

PARIS, June 19 (Reuters): Facts and figures from World Cup matches played on Thurs-

Three players were sent off in Denmark's 1-1 draw with South Africa, equalling a World Cup finals record for a single match. Curiously, all three (Denmark's Miklos Molnar and Morten Wieghorst and South Africa's Alfred Phiri) were substitutes.

Two players were also sent off in France's 4-0 win over Saudi Arabia (Frenchman Zinedine Zidane and Mohammed Al-Khilaiwi of Saudi Arabia), making a total of five for the day in two matches. Only four were sent off in the 20

preceding games. France became the first team to score four goals at the finals and are the most prolific side with seven goals in two games. They are also the only team so far not to concede a goal after

Saudi Arabia became the first team to be eliminated from the finals after a second successive defeat, a victory in their last Group C game against South Africa would not get them into the second round. They have not scored a single

two matches.


France have never before won their first two games at World Cup finals and had not

won by four goals since beating Northern Ireland 4-0 in 1958.

Benedict McCarthy scored South Africa's first goal in World Cup finals with his squaliser against the Danes.

Denmark continued their record of never failing to score in a match at the World Cup finals - though they have only qualified twice. They have scored 12 goals in six games.

Thierry Henry of France secred two goals and joined Marcelo Salas of Chile and Christian Vieri of Italy as joint top scorer at the finals with three.

Danes still delightful

Le Roy to beef up defence

LIGNAN-SUR-ORB, France, June 19: Cameroon coach Claude le Roy, speaking in the wake of his side's 3-0 World Cup defeat by Italy, said on Thursday he would pick a more defensive team for the final first round game against Chile, reports Reuters.

And he raised eyebrows by suggesting that he might play veteran striker Francois Omam Biyik at the back to replace Raymond Kalla.

Le Roy's gamble of bringing only a handful of dedicated defenders with him to France looked to have backfired on Wednesday when sweeper Kalla was sent off in the first half against Italy, gaining an automatic two-match ban.

Cameroon have only one point to show so far for their adventurous attacking play, which has shown up the defensive failings of the young and inexperienced side.

"I will change our system of play to a defensive 3-5-2 formation," said Le Roy, hoping for a win and counting on an Italian victory over Austria to help Cameroon on their way into round two.

Cesare not complacent

SENLIS, France, June 19 (AP): A dominating victory over Cameroon. The lead atop Group B. Christian Vieri sharing the World Cup scoring lead with three goals in two matches. It's not enough for Italian

Italy, with four points from two matches, will want a victory over Austria to secure first place in their group and avoid a second-round clash against alniost certain Group A winners -. Brazil.

Morocco: Do they believe in themselves?

AIX-EN-PROVENCE, France. June 19 (Reuters): Moroccan coach Henri Michel believes his players have the skills to beat Scotland and reach the last 16 of the World Cup but conceded on Thursday they still had to win the mental battle.

"If there's anything wrong with the players' fitness its more mental than physical," former French coach said after his side went down 3-0 to Brazil.

"It's always harder after a defeat but we have to learn from it and not let the heads go down," he said, dismissing talk of internal dissent in the camp from those left out of the team. Michel, who coached Frence

to third place in the 1986 World Cup, has not concealed his frustration with his side after they twice left slip a lead against Norway in their opening game to draw 2-2 and then seemed to freeze up entirely against

The habitually genial trainer, sitting by a poll after training in his native Aix-en-Provence, snapped at one Moroccan journalist for asking yet again — how he explained his players' slow start to both groups games so far.

"What do you think? Do you think that I tell them to go out and take their time?," he said. "There are things in life it's hard to explain. For two and a

half years we went out without worrying about our opponents but since we started looking at the way other teams play all we've done is left in goals." Chiding his players for showing Brazil "too much re-

spect, perhaps fear," he compared that psychological hurdle to the findings of an American coach who found his pupils could play perfect shots all day until he put up the net. "Then all the shots went into the net," Michel said.

Morocco gave Brazil a fright in a friendly last year before losing 2-0 and after their fine performance against Norway last week were fancied to trouble the Brazilians on Tuesday. Instead they went quickly behind and never looked a

threat. "There was a succession of little mistakes, nothing huge but errors in passing, marking and choices in attack that all added up," he said, singling out star forward Mustapha Hadji and defender Noureddine Nav-

bet as having had poor games. Rebuilding confidence ahead of Tuesday's decisive clash against Scotland is clearly one of Michel's concerns.

Asked about the goalkeeping position after two less than reassuring performances from Driss Benzekri. Michael admitted here was at problem but said there was little he could to avoid undermining morale. "I have had worries about

goalkeepers with Morocco for a long time," he said. "But what can I do? I can't keep saying the goalkeeper's bad. That does nothing for their confidence."

He refused to accept he was resigned to an early exit: Depending on the Norwegian's result against already qualified Brazil a draw could be enough to put Morocco into the second

"We have to believe we have a chance of qualifying," he said.

2-match ban on Kalla

PARIS, June 19: Cameroon defender Raymond Kalla Nkongo was suspended from the World Cup for two games for "serious foul play" against Italy. FIFA announced Thursday, reports AP.

The decision means Kalla is banned from playing in next Tuesday's Chile-Cameroon game and the first game of the second round, if the Indomitable Lions advance.

Just before the end of the first half of Wednesday's Cameroon-Italy match, Luigi, Di Biagio made a tackle on Kalla. Kalla, who was on a full run, couldn't stop and wen't feet first into Di Biagio. Australian referee Edward

Lennie immediately pulled out the red card for Kalla. Di Biagio, taken off on a stretcher, returned before the first half was over to the jeers of SL 243/6

Hansie, Jonty stop Cork

LONDON, June 19: England paceman Dominic Cork continued his magnificent Test comeback this summer with a four -wicket haul on the first day of the second Test against South Africa here on Thursday, reports AFP.

But England's bid to press home their advantage after Cork's incisive new-ball spell was frustrated by a combination of rain, bad light and a defiant unbroken fifth-wicket stand between South Africa captain Hansie Cronje and Jonty Rhodes.

Cork, who took five wickets in the drawn first Test at Edgbaston, boasted figures of four for 24 at one stage, but in a final session disrupted by yet more weather interruptions, South Africa rallied from 46 for four to 135 with out further loss as England's bowlers surrendered the initiative to Cronje and Rhodes.

Cork's inspired seam and swing produced moments of excitement and hope which contrasted sharply with some poor bowling later in the day and with the general air of disappointment caused by a delayed start and three subsequent hold-ups for rain and bad light.

Cork seized the stage, after Alec Stewart had won an important toss and chose to use the moisture in the pitch to his bowlers' advantage, and snapped up the wickets of Gary Kirsten and Jacques Kallis in three overs.

Wenger's winners & losers

PARIS, June 19: The strikers might score the goals but the World Cup is going to be won in midfield, according to Arsenal coach Arsene Wenger, reports

Wenger, who has swapped his tracksuit for a TV commentator's shirt and tie, tipped his native France for the title because of their strength in midfield, based on the creative skills of Zinedine Zidane and the iron first of Didier Deschamps.

"I think it's going to be won by the team with the best midfield" he said, and "I think it's going to be France's year. Having home advantage is very important. Their only possible weak point might be in attack."

Wenger, who was in Montpellier for Italy's 3-0 victory over Cameroon, said that Italy and England were both flawed contenders.

"England are in the same position as Italy, they are good up front, they're good at the back, but are not as strong in midfield."

Italy's well-publicised lack of midfield talent was not lost on the Gunners boss, who doubted that their new 'star' Luigi di Biagio would even have made it to the national side in other countries. "If you look at the top Italian

sides, they all have foreign players in midfield," Wenger said. "Zidane and Deschamps are at Juventus, AC Miland have Zvonimir Boban, Inter have Youri Djorkaeff and Diego Simeone and there's Vladimir Jugovic and Pavel Nedved at Lazio."

Another of the Frenchman's tips for a good campaign at France 98 are the Dutch, who were held to a goalless draw by neighbours Belgium last week-

Holland are likely to field Marc Overmars and Dennis Bergkamp in attack in their next match and Wenger admit-ted that with the two men having spent a season together with him at Arsenal would be a great advantage.

"But the Dutch team as a whole is made up of very, very good players," he added.

The one side he warned to watch out for in the years. ahead were Japan, where the Frenchman coached for two years before heading for Highbury and completing the double in his first season. Wenger said he was not sur-

prised by Japan's stubborn re-sistance in their 1-0 defeat to Argentina. "Japan are a good side,


