

SA earn Border's respect



BRISBANE, Feb 4: Record-breaking Australian cricketer Allan Border said today that the South African batsmen had finally come of age in Test cricket, reports AFP.

Border, capped a world record 156 times by his country, also announced he wants to be considered for the vacant post of Australian national selector.

"It's something I wouldn't mind doing, Border said, stressing that he would have to talk with the Australian Cricket Board about the demands of the honorary position.

The three-man Australian panel, said farewell to Steve Bernard after the Test series against South Africa. Bernard has taken up the position as full-time team manager.

"Because I still know a few of the players and still have a feel for it ... I think it's more an advantage than a disadvantage," Border said.

Of the South Africans, he said their very nature will mean they will come back faster and harder than Australia in the next series in two years time.

"I've been impressed with the South Africans in Test cricket to be honest but they really got their act together this time and showed what they are capable of," he said.

"I just think they are a good, hard-nosed race of people ... very similar to us ... and we are always going to have a tight bat-

ally got their act together this time and showed what they are capable of," he said.

one-day series wins. Border said he still got a thrill from cricket and feels his short time away from the game, after retiring in 1994, meant he was ideally suited to make a contribution.

And Border has advocated the revolutionary and controversial policies of Australia's former panel which separated the Test and one-day teams, as well as playing different captains.

"If you've got the same captain it wouldn't be such an issue because it's quite sound tactics to pick your best side to win whichever cricket match you are playing," he said.

"There will be many, many periods when we'll have the same captain and that's also saying that Mark Taylor can come into contention.

"There's a lot of similarities in some areas between the two games but, really, if you want to play a certain formula you've got to pick players to put that in place."

Border played 273 one-day internationals, also a world record. He has just returned from leading Australia's one-day side at the under-19 World Cup in South Africa, where his team lost one game and was knocked out early.

At stumps on the opening day at the Melbourne Cricket Ground, Jones was 100 not out and Shawn Craig 17 not out.

The Victorian effort was a marked improvement on their outright loss to Queensland last week, which ended with the resignation of chairman of selectors John Grant.

Jones passed the 10,000-run milestone when he scored his 63rd run of the innings which came after the 40th half century of his career.

Warne will miss four one-day internationals against New Zealand over seven days in a move aimed at ensuring his fitness for a three-Test tour to India, starting later this month.

"Shane will see a shoulder specialist in the next couple of days. He will use the time to recuperate so he's fully fit for the India tour," Australia Cricket Board spokesman Patrick Keane said.

Warne, so often Australia's match-winning bowler in the past, performed well below his best in the drawn third Test against South Africa in Adelaide.

10,000 career runs for Jones

TOKYO, Feb 4 (AFP/AP): Martina Hingis averaged her doubles partner's loss in devastating form to beat Elena Likhovtseva today, launching her campaign to defend the Toray Pan Pacific Open tennis tournament.

The Swiss teenager was drawn to face another teenage sensation Croatian Mirjana Lucic, with whom Hingis defended the Australian Open doubles title by knocking her out of the first round Tuesday.

Fresh from defending both singles and doubles titles in Melbourne, Hingis showed no sign of fatigue as she allowed the Russian to hold only the opening game before dominating the rest for a 6-1, 6-0 victory.

The 1996 champion Iva Majoli of Croatia joined Hingis in the quarterfinals after Chinese national champion Li Fang abandoned the match when the fifth-seeded Croat was leading 6-3 and 3-0.

Li, who survived the qualifying rounds and defeated Thailand's Tamarine Tanasugarn 6-1, 6-3, Tuesday, got an inflammation of left knee joint and needed court-side treatment at the beginning of the second set.

But she decided to pull out after falling easy prey to the French Open champion in the following three games.

"I didn't know she was in-

jured," said Majoli. "but I have to be pretty happy with the way I played."

Greene goes one better

MADRID, Feb 4: Maurice Greene, the world champion at 100 metres, set the world indoor 60-metre record Tuesday, clocking 6.39 seconds, reports AP.

The record came two days after Greene equaled the previous record of 6.41 seconds set by Andre Cason in 1992, also in Madrid.

Greene finished 11 hundredths of a second ahead of fellow American Jon Drummond, Nigeria's Davidson Ezinwa finished in 6.57.

After the race, Greene told reporters he now felt he would "have no problem running against (Canada's Donovan) Bailey," the current world record holder for the 100 metres.

American athletes took the top three positions in the 60-metre hurdle with Allen Johnson, the 100-metre hurdle world champion, finishing at 7.44, the best time of the year. Duane Ross was second at 7.49, followed by Tony Dees at 7.50.

In the women's category, Jamaica's Michelle Freeman timed 7.74, five hundredths of second off the world record, while Slovenia's Brigita Bokovec finished in 7.96 ahead of Patricia Girard of France at 8.12.

Gwen Torrance, of the United States, suffered a painful muscle strain in her right leg in the 60-metre semifinal and hobbled off the track after the race. The final was won by Nigerian Chioma Ajunwa in 7.10.

Cyril echoes the sentiment

JOHANNESBURG, Feb 4: South Africa's leading cricket umpire, Cyril Mitchley, has said he would have given Australia's Mark Waugh out, hit wicket, if he had been standing at the Adelaide Test, reports AFP.

"There was no doubt in my mind he was out," Mitchley was quoted as saying in today's Star newspaper, speaking during a break in the Griqualand West v Pakistan match at Kimberley on Tuesday.

Mitchley referred to Tom Smith's "Cricket Umpiring and Scoring" to justify a decision which he felt should have gone South Africa's way.

Under law 35 which covers hit wicket, a note reads "any action," in the description of the dislodging of the balls, by the striker includes his backlift, provided the ball is in play, playing at the ball, any follow

through of the bat and any action up to and including setting off for a first run immediately after playing or playing at, the ball.

Mitchley also questioned the role of the third umpire in the controversial decision in the third Test in Adelaide.

Elsewhere, the South African press quoted at great lengths from "angry" and "disheartened" Hansie Cronje and his analogy with a batsman "who's hit on the head and is a bit wobbly and walks on to his stumps (then) he's out."

The Star noted that "the key part of the law's ruling is contained with the word 'receive' and 'setting off for his run.'"

"Waugh was clearly not preparing to receive the ball nor was he setting off for a run and it is more likely that he had finished receiving the ball when he walked away than was still in the process of doing so," it said.

"In any event," the newspaper concluded, "there is some doubt and in this case the benefit has to go to the batsman."

"Waugh hits and stays" read Business Day's headline. The newspaper added: "The decision was just one of several the two umpires made that were fiercely criticised by all sides," like the lbw appeal by Pollock against Ponting turned down in the first innings, and Bichel given lbw Tuesday to a ball from Klusener.

The Business Day said that "amongst the welter of reasons advanced for SA's failure to win ... the tally of dropped catches stood out like a sore thumb," especially for a side "usually renowned for their catching and fielding."

The Okadage "catches win matches" was burned into the consciousness of 11 disappointed South Africans Tuesday, the newspaper concluded.
