

Britain keen to invest in DEPZ

Britain is keen to invest in the Dhaka Export Processing Zone, reports UNB. This was stated by Acting British High Commissioner to Bangladesh Ms Miriam Rose McIntosh during a meeting with Executive Chairman of Bangladesh Export Processing Zones Authority Moazzam Hossain Khan here yesterday. Ms McIntosh expressed her satisfaction at the productive atmosphere prevailing in the DEPZs of Bangladesh. She particularly showed interest to invest in the shrimp project. The Executive Chairman briefed the British envoy about various incentives and facilities which are being extended to the investors of the DEPZs. It may be mentioned that Britain has already invested 5.72 million US dollars in the two DEPZs, said a press release.

Fourth branch of Dutch-Bangla Bank opens

The fourth branch of Dutch-Bangla Bank Limited has been opened in the city. The branch was inaugurated by its Chairman, Mohammad Sahabuddin Ahmed, at 165, Nawabpur Road, Dhaka yesterday, says a press release. This is the first Bangladesh-European joint venture bank in the country with the Netherlands Development Finance Co (FMO). The branch opening ceremony was attended by businessmen, media representatives, Director, Managing Director, Advisor and senior executives of the bank. A milad mahfil was held to mark the occasion.

JS told Tk 7904cr foreign investment in 205 units since July, 96

Foreign investment of Tk 7,903.60 crore have been made in 205 industrial units during one and a half year since July 1996, reports UNB. Industries and Commerce Minister Tofael Ahmed stated this in Parliament yesterday replying to Tajul Islam (AL-Comilla). He said Tk 12,732.50 crore were invested in 436 industrial units as registered by the Board of Investment during January 1991-June 1996 period.

Southeast Asian currencies fall

SINGAPORE, Mar 12: Southeast Asian currencies fell Thursday as cautious traders took refuge in the US dollar to await weekend Cabinet appointments and possible economic changes by Indonesia's re-elected President Suharto. "You can observe that the markets are very confused," Alston Seng, an analyst at Standard and Poor's M&S Emerging Markets, told The Associated Press. They are taking a very short-term outlook in intra-day trading. If they were to go long on the dollar in the morning because of negative news... they balance it in the afternoon. The negative news Thursday was a newspaper interview in which Suharto's new hand-picked vice president, Bacharuddin Jusuf Habibie, said Indonesia's constitution does not allow some of the financial structure reforms demanded by the International Monetary Fund in return for 43 billion dollars in aid. Although the Malaysian ringgit, Singapore dollar, Indonesian rupiah and Thai baht fell against the US dollar from the opening of Asian trading Thursday, there were no dramatic movements.

Crisis in Asia 22-nation talks in Washington on Apr 16

WASHINGTON, Mar 12: Finance ministers and central bank chiefs from 22 countries in Europe, Asia and the Americas will meet in Washington on April 16 to discuss Asia's financial problems, a treasury spokeswoman said on Wednesday, reports Reuters. United States, the world's biggest economy, had called the meeting to give ministers a chance to discuss how to cope with financial crises like the one which has been sweeping through Asia for months. Invited guests will come from the Asian tiger economies hit by the crisis, from the rich countries helping to bail them out and from other countries in the region and beyond. Asian states are particularly well represented. Treasury is calling the group the Willard Group, named after one of Washington's most exclusive hotels.

Nepalese MPs say India still remains a barrier to Dhaka-Kathmandu land link

A Nepalese parliamentary delegation here yesterday said India's restriction to using its land for more than twice a week is one of the main obstacles to the full-fledged use of Bangladesh land transit point, reports UNB. "We have to travel 55 km through India to reach Bangladesh transit point and India only allows twice a week to use her land," Hiranya Lal Shrestha, the leader of the 10-member delegation, said at a meeting with the leaders of FBCCI.

He said the delegation will advise Nepalese government to press India to modify its conditionalities for making the land route functioning in real sense. Nepal's ambassador Lok Bahadur Shrestha said Nepal had to fight for years together to make India agree to allow Nepal to use her (India) land for Bangladesh route. "The route has opened now. But, we can't fully use it yet," he said adding both Bangladesh and Nepal will have to share the responsibility if the much-awaited Bangladesh land route remains practically unutilized. The delegation comprising members of Nepal's parliament

committee on foreign affairs and human rights was exchanging views with the business leaders at the Federation of Bangladesh Chambers of Commerce and Industry (FBCCI) at FBCCI conference room. Besides, he said, road infrastructures from Bangladesh to Mongla port and warehouse facilities should be developed to make the route useful, he said. Bangladesh will host SAARC trade fair in October and SAARC chambers' meeting sometime later this year, he said. The Bangladesh business delegate will visit Nepal in April to identify the areas of bilateral trade, he informed. He cited jute, textile, leather, artificial jewelry, computer software and pharmaceutical products as some of the goods which Nepal can import from Bangladesh while Bangladesh can import mainly agricultural products from Nepal.

FBCCI president Yusuf Abdullah Harun said permission for using India's land only for two days a week is not economically viable for using the Nepal-Bangladesh land link through India. He suggested that the three nations sit together to settle the matter. "Otherwise, India will be saying in record they've given transit facilities, but in practical it'll remain useless,"

Haron said. Besides, he said, road infrastructures from Bangladesh to Mongla port and warehouse facilities should be developed to make the route useful, he said.

They came here to study the existing facilities at Mongla port and Bangladesh land port and approaching road conditions and find ways to make the route functioning and to identify the areas of boosting bilateral trade.

Describing the economic and trade relation between Nepal and Bangladesh as "neglected" the Nepalese ambassador said the joint economic commission should meet frequently to strengthen the trade ties between the two countries.

Another report says: Commerce and Industries Minister Tofael Ahmed has said Bangladesh is ready to provide wholehearted cooperation for expansion of export and import of

Nepal. "We have no problem to allow our land and port to be used for the movement of goods to and from Nepal. We are extending all sorts of help as Nepal is land-locked," he said.

The minister was talking to the visiting 10-member all-party parliamentary delegation of Nepal at his parliament office here yesterday.

Tofael said Bangladesh favours the utilization for seven days in a week of Bangladesh transit point between Bangladesh and Nepal. "It will also help increase our trade with Nepal."

The minister hoped that Nepal and Bangladesh, as members of the LDC, will work together in the coming 2nd WTO ministerial conference in Geneva for realising the demand of LDCs, including duty-free access of their products to other markets.

He said Bangladesh will play its due role in the conference as before as the coordinator of and spokesman for LDCs.

Narayan Man Bijukchhe, leader of the Nepalese parliamentary delegation and Chairman of Nepal Workers and Peasants' Party, said Nepal

is interested to import frozen food and other industrial products from Bangladesh. Bangladesh could also increase import of fruits, vegetables and other agri-products from Nepal, he said.

'Share experiences'
BSS says: Visiting Nepalese Minister for Local Development, Gajendra Narayan Singh, said here yesterday that Nepal and Bangladesh have opportunities to share experiences for poverty alleviation and infrastructure development of the two countries.

Speaking at a three-day workshop on "food assisted development during visit of the Nepalese delegation to Bangladesh" here, Gajendra said "we look forward to learning greater and sharing from your (Bangladesh) experiences." State Minister for LGRD and Cooperatives Mozazzam Hossain Chowdhury Maya spoke on the occasion as chief guest.

Jointly organised by the Local Government Engineering Department (LGED) and World Food Programme (WFP), the workshop was presided over by M Anwarul Islam Joint Secretary, Local Government Division.

ADB focuses on poverty alleviation in Nepal

KATHMANDU, Mar 12: Poverty reduction in Nepal will remain the focus of the assistance by the Asian Development Bank (ADB) in the coming three years starting from 1999, the bank said yesterday, reports Xinhua. Under an agreement reached between the country programming mission of the ADB and the Nepali government, the assistance aims to help Nepal attain higher sustainable growth to create jobs and increase incomes for the poor, the bank said in a press release.

Agriculture will continue to be an important sector due to its poverty reduction potential as well as its large share in the overall output, and further support will be provided for reforms in the sector, the bank said. It said support will also be given for physical and social infrastructure projects, capacity building, human development and natural resources management, in particular environmental protection.

The programmed level of lending will be about 75 million US dollars per annum, while the projected level of technical assistance grants will be around five million dollars each year, the bank said. The loans will be provided by the Asian Development Fund, the bank's soft loan window which provides loans with no interest and a 40-year repayment schedule, including a 10-year grace period.

In the past three years, the bank lent Nepal annually 90 to 100 million dollars, said Ali Shah, Resident Representative

of the ADB in Nepal. He told a press conference that substantial progress has been made in the ADB-aided sectors in Nepal, such as education, road and agriculture.

Programmes for the coming three years include projects for urban water supply for the Kathmandu valley as well as for small towns, rural electrification and distribution improvement, the development of private sector through capital market development and the creation of an enabling environment, crop diversification, roads and basic education, the bank said.

It said technical assistance will be provided for the preparation of these projects as well as for policy advice and capacity building. The bank's assistance will also focus on sub-regional cooperation among Bangladesh, Bhutan, India and Nepal with an emphasis on projects which can be implemented in the near future.

The bank will look into the Pancheswor Hydropower Project and conduct technical study and if feasible, it will provide loans, an official from the bank told the press conference.

Nepal is a founding member of the ADB and an important borrower from the Asian Development Fund. On a cumulative basis, the bank's lending to Nepal had reached 1.5 billion dollars for 92 loans by the end of 1997.

It noted that the agriculture sector received 45 per cent of the amount, followed by energy, transport and communications.

Workshop on environmental rules '97 held

A workshop on 'dissemination of environmental conservation rules 1997' was held at the DCCI auditorium in the city on Wednesday.

It was jointly organised by Bangladesh Centre for Advanced Studies (BCAS), Dhaka Chamber of Commerce and Industry (DCCI), Department of Environment, and World Bank.

The purpose of the workshop was to familiarise the industrial entrepreneurs and the business community with provisions of the environmental laws and legislation of Bangladesh, such as, Environmental Conservation Act, 1995 and Environmental Conservation Rules, 1997.

The workshop was participated, among others, by Dr Saleemul Huq, Executive Director of BCAS; Paul Martin of World Bank and AR Khan, Director General of Department of Environment.

The keynote speech was delivered by Dr MI Sharif, Research Fellow, BCAS. Speaking on the occasion the Acting President of the DCCI, Masudur Rahman, said there is a great need for creating awareness among the industrialists about the provisions of the environmental laws.

The World Bank will help the industrialists to implement the related environmental legislation at least cost method.

The DCCI is also planning to establish an environmental unit in cooperation of the World Bank at its premises so that the members of the DCCI and the business community get the benefit out of it.

EU Commission adopts New Trans-Atlantic Market project

STRASBOURG, France, Mar 12: The EU Commission adopted a resolution yesterday preparing the way for talks on a new trans-Atlantic market, a vast free-trade area linking the EU and US, reports AFP.

The Commission adopted a resolution on this here at its weekly meeting. Commission Vice-President Sir Leon Brittan said: "This project will be sent to the European Council (of heads of government), where it will be debated, and then the commission will draft a firm proposal." He said: "We want to begin negotiations with the Americans as quickly as possible for conclusion before the end of 1999."

The New Trans-Atlantic Market, or NTM, concerns a range of measures to remove all obstacles to trade between the United States and Europe.

The Commission has estimated that the benefits to the EU would amount to 150 billion euros (165 billion dollars) per year after the first five years of application.

The NTM area would affect all trade between the EU and US except trade in agricultural products and in film and audio products and services, two areas of "great sensitivity" in Europe, Brittan said.

The commission had already had informal talks with US officials he said, commenting that the matter would be on the agenda of a six-monthly summit of the EU and United States in May.

EU Commissioner Martin Bangemann, who is responsible

for industrial relations, said that the NTM was the best means of fighting protectionist trends in the United States.

"We are proposing the opening of markets, it is as in a game of chess: the best defence is to attack."

The two commissioners denied suggestions that the commission was dispersing its attention, already occupied by the launch of the Euro and by enlargement.

They held that there was no reason why talks on the NTM should not be launched.

Planning Commission okays development proposals for north-west region

A high level meeting of Industries and Energy Division of the Planning Commission has approved a number of proposals to expedite overall development of the country's north-western region, reports UNB.

The "pragmatic development proposals" included the sectors of communications, telecommunications, agriculture, water, gas and electricity, industries and education, said an official handout here Wednesday. But it did not elaborate the proposals.

The meeting, chaired by State Minister for Planning Dr Mohiuddin Khan Alamgir, was informed that the developed communications network in the north-western region will be helpful for the sub-regional cooperation.

India, Pakistan again team up against West

ISLAMABAD, Mar 12: For the second time, India and Pakistan have teamed up against the West, this time at the World Trade Organisation (WTO) where they are opposing a US proposal to modify the rules of the international textile trade which would hurt yarn exporting developing nations.

The South Asian neighbours joined hands at a recent meeting in Brussels of the World Customs Organisation (WCO), a WTO panel, against the proposal to include yarn and fabric forward policy in the WTO rules governing the textile trade, Pakistani Commerce Ministry officials told IANS.

New Delhi and Islamabad had earlier decided to challenge jointly in a US court the grant of a patent by the US Patent Office to an American agriproduct company on a variety of rice which closely resembles the famed Basmati rice exclusive to the subcontinent.

Ahasan Wahla, Deputy Secretary in the Commerce Ministry who was present at the Brussels meeting, said that under the US proposal, the origin of finished products made from imported yarn or fabric would be attributed to the country which exported the yarn or fabric. However, the representatives

of Pakistan and India, who were joined by China, Turkey, Indonesia and Bangladesh, turned down this suggestion. They argued that this would hurt exporters of yarn and fabric and also discourage value addition of these items in the developed nations, Wahla said.

Another ministry official said that the WCO would submit its recommendations and the views of the textile exporting/importing countries soon to the WTO in Geneva. The WTO would make public in June 1998 its verdict regarding the US concept of yarn/fabric forward, said the official. Currently, The US, Germany,

Britain, Japan, France, Italy and Canada are importing yarn and fabric worth of billions of dollars from Pakistan, India, China, Indonesia, Turkey and Bangladesh. Pakistan alone annually exports about two billion dollars worth of yarn and fabric to developed countries.

According to yarn exporter Anis Lala, if developed nations start linking the origin of their finished products to the Asian countries, it would not only lower their profit margin but also badly mar the sale of their well-trimmed products. Asian countries have asked the WCO not to endorse the American plan and continue with the ex-

isting policy. At the Brussels meeting, the textile exporting countries pleaded that any substantial transformation of yarn/fabric be linked to that country which makes value addition by using latest technology, designs and fascinating colours, the Commerce Ministry official said.

In an earlier meeting, in which the US first tabled its proposal, the textile producing countries argued that any commerce item, made from the yarn and fabric, must be linked to the country which had trimmed, designed and finished the yarn and fabric.
