

## No breakthrough on first day of BNP-AL dialogue

Top negotiators of Awami League and BNP yesterday could not make any headway in removing the barriers to the latter's return to parliament when they sat across the table for four hours with the Speaker as the mediator.

They adjourned the talks at 6.53 pm for resumption at 11 this morning.

Some of the key negotiators on both sides told The Daily Star that the discussions failed to make any breakthrough on BNP's demand for reinstatement of the floating bridge over the Crescent Lake and allowing public rallies on at least two city roads, Manik Mia Avenue and the Tophkhana Road.

However, they said the meeting brought the two sides closer to resolving other issues like the four-point agreement on affairs of the parliament and withdrawal of political cases against some BNP lawmakers.

The key negotiators however

## 'Stop politicisation for proper implementation of policies'

Speakers at a roundtable yesterday feared that the industrial policy being formulated will not be implemented properly due to politicisation and administrative bottlenecks, reports UNB.

"We may adopt a policy, but that would not be effective unless we can remove the problems," said Foreign Investors Chamber of Commerce and Industry (FICCI) President AKM Shamsuddin.

He said administrative discretionary power is enough to cause sufferings of the entrepreneurs.

Organised by the Bangladesh MBA Association (BMBAA), the roundtable on 'Industrial Policy of Bangladesh' was held at a city hotel with its President Khandkar Ibrahim Khaled in the chair.

Participating in the discussion, editor of The Daily Star Mahfuz Anam said governments were very firm in formulating various policies, but those were not implemented as they misused the policies

## Last batch of Chakma refugees returns home

KHAGRACHHARI, Feb 27: Repatriation of the last batch of 199 refugees today marked the end of the 12-year-old Chakma problem.

"I am very happy to return home," said Upendra Lal Chakma, the president of Juma Refugee Welfare Association and former MP, who led the refugees home.

Upendra Chakma, who returned home after about seven years of refugee life in the Indian state of Tripura, told the newsmen that the December 2 agreement between the government and the PCJSS would bring peace for all communities in the CHT. "My worries are over," he said.

The refugees repatriated today belonged to 33 families.

Upendra Lal Chakma was the first to step into frontier Tabalchhari in Matiranga thana at 11 am crossing the river Feni through an wooden bridge at Shilachhari point of

Amarpur sub-division in Tripura.

He was accompanied by his wife, daughter-in-law and two grand-children.

With the day's repatriation, 63,861 tribals of 12,383 families returned home in six phases.

The tribal refugees came back from Kathalchhari, Shilachhari, Karbuk, Pancharampara, Lebachhara and Takumbari camps in Tripura.

The repatriation of the tribal Chakma refugees, who left the country in different

times since April 1986, began on February 15, 1994 from the six camps of the Indian state of Tripura following an agreement between the government and the refugee leaders.

Energy and Power Minister of Tripura Keshab Majumder bade farewell to the last team of the tribal refugees. They were welcomed from Bangladesh side

## Chevron-Texaco rejects equity sharing formula

US joint venture Chevron-Texaco, which was asked to decide on becoming a partner of Irish company Tullow for exploration of oil and gas in Block 9, has rejected a government formula of equity sharing with the Irish company, indicating that it would withdraw from the negotiations on that block.

The joint venture further told the government that it would discontinue negotiations if the government disregarded the equity sharing formula it gave in the last government-moderated meeting between Chevron-Texaco and Tullow earlier this month.

Chevron-Texaco was asked by the government last week to talk with Tullow and decide on a equity formula under which Tullow would get 45 per cent of the block, Chevron-Texaco 45 per cent and BAPEX — the exploration wing of Petrobangla — the remaining 10 per cent.

Chevron-Texaco had, earlier this month, proposed a different equity sharing formula: 70 per cent for the joint venture, 20

## BNP MPs made ministers to keep parliamentary system going: Manju

Jatiya Party Secretary General and Communications Minister Anwar Hossain Manju believes that the recent induction of two BNP lawmakers into the council of ministers was part of Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina's efforts to keep the parliamentary system going.

Claiming that he had no prior knowledge of the incident, the JP leader also said, it is not unlikely that some other BNP legislators will respond positively to the Premier's efforts.

When his attention was drawn to the reported intermezzo conflict in the JP over his position in the government, Manju evaded a direct answer. But he said that some JP leaders, specially its chief HM Ershad, were the greatest beneficiaries of AL's taking over of power in 1996.

The JP secretary general made the observations in an interview with The Daily Star on Wednesday.

Asked about the reasons behind induction of two MPs from the opposition BNP into the Council of Ministers, Manju said that the Prime Minister did not discuss the matter with the JP or with him.

"She is not obliged to consult JP. But as far as I understand the issue, the Premier has taken

the BNP legislators in the council of ministers in an attempt to keep the parliamentary system going."

He said that the governments of both HM Ershad and Begum Khaleda Zia had to 'succumb' to the boycott of parliament by the opposition parties in 1991 and 1996 respectively.

In both the cases, the opposition stood for some pro-proposition

## Taxi cab service in city likely from June

Meterised Taxi Cab Service (MTCS), with centrally controlled radio-telephonic links, is likely to start operating on the city roads from June this year, officials said.

A maximum of 2000 such cars will operate in the city under the MTCS programme, a pilot project initiated by the government, the sources said.

Some 20 companies have so far applied to the government for registration. Many of them have already started the process to import vehicles.

Two types of vehicles, one having air conditioning facilities and the other without it, will operate in different city routes under the proposed programme.

Any private or public company having a paid up capital of Tk 10 lakh and tax payer identification number will be eligible for importing vehicles to be used for taxi cab service.

Sources in the communication ministry said the government is conducting a survey to improve the existing road network in Dhaka city and carrying out a feasibility study to construct fly-overs at the earliest to ensure smooth traffic movement.

"The MTCS is expected to get into operation in the city as soon as certain other necessary formalities are completed," said an official of the communication ministry. "We are expecting it to start from June next."

The Bangladesh Road Transport Authority (BRTA) has already prepared a 23-point guideline for air conditioned MTCS and a three-point recommendation for economic MTCS.

The injured BCU activists were treated at JU medical centre and a clinic at Savar.

## Visitors crowding trade fair

The Dhaka International Trade Fair '98 at Sher-e-Bangla Nagar in the city is getting momentum as a large number of visitors are crowding the fair everyday to buy attractive products and fashionable goods.

Entrepreneurs from nineteen foreign countries and host Bangladesh have set up several hundred stalls and large pavilions at the fair. The participants include some joint venture companies.

"We are getting good response from the visitors since the beginning of the exhibition", a salesman of a foreign electronics company said. The company, Kwangasia Pte. Limited, have brought latest model Japanese electronics goods assembled in Singapore. The crowd is much larger this year than in previous years, he added.

Visitors, including women

and children, were seen standing in a long queue yesterday to buy entry tickets. The visitors are showing great interest in local and foreign electronic goods, food items, ornaments and jewellery, stone and marble products, cosmetics and gift items.

Some pavilions and stalls of foreign participants are yet to be completed. "A lot of items are yet to be released by the customs department," said a Pakistani participant.

A total of 26 organisations from Pakistan are taking part in the fair. They have been given a separate area in the southern side of the fair.

Eleven companies from Iran have set up stalls in three large pavilions. A large number of people were seen crowding the Iranian pavilions specially for delicious fruits, expensive Persian carpets, stone and gold ornaments and melamine products.

A salesman of a company selling drinking water purifying device told The Daily Star that he was expecting orders from foreign buyers for his products. "Already some importers from Middle East countries have made queries, though we are yet to meet the home de-

## Shell to take up multi-purpose gas projects

A team of top executives of oil giant Shell and its partner in Bangladesh, Cairn Energy, is now in the city to discuss their proposal for Block 9, sources said.

Shell-Cairn has been hammering its proposal to work in Block 9 although the government offered the block to Irish company Tullow and was trying to tag US joint venture Chevron-Texaco with Tullow.

Dr Mark Modi Stewart, Chairman of Shell Transport and Trading Co Plc and Managing Director of the Committee of Managing Directors of the Royal Dutch Shell Group and Bill Gammel, chief of Cairn Energy met the Prime Minister, the Energy Minister and high officials of the government in the last two days. They will visit the Sangu Gasfield today.

Sources said that the Shell-Cairn joint venture had earlier expressed their interest to become a partner of US company Mobil and its partner Malaysian company Petronas — another aspirant per Block 9.

## Last round of polls in West Bengal, 9 other states today

CALCUTTA, Feb 27: Security has been beefed up in West Bengal and other places as the last round of Indian Lok Sabha elections will be held tomorrow in 131 constituencies spread over 10 states, reports BSS.

Elections to the state assemblies in Gujarat and Himachal Pradesh will also be held simultaneously.

Tomorrow's elections will mark the completion of the election process in 538 of the 543 Lok Sabha constituencies. Polling in the remaining five constituencies will be held on March 7 and June 21 — after the completion of counting of votes beginning March 2.

The last round of elections will cover Maharashtra (24 constituencies), West Bengal (22), Madhya Pradesh (20), Kerala (20) Orissa (11), Gujarat (26), Himachal Pradesh (3), Goa (2) and Jammu and Kashmir and Tamil Nadu (one each).

Prominent among those contesting tomorrow's election include BJP President LK Advani and Promod Mahajan, Congress leaders Sharad Pawar, Madhavrao Scindia and AR Antulay, CPI leader Indrajit Gupta and Trinamul Congress leader Mamta Banarjee.

More than 14 crore voters are expected to exercise their franchise.

Meanwhile, security measures have been tightened in the West Bengal state where all the city constituencies have been declared sensitive.

Chief Electoral Officer J Siricar said Trinamul Congress leader Mamta Banarjee in a fax to him expressed her apprehension of violence particularly in the South Calcutta constituency from where she is contesting. She demanded deployment of four armed police in each polling booth.

Electoral authorities have

already taken steps to ensure peaceful polling. In addition to 22,000 state police, 44 company of central force will be deployed to maintain law and order during the polling, a high election official said.

Doordarshan International will telecast an exit poll tomorrow on the Indian elections.

It will be a five-hour telecast commencing from 5:30 pm Bangladesh time, according to a press release of Indian High Commission in Dhaka.

The Doordarshan International will also telecast 72-hour non-stop programme on election results beginning March 2. The transmission will begin at 3 pm.

Showcasing of the general election will also be out live in Internet from February 28 at <http://www.ddindia.net>, the release added.
