Korean investors lodge series of complaints

South Korean investors yesterday complained that frequent power failures and cumbersome customs and banking procedures are the major constraints they are facing in

Bangladesh, reports UNB. They informed the Board of Investment (BOI) of their problems during a meeting with its Executive Chairman Farooq

Sobhan in the morning. They said frequent power failures are causing a serious impact on the operation of the factories.

The investors suggested that at least one day's notice be served to the factories so that they can take necessary measures during loadshedding.

The entrepreneurs also urged the authorities to allow dutyfree import of generators until uninterrupted power supply is ensured.

BOI organised the meeting in the city as part of the effort to build up the country's image and to attract foreign investment. Korean Ambassador to Bangladesh Tae Kyu Han and BEPZA member Saifuddin Ahmed were present at the meeting.

The Korean entrepreneurs


emphasised the need for roundthe-clock customs service, particularly at ZIA, to avoid undue delay in supply of orders or receiving raw materials.

They drew attention of the officials to the lengthy procedures for customs clearance of goods imported for factories outside EPZ.

Regarding banking problems, the entrepreneurs said private banks accept pro-forma invoices for 90-day usance ba-sis back-to-back letter of credits (L/Cs). But most of the semigovernment and government banks accept only on 120-day usance basis back-to-back L/Cs. They suggested that 90-day usance terms of the L/Cs should be accepted.

They said many L/C opening banks often hold documents for more than a week, in some cases for longer than 30 days, without informing L/C advising

The Korean entrepreneurs also complained about nonpayment of export bills on due date, non-payment of interest as per the terms of pro-forma invoice and L/C and failure to comply with the central bank regulations.

Hanufa had told this correspondent last year that she was subjected to physical torture day after day and was confined to a small room without food.

When Azizur Rahman was posted to Brussels in 1984, a Belgian doctor rescued Hanufa in a comatose condition. In his report, the doctor said that Hanufa bore wound marks all over her body and she was so weak that she could not walk. Hanufa had to spend six months in the intensive care unit of a Brussels hospital be-

fore being able to walk. Belgian police investigated the matter and then expelled Azizur Rahman Chowdhury from the country and also alerted the government of Bangladesh: Since Chowdhury enjoyed diplomatic immunity. he could not be tried under Bel-

gian law. Now, if found guilty, under the Bangladesh Penal Code, Chowdhury and his wife could face life imprisonment.

Advocate Alena Khan said that the police or the court could also charge them under the Women and Child Repression Act 1995, in which the maximum penalty is death.

"We did not file a case under the 1995 Act because the 'cause of action' started in 1982 when this act did not exist," said Alena Khan.
