BNPPP authorises Begum Zia to take decision

Both BNP, AL optimistic: Next round of dialogue today

The BNP lawmakers vesterday authorised party chief Begum Khaleda Zia to take a final decision about their return to parliament on the basis of the outcome of next round of dialogue today with the ruling Awami League.

The adjourned meeting of the BNP Parliamentary Party. during a one and half-hour discussion on the progress made so far in the AL-BNP negotiation, gave the mandate to Begum Zia, also Leader of the Opposition in the House. The meeting that began on February 20 concluded yesterday.

The Speaker-mediated dialogue between the AL and the BNP is due to resume at 10 this morning, coinciding with the resumption of current session of parliament.

Top AL and BNP negotiators made further efforts yesterday to narrow down their differences to facilitate BNP's return to the House at the nearly twohour talks at the Speaker's chamber. But they could not resolve the two 'vital' issues the BNP was insisting on.

Gangsters terrorise Shell, Cairn officials in Feni

Star Report

Gunslinging gangsters yes-terday terrorised a team of oil company executives including the top officials of Shell Oil and its British partner Cairn Energy and the British High Commissioner, barring them

from visiting a village in Feni.
The gangsters fired three rounds of gunshots in front of the team forcing them to leave Feni without visiting their destination in Parshuram thana.

According to one of the members of the visiting team, a convoy of 10 motor vehicles carrying about 15 oil company executives from Shell, Cairn, Brown and Roots and video crews were heading towards Durgapur area under Parshuram thana of Feni district from the Feni airport at around

The team was attending a private function organised by

the local Director of Shell Cil. When the convoy had reached Fulgazi Bazar bridge point, some six youths or, two motorcycles blocked their way and fired a round of gunshot. When the convoy stopped, they told the visitors to turn back

Then the terrorists threw a soft drink bottle on the glass of a car and fired two more gunshots. The convoy immediately turned back and returned to Feni Airport.

The gang, allegedly belonging to the cadre of a powerful lo-cal Awami League leader, ear-lier ransacked the arrangements made for the function by the local Director of Shiell Oil in Durgapur.

Sources in Chittagong said that the attacks were a result of political conflict between the Shell Oil official and the

Awami League leader. The Shell Director is reportedly a strong supporter of BNP.

No case has been filed in this connection till filing of this report last night.

Task Force report on banks

TU leaders take fat fees to 'manage' loans

The trade union (TU) leaders of the nationalised commercial banks (NCBs) act as the key persons in both sanctioning of new loans and in rescheduling loans, according to the recently submitted Task Force report on

The leaders take fat fees from clients for lobbying for them. They also flex their power in the postings of executives in the high levels of loan management and administration divisions.

The report cited the case of a deputy general manager (DGM) of a big NCB. The managing director (MD) of the bank had transferrerd the DGM on the 'believable' allegation that he regularly received money from

For this, the MD, as a strategy, had received the permission of the chairman of the bank. But this transfer order

the same chairman had later advised in writing to stay the transfer order.

A new MD of the bank later had also ordered transfer of the same DGM at which the CBA of the bank staged angry demonstrations. Later, the chairman once again advised through another member of the bank's board to cancel the transfer or-

The report further said it was 'perceived beyond doubt' that the TU is involved in loan issues specially in Sonali and Janata banks.

The report also said managers of some branches of banks pay regular tolls to the TUs, or they face transfers. The branch managers think that high officials up to the rank of GM, DGM and even Mds are also involved with this vested quarter. The bank managers collect the money from loan applicants.

Another exit poll commissioned by the Doordarshan state television channel forecast the BJP would win about 90 of 150 seats in the north and dominate Uttar Pradesh, the political heart of the country.

The Congress, inspired by a campaign by Sonia Gandhi, widow of former premier Rajiv Gandhi, would win 26 seats, just ahead of the outgoing United
