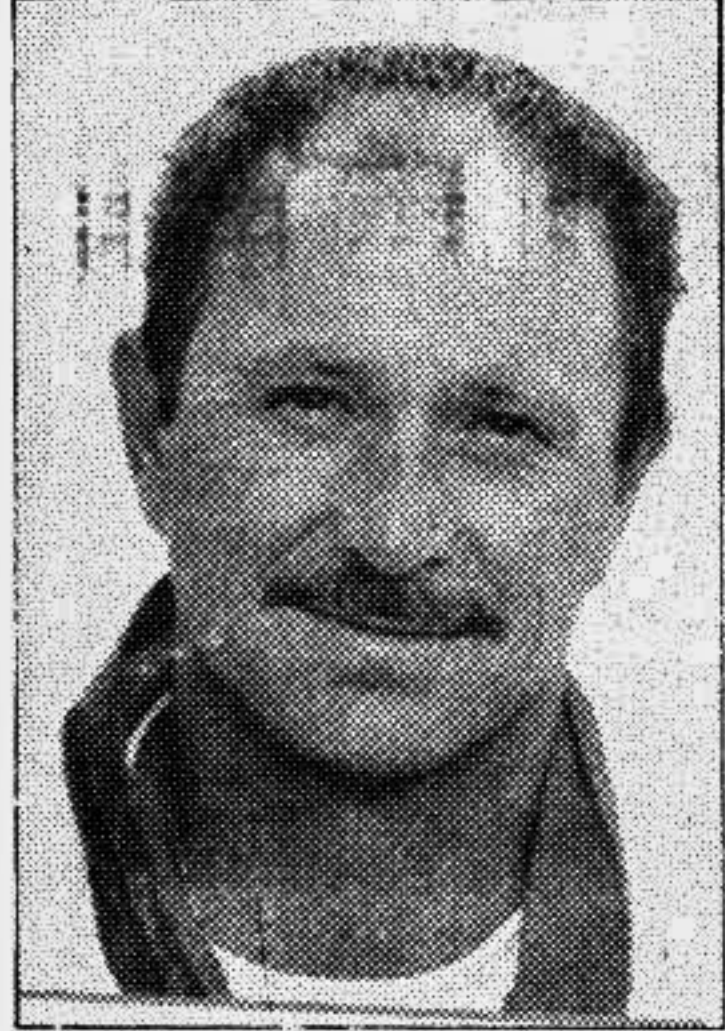

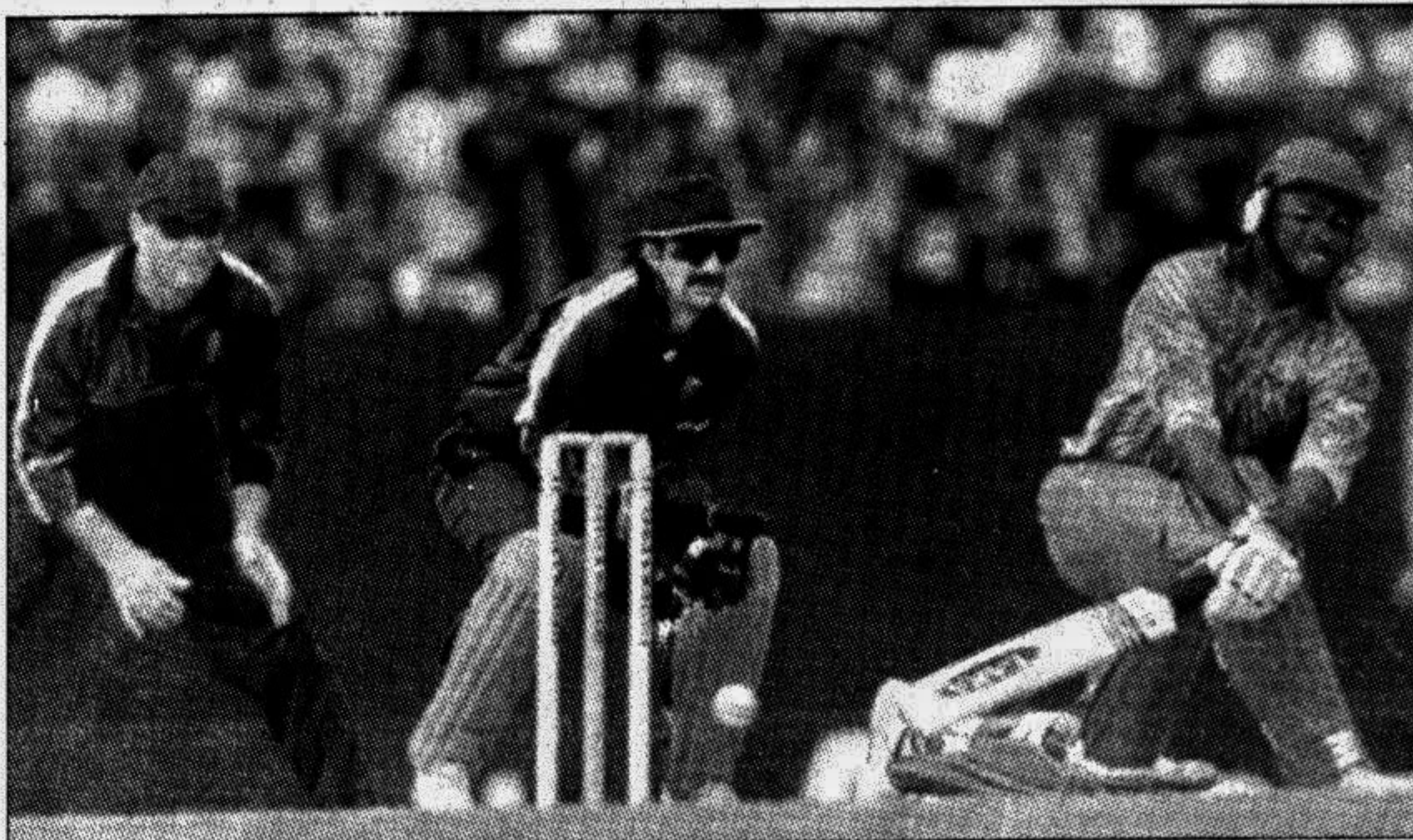
Spadea sent packing

HONG KONG, Apr 6: Australian Sandon Stolle upset fifth seed Vincent Spadea of the United States 6-1, 6-3 Monday in the first round of the US \$340,000 dollars Salem Open, reports AP.

Stolle, who is ranked 127th, said Spadea 'never got into the match.'

The Australian who lost in the first round in his previous appearances in Hong Kong in 1993-4, said he kept pressuring the American and 'I felt I hit the ball well.'

Spadea said Stolle was just too good and it was like a 'one-sided match.'

Windies clinch series

ST VINCENT, Apr 6 (AFP/AP): Clayton Lambert and Brian Lara each scored half-centuries as the West Indies beat England by four wickets in the fourth limited-over international played here on Sunday.

The West Indies restricted England to 149 and then reached the paltry victory target with 74 balls to spare. The triumph gave the West Indies a winning 3-1 lead in the best-of-five series ahead of Wednesday's final match in Trinidad and gave the home side revenge for their loss to England in the Sharjah Cup.

It was the weekend when England skipper Adam Hoolioake's magic touch deserted him. Hoolioake's one-day side were supposed to provide consolation for a 3-1 Test defeat — but two straight losses over the weekend put paid to those ambitions.

On Sunday, the tourists had little chance as they tried to defend an inadequate total for the second day running — something which Hoolioake was admirably honest about. 'We've not batted very well over the two days and have deserved to lose,' Hoolioake said.

It has not been good for us here. We've not played as well as we can and have been outplayed by a better side over the two days,' he added.

Lambert ensured a solid start for the West Indies with 52 of the first 67 runs and Lara settled things after a flurry of wickets with a stream of glorious strokes.

Angus Fraser dislodged Philo Wallace in the fifth over but Lambert and Stuart Williams added 48 for the second wicket to consolidate West Indies' advantage.

Lambert was the first of a few West Indians to gift their wicket, mis-hitting a slog off Robert Croft's off-break to mid on. The Guyanese opener faced

63 balls and lashed six fours. The West Indies slipped to 67 for three before Lara steadied nerves with a confident half century.

The left-hander lifted his team to within five of victory before he was bowled by Adam Hoolioake trying to end the match with one hit.

Lara's 51 spanned 64 balls, spiced with seven sweetly-timed boundaries, earned him the player-of-the-match award.

Victory was sealed when Matthew Fleming bowled a wide.

The West Indies captain, under much pressure when he took over the job at the start of this tour, has now had two triumphs to savour.

England knew they faced almost certain defeat after failing to post a competitive total.

The match was lost as early as the ninth over when fast bowler Nixon McLean, the local hero on this island, took three wickets with the new ball to send England tumbling to 33 for four.

On a pitch helping the seamers early on, but also the spinners, England could not recover despite a succession of batsmen getting a start.

Graeme Hick lost his off stump on 22, skipper Adam Hoolioake chipped paceman Mervyn Dillon to mid-wicket on 23 and Jack Russell was bowled by Dillon for 21, missing a leg stump full toss.

Wicketkeeper Russell had been strangely preferred to batsman Mark Ramprakash following Saturday's five-wicket defeat on the same ground. The early collapse probably left England wishing they had stuck with Ramprakash.

England's tail did their best to make sure some sort of defendable total was on the board — but it needed a last-wicket stand of 23 between Robert Croft and Angus Fraser to even achieve mediocrity.

Lara, who has proved his critics wrong since he controversially replaced veteran paceman Courtney Walsh as captain, praised both his young bowlers as McLean bowled his 10 overs straight through to take 3-44, while Dillon, brought in to replace Curtly Ambrose, finished with 3-32.

'I think it was a great effort by everybody, but the opening bowlers set it up and they won the match for us,' Lara said. 'We came here to win two matches to wrap up the series and that is what we did,' he added.

Parading for a sporting cause

Sports Reporter A group of resident students of Dhaka University brought out a procession on Sunday inside the campus demanding of the university authorities to provide ESPN and Star Sports channel in the student halls.

The rally of students raised slogans as it paraded around the Arts Faculty area. The demand was conveyed at Modhu's Canteen where several speakers argued in favour of the two sports channels.

Speakers urged the university authorities, including the Vice-Chancellor and Hall Provisors, to purchase decoder cards for the two sports channels and simultaneously warned Translink, local agents of ESPN and Star Network, not to take undue advantage by imposing extra costs intermittently on Bangladeshi subscribers.

The rally was very critical of the IPTV authorities, who they said were patronising in the halls cheap channels which were telecasting near-pornographic programmes.

It may be mentioned that local cable operators are continuing to refrain from subscribing to both the sports channels and are pressing on their demand on Translink to reduce connection fees.

Real in real trouble

NYON, Switzerland, Apr 6: UEFA, the body that rules European soccer, fined Real Madrid 1.3 million Swiss francs (850,000 dollars) Sunday and banned the Spanish club from playing its next two European games at home, reports AP.

The fines revolve around incidents in last Wednesday's Champions' Cup first-leg, semi-final won 2-0 by Real Madrid over Dortmund. The start of the game was delayed 75 minutes when fans pulled down the goal frame.

UEFA fined the club 300,000 Swiss francs for that incident and added another 1 million francs for over-selling tickets for the match.

The club sold 85,000 to 90,000 tickets instead of the authorised 72,000 for its Santiago Bernabeu stadium, UEFA said.

UEFA also ruled that Real Madrid's next two home games in European competition must be played at least 300 kilometres from the Spanish capital.

'Independent sources confirmed that some 85,000 or 90,000 spectators attended the match, whereas the club officially stated that the attendance was 65,500,' a UEFA statement said.

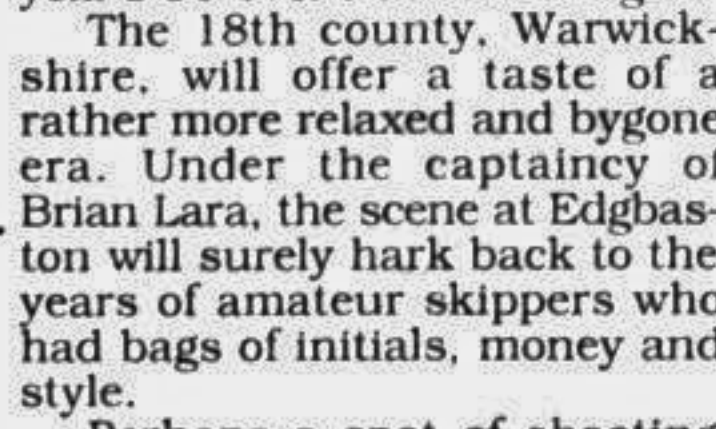
'The maximum permitted capacity for UEFA Champions' League matches (at Santiago Bernabeu) is just over 72,000.'

Lara now the captain who has everything

Brain Lara had a dream county cricket debut in 1994. As Lara scored runs at will, including the world record 501 not out against Durham, Warwickshire promptly won all but one of the trophies on offer during that memorable English summer.

Now after a gap of three years, Edgbaston is set to greet the sensational left hander once again. But things are a little different now. Lara is the skipper of the West Indies and is also expected to take over the Warwickshire helm for the ensuing county season.

Reputed cricket writer Scyld Berry reviews Lara's past and present exploits and also forecasts on what to expect in his feature in the Electronic Telegraph.



In less than a fortnight 17 first-class counties will enter the brave new world of Lord MacLaurin's reforms. They will be striving might and main to finish in the top half of the County Championship so that they can qualify for next year's Super Cup, another one-day knock-out dreamed up by HQ (please excuse me while I yawn), and in the top half of the Sunday League so that they will qualify for the upper division of next year's 50-over National League.

The 18th county, Warwickshire, will offer a taste of a rather more relaxed and bygone era. Under the captaincy of Brian Lara, the scene at Edgbaston will surely hark back to the years of amateur skipper who had bags of initials, money and style.

Perhaps a spot of shooting before the match, what-ho? Certainly around of golf, absolutely. And if it's an away match, let's round up a couple of popsies to take along in the back, and if we don't get there before the start, why not?

Had Courtney Walsh still been captain of the West Indies, Warwickshire's appointment of Lara as their captain would have been an undeniable masterstroke. He would have been highly motivated to show them that he should be given the West Indies job. But now that Lara has what he has always wanted, there is sure to be an interesting tension between the most laid-back of overseas players and the most professional of counties — quite possibly a creative one.

The tension should not be as glaring as it was in 1994, at any rate. Then the novelty of county cricket wore off quickly, and a prodigy at the piano found he was bored when stuck with the drums and triangle. The rest of the orchestra was not too happy either at the ever more disconcerting note which Lara struck.

When he joined Warwickshire immediately after scoring his 375, he was so hungry that he was sometimes practising on the outfield in the lunch interval. His first seven innings in the championship were 147, 106, 120*, 136, 28, 140 and 59.1, 176 runs, which were scored, what is more, from 1,175 balls.

Not surprisingly Lara became sated. In the remainder of the championship season he made three more hundreds. In the three limited-overs competitions he did not make one; his highest in them was 81, not coincidentally on the biggest occasion, the NatWest Trophy final at Lord's. For joie de vivre

his fielding that summer could not have been confused with Derek Randall's, on the occasions when Lara took the field, that is.

Behind the scenes, too, the lessening of commitment was increasingly apparent, sometimes hilariously so, except if you were the captain Dermot Reeve or the coach Bob Woolmer: soon the heavy roller was not enough to de-furrow their brows. When one of Warwickshire's home matches started, Lara was discovered to be on the motorway, driving a Trinidadian popy back from Heathrow.

Warwickshire had to win their last Sunday League match of the season, away to Gloucestershire, to take the title. To be fair, Lara arrived only just before the start largely because he had lost his way from Birmingham. But the point was that all the other players had stayed overnight in Bristol, while Lara had pleaded for and gained special permission to stay in Birmingham and drive down in the morning.

He was no more punctual with the newspaper which contracted him. When his 'ghost' managed to meet him one day at Edgbaston to do a column, Lara said he just had to do something first in the dressing-room. The ghost waited, and waited. When he finally inquired in the dressing-room, he learnt that Lara had gone off to Trinidad.

It was all done with princely charm, and the most winning of smiles. Some rounds of golf with the powers that are at Edgbaston also helped to keep him in possible odour and to secure an invitation to return one day. As captain, naturally, Brian Charles Lara, holder of Trinidad's Humming Bird medal and Trinity Cross, was not born to the ranks. The undertaking to this season's designated captain Tim Munton, that he had until Christmas to prove his fitness, was set aside.

And Lara's display during the recent Test series indicated that he is far more at ease now that he has fulfilled his life's ambition. He gave everything that he had against England, which might not have quite been the case in the previous series in Pakistan under Walsh, even if that 'everything' is not, as much as it was four years ago, before the record-breaking.

His man-management was exceptional in that he re-united the West Indian team in the tradition of Frank Worrell and Clive Lloyd, albeit in a New Age touchy-feely fashion. A careless captain could have lost Curtly Ambrose and Walsh to retirement. Lara's communication

skill helped to ensure that the West Indian pace bowling was decisively stronger than England's. His on-field captaincy was never conventional or formulaic, like that of several of his predecessors. It combined thought, imagination and luck, and usually worked. If anything he was too keen to be seen as different from his predecessors; and he appears to get bored at first slip, having done almost everything in cricket.

The impatience shows in his batting even more. He got on top of England's bowling in Guyana and Antigua, and was surging towards his hundred. Most batsmen would have throttled down through the nineties then picked up the pace again. Lara got out to screamers, for 93 and 89, skimming a drive to extra-cover and lashing a pull to midwicket. It was not a coaching book which once said, "twere well it were done quickly." If Lara has to play county cricket, to enhance his earnings rather than his game, there is no doubt that Warwickshire — without Reeve now, and Woolmer — is the county best suited to him. Last year they managed without an official captain, as Munton was injured. They have had to undertake their pre-season tour to Bloemfontein without Lara too.

Warwickshire has so many capable cricketers — and the best-drilled and most self-motivated of any county — they will supply a substantial cake on top of which Lara can squirt his feelings as and when he feels. And if he himself is not utterly committed from April 17, when Durham visit Edgbaston, to the last day of the season on Sept 20, and he loses a little interest when the winning stops and the patience of his players starts to fray, we can be sure that the shades of some earlier Warwickshire captains, like Hon FSG Calthorpe, will forgive him.
