SAARC summit in Colombo likely

SAARC countries are now 'actively considering' participating in the next Summit in Colombo on the revised date of July 28 to July 30, according to diplomatic sources in Dhaka

and Colombo. "Bangladesh has accepted the revised date and confirmed its participation. However, we are awaiting confirmation by all other countries to make the new date effective," a senior of ficial of the foreign ministry said last night.

Earlier, Sri Lanka, worked on two sets of dates - July 9-11 and July 20-22 - for holding the 10th SAARC summit.

Delhi may propose joint stand on disarmament

NEW DELHI, June 14: India will convey to Bangladesh the need for a harmonised stand by the two countries on a timebound complete global nuclear disarmament during Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina's talks with her counterpart Atal Behari Vajpayee here Tuesday.

Vajpayee is likely to explain to Hasina the imperatives of asking the five recognised nu-

clear power states to agree to a timeframe for dismantling nuclear arsenals across the world to help achieve global disarmament in a meaningful way,

official sources here said today. Hasina is the first head of government to visit New Delhi since the multiple nuclear tests at Pokharan last month.

Delhi is expected to explain its stand that India rejected a

third party mediation in its problems with Pakistan.

Vajpayee may also seek to dispel fears that tests by India and Pakistan will fuel nuclear arms race in South Asia. He may assert during the talks that nuclear threat should not be viewed as an issue confined to a particular region but in the global perspective, the sources

Yugoslavs win by lone goal

SAINT ETIENNE, June 14: Yugoslavia's return to the world scene after six years in the wilderness got off to a rocky start as they struggled to a 1-0 win in their World Cup opener against Iran here today, reports

The Yugoslavs had to wait until the 73rd minute to break the deadlock and it took a free kick to do it.

Sinisa Mihajlovic's 22 metre shot curved round the wall and 'keeper Nima Nakisa, out of position, was helpless.

For Mihailovic, it was the easiest of goals.

The 29-year-old is famous in Italy, where his free kicks have won a string of matches for Sampdoria.

Twelve of his 13 goals in the series have come from freekicks, and this season alone he has scored three times, hit the post 10 times and created eight

But Yugoslavia, who call themselves the 'Brazil of Europe', showed little South American skills as they came up against a determined Iran. playing in their first finals since the 1979 Islamic Revolu-

Khulna BNP leader gunned down

From Staff Correspondent KHULNA, June 14: A local BNP leader was gunned down by a group of unidentified assailants at Royermahal on Sat-

urday night Police identified the dead as Rafiqul Islam, 42, a former chairman of Rudagara Union Parishad under Dumuria thana and a first-class contractor enlisted with the Water Development Board.

According to witnesses, a gang of four gunmen stopped his motorcycle while he was returning home from Rayermahal. They fired two shots on his head and abdomen from a point-blank range.

The BNP leader succumbed to his injuries soon after being admitted to Khulna Medical College Hospital.

His companion, Afzal Hossain, 38, who was with the deceased, escaped unhurt. But he has been absconding since the shoot-out. Police are looking

Police said the deceased was the complainant of the murder case of his father-in-law Tozamuddin. Tozamuddin, also a BNP leader of Dumuria, was hacked to death in 1992 allegedly by activists of an outlawed party.

Police suspect that the alleged killers of Rafiqul Islam are among the 30 FIR-named accused in the murder of his father-in-law who were recently released on bail. A case has been recorded

Loadshedding Soccer fans in Ctg threaten

hartal on June 17

CHITTAGONG, June 14: The football fans will enforce a half-day hartal on June 17 in greater Chittagong if uninterrupted power supply is not ensured by June 16, reports UNB.

This was decided at a meeting of "-Football Premi Parishad" (Association of soccer fans) held here with its convenor Ashik Md Shakeel in the chair.

The meeting alleged that the residents of Chittagong could not watch the World Cup football matches smoothly because of planned loadshedding.

The meeting said they had submitted a memorandum to the Chittagong Electricity Supply Authority demanding uninterrupted power supply during the World Cup matches. But, the authority is yet to take any step in this regard.

The Parishad urged all political parties to support their hartal call.

BNP yet to join parliament

Discussion on suppl budget begins

Parliament yesterday began discussion on the supplementary budget for the 1997-98 financial year, with the opposi-tion BNP yet to join the session. The original revenue budget

in the 1997-1998 fiscal was Tk 14,544 crore, while the revised budget stood at Tk 14,500 crore. Five MPs — four from the ruling Awami League and one from the Jatiya Party- took part on the first day's discus-

sion on the supplementary bud-The AL legislators thanked the Finance Minister for the supplementary budget that did not ask for any fresh allocation. But the JP lawmaker ques-tioned the transparency of the present budgetary process.
"This is for the first time in

the history of Bangladesh that

the Finance Minister has

sought no additional amount of

money to supplement the origi-

nally calculated budget a year ago," said ruling party MP Akhtaruzzaman. Echoing Akhtaruzzaman, a

ruling party whip Mizanur Rahman Manu said: "The credit for a saving of Tk 44 crore from the originally estimated budget goes to the Finance Minister."
He also said that the "close supervision and prudent man-

agement in the public expenditure by the government of Sheikh Hasina has made the impossible possible." None of the ruling party MPs, however, mentioned the Tk 600 crore cut in the origi-nally announced Annual De-

velopment Programme for the 1997-98 fiscal year. Jatiya Party lawmaker Golam Mohammad Kader, found the present budgetary process to be 'absolutely funny.'

Budget to boost industry, export, says FBCCI

The Federation of Bangladesh Chambers of Commerce and Industries (FBCCI) yesterday hailed the proposed budget for 1998-99 and said if it is properly implemented the country's industry and export would get a boost.

"The budget would boost industrial production, expand our export base, revitalise the capital market and result in increased investment and facilitate poverty alleviation", the FBCCI said.

However, it pointed out a number of steps which it felt would have adverse effect.

"Extension of VAT on CI sheet and MS rod and cement at retail level will hit the commonman," the FBCCI said in its reaction. "The supplementary duty imposed on motor car. jeep, station wagon and reduction of depreciation from reconditioned vehicles need to be rationalised.

FBCCI said introduction of VAT at retail level in certain sectors must be implemented after due consultation with the business community, represented by FBCCI.

It also questioned the modus operandi suggested for solving problems in sick industries. "This would not be effective", it

FBCCI further said the limit of taxable income should be raised from Tk 60,000. The increase in tax at source for transfer of immovable property from six per cent to nine per cent is


