Zaragoza added icing of extra tension to an already buoyant second half with a goal from Francisco Soler in the 89th minute.



Sohail lets 'em off the hook



BLOEMFONTEIN, Feb 24: Pakistan's two strike bowlers Shoaib Akhtar and Faizle Akbar had Free State in trouble at 21 for three in their second innings at Springbok Park on Monday before the tourists' skipper Aamir Sohail decided to call the match off as a draw, reports AFP.

Free State, with 334 for seven declared and 21 for three in reply to Pakistan's 441, were not in the hunt and did not object to Sohail's call.

With more than a full session to go — the match was called off at 2:50 pm (GMT 1250) — and with Akhtar and Akbar in fully cry, Sohail's decision was a little unusual.

Most of the day belonged to 22-year-old all-rounder Azhar Mahmood who followed up the first Test 136 with a fluent 111.

Dropped at first slip on 38 by South African skipper Hansie Cronje, Mahmood notched up his second successive century off 165 balls, before being bowled by Kossie Venter in attempting one lucky dip too many.

His overnight partner Inzamam-ul-Haq added just nine to his 110 before presenting a delighted debutant seamer Dewald Pretorius with his third scalp.

"After the way he had hit me around on Sunday, I wasn't quite sure where to bowl to him," Pretorius admitted. "At one stage I felt like walking up to him and asking him where he wanted the ball. It was embarrassing."

Inzamam was happy to be back on South African turf where the ball, he said, comes nicely on to the bat. At the wicket for 158 minutes, Pakistan's 27-year-old star showed his class.

He collected 90 (21 fours and one six) of his runs via the hoardings.

His dismissal saw the scores levelled at 334 for seven, but Pakistan still had Mahmood in the bank, and he was determined to prove that his first Test 136 was no flash in the pan.



The selectors named Sri Lanka's most consistent batsman, Aravinda de Silva as Ranatunga's deputy. The team will also have opening batsman Sanath Jayasuriya, who narrowly missed beating Brian Lara's world record Test score of 375 last year.



Slater right on slaughter



MUMBAI, Feb 24: Recalled opener Michael Slater fell two runs short of a century as Australian batsmen discovered the hazards of Indian spin bowling on the opening day of their tour here today, reports AFP.

The tourists, electing to bat first on a slow wicket at the Brabourne Stadium, scored 305 for eight by close of the first day's play in their three-day match against Mumbai.

Slater, recalled to the Australian team after 16 months out to replace the off-form Matthew Elliot, used his feet well against the spinners to hit 12 boundaries in a strokeful 98.

But the other batsmen struggled against the three-man spin attack, led by 18-year-old left-armers Rajesh Pawar, who picked up two wickets in the space of five deliveries to finish with 3-59.

The Australians, helped by a second wicket stand of 107 between Slater and Greg Blewett (47), were well-placed at 152 for one when three quick wickets left them at 181 for four shortly before tea.

Australia were rescued in the final session by Ricky Ponting's polished 53 and a breezy 30 off 40 balls by Paul Reiffel.

Ponting became the fifth specialist batsman to fall to spinners for two hours when part-time spinner Rajesh Sutar began the slide by having Blewett stumped as he charged down the wicket.

Pawar, in his first season for Mumbai, then had Slater

stumped and trapped Darren Lehmann leg before as the Australians went to tea on 190 for four.
