## Benny's burning ambitions

VICHY, France, June 10: South Africa's 20-year-old striking sensation Benni Mc-Carthy said on Tuesday that new coach Philippe Troussier's punishing training methods had left him feeling tired just three days before the World Cup opener against France, reports

"At my club I trained hard and I thought when we came back we'd slow a little bit down but it was also hard," the Ajax striker admitted at the team's training camp here. "I'm feeling a little bit tired."

McCarthy, who burst onto the international scene with seven goals during February's African Nations Cup finals in Burkina Faso, said he didn't enjoy the same relationship with Troussier as he had with the Frenchman's predecessor Jomo Sono, who was in charge during the Nations Cup campaign.

"Coaches are very different from each other," McCarthy said. "You can be like a son to one coach and with another you have just a player-coach relationship." "With Jomo there was a little

bit extra. When I came into the national side I was a little bit down in the dumps and Jomo came and brought me back into the side there was a lot of expectations and he helped me get through the difficult stage.

"(With Troussier) I have just a player-coach relationship. nothing more, nothing less." Troussier said on Tuesday he

saw McCarthy, who hails from a gangland area of Cape Town, as South Africa's "flag for the future," and certainly the Bafana Bafana will need all his flair and finishing skill if they are to reach the second round from a group which also contains hosts France. Denmark and Saudi Arabia.

## Vogts keeps 'em guessing

NICE, France, June 10: Coach Berti Vogts has created such an intense competitive atmosphere in the German team that apart from goalkeeper Andreas Koepke virtually none of the other 21 players are certain to be among the starters, reports AP.

While often such rivalries breed jealousies and hostilities. at least some German players think they can help the team capture its fourth World Cup ti-

"I think our strength can be that everyone accepts that not everybody can be among the starters and that all players are ready to take on any role assigned by the coach," Olaf Thon said Wednesday. Thon, the 32-year-old libero,

himself is in such a position. Recalled to the team after a

four-year absence to replace injured Matthias Sammer, Thon himself fell victim to an ankle injury that left his fitness in doubt shortly before the World Cup. That prompted Vogts to re-

call Lothar Matthaeus, the 37year-old veteran with a German record of 125 caps who is in his fifth World Cup. Mathaeus is usually not content with a bench role. Thon said he wasn't worried.

"It's very good that our coach can choose from two very good players for each position," he


"I am relaxed about it. think the coach will look at the performance of each players and I think I belong in the starting lineup," Thon said. "I'll try to play libero but if necessary I can also play in the midfield."

With so many experienced players around - Germany's average age is 29 years and seven months - many players are used to leadership positions in their clubs and the national

Juergen Klinsmann is the

captain, a role that used to belong to Matthaeus, who likes being the center of attention. They have officially buried the hatchet but their well-publicised feuds could erupt any

time. Midfielder Andreas Moeller said there was good team spirit in the camp, but that competi-



tion was greater than two years ago when Germany won the European title.

"It's the main difference in our preparation," Moeller said. "Berti has really fired up the competition among us, he's getting the maximum out of all players." "No one feels secure and you

can see and feel the fire on the pitch everyday in practice.' Moeller said. "I don't really think there is

one leader. I think the leadership is spread out among several players," he said.

"Each players should concentrate on his strengths and everybody will be judged on their performances." Moeller

#### FIFA on lost times

PARIS, Jun 10:Time added on for injuries and substitutions will be strictly regulated at the World Cup finals and communicated to players and spectators, FIFA said on Sunday, reports Reuters.

Referces are under instructions to add on 30 seconds at half time or full time for each substitution and a full minute or more for any injury which requires a player to leave the


Time-wasting will also be penalised in units of 300 seconds at the referee's discretion. All add-ons will be commu-

nicated to the off-field "fourth referee," who will hold up an electronic display board -normally used to announce the shirt numbers of players being substituted -- at the end of the first and second halves to show teams and speciators how much time his being added on. "The new system will help

the referces and give them more power. In one way it will take some pressure of them because it sets down rules for how time is added on, said FIFA communications coordinator Marius Schneider. "On the other hand there

might be new pressures if a team is leading near the end of a game and realises the referee has just added on another 30 seconds. "Time-wasting has been discussed for ages. The fact that it's

still an issue shows that the measures haven't been effective enough."
