation, revalidating the clearence of the 7,000 and the remaining others," one official preferring anonymity told The Daily Star after the talks.

The UNHCR officials visited the two camps at Nayapara and Kutupalong on Sunday and held talks with local officials.

Philippine plane with 104 aboard missing

MANILA, Feb 2: A passenger plane with 104 people on board was declared missing after failing to land in the southern Philippine city of Cagayan de Oro, officials said today, reports AP.

The twin-engine Cebu Pacific Air DC-9 aircraft was carrying 99 passengers and five crew, airline general manager Diego Garrido said.

The plane's last radio contact was with the Cagayan de Oro airport tower at 10:48 am (0248 GMT), 15 minutes before it was due to land, Garrido said,

In that radio call, the pilot said he was at an altitude of 11,500 feet and was starting to descend, Garrido said. He did not report any trouble with the plane, Garrido said.

"The Special Branch of police, acting on a tip off, arrested three Indian citizens from the fifth floor flat of 20, Dhaka Housing, North Adabar, at 2:00 pm on December 21," said the FIR lodged with the Mohammadpur thana in connection with their arrest.

"When interrogated, they all identified themselves as leaders and workers of the separatist movement in the Assam province of India," the FIR said adding, "None of them, however, could show his Indian passport or any other travel document.

"During investigation it was learnt that accused Golap Barua is a terrorist from India. The Assam government of India had issued Red Warrant against him," the FIR said.

The Bangladesh Society for Enforcement of Human Rights (BSEHR), had moved a petition in the CMM's court on January 20, praying for Chetia's production in court and bail.

After hearing the petition on the same day the CMM ordered for the production of Chetia on February 3.

Exercise restraint in N-programme

NEW DELHI, Feb 2: A senior US official today urged archfoes India and Pakistan to exercise restraint in their nuclear and missile programmes, and warned that a resumption of nuclear tests would have serious consequences, reports Reuter. Rick Inderfurth, Assistant

Secretary of State for South Asia, said in an interview with the Indian weekly Outlook that Washington respected every na-tion's right to determine its own security needs.

But commenting on the Hindu nationalist Bharatiya Janata Party's nuclear ambitions, he said the United States maintained that South Asian programmes for nuclear weapons and ballistic missiles ran counter to the hopes of the international community and could be destabilising.

"We continue to urge India. as well as Pakistan, to exercise restraint in its nuclear and missile programmes," he said.

BJP expects 15 per cent of Muslim votes

LUCKNOW. Feb 2: The Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) today said it hoped to get five per cent to 15 per cent of Muslim votes in the Lok Sabha polls. reports PTI.

The shift of Muslim votes to BJP fold was evident from the fact that "they are understanding us better", BJP Vice-President Sunder Singh Bhandari told reporters here.

A large number of Muslim workers and senior leaders from different parties have joined the BJP during last one year and they are helping us to popularise the party's policies and programmes, he said.

Referring to Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister Kalyan Singh's decision to withdraw cases against "karsewaks" (volunteers) associated with the Ram Janambhumi movement. Bhandari said "there is not a single case of cognizable offence which was to be decided by judicial process."

"Numbering about 25, these cases are mostly of political vendetta against the BJP work-

ers and karsewaks," he said. When a newsman drew his attention to tremendous response Sonia Gandhi was receiving in her public meetings, he said "I doubt it would have any material effect on the poll outcome."

"We are aware of the crowd psychology and the Indian mentality which likes new faces," he said

Reiterating his party's stand that the Bofors documents should be made public, he said Sonia Gandhi is more interested in this because she apprehends if BJP comes to power at centre, she would not be able to exert any influence on the government."
