



## Democracy means compromise, not confrontation: Richardson

US Ambassador to the UN Bill Richardson yesterday expressed his happiness over the Opposition parties' decision shifting a hartal date because of his visit to Bangladesh.

He was making an obvious reference to the seven-party called hartal tomorrow, which was earlier scheduled for yesterday. The date was reportedly shifted because of the US envoy's visit.

"I understand the Opposition delayed a general strike because of my visit. I say thank you. Unfortunately, I cannot visit Bangladesh more frequently to shift them."

Richardson made the impromptu remarks while delivering his written address on 'Making Democracy Work in the 21st Century' at the Bangladesh Institute of Strategic Studies yesterday morning.

In his written address he said, "It is clear that democracy in Bangladesh remains fragile and vulnerable to the machinations of political partisanship and rivalry."

### Others on the spot didn't get scope to resist killing

The witnesses from army in the Bangabandhu Murder Case, who were on the spot during the assassination of the country's founding President Sheikh Mujibur Rahman, didn't get any scope to resist the carnage.

Investigation Officer ASP Abdul Kahhar Akhand, also the 61st prosecution witness, said this during his cross-examination at the special ejlash of the Dhaka District and Sessions Judge's Court yesterday, reports

"Some of the army witnesses were on security duty at President's residence while some others, being bluffed by the officers who are accused in the case, had come to the house," he said replying to a query from advocate Khan Saifur Rahman.

The IO also told the court that there was no pressure on him to complete the chargesheet of the case hurriedly.

Khan Saifur Rahman, the defence counsel for principal accused Lt Col (dismissed) Syed Faroog Rahman, resumed his examination when the court of Judge Kazi Golam Rasul began in the morning after the Eid vacation.

He further said, "he will particularly like to come because of the warm reception given to First Lady Hillary Clinton."


