Ceat names Sanath as the best

MUMBAI, Jun 12: Stylish Sri Lankan opener, Sanath Jayasuriya edged past India's star batsman Sachin Tendulkar to bag the title of Ceat International cricketer-of-the-year 1997-98, reports FTI.
Jayasuriya had 122 points and was closely followed by Tendulkar with 144 points.
Under the rules of Ceat ratings system, if there is a difference of less than 10 points between the top players, the three adjudicators — Ian Chappell (Australia), Sunil Gavaskar (India) and Clive Lloyd (West Indies) — are provided with complete details of the performances of the top players to make the final selection.
The adjudicators decided in the favour of Jayasuriya, who becomes the third Ceat international cricketer.

Baggio gets rid of the ghost at last

BORDEAUX, France, Jun 12 (AFP): Roberto Baggio has finally laid the ghost of Pasadena to rest, four years after he ballooned a penalty at USA '94 which handed Brazil the World Cup.
Baggio's late spot-kick here earned Italy a crucial 2-2 draw against Chile in their Group B opener at France '98 on Thursday evening.
Tens of millions of armchair supporters held their breath as Baggio relived one of the unhappiest moments in Italian soccer history at the Rose Bowl in California. Only this time, there was a happy ending.
"Of course I was thinking about Pasadena," Baggio admitted. "But a penalty is just one thing — you can either score from it, or miss it. That's all there is to it."
His teammates needed only to look into Baggio's eyes to see which of Italy's penalty-takers was going to take this one.
Captain Paolo Maldini said: "He took the ball and then he took the kick we let him get on with it because he looked convinced as you walked towards the penalty spot."
Demetrio Albertini, one of Italy's other spot-kick specialists, said: "I was never afraid that he might miss he looked completely relaxed, I realised straight away that he was going to score."
As soon as it was awarded, controversially for a handball, Baggio, suddenly bent double. But Italy's best-known Buddhist was not praying for good fortune.
"I bent over to get my breath back," he said "I was tired and when I was breathing easily, I took the kick."
The equaliser confirmed Baggio as Italy's most valuable player on the pitch, having already set up Christian Vieri's early goal on a plate in the opening minutes, and gone on to create several other chances.
However, the man who was brought to France as a reserve for his former understudy at Juventus, Alessandro Del Piero, is not even sure to play next week's clash with Cameroon.
Del Piero should have recovered from a thigh injury in time for the game in Montpellier, leaving coach Cesare Maldini with a selection headache.
"I don't know what happens now," Baggio admitted "If Maldini gives me the chance, then I'll play again. If not, I'll accept his decision. If nothing else, the coach knows what condition I am in."
If the Chileans criticised the referee for awarding the penalty which led to Italy's second goal, Baggio was no less impressed with Niger's Lucian Bouchardcau for his handling of Chile's 48th minute equaliser.
"It was all looking good and the lead had us on track," he said.
"But then the referee allowed too much injury-time and the Chileans equalised at that point, the match became difficult, as I expected it might."
"However, we have to take credit for the fact that we never gave up, and at the end, we might even have won it."
And sparing a thought for their shock 1-0 defeat to the Re-

public of Ireland at USA '94, Baggio said: "The first match in a World Cup is always tricky think back to the United States — over there it went even worse."
"And the truth is, we have a lot of players who were making their World Cup debut the next match will go better, with or without me."

ABSORBING ANECDOTES

PARIS, Jun 12 (Reuters): Assorted facts and figures from Group A and B matches played on Wednesday and Thursday:
Note: All matches referred to are those played in World Cup finals only.
Francis Omam-Biyik became only the second African player after Jellow Cameroonian Roger Milla (1982, 1990, 1994) to play in three World Cup finals. The 32-year-old Omam-Biyik made five appearances (1 goal) in 1990, three appearances (0 goals) in 1994, and appeared in his third World Cup when he played for Cameroon in their 1-1 draw with Austria on Thursday.

Toni Polster, making a record 94th appearance for Austria, increased his all-time scoring record for his country to 44 goals with his 90th minute equaliser against Cameroon.

Roberto Baggio, who fired home a penalty in Thursday's 2-2 draw with Chile, has now scored six of Italy's last eight goals in the World Cup finals.

Chile's 2-2 draw with Italy means they are still waiting for their first World Cup win for 36 years. They have played 10 matches (4 draws, 6 defeats) since beating Yugoslavia 1-0 in the third-place playoff in Santiago in 1962.

Brazil became the first side to score twice in an official World Cup opening match when they defeated Scotland 2-1 on Wednesday. The previous eight World Cup openers had produced four 0-0 draws, three 1-1 draws and a 1-0 win.

Brazil's 2-1 win over Scotland was their eighth successive World Cup match without defeat they last lost to Argentina in a second round match in 1990. Their all-time unbeaten World Cup record is 13 from 1958-1966, a sequence which began and ended against Hungary.

Scotland have now lost to Brazil in two successive World Cup matches their previous match in the finals before Wednesday was a 1-0 defeat to Brazil on June 20, 1990 in Turin during the finals in Italy.

Morocco's 2-2 draw with Norway on Wednesday ended their run of four successive defeats in the finals. Morocco lost 1-0 to (West) Germany in the second round in 1986 — and the lost all three matches they played in the US finals in 1994 to Belgium, Saudi Arabia and the Netherlands.

Morocco scored more than one goal for only the second time in 11 World Cup matches. They only previous occasion they scored more than one goal was when they defeated Portugal 3-1 in the first round in 1986.

Norway's two goals doubled the number of goals they had scored in their World Cup history, they had previously scored one against Italy in 1938 (lost 1-2) and one against Mexico in 1994 (drew 1-1). Their other two matches ended in 0-0 draws.

British tabloids on ticket touts

LONDON, Jun 12: British tabloids raged today against the black market in tickets for England's opening game against Tunisia that saw fans being charged 200 pounds (326 dollars) for a seat, 15 times the face value, reports AFP.
The Sun Britain's biggest selling daily and its rival The Mirror both dispatched reporters to Marseille, where the match will be played on Monday to investigate the illicit trade.
The blamed French nationals allocated 60 per cent of tickets for every World Cup game, for raking in money by re-selling 13 pound tickets to desperate English fans for huge sums.
Serge Pittaluga a 26-year-old musician, who allegedly sold The Mirror tickets laughed as he defended his actions in the newspaper said.
"I'd have been a fool not to buy them knowing how much they'd be worth. I had eight tickets to the England match and I've sold six for 200 pounds each."
"When I sell the last two I'll have made a profit of more than 1,400 pounds and I don't feel the slightest bit guilty, he was quoted as saying.
UP to 20,000 English fans are expected to arrive at Marseille over the weekend, with only 5,000 holding tickets for the match at the 60,000 capacity Velodrome Stadium in Marseille.

According to the British papers, touts on street corners sport shops and bars in the French city where selling World Cup tickets.
The French World Cup organising committee has come under fire for its handling of the ticket allocation.
After the French fans 60 per cent 20 per cent went to tour firms for VIP packages and sponsors and the rest were split between the two competing teams and 200 Football Associations world wide.

Giddins at his best
LONDON, June 12: Warwickshire pacesman Ed Giddins took his tally of first-class wickets to 31 on Thursday with a season's best six for 79, reports Reuters.
Giddins, in his first season with Warwickshire after serving a 19-month drugs ban following his sacking by Sussex, helped dismiss Gloucestershire for 81 in 55.3 hours at Bristol.
But Warwickshire's bowlers runs equally hard to come by, struggling to 127 for six off 46 overs. Skipper Brian Lara made only 16.
Matthew Wood hit his second championship century of the season to leave Yorkshire on top against Hampshire at Headingley.
After adding 122 for the second wicket with Michael Vaughan, who made 86, 21-year-old Wood went on to make an unbeaten 103 off 206 deliveries as Yorkshire posted 242 for three from 80 overs.
Former England wicket-keeper Steve Rhodes pulled Worcestershire round from 63 for five with an unbeaten 81 against champions Glamorgan at Cardiff.
Rhodes put on 57 for the sixth wicket with David Leatherdale and then added 86 in an unbroken ninth wicket stand with Phil Newport 49 not out. Worcestershire closed on 241.8 off 84 overs.
Bottom-of-the-table Essex, seeking their first win of the season, reduced leaders Surrey to 66 for four at Chelmsford.
England one-day specialists Ally Brown and Adam Holoake stopped the rot by adding an unbeaten 61 for the fifth wicket.
Heavy rain prevented any further action.

NZ need 296 for victory
