Report on secret pact with US baseless: PM

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday dismissed report on conclusion of a secret pact for the establishment of US military base in Bangladesh as totally baseless, reports BSS.

The prime minister's denial about establishment of the US military base in the country came when Md Shahidul Islam (BNP-Jhenidah) in a written question wanted to know whether it was true that an agreement was being concluded for the establishment of US military base in Bangladesh. If it was true, when the agreement would be implemented and whether the military base would be established in Chittagong Hill Tracts, he asked.

Replying to the same member, the prime minister said as a signatory to the Comprehensive Test Ban Treaty (CTBT) and Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty (NPT), Bangladesh opposed to all kinds of nuclear tests. "We are worried over the nuclear tests in the neighbouring countries," she said.

Tk 68.45 cr DU budget

ate has approved a budget of Tk 68.45 crore for 1998-99.

Prof M Shamsul Haq, treasurer of the university earlier placed the budget in the Senate on the second and concluding day of the budget session of the DU Senate yesterday.

The total income has been estimated at Tk 67 crore, of which Tk 60.5 crore will come from the government allocation and Tk 6.5 crore will be collected from the internal resources of the DU.

Research and education sector got the highest allocation of Tk 30.87 crore which is 45.09 per cent of the total expenditure.

Administrative sector got the second highest allocation of Tk 18.72 crore in the budget which is 27.35 per cent of the total expenditure.

Education support fund got the third highest allocation of Tk 4.54 crore which is 6.64 per cent of the total expenditure.

Tk 3.5 crore has been sanctioned for pension of the teachers, officers and employees of the university while Tk 10.82 crore allocated for miscellenious purposes.

'DU students should pay Tk 10000 instead of Tk 2600'

The treasurer of the Dhaka University yesterday observed that each student of the university should pay Tk 10,000 a year as his educational expenses instead of Tk 2600 now. The university now spends

Tk 26,000 a year on each student while they share less than 10 per cent of the total expenses, he noted while placing the budget of the university for 1998-99 financial year.

He, however, said the university authorities should discuss the issue with students, their guardians and former students before taking a decision. Increasing the fees will allow the university authorities to

raise scholarships and financial aid to students, he added. Students of private univer-

sities are paying even Tk 1 lakh a year for their educational expenses, he said.

Hasina tells Vajpayee

Dhaka for total disarmament

NEW DELHI, June 16: Bangladesh stands for total disarmament and a nuclearfree world in the interest of peace and development.

Bangladesh Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina told this to her Indian counterpart Atal Behari Vajpayee during their hourlong one-to-one talks at the historic Hyderabad House here this afternoon, reports UNB.

"We're against nuclear tests as a signatory to CTBT and NPT ... We will have to work together to remove poverty — the prime problem in this region." Hasina

The hour-long exclusive meeting was followed by the official talks.

"We had very good talks, (it was) very fruitful". Hasina told the agency after emerging from

the meeting. The two prime ministers then joined their delegations at the official meeting held at the conference room in the same house, which lasted for an hour.

The two sides discussed bilateral issues as well as the situation arising out of nuclear tests conducted by India and Pakistan recently.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina is the first head of the government to visit India after the nuclear tests. She will also visit Islamabad on June 24 to talk to Pakistan Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif.

During the meeting, Indian Prime Minister Vajpayee explained his country's position and said that India has decided on a unilateral moratorium on nuclear tests.

After the meeting, a spokesman for the Bangladesh government told newsmen that Vajpayee said India and Pakistan cannot be hostage of the past. All problems should be solved but this needs patience. The Indian Prime Minister

said. We are prepared to discuss all issues with Pakistan including Kashmir, but third party's intervention is counter-productive.' Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina appreciated the Indian position on unilateral morato-

The draft Industrial Policy 1998 has been finalised and it will be placed before the Cabinet soon for approval, reports

The draft was finalised at a meeting of the Industrial Policy Formulation Committee yesterday.

Commerce and Industries Minister Tofael Ahmed, who is also the convenor of the 35member policy formulation committee, presided over the

"It would be a long-term and stable policy with a scope to update it regularly," Tofael said while opening the meeting.

He said: We are committed to present the nation an industrial policy which can help implement the long cherished desire of the people for self-reliance through industrialisation in addition to agricultural development.

Tofael asked the committee members to focus on all possibilities and opportunities in the policy for rapid industrialisation of the country.

The policy contains 16 chapters, including objectives, strategies, definition of industry role of public institutions, · privatisation, incentives -in--

Employment Bank likely to open this month

By Staff Correspondent The Employment Bank is expected to start operation this month, Finance Minister SAMS Kibria told the Jatiya

Sangsad yesterday. A Managing Director of the Bank has already been appointed and a Board of Governors will be set up soon to formulate guidelines for its operation, he said. The government has also provided Tk 50 crore a paid-up capital for the Bank, he added.

The guidelines should be different from the existing banks to help unemployed youths get mico-credit on easy terms, the minister said replying to a call attention notice by Tahura Ali of the ruling Awami League.

In her notice, the AL lawmaker proposed that the Employment Banks should sanction loans to unemployed

youths against mortgage of their certificates on academic qualifications.

"We're expecting a new credit system in the Employment Bank which may also consider certificates for loans", the finance minister said, "But everything will depend on the Bank's Board of Governors".

Govt employees start talks for united action programme

Gas supply from Sangu needs monitoring

The Chillimpur Gas Processing Plant, a key installation of the Sangu gasfield project, remains unattended and without monitoring by any representative of the government, sources

The Sangu field, developed by British company Cairn started supplying 60 million cubic feet of gas (mmcfd) daily to the national grid from Saturday. This is the country's first off-shore gasfield as well as the first successful venture by a foreign company under a Production Sharing Contract (PSC). But the government moni-

toring system for such projects has become so weak that it can

not even deploy any representative at the Chillimpur Gas Processing Plant. As per the PSC, the government is the owner of the plant as well as the gasfield. In the past, lack of monitor-

ing created an opportunity for Cairn to enhance the cost recoverable budget of Sangu from 178 million US dollars to 264 million dollars. Lack of monitoring is also one of the reasons why US company Occidental carelessly handled drilling at the Magurchhara gasfield which led to an explosion ear-"Now that the Sangu field

However, PDB sources claimed that power situation improved in the port city today with the resumption of generation of electricity in unit No 1 of Raozan 210 MW power plant.


BNP warns against any bid to foil tomorrow's hartal

Burley keeps Scotland's WC hopes alive

BORDEAUX, June 16: Craig Christian Dailly at the far post Burley kept his nation's World Cup hopes alive with a goal in the 66th minute Tuesday to give Scotland a 1-1 draw with Nor-

way, reports AP. Burley, scoring for only the second time in 25 appearances for Scotland, chased down substitute David Weir's 25-meter lofted pass and volleyed it on one hop over advancing goalkeeper Frode Grodas.

A loss would have made the Scotland, which lost 2-1 last week to Brazil, the first team to be mathematically eliminated from any chance of advancing to the second round. Still, the Scots will need to beat Morocco next week and get some help from others in the group to advance for the first time in eight World Cup appearances.

Burley's goal was the first sign of life in the second half from the Scots, who seemed doomed for another three-andout World Cup after Havard after the break.
