Proposal to raise gas price to be placed before Cabinet soon

The proposal to increase gas price by 31 per cent from this month is likely to be placed in the Cabinet meeting next week,

sources said. The government plans to gradually increase the current gas tariff by 60 per cent by the end of this year. The last time the government increased this tariff was in 1994.

Gas price hike would lead to inflation as all industrial and agricultural products would become costlier, economists say.

One of the main reasons to increase the gas price by such a high margin is to minimise the government's loss due to gas purchase from multinational Cairn at a higher rate than the local gas sale price from this

Cairn will start supplying 100 million cubic feet of gas per day from the Sangu field. As per the Gas Purchase Sales Agreement (GPSA), the government will buy Cairn's off-shore gas at 92.75 per cent of the price of the High Sulphur Fuel Oil (HSFO) in the international market (which is the formula to calculate international price of gas). According to that calculation, government will buy Cairn's gas at 2.6 dollars per thousand cubic feet or per unit. The current domestic price of gas is only 1.2 dollars per unit.

DCC yet to take over Osmany Udyan
