

Brothers leave rally till late

Mohammedans win scorcher

Holders Mohammedan Sporting Club crossed a major hurdle in their chase for retaining the Premier Division football league title with a hard-fought 3-2 win over Brothers Union in a crucial Super league encounter at the flood-lit Mirpur Stadium yesterday.

Striker Alfaz Ahmed scored two goals in the last quarter of the ding-dong battle to carve Mohammedans' 14th victory in the marathon league. But it was a rejuvenated Brothers, who gave their more experienced opponents a run for their money before going down fighting in a match marked by forays and counter forays.

Mohammedans shot into the lead in the seventh minute with Nigerian recruit Bode Baba slotting home the ball into an empty net after a gem of a floater from midfielder Arman Miah stranded onrushing Brothers custodian Saidur in the middle.

It would have been a delightful double for the popular Motiheel outfit had not a scorching left-foot Alfaz volley come off the far post in the 14th minute of the proceedings.

After surviving the second call, Brothers, buoyed by the presence of a host of young and spirited booters, came back into contention with a series of sorties, much to the delight of a few hundred spectators, who after a long time witnessed a cracker of a match between the two traditional foes.

The never-say-die approach of the Gopibagh boys eventually put paid when Bakhtiar, a matured head on a stout shoulder, restored parity two minutes into the second half with a brilliant right-footer. Receiving the ball five meters away from the Mohammedan box, Bakhtiar swivelled on to his left foot before releasing a rainbow shot past a hedge of defenders to the bemusement of custodian Ponir, who watched helplessly as the ball found the upper left-hand corner of his post.

The much-needed goal only added fuel to Brothers' razor-sharp attack with Shamim operating down the middle. But all their efforts went down the drain due to poor marksmanship, much to the relief of a huffing-and-puffing Mohammedans.

But Mohammedans' ploy to preserve their energy for the lag end of the match against an endless chase by the Brothers booters eventually paid off when Alfaz successfully led the late onslaught.

The nimble striker stepped up to convert a penalty with a pile-driver in the 71st minute and then fully capitalised the innumerable loopholes of a non-existent Brothers defence to strike the match-winner in the 90th minute, shooting home

an imaginative cross from medio Arman 3-1.

With these two goals Alfaz, who had earlier rescued his side from a possible debacle against Farashganj, scoring the match-decider in Mohammedans' squeaky 2-1 passage in the previous match, joined Abahani's striker Maksudul Amin Rana as the individual highest scorer, both having 11 goals.

But the match, which provided the much-awaited spill-thrill of a real battle to uplift the dwindling standard of the game, was still not over because Amer Khan came up with a scorching grounder, which kissed the far corner of the net after a wicked deflection from a Mohammedan defender 3-2. But that was in extra time.

Apart from the five goals, the tense match was also marked by foul play from both sides. Mohammedans' left-back Ruhul Amin and a bad-tempered Bode Baba were cautioned with the yellow card for resorting to physical force while Brothers' Amer Khan was booked for kicking Bode on the face.

Tunisia, Cameroon tumble

OUAGADOUGOU, Feb 22: Tunisia became the second of Africa's World Cup representatives to bow out of the African Nations Cup at the quarterfinal stage as they were humbled by unsung hosts Burkina Faso on Saturday, reports Reuters.

The Stallions won 8-7 on penalties after the teams had played to a 1-1 draw in 90 minutes followed by a goalless extra time.

Tunisia's departure followed a mediocre campaign and came one day after Cameroon, who have also qualified for France, suffered a shock 1-0 defeat by cash-strapped Democratic Congo.

Burkina's semifinal on Wednesday will be against Egypt. The Pharaohs beat Ivory Coast 5-4 on penalties after in a huge disappointing game later on Saturday which stayed goalless after 90 minutes and extra time.

The second match pitted Egypt's Hossain Hassan, the competition's top goalscorer with five goals, against the Ivory Coast, the competition's highest scoring team with 10 goals in their first three-round games.

But the two teams cancelled each other out in a game dominated by fear and bogged down for the most part in midfield.

Burkina Faso, whose national team includes players based in the German Third Division, a Dutch youth team, the French Fifth Division, the Ivorian championship and the Moroccan Second Division, appeared to have won and then lost their match.

Burkina took a lead on half-time when Kassoum Ouedraogo, who plays for German Third Division club Osnabruck, converted a penalty on the stroke of half-time.

The Stallions appeared to have survived Tunisia's second half onslaught and police were preparing to prevent a repeat of the pitch invasion which followed Burkina's win over Guinea, when Hassen Gabi equalised in the 90th minute.

A deathly hush fell over the stadium and with the Burkina morale clearly shattered, a Tunisian win in extra time looked inevitable.

But the Tunisians once again reverted to their cautious approach and failed to capitalise on Burkina's nerves. The rejoicing began again when Tunisia captain Sami Trabelsi shot wide from his team's tenth attempt, both sides already having missed twice.

The defeat could have serious ramifications for Tunisia, who have been drawn with Romania, England and Colombia in the World Cup. It also casts a shadow over the future of coach Henri Kasperczak following 3-0 defeats against Australia and Yugoslavia in earlier friendlies.

The thought of their ponderous defence facing the likes of Colombia's Faustino Asprilla in June is one that could fill Tunisia fans with apprehension.

Ivory Coast's Ibrahima Diomande was the only one to miss in the day's second penalty shootout.

ANTWERP, Feb 22: Marc Rosset will have diamonds in his eyes when he plays Greg Rusedski Sunday in the final of the one million dollars European Community Championship, reports AP.

Defending champ Rosset of Switzerland beat world number three Patrick Rafter in straight sets Saturday to earn his place in the final.

Britain's Rusedski beat Rosset earlier this month in an epic battle in Croatia that included three tiebreaks, but the Swiss has an added incentive Sunday.

If he wins, he's on course to capture the biggest prize on offer in Antwerp — a replica racket made from 6 kilos (13.2 pounds) of gold and studded with 1,617 diamonds. It's worth an estimated one million dollars and is given to any player who can win three times in five years.

It's a big motivation for me," Rosset said. "My father's a Swiss banker, there's already a place for it in the bank."



Brawny win for Kiwis

WELLINGTON, Feb 22 (Reuters, AP): New Zealand recorded their third Test win in succession on home soil when they beat Zimbabwe by 10-wickets with a day to spare in the first cricket Test at Wellington's Basin Reserve today.

Following on from the 2-0 series win over Sri Lanka last year, New Zealand beat the hapless Zimbabweans five minutes after the extra half hour of play they were able to claim.

When Zimbabwe were dismissed in their second innings for 250, New Zealand required 20 to win and openers Bryan Young and Matt Horne knocked off the runs in 3.5 overs.

The win was New Zealand's first over Zimbabwe since 1992 and broke the stalemate between the two sides.

The last two series, in Zimbabwe last year and in New Zealand in 1996, were drawn 0-0.

All-rounder Chris Cairns set up New Zealand's win with two heady spells of medium-fast bowling.

Earlier in the day he had knocked the stuffing out of the Zimbabwe batting when he dismissed Murray Goodwin and Paul Strang in the space of three balls.

Then late in the day with the prospect of Zimbabwe taking the game into the fifth and final day, Cairns broke a record eighth wicket partnership between Alistair Campbell and Heath Streak.

Campbell, who made 56, and Streak, who remained unbeaten on 43, had put on 94 for the eighth wicket, bettering the existing mark of 79 set in 1996 by Strang and Eddo Brandes, when

Cairns bounced out Campbell. Cairns bowling round the wicket to Campbell, tempted the left-hander into a hook shot which he top-edged to Horne at deep square leg.

Cairns bowled a great line. We got a little bit impatient trying to win the game and for a while there it threatened to get away from us," New Zealand captain Stephen Fleming said.

"We came in at tea and everyone was buzzing — we'd got four wickets in an hour and basically the hard work had been done."

Campbell had visions of taking the game into the final day until he fell to Cairns.

"Streaky and I wanted to get through to stumps seven down because rain was forecast for tomorrow," Campbell said.

"Cairns bowled a really good spell to me. He bowled into the foot holes and one came back and one went away so it was pretty hard to know what to leave and what not to leave."

Zimbabwe made a bold bid to save the Test in the first session with Goodwin, in particular, looking a danger.

They lost only one wicket in the first session when night-watchman Andy Whittall ran himself out for 12.

Goodwin and Guy Whittall added 45 for the fourth wicket until medium-pacer Dion Nash claimed the wicket of Whittall.

Whittall slashed a ball to Nathan Astle at second gully where he held a good catch.

Goodwin brought up his half-century in 174 minutes but he had the misfortune to watch another partner come and go when Andy Flower went cheaply again.

Goodwin was poised to better his Test best score of 73 set on debut against Sri Lanka last month when he played a loose shot to Cairns on 72 and Fleming held a simple catch at first slip.

Strang followed him back to the pavilion two balls later when he was beaten by a superb outswinger that knocked his off stump out of the ground.

Campbell and Streak delayed the inevitable but when Campbell went for a gritty 56 the tail was exposed.

The second and final Test will start in Auckland on Thursday.

New Zealand's exciting new find Craig McMillan, who notched up his maiden Test hundred (139) off 209 balls flaying 18 fours and four sixes, was adjudged players-of-the-match.
