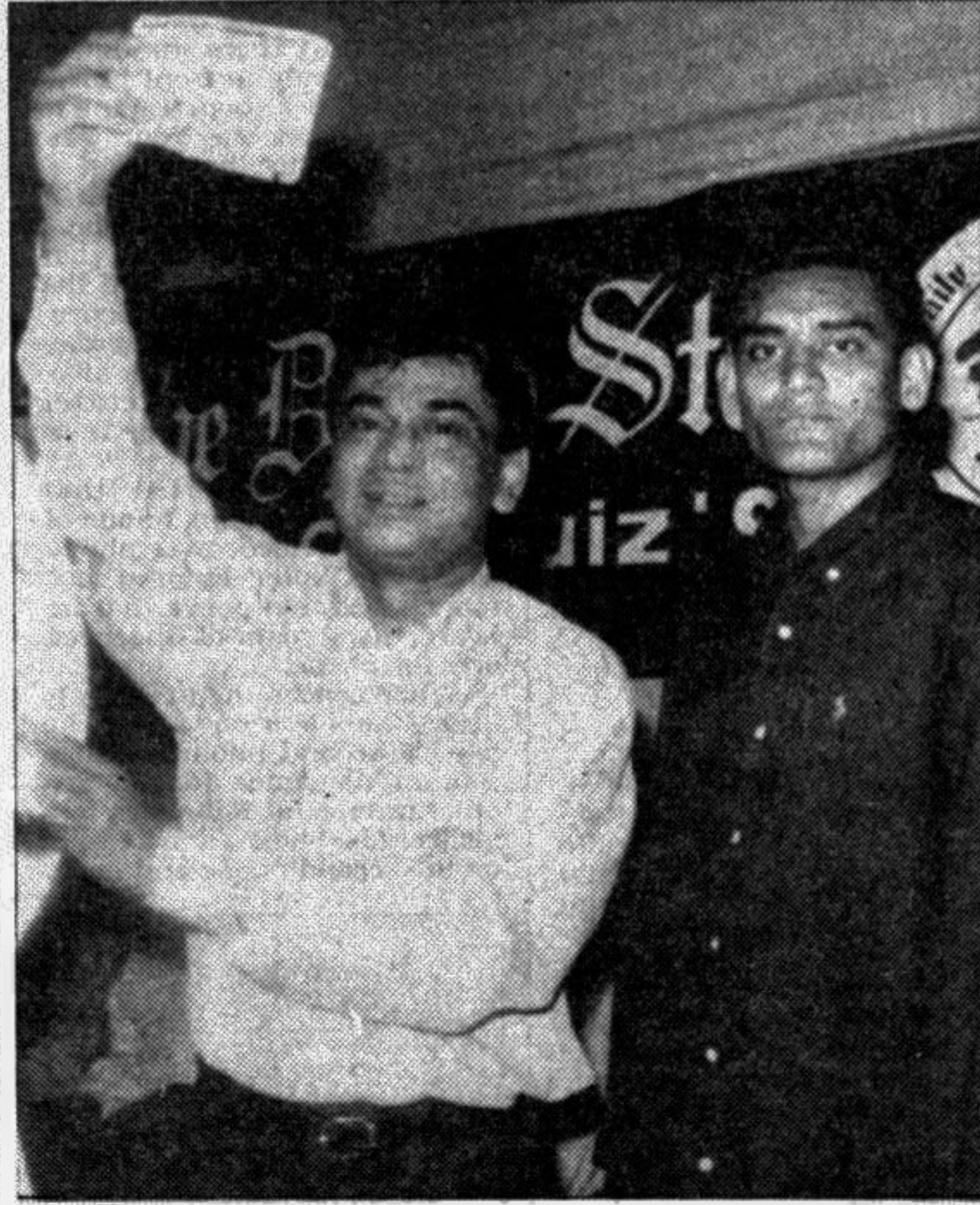
The second prize, a Sanyo Twin-Tab Washing Machine, went to Faez Arefin, a resident

It's now either Alec or Nasser

LONDON, Apr 30: The next England captain will be either Alec Stewart or Nasser Hussain, chairman of selectors David Graveney confirmed on Wednesday, reports AFP.

The appointment will be announced at Lord's next Tuesday and Graveney's assertion that the final decision still remains "a close call" will be heartening for current vice-captain Hussain.

Word within cricket circles has suggested that 35-year-old Stewart is almost certain to be the man named by Graveney and fellow selectors Graham Gooch and Mike Gatting.

But Graveney's comments suggest that batsman Hussain, who was 30 last month, still has hopes of taking over the captaincy.

Graveney revealed, have been fully discussed by the selection panel -- among them certainly Adam Hoolioke, who could yet retain the one-day captaincy, and Glamorgan's Matthew Maynard.

Graveney said: "We've looked at various candidates, all of them with strong claims. We've needed to take our time to reach our decision, but we're now much closer to making our final choice."

"We're meeting a couple more times this week, and I think you can say the choice is between Alec and Nasser."

"And yes, it's a close call between the two, both of them have been long-term vice-captains and both would be in our strongest team."

"What we've done is going with the Australian method. I think we need to look at the sort of team we want to field against South Africa this summer and both are leading players."

The question of Stewart's role in the team, as specialist opening batsman or wicket-keeper-batsman, also seems to be playing a major part in the deliberations of Graveney's panel.

Graveney added: "Alec's workload needs to be looked at. We have to decide whether being given the captaincy would dilute the role of either as a player, a big consideration for us is the balance of our side."

Korea names WC team

SEOUL, Apr 30: South Korea on Thursday announced a tentative list of 22 soccer players, including a 19-year-old rookie, to go to France in June for the World Cup finals, reports AP.

"They have more than a 90 per cent chance to go to France. Unless any of them suffers a big injury in tune-up matches, all of them will go," said Song Kil-young, a spokesman for the Korea Football Association.

A surprise in the list was forward Lee Dong-kook. At 19, he became the youngest South Korean ever to join the national soccer team.

Lee, a former track sprinter, is best known for his powerful dashes in the goal area. He started playing professional soccer only this year, but already has scored four goals in nine matches.

The roster also includes strikers Hwang Sun-hong and Choi Yong-soo.

Three of the players now play in the Japanese league -- forward Kim Do-hoon, midfielder Ha Seok-jun and defender Hong Myung-bo. Midfielder Seo Jung-won is coming from the French league, and Roh Jung-yeon from a Dutch team.

In France, South Korea meets Mexico, Belgium and the Netherlands in the first round of the 32-nation World Cup finals.

FRANCE '98 SIDELINES

UNDATED, Apr 30 (AP): The bruising battle to succeed Joao Havelange as head of the FIFA world soccer federation is doing the World Cup no favor, said Michel Platini, head of the CFC organising committee for the June 10-July 12 finals.

The vote for either Swiss Sepp Blatter or Swede Lennart Johansson is set for June 8 in Paris, just two days of the opening game between Brazil and Scotland at the State de France just north of the capital.

The battle has turned ugly over the past few months and Platini, as an official ally of Blatter, is caught right in the middle.

"It's not easy for the CFC because there is a big power struggle," Platini said.

He said it was fortunate the organisation had already solved most problems since the two challengers were devoting less time to the World Cup -- Blatter as FIFA's secretary general and Johansson as the head of FIFA's organising committee.

"We've already established a logical line of work," he said. He promised that if Blatter won the vote June 8, he would make sure the election gets moved.

"The election should not be in a World Cup year," Platini said.

INJURY WORRIES

PARREIRA

Saudi Arabia coach Carlos Alberto Parreira has seen his World Cup preparations sabotaged by injuries.

Goalkeeper Turki Al Awad, who became first choice due to injuries to others, has been sent home after breaking a shoulder and has no chance of playing in the World Cup. French sports daily L'Equipe reported Thursday.

Other key players out of action are Fouad Anouar, Fahd El Mehellel and Ibrahim Maater.

The Saudi Arabia squad is currently training in Sainte-Maxime, France, ahead of a series of friendlies in the country

against first division club Cannes, Jamaica and Trinidad and Tobago.

Former Brazilian coach Parreira will announce his squad for the World Cup on May 22.

STAR TUNISIAN'S PLIGHT

Tunisian coach Henri Kasperzak says he is worried that star player Adel Sellimi will not have had enough games under his belt to make an impact at the World Cup.

Sellimi, who plays for Spanish Second Division club Jaen, has been languishing on the bench recently, and only got 20 minutes action last week when Kasperzak went to watch him.

"When I see one of Tunisia's best players vegetating on the substitute's bench for a struggling Second Division Spanish team, that pains me," Kasperzak was quoted as saying in Thursday's edition of the newspaper La Presse de Tunisie.

Kasperzak traveled to Jaen last week and saw Sellimi come on as a substitute in the last 20 minutes -- and score.

But he wasn't impressed. "Okay, he scored a goal. But his play didn't seduce," Kasperzak said.

The Tunisian press has speculated that Sellimi might even be dropped for the finals.

Tunisia will play in the same group as Romania, England and Colombia in the World Cup.

STRIKE THREAT DOESN'T BOTHER PLATINI

Michel Platini won't let anything spoil his World Cup, especially not a possible transportation strike.

A small union of rail workers demanding better pay said Thursday they might strike during the World Cup.

Truckers have also threatened to disrupt the tournament.

"I'd go by foot to Saint-Denis

if there was a strike," Platini, speaking to US media, said Thursday, referring to the new Stade de France stadium on the outskirts of Paris.

Remi de Bouteiller, of the Force Ouvriere union, said in a telephone interview that a strike could be called if the national railroad, the SNCF, doesn't speed up talks with the government over pay.

No decisions have been taken yet by the SNCF, so the fight has begun," he said.

French truckers, seeking an increase in hourly wages from 43 francs (7.2 dollars) to 56 francs (9.30 dollars), are also threatening a walkout during the World Cup.

LOTHAR HAUNTS BERTI JUERGENS

Olaf Thon says he'll recover from an ankle injury in time to make Germany's World Cup roster.

"I don't see any problems in getting fit in time, Thon said Thursday.

Thon, the Schalke libero, suffered a torn ligament in his right ankle one week ago. He did not require surgery but is wearing a special brace.

At the end of this week, Thon will start using a fitness bike to stay fit and expects to be ready to practice again when Germany goes to their World Cup training camp in Finland on May 16.

Thon's injury has sparked a lively discussion in Germany on whether 37-year-old veteran Lothar Matthaeus should be recalled to the national team. He holds the German record with 122 caps.

Matthaeus, who has played well in recent weeks as libero for Bayern Munich, has repeatedly reminded coach Berti Vogts that he is available.

But Vogts has been remained cool to the idea. In an interview with the magazine Kicker Thursday, Vogts said he'll talk to Thon's physicians before making a decision.

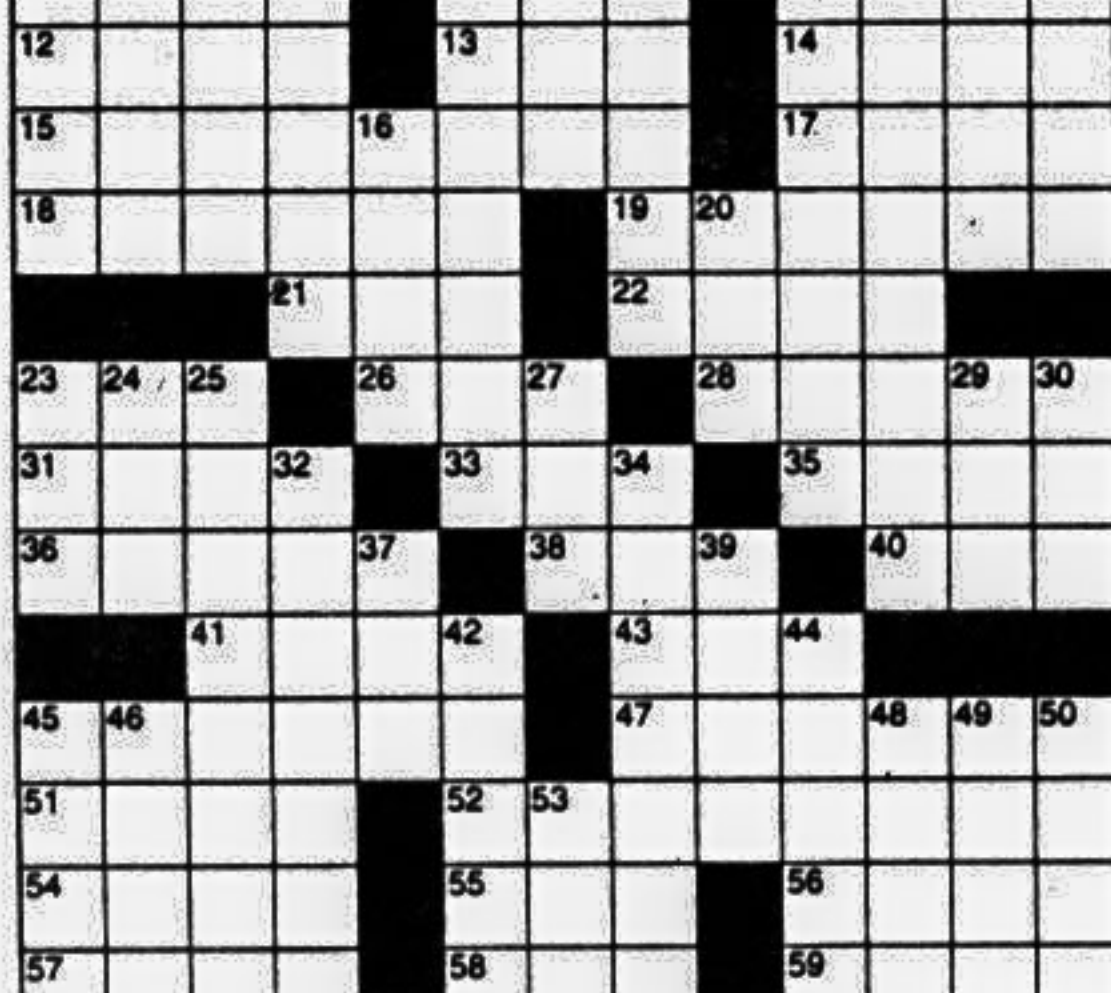
