

Comilla BCL leader gets life term for rape, abduction

From Staff Correspondent COMILLA, May 19: A former student leader of Bangladesh Chhatra League was today sentenced to life imprisonment under the Women and Children Repression Prevention Act for abducting and raping a college girl in 1995.

Iktedar Ahmed, Judge, Special Court for Repression Against Women and Children. Comilla, sentenced Shajahan alias Saju to seven years ŘI under sections 9 (Kha) and (Ga) of the Act for abducting Husna Jahan and to life imprisonment under sections 6(1) and 9(Kha) (Ga) of the Act for raping her, according to court sources.

Three accomplices of Shajahan - Babu, Farid and Liton were charged under sections, 9 (Kha) and (Ga) of the same special law and sentenced to seven years' RI and to pay a fine of Tk 5000 each.

Bill in JS budget session

UZ Parishad to enjoy greater admin powers

The Upazila Parishad Bill would be placed before the Jatiya Sangsad in the upcoming budget session, according to official sources.

Earlier, on May 13, the Cabinet approved in principle the draft bill on formation of Upazila Parishad.

The Upazila Parishad system, first introduced in 1982-83, would be revived this time with some additions enabling the local government body to enjoy greater freedom in the decision-making and project implementing process.

According to sources in the Local Government, Rural Development and Cooperatives Ministry, it has been proposed in the bill that the Upazila Parishads would deal independently with the affairs of various departments of the government except police administration and judiciary.

Immediately after coming to power, the Awami League government set up a commission under the chairmanship of Rahmat Ali, MP, to recommend establishing of local-level representative bodies. The commission suggested a four-tier local government system-Gram Parishad, Union Parishad, Upazila Parishad and Zila Parishad.

On the basis of the commission's report, the Local Government (Union Parishad) Second Amendment Act, 1997 was passed by the Jatiya Sangsad last year and elections to some 4.000 Union Parishads in the country were held in a staggered manner throughout the month of December, 1997.



Stabbed young man succumbs to injuries

By Staff Correspondent A young man who was fatally stabbed allegedly by his friends over share of money at Ashkona in the city's Uttara area on Monday, died at the Suhrawardy Hospital yesterday, police said.

The young man, Ripon, 20, was called out of his North Ashkona house by his friends --Hazrat, Habibur and Osman and five others, taken beside a pond at nearby Goair village and stabbed. They also cut the tendons of his leg, having him unconscious.

Local people took Ripon to the Dhaka Medical College Hospital. Later he was shifted to Suhrawardy Hospital where he died yesterday morning.

Police sent the body to DMCH morgue for autopsy. Ripon was the son of one Ramjan Ali.

Police suspected that Ripon was killed following a quarrel over share of money. Ripon and his friends were involved in various crimes in the area specially around the Zia International Airport, police said.

A case was filed with Uttara thana in this regard. However, none was arrested till last night.
