# Feasibility of power import

The government has initiated a study on the feasibility of power import from India. The study is likely to be completed before the coming rainy season. A US consulting firm has started a "techno-economic fea-

sibility study" on import of power from India. The study is funded by the Asian Development Bank (ADB), according to a highly-placed source in the Energy Ministry. The government is examin-

ing the option of power import in view of the fact that power supply situation is not likely to improve to meet the demand in the next two years.

## Beam of under-construction nal't auditorium collapses

At least ten workers were injured as a beam of the underconstruction Jatiya Natyashala at the Shilpakala Academy in the city's Segunbagicha area collapsed yesterday.

Five of the injured workers have been admitted to the Dhaka Medical College Hospital. They are Siddique, 25, Manjur. 22. Rafiqul Islam, 30, Shabuj, 31, and Mustafa, hospi-

Police said the incident took place when construction workers were pouring raw materials the second floor of the underconstruction Natyashala. However, it could not be known immediately how the

beam collapsed. About 40 people were working at the site when the incident took place at about 6:10 pm.

The scaffolding and the raw materials inside it collapsed with a bang shortly after the workers resumed work after about an hour's break due to the rain and stormy weather in the afternoon.

An engineer of the construc-

Police said the raid was part of the crackdown that begun in the city on Tuesday to arrest terrorists after the home minister's order during his visit to Chittagong on Monday. Twenty-one persons were arrested on the first day for their alleged involvement in various crimes, police said.

The WASA in collaboration with the DCC has now taken up a project to identify potential areas of contamination so that preventive measures could be taken," he added.

Scores of people are affected everyday drinking contaminated WASA water in the city, commented some doctors, talking to The Daily Star. Many of them get cured without going to a doctor while serious patients are taken to doctors or hospitals and clinics, they pointed

"Water-borne bacteria is responsible for such outbreak of diarrhoea in certain areas of the city. And leakage in water pipes near sewer lines is the probable cause of the widespread contamination of water. leading to outbreak of diarrhoea in some areas of

Dhaka," said a doctor who treated many such patients. Selina Khaleque, a resident of Shantinagar, told this corre-

spondent that she has suffered

from diarrhoea, which appeared 'almost like cholera. "Many others in the locality also had similar sufferings soon after they had detected bad smell in the tap water," she

The middle-aged lady further said the doctors who treated her 'identified bacterial presence in the drinking water as the reason behind her ill-

Azad described the talks "very fruitful and useful." Trade and economic cooperation, boundary disputes were among the issues discussed "frankly and cordially," and the response from the Myanmar side was very positive, he said but declined to elaborate.
