The offense, meanwhile, is adjusting to life without Romario. The 32-year-old hero of the '94 Cup was cut from the team on Tuesday, when it became clear that a calf muscle injury wouldn't heal in time for the tournament.

Against Andorra, Bebeto replaced Romario in the front line alongside two-time FIFA Player of the Year Ronaldo. But both seemed to miss the presence of Romario in the penalty area, for years a point of reference for the offense.

Ronaldo, despite some brilliant runs, was repeatedly thwarted by Andorra's keeper Koldo Alvarez. Bebeto showed good movement but blew his best scoring chance, a pass from Ronaldo that he shot high and wide from inside the area.

Giovanni and Rivaldo, teammates on FC Barcelona, scored a minute apart in the first period, while Cafu concluded the scoring on an individual end-to-end run.

For Zagallo, the result shows that Brazil has a greater offensive arsenal then four years ago. And the team's patient. ball-control offense will be the key to success at the Cup.

# Brown's bright dreams



PARIS, June 4 (Reuters): It has taken a long time for Scotland to accept their place in the world of soccer.

Twenty years ago, their manager, Ally MacLeod, claimed his side could actually win the game's biggest prize. Now Craig Brown believes getting past the first round of the World Cup finals for the first time will be a fine achievement.

Whereas MacLeod wound the Scots fans into a state of high expectation, everything about Craig Brown and his squad is low key. But that does not mean they are not ambitious.

"I think we are ready to peak at the right moment," said Brown after a 0-0 draw with the United States on May 30.

> Scotland left for the 1978 World Cup in Argentina cheered by more than 30,000 people who paid money to come to Hampden Park just to watch MecLeod and his players travel round the track on an open-top bus.

> In contrast, Brown's side have spent the vital few weeks before the finals in France tucked away in a quiet corner of New York state far from the Tartan Army. Only once have they hit the

headlines during their preparation, when veteran goalkeeper Andy Goram walked out of their training camp late last month. The 34-year-old Goram flew

back home, saying he was retiring from international soccer because of publicity about his private life, leaving the number one position to Jim Leighton. the oldest man at the World Cup

finals at 39.

"We'll really shake them up, when we win the World Cup" blared out MacLeod's "Ally's army" record for the 1978 campaign

The reality was defeat by Peru and a draw with Iran, the shame of Willie Johnston being sent home in disgrace after testing positive for drugs and then the glorious, but futile, defeat of eventual finalists the Nether-

lands. This year the Scots are playing in their sixth finals out of seven (the only qualifying failure was in 1994), which is a remarkable record for a nation of just five million people.

However, Brown is fed up with the heroic failures of the past. He realises it's pointless beating the Netherlands if you can't beat the likes of Iran.

"I don't think too many countries will relish playing our defence," he points out, "but I do admit we have some worries about where our goals will come from.

MacLeod had players like Joe Jordan (Manchester United and AC Milan), Graeme Souness (Liverpool and Sampdoria) and Kenny Dalglish (Celtic and Liverpool) at his disposal, whereas Brown has few squad members who set the pulse racing.

"Players such as John Collins and Paul Lambert have played for Monaco and Borus sia Dortmund and enjoyed success, while Blackburn pair Colin Hendry and Kevin Gallacher are the envy of every English Premiership side," Brown points out.

"But it is the team which is important, not the individual and the players we have recognised that and work for the team. We have no prima donnas. Our collective spirit is what gets us results."

In 1974, 1978, 1982, and 1990, the Scots went out of the

tournament on goal difference. This time they are hoping that for once the dice rolls in their

favour. Yet luck does not appear to be on their side with that opening fixture against Brazil. The Scots lost to Brazil in 1982 and 1990 but if they could match the 0-0 draw in 1974 they would

have a platform to work from. Brown hopes his defence which has conceded only seven goals in 23 competitive matches since 1994 — can frustrate Morocco and Norway and enable his midfield to create a few chances for striker Kevin Gal-

lacher and Gordon Durie. Scotland lack punch up front but Gallacher is a striker on form right now as his 19 goals for Blackburn in the English league prove.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, June 4: No matter what their fortunes in this month's World Cup playoffs. Jamaican national soccer team players all will have plots of land to call home when they return to the Caribbean, reports AP.

Jamaican Prime Minister Percival Patterson presented sales agreements for parcels of land to each of the team's 22 players Wednesday during an official send-off.

Called the Reggae Boyz, it is the first Jamaican team to win' a berth in the international competition, and the first from an English-speaking Caribbean

"We have created history and excitement but we are going to create even more history and excitement by what we achieve by our performance in France," Patterson said. "There are more miracles yet to be revealed."



Other events being held on this occasion will be paid for by the towns hosting the matches. The French Organisation Committee has decided to allocate them 2.5 million francs in aid (expect for Paris and Saint-Denis).

Security is the last big budget in which the committee has invested more than 100 million francs. The French Organisation Committee's area of responsibility for security is limited to the stadiums and the state is in charge of maintaining order outside the stadiums. Moreover, the measures set up by the French government benefit from a contribution of 40 million francs from the committee organising the event.
