

Manoj India's hero High Commission spells stark truth

A superb all-round performance from Manoj guided Indian High Commission to a facile 31-run victory over Daily Star in a 25-overs-a-side friendly at the Dhanmondi Club ground yesterday.

Manoj, the big man from Orissa, scored a stroke-filled 25 to help his side reach a not-so-impressive 115 and then went on to capture three vital wickets to send Daily Star packing for a meagre 84 in 17.2 overs.

The Daily Star team fielded impressively despite some wayward bowling and was successful in restricting the Indians to an apparently inadequate total.

However, they failed to live up to their potential when they batted. After a rollicking start which saw their run-rate soar to over six an over, the middle order failed miserably.

Rabed Imam top-scored for Daily Star with 17 while skipper Morshed Al Khan chipped in with 16. Besides, opener Yameen and lower middle-order Joy contributed eight runs each.

Apart from right-arm medium-pace Manoj who ripped through the top order, Khera finished with four wickets while Mandal took two wickets for the Indian HC.

Earlier, opting to bat first, Manoj hammered highest 25 while Arindam added 10 to the winners' total which was built mainly around a huge tally of extras amounting to 48 runs, contributed by the not-the-least-celestial Star bowlers.

Medium-pace Towfik captured three wickets while Morshed finished with two wickets.

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Azhar adorns Eden again

CALCUTTA, Mar 20: Indian captain Mohammad Azharuddin hit his fifth century in seven Test innings here today to leave Australia facing a second straight defeat in the second Test, reports AFP.

Azharuddin struck an unbeaten 163 as the Indians piled up 633 for five before declaring an hour before close on the third day at Eden Gardens with a first innings lead of 400.

Australia, relieved to be back in the pavilion after a two-day toil, struggled to 38 for one in their second innings by the close.

Michael Slater was the batsman out, bowled by Jagavall Srinath for five. Skipper Mark Taylor (11) and Greg Blewett (19) were at the crease.

The tourists, who lost the first Test by 179 runs, face an uphill task batting for two days to stage off a second defeat in the three-Test series.

Azharuddin continued his love affair with Eden Gardens where he scored a century on debut against David Gower's England in 1984.

His sequence of scores in six innings here were 110, 141, 60, 182, 109 and 52.

Azharuddin slammed 18 fours and three sixes in India's only century during the marathon innings after five

others failed narrowly. On Thursday, Navjot Sidhu (97), Venkat Lakshman (95) and Sachin Tendulkar (79) all missed the coveted three-figure mark.

Today, it was the turn of Rahul Dravid (86) and Saurav Ganguly (65) to follow suit.

Azharuddin, however, reached his 20th Test century in regal style before 65,000 screaming home fans.

He moved from 85 to 95 with a six and four in one over from spinner Gavin Robertson when he brought up his century in the next over by lofting Mark Waugh into the stands for another six.

The Indians, 369 for three overnight, continued their spectacular run hunt against the depleted Australia attack missing all-rounder Steve Waugh and debutant fast bowler Paul Wilson.

Waugh strained a groin muscle while batting on the first day, while Wilson was ruled out for the rest of the tour with an abdominal injury.

Leg-spin wizard Shane Warne bore the brunt of the Indian assault, but found little assistance from the placid wicket to return figures of 0-147 from 42 overs.

Warne, rated as one of the game's greatest spinners with 308 wickets, never suffered such humiliation since his 1-150 on his debut against India at Sydney in 1991.

There was little respite for the others too. Off-spinner Robertson went for 2-63, while fast bowler Michael Kasprovicz finished with 1-122.

India added 94 runs in the two-hour morning session for the loss of Dravid's wicket.

Dravid added 10 to his overnight score of 76 when he top-edged a pull of Greg Blewett and the bowler himself took the catch.

Local boy Ganguly and Azharuddin compounded Australia's misery by adding 158 for the fifth wicket.

Ganguly, often referred to as the 'prince of Calcutta', disappointed his home fans when he was caught at silly point off Robertson just before tea.

Azharuddin, however, compensated with a sparkling innings to leave the Australians struggling for survival.

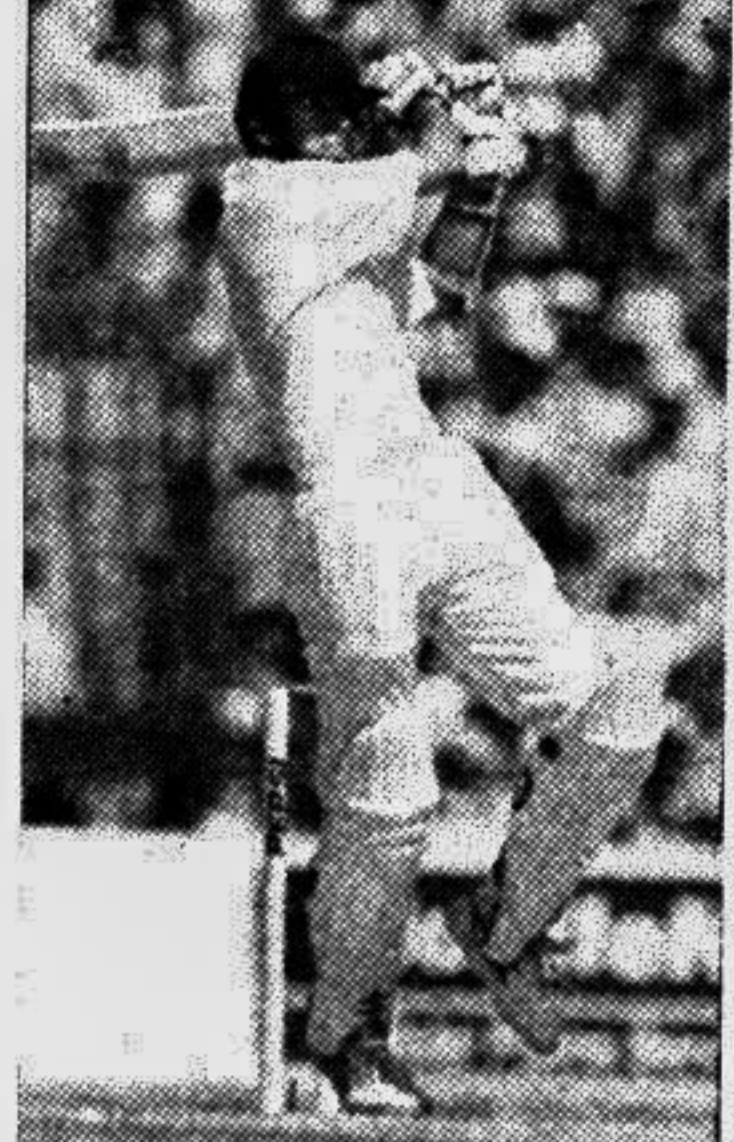

Commonwealth Games cricket grouping

Sixteen teams will take part in the Commonwealth Games cricket competition, starting in Malaysia from September 12.

The over-limit tourney will be played on turf in Kuala Lumpur and a New Zealander curator is reported to have been looking after it. Teams will be divided into four pools and the group winners will qualify for the semifinals.

Bangladesh, the International Cricket Council (ICC) Trophy champion, have been placed in a strong Group C along with South Africa, Zimbabwe and Northern Ireland.

Among the nine Test-playing nations only England declined to participate in the meet because of the fixture clash with the final rounds of the county championship. Barbados, Jamaica and Guyana will send separate teams from the Caribbean isles.

The draw for the 16th Commonwealth Games is as follows: Group A: Barbados, Jamaica, Malaysia, Sri Lanka.

Group B: Australia, Canada, Guyana, India.

Group C: Bangladesh, Northern Ireland, South Africa, Zimbabwe.

Aravinda to play for Boland?

Aravinda de Silva, whose fame as a master batsman hit world headlines and made the Test heavy-weights admire his excellence with the bat since his swashbuckling World Cup performance, has been offered a contract to play for Boland, next season.

South African media reported that Aravinda was delighted with the offer and said, "It has always been my ambition to have a stint in South Africa. The offer is good, but there are a few clauses in the contract they hope to offer me to be put right."

Hylton Ackerman, the former South African batsman who had heard so much about Aravinda's exploits with the bat, had a long chat with Aravinda during Sri Lanka's game with Boland. The Sri Lankan maestro is expected to sign the dotted line before he leaves South Africa.

"The contract is still to be signed and sealed. And before I leave I hope to iron out the little differences," said Aravinda.

Aravinda had a fling with Kent in the English County circuit and also played for Auckland in New Zealand. He also did wonders with the bat playing for Frahran in Australia.

Aravinda is best remembered for his blazing one-day centuries he scored for Kent against Lancashire and for Auckland in one of their vital games.

Ackerman is the coach of Boland and his son who is also named Hylton is being played in the Test against Sri Lanka at Newlands.

Fleming on way to India

SYDNEY, Mar 20: Damien Fleming was rushed to India today to strengthen Australia's injury-ravaged fast bowling ranks for the current Test series between the two countries, an Australian Cricket Board spokesman said, reports Reuters.

Fleming was expected to go straight into Australia's side for the third Test against India, starting in Bangalore on March 25.

Australian team management in India sent for an emergency replacement after injury sidelined fast bowlers Paul Wilson and Paul Reffel.

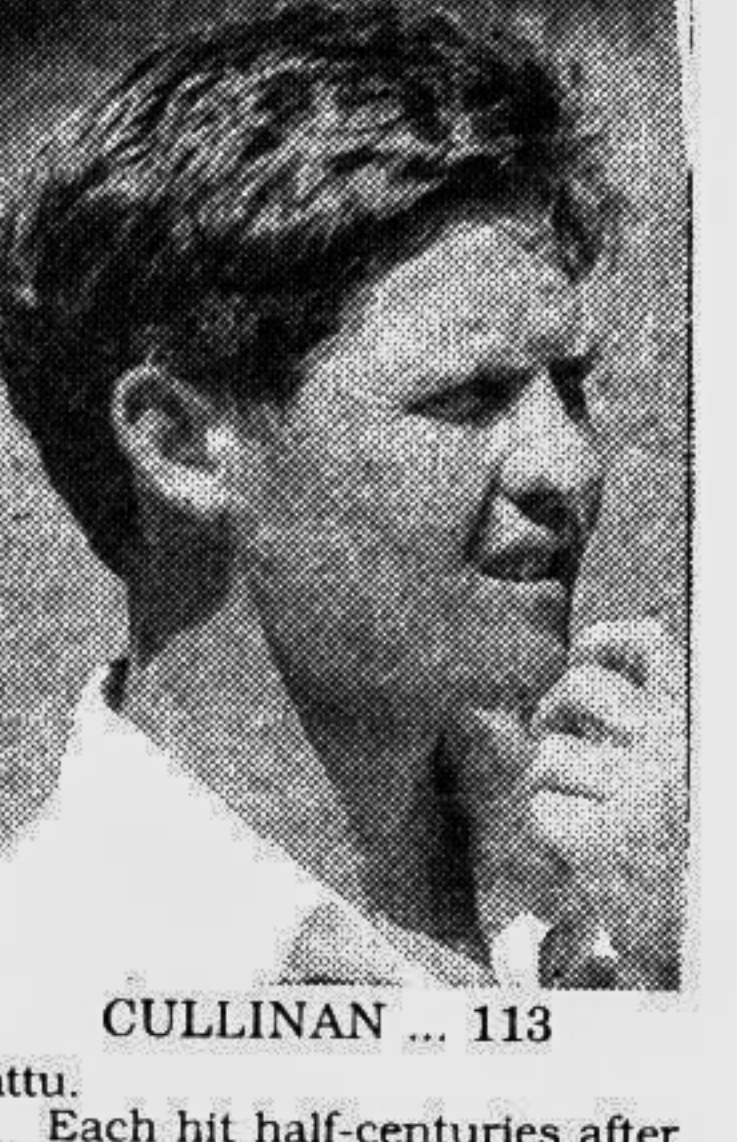
Speaking to reporters at Sydney airport, Fleming said he had three hours to pack for India after being notified by selectors on Friday morning.

Pollock falls eight runs short Sri Lanka 212 for five

Sri Lanka were 212 for five at close of play on the second day of the first Test against South Africa in Cape Town yesterday.

Each hit half-centuries after strike bowler Allan Donald had accounted for two quick wickets.

AP adds: Fast bowler Donald grabbed two quick wickets; but Sri Lanka replied boldly to South Africa's big first innings total on Friday.

After South Africa were bowled out for 418, Sri Lanka got off to a playing start, hammering 92 for two in just 88 minutes at tea on the second day.

Aravinda de Silva led Sri Lanka's run assault with a run-a-ball 36 runs and with opener Marvan Atapattu, 25 not out, put on 56 runs for the third wicket in just 45 minutes.

De Silva, Sri Lanka's highest run-getter in Test cricket, was particularly severe on Test debutant Makhaya Ntini.

Ntini, the first black player to represent South Africa in Test cricket, was hit out of the attack after just four overs. He conceded 32 runs inclusive of five boundaries.

De Silva has so far struck six

boundaries in all while Atapattu, who resigned to play second fiddle, has hit three boundaries off 53 balls.

Donald removed left-hander Sanath Jayasuriya (17) and Roshan Mahanama (nine) in the space of three overs.

Donald had Jayasuriya chasing a wide delivery to give the wicketkeeper Mark Boucher the first of the two catches. Jayasuriya started ominously, hitting three boundaries off 15 balls.

Two overs later, Mahanama followed a well directed out-swing to Boucher again.

Earlier, Shaun Pollock hit a career-best 92 in 201 minutes to anchor the South African lower order.

Pollock, who narrowly missed out on a maiden Test hundred, shared 95 runs with his overnight partner Boucher (33) after South Africa had resumed on 238 for six.

Pollock made Sri Lanka pay dearly for another fielding lapse. Mahanama, who was responsible for a costly miss on the first day, dropped Pollock on 25.

On the first day Mahanama dropped Cullinan before he had scored. Cullinan went onto score 113, his fourth Test century.

But Mahanama quickly made amends, running out Boucher with a direct hit.

Pollock was the last batsman out, trapped leg before wicket by seam bowler Pramodaya Wickramasinghe 10 minutes after the lunch break.

Pollock hit eight boundaries and a towering six off Sri Lanka's 212 for five.

Off-spinner Muralitharan returned 4-135 in 45 overs while Wickramasinghe took 3-75.

Graf, Majoli withdraw

KEY BISCAYNE, Florida, Mar 20 (AP): Jennifer Capriati's latest comeback bid lasted barely an hour, and Steffi Graf never even made it to her opening match.

The Lipton Championships lost two of its biggest names on the first day of action Thursday, but neither departure was a surprise.

Capriati, playing for the first time since November, lost to Magdalena Grzybowska, 6-0, 7-5. Graf withdrew because of a strained left hamstring that is expected to sideline her for at least another month.

Both players could recall better days at Lipton. Graf won the tournament five times, and American Capriati reached the semifinals in 1992, when she was a 16-year-old prodigy.

"I like this place," Capriati said. "It feels like home."

But she couldn't get comfortable against Poland's Grzybowska, losing the first set in 22 minutes and squandering chances to win the second set because of wild forehands and double faults. The result was her sixth consecutive first-round defeat.

Graf of Germany couldn't say the same. She withdrew because of a sore hamstring that forced her to retire in the third set of a semifinal match March 12 against American Lindsay Davenport at Indian Wells, California. That was only Graf's second tournament in nine months.

She was seeded fourth at Lipton and scheduled to play Friday or Saturday.

"I was hoping for the best, and I tried practising this morning," Graf said in a statement. "After just a few balls, it was obvious that there just has not been enough time for the injury to heal."

Graf, who hopes to play in Germany's Fed Cup match against Spain in mid-April, is still recovering from reconstructive surgery on her left knee. The decades most dominant player was sidelined for eight months before making an

emotional return last month at Hanover, Germany, where she won her first match, then lost to Sabine Appelmans.

Graf won three matches impressively at Indian Wells before retiring against Davenport. The German also has been bothered this year by a sore left calf, and speculation persists that she'll soon be forced into retirement.

Another Lipton casualty was French Open champion Iva Majoli, who withdrew because of the flu.

In men's play, Australia's Mark Woodford beat rising American star Jan-Michael Gambill, a semifinalist this month at Indian Wells, 6-1, 6-2. American Jim Courier blitzed Czech Radomir Vasek 6-1, 6-0.

Seeds will be in action beginning Friday.

Capriati took the court sporting short hair with a fresh red tint, but her game showed no such flair. A weight problem hampered her mobility, and her groundstrokes were inconsistent.

When yet another errant forehand sailed long, Capriati frowned at her racket, looked to the heavens and then stared at the ground. Victory was nowhere in sight.

But Capriati, whose demeanor turned sullen as she struggled with personal and legal trouble several years ago, smiled easily while talking about her latest loss.

"At least I didn't get blown off the court," she said. "It was a start."
