Suspected rapist of minor girl arrested

By Staff Correspondent CID investigators arrested a young man from Faridpur early yesterday on charge of raping the six-year-old girl in the police control room at the CMM's Court building in the city on March 10.

Obayedul Matbar alias Mora, 25, was brought to Dhaka and produced in the CMM's Court the same day. He was placed on a three-day CID remand for further interrogation.

He used to stay in the court area in the old city and do some small jobs like sweeping and cleaning there for quite some-time, CID sources said.

A special CID team arrested Obayedul, son of Sayeed Matbar, from his village home at Narayanpur in Nagarkanda thana of Faridpur at about 3 am yesterday.

Legal process delays BB drive to remove defaulting directors

Star Report

The central bank's drive to remove defaulting directors from banks may become ineffective as the process to decide whether it was legal or illegal is taking a long time.

A large section of the defaulting bank directors have obtained court orders staying the removal process. Such stay orders sometimes continue for years due to backlog of cases in the courts.

The court procedures have taken such a lengthy detour that in some cases the Bangladesh Bank's (BB) penalty under Section 46 of the Bank Company Act (BCA) is about to become invalid even if it is fi-

nally affirmed by the courts.
The stay orders, in some cases discharged by the High Court, had been renewed by the Appellate Division and the time was later extended.

The BB had served notices on 112 directors of different

private banks under Section 17 of the Banking Companies Act. 1991, asking them to repay their defaulting loans or lose their directorships, according to central bank sources.

Five or six of these directors had either repaid their full loan amount or 'adjusted' loans, 12 had either resigned voluntarily or lost their directorship, and the deadline for expiry of notice is yet to become effective in case of nine directors.

But about one fourth of the total number of directors, 35, had obtained stay order of the central bank's notice or removal order.

This has left the whole process of cleaning the financial system almost ineffective, central bank sources said.

The BB had served removal order for three years under Section 46 of BCA on a director of Pubali Bank, Shafi A Chowdhury, on August 19, 1995. But he obtained a stay order on September 11, 1995 from the High Court, according to the BB. Since then, the case has been

pending with the HC for about two and a half years. If the status quo continues for another six months, the central bank's removal order for three years will become automatically in-

Another director of City Bank, Ibrahim Mia was served with a same type of removal notice on May 5, 1996. He obtained a stay order from court on May 12, 1996 and the case has been pending for more than one year and nine months.


In the latest case, showcause notices were served on two directors of IFIC Bank, Salman Rahman and Sohel Rahman, under Section 17 of BCA on February 12, 1998. Both of them obtained stay orders four days later, on February 16, for ten

On the same date, two directors of AB Bank - M A Quashem and Igbal Ahmed - also obtained stay orders from the court on notices they received from the BB.

They have filed writ petitions against the notices to repay money. Some senior lawyers are of the view that writ petition against such notices to repay money is not maintain-

Ramjul Seraj of AB Bank was also served with notices on November 6, 1997. He obtained stay order on February 4.

Serajul Islam Chowdhury, Director of UCBL, was served with showcause notices on July 27, 1995. He obtained stay order from the HC on September 19. 1995. Later, the HC discharged the rule on July 1, 1997. But Chowdhury filed a civil petition before the Appellate Division which also allowed stay order See Page 12 Col 7

BJP govt to honour water sharing accord

NEW DELHI, Mar 18: Indian Prime Minister designate, Atal Behari Vajpayee, said here today that his government would honour the water sharing accord between Bangladesh and India signed in December 1996, reports BSS.

Releasing an eight-page national agenda in the presence the leaders of BJP and its allies. he said the new government, to be sworn in tomorrow, will adopt a national water policy which provides for effective and prompt settlement of disputes and their time-bound imple-

mentation. Putting all contentious issues on the back-burner, the national agenda of the BJP and its allies promised to usher in a new political era of reconciliation and continue the economic reforms with a strong "swadeshi" thrust and 'thor-

oughly' review the constitution. On the national security of India, the agenda committed the coalition government to reevaluating the country's nuclear policy exercising the option to induct nuclear weapons.

Punitive action will be taken if defaulters' list found faulty'

Finance Minister SAMS Kibria yesterday said punitive action will be taken against the officials of Bangladesh Bank and other banks concerned if their list of defaulters is found faulty, reports UNB.

"My source was Bangladesh Bank and I can't believe the Bank has given a fictitious list," Kibria said when his attention was drawn to the strong reaction of the business community to the list of defaulters he placed in parliament recently.

Negligence on the part of the bank officials in preparing the list, if detected, will be dealt ter in an apparent soft attitude toward the business commu-

Talking to reporters on return home from Nepal, the Finance Minister advised those who have cleared their debts after September 1997, to inform the Banking Division. "We'll release their names if found not defaulters," he said.

Kibria said he believed the issue of defaulters should be seen in proper perspective. He admitted that those who failed to repay loans due to genuine reasons should not be bracketed with wilful defaulters.

RAJSHAHI, Mar 18: Short supply Liquefied Petroleum Gas (LPG) in the northern districts has pushed its price to as high as Tk 700 a cylinder.

LGP cylinders are now available only in the black market, consumers alleged. According to sources in the Bangladesh Petroleum Corporation, there are at least 25,000 consumers of LPG and 191 deal-

ers in the 16 districts of Ra-

ishahi Division. The total monthly demand is about one lakh twenty thousand cylinders. The highest

number of 28,778 cylinders were supplied in July last year. The supply then gradually decreased and came down to almost half the quantity.

The sources said the short supply has been caused by less production of LPG cylinders in the Eastern Refinery. The production was 51,000 cylinders earlier but it has decreased by about 50 per cent now.

Cylinders are now being released from the Baghabari oil depot at an interval of 10-15
