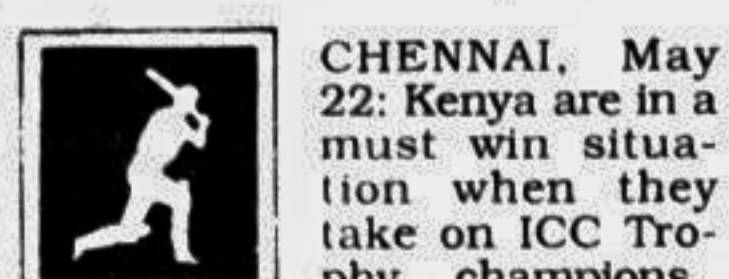

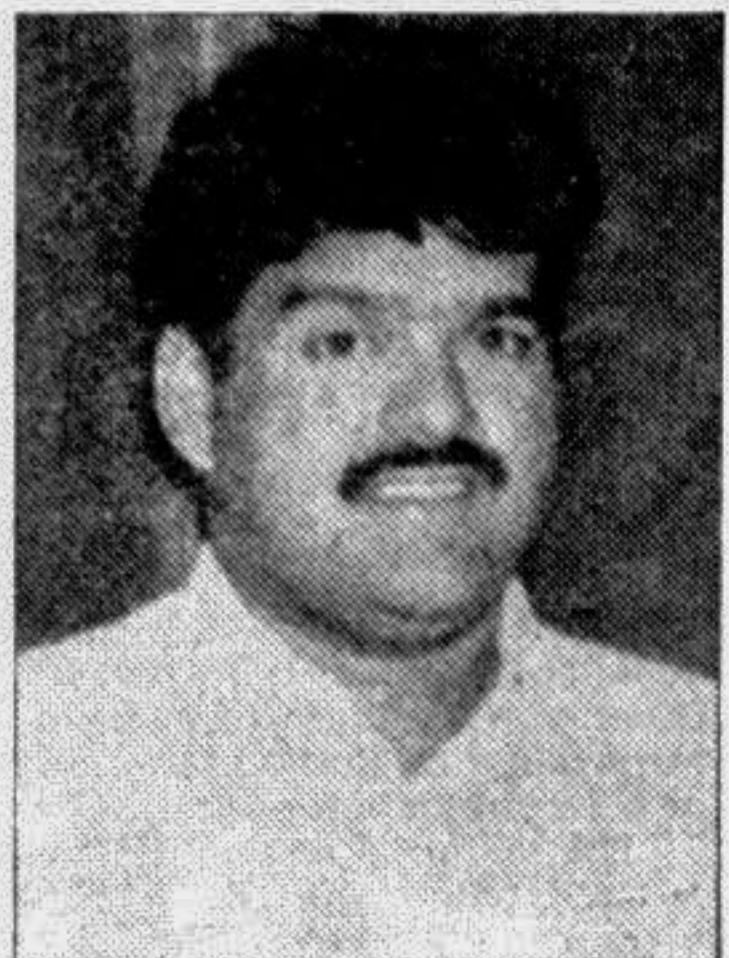

Akram's men raring to go Battle at Chennai today



CHENNAI, May 22: Kenya are in a must-win situation when they take on ICC Trophy champions Bangladesh in their round robin league day-night cricket match of the Coca-Cola Cup one-day triangular series at the MA Chidambaram Stadium here tomorrow, reports PTI.

On their chances, he said, 'Though we lost to India in Mohali, we played well and the victory over Kenya at Hyderabad has boosted our morale.'

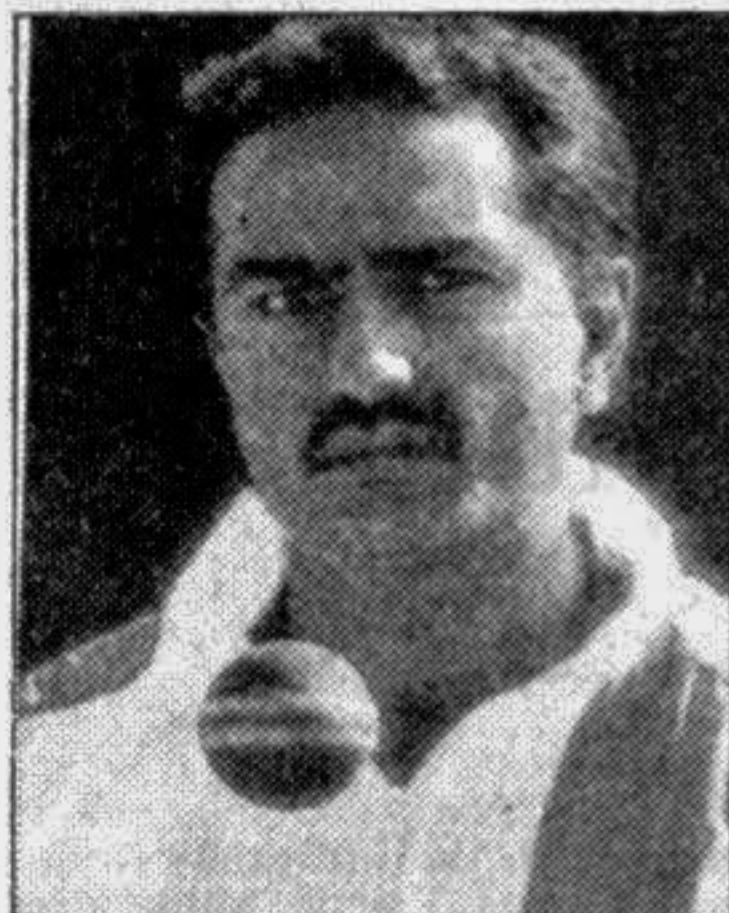
He expressed satisfaction with the batsmen's performance so far in the tournament, but admitted that the spinners had to concentrate a little more.

Gazza paying a high price

In stepping up their preparations for the World Cup finals, England meet Saudi Arabia at Wembley on Saturday and, as dry runs go, there could be no more fitting opposition, writes Henry Winter.

With Bisham Abbey yesterday hosting its regular seminar on Paul Gascoigne's refuelling habits, the England midfielder may care to reflect that the Saudi playmaker, Saad Owtairan, was banished for 14 months for being caught imbibing. Gazza would not have lasted long under Islamic law.

Glenn Hoddle is hinting at a similar expulsion should Gascoigne misbehave on England duty. The national coach is clearly exasperated by the Middlesex player's continued residency on the front pages, following what Gascoigne insisted yesterday was only a drink and a kebab with assorted showbiz chums.

In Gascoigne's defence, the run-in to a major tournament invariably sees a story blowing up and usually blowing out of proportion. The surprise is that 'Kebabgate' has arrived early: the England camp had expected any controversy — along the lines of the Italia '90 hostess or the Euro '96 Cathay Pacific events — to occur during next week's visit to La Manga, their pre-France '98 training centre.

Furthermore, the Geordie is an easy target, a celebrity marked by the flash-bulb fraternity. If Gascoigne was invited to a royal garden party, he would be depicted as being out on the town.

Gascoigne can mix with whoever he wants and personalities such as Danny Baker, Chris Evans and Rod Stewart obviously understand fame's peculiar pressures. But the England footballer must take care. Baker, Evans and Stewart are undoubtedly well-meaning and commendably loyal but their professions do not demand healthy lifestyles.

Gascoigne's does. He is on the eye of the World Cup, when most of his opposing numbers are studying match videos, chewing broccoli and curling up in bed with an isotonic cocoa.

So is he worth the bother? Emphatically yes. Anyone attending England training yesterday will have appreciated that for all his off-the-field faults, Gascoigne remains the most creative footballer of his generation. The quality of his first-time passing stood out, above the Beckham and Redknapp, who will one day take his place as England's fulcrum.

Hoddle, whose only injury doubt involves Paul Ince, commented that Gascoigne was '40 per cent away' from full fitness, observing ruefully that this stemmed as much from his lifestyle as injury. 'He doesn't realise that injuries come if you don't keep your body in shape,' Hoddle said.

'His fitness levels have to become better and we have time to do that. 'I've been disappointed in what I've seen. I had a word with him forcefully. He's apologised. He's never let us down when he's put an England shirt on, never let us down at the training ground or in the hotel. It's when he's out of our grasp. 'If he had stepped out of line under my jurisdiction, he would...

Reefat, Saifuddin share lead

IM Reefat-bin Sattar and Saifuddin Lovlu were jointly leading the first international rating chess tournament table at the end of Round-4 held at the Russian Cultural Centre yesterday.

Reefat tamed Mehdi Hasan Parag while Lovlu posted an easy win over Mizanur Rahman Labu to remain atop the standings with full four points.

Having apologised to Hoddle, Gascoigne predictably turned his anger on the media. 'I went out for two nights in 16 (after promotion with Boro) and got slaughtered by the press,' he said yesterday. 'What's wrong with having a kebab? How can you not be fit for the World Cup just because you are having a kebab?'

'I'm sure a lot of the other guys were having a drink as well. The difference is that they haven't got a camera up their backsides all the time. I get all this fuss about everything I do. It's p**** me off.'

Asked whether he appreciated Hoddle's concern about his lifestyle, Gascoigne retorted: 'I've had a great lifestyle. I've travelled the world, got a couple of nice cars and a few bob in the bank and enjoyed myself.' But medically? 'If you go out and get plastered every night, your form is going to dip. But one night won't make your form dip.'

And what of the smoking? 'I don't smoke 20 a day. I might have the odd cigarette now and again. Seventy-five per cent of Italians smoke. Some even go to the toilet at half-time for a fag and I class them as world-class players.' But did he feel old? 'I feel like a kebab with onions on it.'

Meanwhile, Jamie Redknapp is hoping two years of frustration could be over if he can get to Glenn Hoddle on Saturday that the bad luck which seems to dog him has been dispelled.

The Liverpool midfielder player damaged ankle ligaments against Scotland during Euro '96 and, 12 months ago, fractured the same ankle against South Africa. He then suffered a knee ligament injury against Coventry after a challenge by England colleague Dion Dublin.

But Redknapp remains optimistic he will be able to prove his fitness by the Friday deadline, set by Hoddle for him to be considered for France 1998.

WG's bat beats Bradman's

LONDON, May 22: A bat used by WG Grace in an 1868 match in which he was out for a duck in both innings has fetched a world record 26,450 Pounds sterling (43,100 dollars) at an auction in London, reports Reuters.

The previous highest price of 23,000 pounds was paid for a bat used by Sir Donald Bradman in 1937.

ROME, May 22 (AFP): Inter Milan Brazilian ace Ronaldo welcomed Real Madrid's victory over Serie A rivals Juventus, saying that the Spaniards deserved to become European champions, reports AFP.

Ronaldo, an armchair spectators here of Real's 1-0 victory in Amsterdam, did spare a thought though for his opposite number at Juventus, Alessandro Del Piero.

'I feel very sorry for Del Piero,' said the Brazilian. 'It's been a tough end to the season. Del Piero has been one of the stars of 1998 and for what he's done up to now he didn't deserve to lose. However, personal feelings aside, the 21-year-old acknowledged that the better side had won on the night.'

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'But Real Madrid showed real fighting spirit — precisely the way I'd expected Juventus to be the really fantastic player for me was defender Roberto Carlos. He's Brazilian, but the fought like an Italian.'

And he added: 'A final like that one is an honour for football and one that rewards the best team on the field.'

Ronaldo finished by throwing down the gauntlet to Marcello Lippi's side, who they will join in next seasons' European Champions League, provided Inter come through this summer's preliminary round unscathed.

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Ronaldo's views on the final were shared by Fabio Capello, the man who set Real Madrid on their road to Amsterdam by coaching them to the 1997 Spanish league title.

Capello, who made a disastrous career move by agreeing to return to AC Milan last season, and who is now being made redundant, said: 'Real Madrid deserved to win the Cup. 'They played better than Juventus and they kept better possession on the ball. They were superior. 'I'm glad for Real Madrid, who I still feel are a bit mine. This was the team I was after, because I'd wanted (Christian) Karembeu there last year. Capello had been linked with a return to Real Madrid next season. But the future which on Wednesday morning looked bleak for German coach Jupp Heynckes, brightened markedly on Wednesday night.

Nat'l cricket Final round begins in Sylhet today

Sports Reporter The final round of the 24th national cricket championship begins at the Sylhet Stadium this morning with Khulna taking on Rajshahi in the opening match.

A total of ten teams — five qualifiers, Khulna, Rajshahi, Narayanganj, Comilla and Chapainawabganj, last year's semifinalists, Chittagong, Biman, Dhaka and Dhaka University, and hosts Sylhet will take part in the three-week long competition.

Defending champions Chittagong and runners-up Biman have earned automatic qualification for the semifinals while the rest will vie for the other two places through knock-out format which will be 50-over-a-side affairs.

The semifinals will be three-day matches while the final, likely to begin on June 8, will be a four-day engagement.

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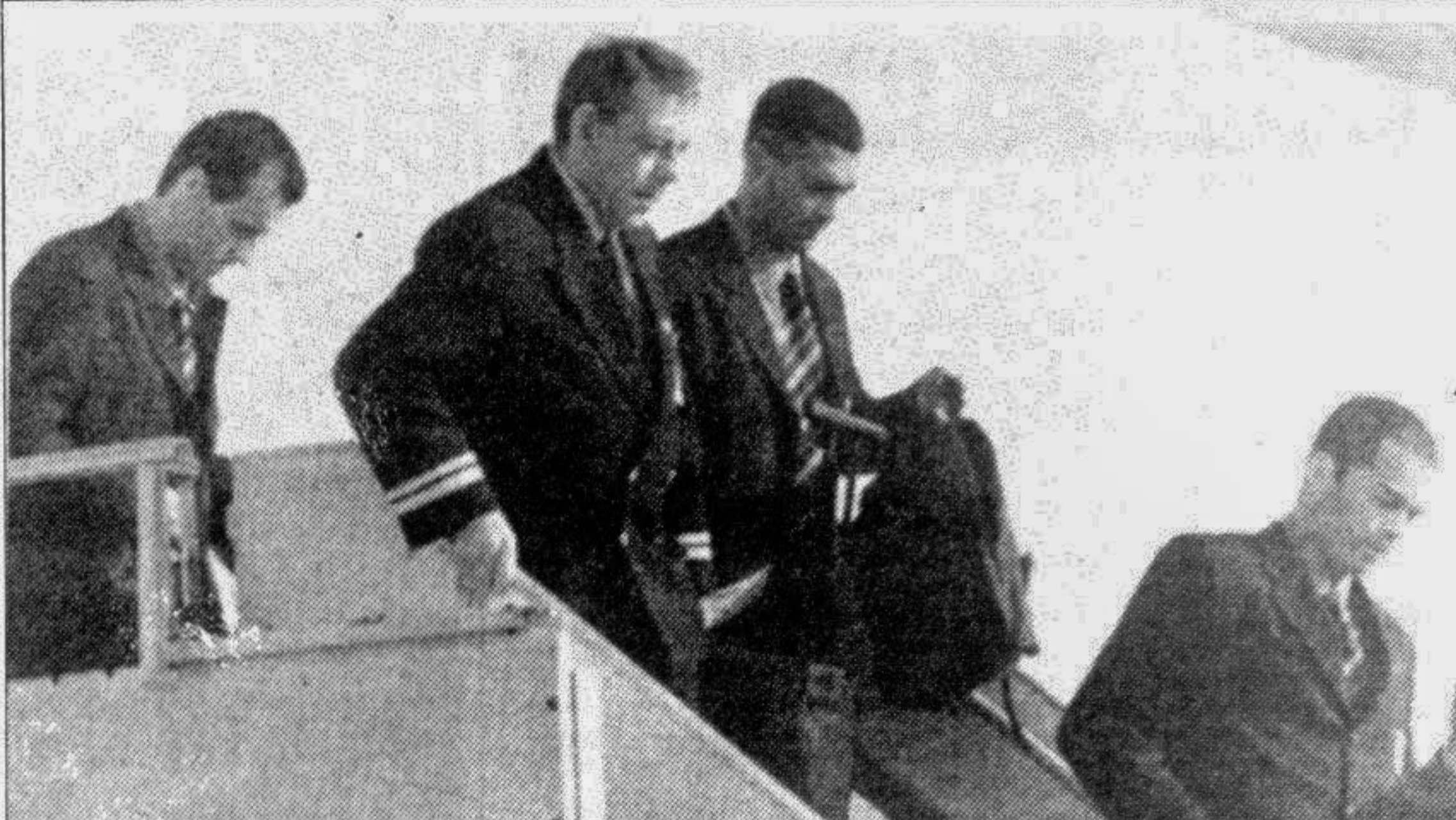

Champs jetaway to Paris

RIO DE JANEIRO, May 22: Millions of Brazilians watched their World Cup squad leave for France on Thursday as television stations interrupted regular programmes for live pictures of the team's plane taking off from Rio airport, reports Reuters.

Meanwhile, an estimated 1,200 fans turned up at the airport to catch a glimpse of the players who will lead the country's bid for a fifth world title, causing chaos inside the terminal and a traffic jam outside.

The words 'good luck, Brazil' popped up on Globo television as the chartered Varig Brazilian Airlines MD-11 aircraft sped along the runway and climbed into the sky to the backing of the network's World Cup theme tune.

The aircraft, which has been specially painted in the country's colours and refurbished inside, was due to complete a low flight over the city before heading for Paris on a non-stop flight.

There were no repeats of the previous World Cup's window-seat controversy when the names of players were printed on each seat, upsetting Romario when he was placed between two other players.

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Champions jetaway to Paris. Romario insisted he preferred to travel by the window, sparking a controversy which eventually required intervention from Ricardo Teixeira, the president of the Brazilian Football Confederation (CBF).

This time the seat with 'Romario' stamped on it was next to the window.

Brazil's opening World Cup game against Scotland on June 10 is still nearly three weeks away but most newspapers are already devoting three or four pages to the national team and anything makes news.

On Thursday several carried graphics to show the seating arrangements inside the 250-seater plane, which the 32-man delegation shared with a handful of journalists and guest.

The pilot, 51-year-old Enio Louroco Dexheimer, said the moment was the highlight of a career spanning 17,000 flying hours.

Seventeen of Brazil's 22 players were on the plane. Ronaldo, Cafu, Aldair and Roberto Carlos, who were not released by their European clubs for last week's training camp, will join the squad in France today.

Team sources said defender Andre Cruz missed the flight after his connection from Sao Paulo was delayed by fog and

will have to make his own way to Paris. The players and staff appeared in confident mood, despite a 1-0 home defeat by Argentina in their last warm-up international in April.

'To win again is always more difficult,' said midfielder Leonardo. 'Being tagged as favourites is a big responsibility.'

Coach Mario Zagallo said there was no danger of over-confidence. 'We're not leaving here thinking we're the best,' said Zagallo, who in the past has been criticised for under-rating Brazilian opponents.

Striker Edmundo, who is not in the starting line-up which has already been announced for the Scotland game, said: 'I don't have to promise anything. I just want to do my job well and represent the Brazilian people in the best way possible.'

'I want to fulfil my dreams at this World Cup.'

Back on the ground Brazilians have already begun putting up the traditional World Cup decorations.

Residents in Rio have been shutting off back streets at night to paint designs on the tarmac and hang blue, green and yellow ribbons across the streets.
