Radio refs!

PARIS. June 7: For the first time at a World Cup finals, a radio link will be used to improve communication between the match referee and his linesmen, reports Reuters,

The system, tested at the Atlanta Olympics in 1996 and at the Tournoi de France tournament last June, allows a linesman to alert the referee electronically if he sports an offence, rather than waving his flag and hoping the referee spots him.


When a linesman presses a button on the baton of his flag. the referee hears a signal through a receiver, said France

Telecom who developed the system with the Lebel Company. FIFA has introduced a controversial change in the rules to clamp down on tackles from behind at the tournament.



France opens their World Cup campaign Friday against South Africa, and their ineptitude in front of the goal is a major problem. No striker on the team has been impressive.

France got a taste of what's to come against Finland in an exhibition game Friday, scraping through with a 1-0 win after David Trezeguet scored a late goal. The Finns kept the French in check with the type of physical play that is expected to be a fixture in many of the 64 World Cup matches.

"It was scandalous," Jacquet said. "Did you see what they did to (midfielder Zinedine) Zidane? ... Are these referees part of FIFA or not?"

Jacquet realises he will need Zidane to be at his best if France is to make a challenge for the Cup, and he's worried about his star player getting injured.

"Opponents will put up blocks," Jacquet said. "So it is the team with the most imaginative technician that will make the difference." Still, Zidane needs someone

to set up. The French league's top scorer, Stephane Guivarc'h, has hit only one goal in his seven internationals, and he has failed to set up a good partnership with Zidane and Youri Djorkaeff.

Zamorano injured

MARIGNAC, France, June 7: Ivan Zamorano, half of Chile's high-scoring front line, sat out practice Sunday with what team doctor called a "minor" knee injury, reports AP.

Doctor Eugenio Valdecantos said the injury would not keep the 31-year-old forward out of Chile's World Cup debut against Italy on Thursday.

LAGOS, June 7: It was a "show of shame" Friday night in Amsterdam when the Nigerian side, the Super Eagles, crashed out of a friendly encounter with the orange gang of Holland by a whopping 5-1 defeat, reports AFP.

The international friendly organised as part of a build-up to France '98, was the second humiliating defeat in eight days, coming only a week to the start of the World Cup. ..

Earlier, the Nigerian side had been humbled 4-0 by Grasshoppers, a Swiss First Division side, and 1-0 by Ger-

many. In all, the Eagles have conceded 13 goals since their camping exercise began in Switzer-

An independent newspaper, the Weekend Concord, described the defeat as a "national calamity" and asked the team's handlers to go back to the draw-

we would have known our weaknesses," the paper quoted an apparently unnamed angry editor as saying. The Weekend Vanguard on

Sports Ministry-1, BFF-1?

With regard to "Our own World Cup has begun" (DS May 30), the Bangladesh Football Federation (BFF), in a press release signed by its General Sec-retary, Harunur Rashid MP, has termed State Minister for Sports Obaidul Quader's allegations on distribution of Media Accreditation Cards via a press release of the Bangladesh Sports Writers Association as "baseless and misleading".

According to BFF, FIFA forwarded forms for two Media Accreditation Cards to the federation. On the basis of applications from journalists through three recognised organisations of sports newsmen, the BFF allocated the forms to a journalist of Dainik Ittefaq and the editor of Krira Jagat. The journalists returned completed forms to BFF along with money receipt for dispatching to FIFA.

It was then that the BFF General Secretary received a telephone call from the minister, who communicated that the editor of a newspaper has com-

Sports Reporter plained that of the two cards, one had been sent (by FIFA) for that newspaper. It was the belief of that newspaper that the minister, instead of giving their card to them, had allotted it to Krira Jagat, a publication of his ministry. The newspaper demanded that the card be given

In reply, the BFF informed the minister that the allegation of the newspaper was not true because, as a rule, forms for Media Accreditation Cards are not sent to any particular newspaper or any organisation of sports newsmen; these are sent to the federation. Also, the minister was informed that because the two nominated journalists had already filled up the forms, it was not possible for any new nominee to apply.

Three days later, the minister informed the BFF that, in view of unexpected circumstances, he was being compelled to cancel the World Cup France trip of Krira Jagat Editor and a copy of a letter to this effect had in the meanwhile been dispatched to BFF. He then made a personal request (to BFF) to obtain another form from FIFA.

Considering the minister's request as an order, the BFF then requested FIFA to send another form. On receiving the fresh form after a few days, the BFF informed the minister, who expressing his satisfaction, heartfelt thanks and gratitude, requested that the form be sent to Ali Kabir, Secretary, National Sports Council. The BFF did accordingly.

Subsequently, it was not in BFF's knowledge how or to whom the form was given. However, just as everyone else, the BFF learnt that the form had been to a particular newspaper when that newspaper in its columns thanked the minister with acknowledgment of receiving the form.

Beyond this, the BFF was not aware of any matter related to distribution of forms. In view of the above, it was clear that the BFF was in no way involved in issuing the new form, concluded the BFF press release.



Public transport scores a goal Florence Raynal

To allow football fans to get to the stadiums in which the matches of the World Cup will take place, French transport operators are rolling up their sleeves. Public transport has been developed, attractive fares have been introduced and the stress has been put on the quality of information.



No to come by car is the golden rule that the spectators of the nine matches (including the opening match and the final), which will

France stadium, at the World Cup, will have to apply. Jean-Claude Gayssot, the Minister of Public Facilities, Transport and Housing, was very firm on this point at the press conference he gave on 13th January 1998. "There is a real risk of blocking the network and I would not like this great celebration to be marred by the impossibility of gaining access to the stadium," he declared. In addition to traffic problems, there will be the enormous difficulties of parking since parking spaces. which are not very numerous. will only be accessible with a permit. So, many measures have been taken to develop and improve the public transport service to this stadium located

in and urban environment. The site of Saint-Denis (where the Grand Stade de France stadium has been built) is already served by a station of the RER express railway network and a Metro station, but the capacity of its infrastructures has been increased. A third station, Stade de France-Saint Denis, has been created, the already-existing station of La Plaine-Stade de France has been completely rebuilt and the Porte de Paris Metro station has been refurbished. Football fans coming from abroad or from the provinces will be able

without changing lines from the international Roissy Charles-de-Gaulle airport and most of the large stations in Paris. The stadium is also connected, directly or with just one change, to 220 stations in the Paris area. Public transport take place in the Grand Stade de will pick up motorists arriving from the suburbs or from the provinces from one of the 17 relay car parks placed at their

disposal. All these measures should make it possible to bring some 60,000 people an hour to the Stade de France stadium, which can hold 80,000. For that purpose, the frequency of the transport has been considerably increased. The return journey throughout the whole of the public transport network will be guaranteed whatever the time the matches finish an all the passengers should be dealt with in the 45 following min-

In order to encourage supporters to use public transport. the Societe des Transports Publics (public transport company) has set up exceptional fares cutting the cost of the journey to the Stade de France stadium or the Parc des Princes stadium in Paris by about 50 per cent. The transport ticket will be issued on presentation of the admission ticket for the matches and will be multimodal and valid for a return journey from any station in the Paris area. Information desks for travellers, set up in stations, airports and at motorway toll booths will provide advice for



Paris will not be the only town to benefit from exceptional fares and transport facilities. A single ticket, called mobifoot, will allow fans to use all forms of public transport in the towns hosting the World Cup, for the period of their choice. It will thus be possible to use the tram in Nantes, the Metro in Lyons, the bus in Toulouse or the RER express railway network in Paris indifferently. Moreover, the SNCF French railway company will put on extra trains on its main lines and especially TGV highspeed night trains which will leave after matches being played in the evening.

On the score of information, in addition to the mobifoot, a special booklet describing the means of access to the stadium and providing detailed maps of the towns concerned will be made available to supporters. The SNCF French railway company is already issuing an SNCF supporter's guide to World Cup 1998, in stations and travel agencies. Information to facilitate the arrival in the ten towns concerned by the Cup are provided. They include a selection of timetables, information about fares, the possibilities of reservation, etc.

So it is impossible for supporters to miss the World Cup. The arrangements were already successfully tried out on 28th January at the match to inaugurate the Stade de France sta-
