

PCJSS hails passage of CHT bills

CHITTAGONG, May 10: Parbatya Chattagram Jana Sanghati Samity (PCJSS) has thanked the government for the passage of CHT Regional Council Bill and three other amendment bills on the three hill districts by the Jatiya Sangsad.

In a press release signed by PCJSS leader Rupayan Dewan said that the misgivings regarding the CHT bills have been removed as government has assured to amend the inconsistencies in the passed bills by the first week of June.

PCJSS urged all political parties along with the government to extend their support and cooperation to remove the inconsistencies in the CHT bills and to help implement the CHT peace accord.

Hasina urges G-8 to address concerns of LDCs

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina has called upon the industrialised nations to give due consideration to the concerns of the Least Developed Countries (LDCs), reports BSS.

In a letter to British Prime Minister Tony Blair, who is the current chairman of G-8 (Group of Eight industrialised states), Sheikh Hasina said while the process of globalisation presents an unprecedented opportunity for growth and prosperity, it may also accentuate inequality in poorer countries.

Expressing apprehension over the negative impact of globalisation, she said unless effective preventive and remedial measures were taken, certain parts of the world could become marginalised, the letter said.

Detention of 11 BNP activists declared illegal

A division bench of the High Court yesterday declared illegal the detention of 11 opposition BNP activists who campaigned against the CHT accord, reports UNB.

The bench comprising Justice K M Hasan and Justice M Latifur Rahman made the rules absolute after hearing eleven separate writ petitions.

Barrister Moudud Ahmed appeared on behalf of the petitioners, said a press release.

The detenues Jubo Dal leaders in Khagrachhari were Alaudin Alal, Hanif Miah, Sheikh M Ibrahim, Masud Rana, M Shahajahan, Harunur Rashid, Nurun Nabi and Abdul Latif and JCD leaders Golam Sarwar Shimul, Badul Alam Bodi and Sukumar Barua.

Tk 12 lakh worth of gold bars seized at ZIA

The Customs authorities at the Zia International Airport seized 25 gold bars worth about Tk 12.28 lakh from a couple, passengers of a Saudia flight, yesterday.

Train collision kills 17 in Laksam

Ctg Mail rams detached wagons of goods train: Compartment smashed, engine damaged

At least 17 people were killed and 30 injured when the Chittagong Mail from Dhaka rammed into some detached wagons of a goods train at a place between Naoti and Nangolkot railway stations in Laksam early morning yesterday.

Eleven wagons had got detached somehow and were standing on the track off Naoti station while the engine and some wagons of the goods train reached the station. The driver and the station authorities did not know that some wagons were left behind.

Sixteen of the victims died on the spot when the passenger train hit the standing wagons with a big bang at 4:52 am, badly damaging the engine and smashing a second class compartment next to it, railway sources said. Six of the eleven wagons were also badly damaged and derailed.

Most of the victims were of the second class compartment. Those who died on the spot included a railway security per-

sonnel, Abdur Rashid Majumdar, and two women. Another woman identified as Anowara Begum, 50, died at Nangolkot Thana Health Complex (THC), the sources said.

Of the injured, seven were rushed to Comilla Medical College Hospital, eight to Nangolkot THC, three others to Laksam THC while the rest were released after first aid.

The Chittagong Mail that left Dhaka the night before hit the wagons nearly half an hour after the Tejgaon-bound goods train had reached Naoti station, leaving behind 11 out of its 52 wagons.

Railway sources said, the 11 wagons from the rear portion of the goods train, coming from Chittagong Port, had got de-

tached at a place some two kilometres from Naoti, with the driver knowing nothing about it. The goods train had reached Naoti station at 4:18 am and was standing there to allow the Chittagong Mail to pass.

Getting clearances from Naoti rail station, the Chittagong Mail advanced only to face the disaster.

As an immediate action, the Station Master on duty at Naoti and the guard of the goods train have been placed under suspension.

The sources said it is being suspected that the guard of the goods train, whose guard brake was left with the detached wagons, might have been sleeping at that time.

JS session likely to be prorogued tomorrow, BNP unlikely to return

The current session of the Jatiya Sangsad is likely to be prorogued on Tuesday with little possibility of BNP's return to the House.

Lawmakers of the main opposition BNP, who had staged a stormy walkout protesting the Speaker's decision limiting discussion on the CHT bills on May 3, did not go back to the House till May 6 when the session was adjourned for five days.

BNP also abstained from attending yesterday's meeting of the JS Business Advisory Committee (BAC) that decided on the prorogation and the agenda for the last working day of the current session, meeting sources said.

However, PM's parliamentary affairs adviser Suranjit Sengupta told The Daily Star that the session might be extended by another day provided BNP returns to the House on Tuesday.

But, a top BNP leader ruled out any possibility of their joining the current session.

Meanwhile, BNP lawmakers

are due to stage a dawn-dusk hunger strike on Tuesday at the city's Paltan Maidan in demand for, among other things, repeal of the CHT accord and the laws enacted for its implementation.

The BAC meeting also decided on an announcement regarding formation of 21 parliamentary standing committees on different ministries and completion of constitution of 14 standing bodies on the concluding day.

Earlier, in November last year, the 14 standing bodies were formed keeping seats for the BNP vacant.

Asked about his party's abstention from yesterday's BAC meet, Chief Whip of the Opposition Khandakar Delwar Hosain attributed this to the Speaker's non-compliance with their request to convene the BAC meeting before the CHT bills were passed.

"Holding a meeting after the purpose was served is nothing but an eye wash... They did everything in the House unilaterally and deprived us of our

PM visits train accident victims, assures help

ASHKAMTA, Comilla, May 10: After hearing the news of early morning train accident, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina rushed to the spot today to console the survivors and see the destruction caused by the tragic mishap, reports UNB.

At least 17 people were killed and some 50 others injured in the accident which took place near Naoti Station in Laksam.

Cancelling her scheduled programmes in the capital, the Prime Minister flew in Nangolkot, three kilometres from the scene of the accident, and visited the Thana Health Complex where eight seriously injured people were receiving treatment.

The critically injured passengers were referred to the Comilla general hospital.

At Nangolkot thana health complex, Hasina expressed her sympathy to the injured people who were groaning in pains in the hospital beds. She asked the attending doctors to take proper care of the victims.

From the hospital the Prime Minister went to the spot, Ashkamta, where the twisted compartment of the passenger train was left beside the track. Four bogies of the goods train were also derailed in the accident.

'Business confidence appears fragile' Donors blame political situation, leadership

Donors sit with the government tomorrow to review the economic progress against the backdrop of what they said lack of business confidence because of confronting political situation and frustration about political leadership.

Business confidence appears to be fragile because of confronting political situation, toll collection and frustration about political leadership both in power and in opposition, said a World Bank-Asian Development Bank joint report prepared for the meeting.

The meeting is scheduled for one day and the WB will lead the donors' community.

The joint report of the WB and ADB called 'Bangladesh Economic Change and the Policy Agenda' is highly critical of the government's economic and reform management. It observed, "The economic environment remains uncertain and a sense of urgency is missing in policy making. The financial sector remains vulner-

able with non-performing loan accounting for a third of loan portfolio.

The report questioned the government's willingness to off-load the loss making SOEs. "The government's position on privatisation remains unclear since very few enterprises have been handed over to the private sector. There is also uncertainty about the direction of economic policy. Privatisation programme is virtually at a standstill, financial sector reform has slowed down, and no significant change has been made in trade regime during the last two years."

The progress of reforms in the financial sector and public administration were also seriously criticised by the donor document. "The financial sector remains fragile. Capital adequacy is currently estimated at Tk 133 billion and this will rise if fundamental reforms are not undertaken immediately. The government has been attempting to reform the financial sys-

tem with donor assistance, but progress has been slow", it noted.

Despite formation of special task forces in the Bangladesh Bank and financial institutions, the loan recovery effort needs to be significantly intensified, it pointed out.

The donors called for enabling legislation and actions against defaulters and said unviable institutions should be restructured or closed down.

Public administration reform committee has virtually become non-functional following the resignation of its chairman, they said urging the government to appoint a new chairman.

The donors also pointed out that there has been no progress in setting up efficiency unit in the Prime Minister's Office and regarding appointment of ombudsmen. Separation of lower judiciary from the executive is yet to be accomplished.

The WB-ADB document also

No step yet to exploit gas from 'common reserve' in Salda

The government is showing total indifference to a proposal by BAPEX to exploit gas from a common reserve Bangladesh geologically shares with India near Kosba in Brahmanbaria.

BAPEX had already struck a small gasfield in Salda river area under Kosba thana in 1996. It has been pursuing the government for about one and a half years to allow it to drill two more wells to expand data base and increase gas supplies from the structure.

But the government hardly took any interest in the BAPEX proposals. Recently, in order to win over the decision makers, BAPEX has revised its proposal — slashing one out of the two proposed wells.

While decisions are stuck up due to bureaucratic red-tapism, the Indian side has been extracting gas from the common reserve through several wells for the last 10 years. The delay is depriving Bangladesh of exploiting the natural resource found in the geological structure named Rokhiya situated in Salda in the country's eastern part bordering India, according to official sources.

If India continues to extract gas and Bangladesh does not the country's gas production capability from the bordering reserve will be reduced because of pressure loss. This will also make cost recovery for gas extraction difficult for Bangladesh.

Currently, the lone well in Salda is producing 15 million cubic feet of gas per day (MMCFD) since late March. This has helped improve power generation in the country.

According to energy experts, when such common deposits are found, the countries concerned sit with necessary data to determine who owns how much gas. This is necessary for systematic extraction of the natural resources.

But Bangladesh is not even well equipped with data for such meetings with India because its data base is inadequate. "We have information gathered from only one well," said a source. "We need to dig more wells to gather enough information so that we can sit for negotiation with India. This is why BAPEX proposed the digging of wells."

This structure starts in In-

dia, enters Bangladesh and then it runs back to India by another side," said Dr Badrul Imam, Chairman of Geology Department, Dhaka University. "The natural gas flow will favour India if we don't tap the resources," he noted.

The Salda-1 gasfield was drilled at a cost of Tk 25 crore (or 6.5 million US dollars, a low cost operation by international standard). BAPEX drilled about 2100 metres and hit a 0.23 trillion cubic feet gas reserve.

BAPEX submitted a Tk 105 crore project in mid-1996 for drilling two 'development gas wells' in Salda and an 'exploratory well' in Sikail under a three-year-plan. This plan was stopped at the pre-ECNEC level and it was suggested that BAPEX should submit two separate proposals for Salda and Sikail.

Accordingly, BAPEX proceeded with a Tk 60 crore plan for Salda. This passed the pre-ECNEC stage. But at the ECNEC meeting a few months ago, the project was turned down saying 'only one development' could be approved, one source said.

By that time, BAPEX had

Govt 'extremely unhappy' over Occidental's performance

The government is 'extremely unhappy' with the performance of the US based oil and gas company, Occidental, for the two major accidents at Magurchhara and Lakkatura during its operation, UNB quoting official sources said.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina has directed the Energy and Mineral Resources Ministry to prepare a current status report on overall activities in the oil and gas sector.

Officials said the Prime Minister who is in charge of the ministry has convened a meeting of senior officials on May 18. The meeting is scheduled to be held at the Secretariat.

State Minister for energy and mineral resources Rafiqul Islam told UNB that the Prime Minister will take stock of the latest situation.

Prof Rafiq declined to comment on the performance of the Occidental. However, he acknowledged that the ministry is seriously going through the contract documents signed with the company.

He said the government is yet to grant an extension of the contract period.

"The decision will be taken

only after examining the contract documents," said the State Minister.

Informed sources said the government might go for strong measures against Occidental if any proof of negligence was found for the recent leakage of gas in Lakkatura gasfield.

Meanwhile, sources said that inauguration of the Sangu off-shore gasfield will be delayed further as the operator company, Cairn Energy, is yet to ensure full-pledged operation of the gasfield.

The government and the operator company are yet to reach consensus on the amount of gas to be supplied to the Bakhrabad grid from the field.

Cairn Energy showed interest to supply 160 million cft gas per day while local experts viewed extraction must not cross 120 million cft per day.

An official said they have a sad experience of extracting too much gas from one of the wells of the Bakhrabad field which had to be abandoned midway.

"The rate of extraction must not exceed 30 million cft per day from one well. As the Sangu off-shore gasfield has four wells

Two Dhanmondi Lake bridges to be replaced with wider ones

Two bridges are likely to be built on Dhanmondi Lake at roads 32 and eight, replacing the existing narrow ones.

The bridges, estimated to cost around Tk three crore, may be included in the on-going Dhanmondi Lake Development Project. A project proposal, prepared by Vitti Sthapati Ltd, was submitted to the LGRD Ministry more than a month ago for its approval, sources said.

A Vitti architect said that the new bridges would be 15 metres wide. The existing bridges are just over six metres wide. The length of the new bridges would be slightly shortened and their heights increased so that boats could ply

unhindered in the lake.

The new bridges would have separate rickshaw, vehicle and pedestrian lanes. Their access roads would also be widened to ensure smooth traffic movement in the area.

At present, the narrow bridges cause massive traffic jam in the area during school hours.

Meanwhile, the cost of the Dhanmondi Lake Development Project has gone up by at least two Tk crore, totaling Tk 12 crore. With the probable inclusion of the bridge component the project would cost Tk 15 crore, Vitti sources said.

"The re-excavation and the drainage components are cost-

ing us an additional Tk one crore each," the source said.

Dhaka City Corporation (DCC) has served six Dhanmondi residents with notices to immediately vacate the lake-side land which they have encroached upon. DCC sources said that several previous notices were ignored by the encroachers.

"Now we have identified six major cases of encroachment, four of which are at Road 27 and two elsewhere," said a DCC source, adding that if the notice went unanswered, legal action would be taken.

The PWD, in a survey two years ago, had pinpointed more

Shazneen murder

CID may seek fresh remand of Hasan, two others

CID investigation to determine whether there was any abettor in the Shazneen murder is still on although statements of the prime accused, Shahid, has not yet helped the investigators find any "conspiracy" behind the brutal killing, CID officials said yesterday.

Meanwhile, contractor Hasan, supervisor Badal and carpenter Shoni Ram will be produced before the Chief Metropolitan Magistrate's court today after expiry of their two-day remand. CID may pray for a fresh remand of the three who were engaged in a renovation work at the Gulshan residence of Shazneen's father Latifur Rahman, Chairman of Transcom Ltd. They were engaged in the renovation for more than a year.

The CID officials said they did not get any 'conclusive finding' about the involvement of more than one person in the killing of the 15-year-old girl.

Validity of CHT accord

Appeal against HC judgement on writ dismissed

The Appellate Division of the Supreme Court yesterday dismissed the application seeking appeal against the judgement of the High Court Division that rejected summarily the writ petition regarding Chittagong Hill Tracts Peace Agreement.

Chief Justice A T M Afzal was in the chair. The other judges were Justice Mustafa Kamal, Justice Latifur Rahman, Justice Mohammad Abdur Rouf and Justice Bimalendu Bikash Roy Chowdhury.

Earlier a High Court Division Bench had rejected summarily the writ petition filed by Advocate Shamsuddin Ahmed challenging validity of the Chittagong Hill Tracts Peace Agreement.

Advocate Shamsuddin Ahmed moved the application in person before the Appellate Division.

Attorney General K S Nabi appeared for the state.

Rule nisi on Govt for detention of JCD leaders

The High Court yesterday issued rule nisi upon the government to show cause why the detention of JCD President Shahiduddin Chowdhury Anny and another leader shall not be declared illegal and they be set free, reports UNB.

The Division bench comprising Justice KM Hasan and Justice Mohammad Latifur Rahman issued the rule upon two separate writ petitions moved on behalf of Anny and Mohammad Asaduzzaman Asad.
