## History cautions Argentina

L'ETRAT, France, Jun 12: Powerhcuse Argentina have endured enough humiliations in their World Cup debuts to know they cannot take anything for granted against Japan on Sunday, reports AP.

Thus, head coach Daniel Passarella has been drilling his starters in the style used by the Japanese defence, which includes one sweeper, two stoppers and quick counterattacks.

"Japan also changes defenders and sometimes plays with two sweepers and only one stopper," said Passarella, who last week travelled from this small French village to Switzerland to scout Japan in a match they lost to Yugoslavia 1-

At first glance, Japan seem easy prey to the powerful Argentines, the favourites in Group H. which also includes debutants Jamaica and Croatia. But Argentina are keenly aware of the many blows they have endured in a first matches of their brilliant World Cup history.

"We have to be careful with Japan. We can't take them for granted because they could surprise us," said Passarella, who as a player suffered through one of those early losses against weaker teams.

In 1982, with Passarella and Diego Maradona at the height of their game. Argentina went to Spain having won the title four years before in Buenos Aires, but lost 1-0 to Belgium in the

In 1990, with Passarella already retired and the Maradona star beginning to dim, Argentina once again showed up as world champions' in Italy, having won in Mexico. But lowly Cameroon shocked the soccer world by defeating the Argentines 1-0 in the first match. The team recovered and reached the final, where they lost 1-0 to (West) Germany.

Four years later, however in the United States, Argentina made easy work of Greece and won 4-0, with three goals by rising star Gabriel Batistuta and one by Maradona, who was kicked out a few days later after failing a drug test.

Even though they are among the favourites to reach the final, the Argentines are making sure they do not to underestimate Japan, Jamaica and Croatia, all of them newcomers to World Cup play.

Batistuta, now in his second World Cup, says the Japanese are "young and combative. Besides, one should never tally points until they've been earned.

Just as a reminder, the South Americans should bear in mind Japan's 3-2 win over Argentina in the Tokyo Olympics in 1964.



## Matthaeus' twilight tranquility

At the ripe old age of 37 Lothar Matthaeus, Germany's winning captain eight years ago, is knuckling under at his fifth World Cup and says he will be satisfied with a place on the bench if it means a fourth triumph for the fatherland.

"If Berti Vogts chooses to put me on the substitutes' bench I will accept his decision," says the usually impetuous Matthaeus — often a controversial figure since he won the first of his 125 caps 16 years ago.

Out of the side since December 1994 after gearing an Achilles tendon, the once bad boy Matthaeus has made a surprise return, and transformed himself into something of a choir boy in the process.

He owes his return to the long term absence of Dortmund libero Matthias Sammer and doubts about the fitness of alternative sweeper Olaf Thon, who could now keep Matthaeus in the cold.

But he said Thursday he was hoping for a new lease of life, telling reporters, "It's as if I've never been away." Matthaeus was booted out of

the Germany team acrimoniously two years ago, just before Euro '96 in England, after verbally attacking Vogts and former Bayern Munich teammate Juergen Klinsmann for allegedly lobbying to have him removed from the squad.

But he has buried the hatchet with both men and is now on the verge of making an un-

Scifo is now back with Anderlecht in the twilight of a career of Largely unfulfilled promise which has taken him on a Pan-European tour of leading clubs, and playing as well as

A crowd-pleasure and highly skilful individual, Scifo does not have Wilmots' application, a point underlined by Leekens following the recent victory over Paraguay in last Saturday's friendly.

He replaced Wilmots at halftime and ran the show, celebrating his recall after being ignominously dropped against the United States in February, and scored the decisive goal, his 18th international strike. And Leekens said: "I was

very happy with the way Enzo slotted back into the side, but we must make sure he is not put under unnecessary pressure and certainly no comparisons should be made between his style of play and Wilmots."

The message seems clear. If the Belgians are going to beat their arch-rivals and for once they have an excellent chance, they will need both the discipline of Wilmots - and if they need an injection of individual skill, he will have to make way for Scifo.

VARSAILLES, France, June 12 (AFP): Holland's star striker Dennis Bergkamp is looking forward to his World Cup challenge to ad to his superb English Premiership and FA Cup double this season.

Admittedly Bergkamp had been out injured for the last six weeks and missed the culmination of Arsenal's English Premiership and FA Cup double triumph.

However that could work to the advantage of Dutch coach Guus Hiddink as a rested Bergkamp has now made what seems a remarkable recovery from a hamstring injury.

Just four days ago, Dutch physio Frits Kessel said the injury was far worse than thought at the beginning. Bergkamp was, thought to be certainly missing the opening match against Belgium on Saturday and probably sit out their second match

against South Korea on June 20. But the 29-year-old could not wait to start his tournament against Belgium and Kessel gave him a clean bill of health on Thursday morning.

Bergkamp admitted he had been on an incredible high after this year despite not featuring in the final part of the season. Arsenal beat Newcastle 2-0 in mid-May in the FA Cup final and had rousing league celebra-

tions after beating Everton. He said, at their Stade Montbauron training ground in Versailles, that he had to get his mind back on international

"It's the back of your mind Hurst is the only player to I that you have had so much suchave scored a hattrick in the cess but the main thing is that I focus on this tournament. It's a completely new challenge, have never won the World Cup," he said with a smile.

Bergkamp started his career at Ajax where he began as a winger and was transferred to a central midfield position. He had a disappointing spell

at Inter Milan but his career

revived at Arsenal and he is now playing the best football of his career. Perhaps Bergkamp is not

particularly comfortable in the limelight, but now his hamstring problems are a thing of the past, he could shine at this tournament. Holland have also had prob-

lems with team spirit in the past. In fact a self destructive streak raised its head at Euro'96 when the players of Surinamese extraction - Edgar Davids, Clearance Seedorf and Patrick Kluivert - claimed they were discriminated against in the

But Bergkamp claimed there were no such problems now. "The spirit is good and I don't think we'll have any problems," he said.

Bergkamp served Holland well in the build-up to France 98, too, scoring seven goals, and he will have quality assistance up front with Arsenal teammate Marc Overmars pressing home his claims and the surprise recall of Davids.

In six previous World Cups, Holland have reached the final twice, finishing runners-up to Germany in 1974 and Argentina four years later. And with old rivals Belgium, Mexico and South Korea in their group, Bergkamp fancied their chances of getting through to the knockout stages.
