Iranians in Italy

ROME, May 12: Iran's national football team arrived here on Monday for a series of friendlies against Serie A giants AS Roma and Inter Milan as they prepare for the World Cup finals, reports AFP.

Iran are to spend nearly three weeks in Italy getting ready for France '98. The team, coached by Croatian Tomislav Ivic, will be Roma's guests at their Trigoria training ground until May 19.

They will then head north for Inter's training base at Appiano Gentile, between Milan and Lake Como, and staying there until May 31.

Team spokesman Hamarz Vasfi said: "We're expecting to play friendlies against Roma and Inter during our time here. But the dates have yet to be decided."

The team were officially welcomed at Rome's Fiumicino airport by Iranian ambassador Seyed Majaid Hedayatuzadeh, and unofficially by a group of Rome-based Iranians waving small national flags.

Jamaican back Ricardo Gardner scored eight minutes into Sunday's match, and Brazilian forward Paulo Sergio Rosa Viiola tied the score in the 25th minute. Midfielder Jorge Luisa da Silva put Santos ahead 2-1 with a goal in the 33rd minute.

Jamaica controlled play in the second half, with striker Paul Hall trying the score at 2 with a goal in the 40th minute and fullback Ian Goodison putting Jamaica ahead in the 68th minute.

Santos goalkeeper Armelino Donizetti Quagliato, known as Zetti, was replaced at the 46th minute by Edson Cholbi do Nascimiento.

The friendly match turned out to be not so friendly, with scuffles between Jamaican and Santos players prompting referee Richard Nathan to issue two yellow cards to home team players and three to the visi-

BERLIN, May 12: Seeded duo Nathalie Tauziat of France and Patty Schnyder of Switzerland both failed to survive the opening day of the German Open on Monday, reports AFP.

Anna Kournikova swept aside Czech qualifier Radka Bobkova, while Jennifer Capriati's comeback bid hit an obstacle.

Tauziat, the 10th seed, came off second best against American Sandra Cacic, losing 7-5, 6-4. Cacic also beat her at Indian Wells in March and Tauziat, who prefers faster surfaces, also lost in the first round of the Italian Open last week to Serena Williams.

Schnyder, a recent semi-finalist in Hamburg but seeded an unlucky 13, took the first set against Maria Sanchez Lorenzo, but then allowed the Spaniard to rally for a 2-6, 7-6, 3-6 victory.

Kournikova was swift in her demolition of Bobkova, winning 6-2, 6-1 in just 48 minutes. The 16-year-old Russian admitted to feeling very comfortable on the courts of the Rot Weiss

FIRST ROUND

European champions West Germany qualified ominously well with eight straight wins and 33 goals against three. The first phase of the finals, six groups of four, with two going through from each, threw up a handful of surprises. Holders Argentina lost to Belgium in the opening match, and Algeria made a sensational debut beating West Germany 2-1. They beat Chile too, but were scandalously prevented from going through when West Germany and Austria contrived the result of their match, the last of the

England got a wonderful start, skipper Bryan Robson scoring in the 27th second against France, a World Cup record, and winning all their three matches. Brazil were the only other team to take six points with displays of exciting and attacking football not seen since the days of Garrincha, Pele, Tostao and company.

Honduras gave a wonderful account of themselves in Group 5, drawing with Spain and Northern Ireland but Hungary posted as many as 10 goals against one against the sickly El Salvador in Group 3. Ramirez Zapata was their hero with the lone goal.

New Zealand making their debut, fared little better, although the two goals they scored against the careless Scotland, proved the Scots' downfall. Cameroon were expected to be the choppingblocks of Group 1, but nobody could beat them. With their captain N'Kono an inspiration in the goal and Roger Milla a dangerous striker, it was only inexperience that let them down.

The finest performance from an unfancied side in the first phase belonged to Northern Ireland. They not only qualified from Group 5, with inexperienced club players in their squad, but also topped the Group.

Perhaps the strongest Group in the second round was Group C, in which the two South American giants, holders Argentina and three times champions Brazil were bracketed with the European giants Italy, who managed to scrap through with three drawn matches in the first round.

Italy approached their opponents Argentina with typically clinical fashion, intent on stopping Maradona, playing his

first World Cup finals. The chief culprit, ironically named Gentile clobbered Maradona if he so much as thought of going for the ball. Having softened up the opposition the Italians began to play the ball in the second half to win 2-1. Maradona took his frustration out on Brazil and he was sent off for blatantly kicking Batista, but not before the Brazilians had scored three delightful goals.

(Bangladesh Television managed to show this match live through satellite. As they did not get the commentary in English, this writer had the proud privilege of doing the running commentary in Bengali from the studios of BTV at Rampura on the clash of the titans. Eminent sport journalist of the country M Qamruzzaman was with me.)

Paolo Rossi, hitherto struggling to find his form, was suddenly back to his old sharp-self and scored two typically opportunist goals. Twice the Brazilians came back with magnificent efforts from Socretes and Falcao but Rossi completed his hat-trick with 16 minutes to go, and perhaps the best side in the competition were out.

England with two draws in the second round against West Germany and Spain and three wins in the first round went out as an unbeaten team. Poland and France topped their groups to reserve their births in the semifinal along with Italy and West Germany.

Italy had no trouble beating Poland in the first semifinal. A goal in each half from Rossi saw to that.

The other semifinal between France and West Germany produced one of the most memorable matches in the World Cup history. Platini and Giresse were magically creative in the mid-field, where anchorman

Marion Jones' fabulous feat

CHENGDU, China, May 12: US track star Marion Jones became the second-fastest woman in history Tuesday clocking 10.71 seconds over 100 metres. a time bettered only by world record-holder Florence Griffith-Joyner, reports AP. Jones' time, clocked in a race

in southwest China under less than ideal grey, damp skies, moved her past Merlene Ottey of Jamaica, who has run 10.74, as the second-fastest woman ever. It also edged the 22-year-old 1997 world champion closer to Griffith-Joyner's daunting world record of 10.49. "I'm very excited. It's great

for women's athletics," Jones told reporters after the race. Jones finished well ahead of World Championships bronze medalist Savatheda Fynes, second in 11.06, and Fynes' fellow

Bahamian Chandra Sturrup,

third at 11.09. Top Chinese runner Li Xuemei, the Asian record holder. broke down in tears at her fourth-place finish of 11.21. Li was running before a home crowd from her native Sichuan province and had been offered a 100,000 yuan (12,070 dollars) bonus if she won.

Jones's time beat the year's best she set Saturday in Osaka of 10.79 seconds and knocked five-hundredths of a second off her previous best of 10.76, set in Brussels last August.

Jones said she hoped to break Griffith-Joyner's 10year-old world record before the end of her career, "but may be this year is pushing it."

The former college basketball star also said she was aiming for five gold medals at the 2000 Olympics in Sydney. in the 100 and 200 metres, the long jump, the 4x100 relay and the 4x400 relay.

She also said she was believed she could go faster: She'd hoped to run within 10.70 seconds Tuesday and said she was disappointed that she didn't make it.
