## Mijatovic puts on warpaint

ST GALMIER, France, June 20: Yugoslav striker Predrag Mijatovic warned on Friday that Sunday's potential table-top decider with Germany would be more like a "war" than a football match, reports AFP.  
Both sides won their opening Group F matches, Yugoslavia 1-0 over Iran and Germany beat the United States 2-0.  
The 29-year-old Real Madrid striker, who scored the only goal in Real Madrid's 1-0 European Cup final win over Juventus last month, also said that the key to a Yugoslav victory was to nullify the German threat down the wings.  
"This is going to be war. It's going to be a clash of the giants," Mijatovic said.  
"It is a battle between two schools of footballing excellence and one which no-one will be able to predict the outcome," he added.  
The comments by Mijatovic, who was part of the unified Yugoslavia team that won the 1987 under-20 world title, were evidently taken on board by his coach Slobodan Santrac.  
Santrac, who is aiming to become the first Yugoslav coach in 25 years to guide the national side to a win over Germany, is likely to employ a five man midfield to stem the flow of attacks down the wing and close down the crosses, which were lapped up by veteran Jurgen Klinsmann and Oliver Bierhoff in the 2-0 win over the United States on Monday.  
"It is imperative that we half the attacks down the wings and stop the crosses into their strikers," Mijatovic said.  
"It's their wing players who create all their chances and if we stop that then their efforts will be in vain," he added.  
However, veteran playmaker Dragan Stojkovic, who failed to impress in the 1-0 win over Iran, dismissed the German threat entirely.  
"The German team today are not as good as the one that beat us 4-1 eight years ago on their way to winning the trophy," the 33-year-old captain, who played in the 1990 match, said.

## Hooligans hard to handle

TOULOUSE, France, June 20: The best laid security plans cannot stop a horde of determined hooligans from disrupting World Cup soccer, according to British police helping prepare for Monday's match between England and Romania, reports AFP.  
"Nobody, British or French, has said we could guarantee a trouble-free event," Tim Hollis, the top British police officer advising the French, told a news conference Friday.  
This southwestern city, site of the match, is the focus of attention by World Cup officials, local authorities and police on both sides of the English Channel.  
A barrage of measures are being put into place to try to avoid the kind of clashes that occurred before, during and after last Monday's match in Marseille between England and Tunisia during which 80 people were injured.  
Marseille authorities were also bracing for possible violence ahead of Saturday's match between the Netherlands and South Korea, increasing police strength.  
But regional Prefect Jean-Paul Proust relented on a strict alcohol ban announced earlier, under pressure from cafe and restaurant owners. Proust agreed Thursday to allow alcohol to be sold an hour later, until midnight, and said cafes and restaurants could remain open until 4 am.  
In Toulouse, cafes and bars were forced to close at 11 pm starting Thursday and continuing through Monday, instead of the usual 2 am closing time. The nationwide music festival has been postponed in Toulouse until July 11 and, with it, a series of other festivities.  
Two giant World Cup screens for ticketless fans are being eliminated. A screen on Marseille's Prado beach was the sight of violence during Monday's game.  
Police strength is being increased, with the 1,300 police to be backed by two or three 80-member units of riot police or motorised gendarmes, police officials said.  
"Our plan is in place, but it is worth nothing if you have 500 guys who don't fear arrest and who want to wreck everything," said British liaison officer Eddie Curtis, attached to his country's Football Association.  
Hollis said that 200 hooligans who rampaged in Mar-

## DOMINIC'S DIARY

13/6/98  
**SPAIN VS. NIGERIA: 2-3**  
In the most exhilarating meeting so far, the Nigerians came back after going behind to Spain twice to win the game.  
I thought that Fernando Hierro's opening goal would've settled the Spaniards and enabled them to dominate the game. But it had the opposite effect of blunting their will to win. And in the end, they looked like they wanted a siesta rather than fiesta.  
The Spanish looked lackadaisical throughout. Up front, despite his goal, Raul failed to live up to expectations. Luis Enrique struggled to establish himself in the midfield. And the Spanish defence, impenetrable on paper, looked vulnerable in actuality.  
The Nigerians, on the other hand, looked bright and positive. Their players were constantly chasing the ball when they didn't have it, and were always making runs into space when they did.  
For a while at least it seemed as if the whole nation had forgotten about the political chaos that followed the death of General Abacha. Although they probably didn't miss him that much, World Cup victories have tremendous healing powers.  
I think Peter Rufai, Nigeria's goalkeeper, should hang up his boots and become a professional dancer — he can shake his thing pretty well as he showed Nigerian fans in the post-match celebrations.

**DS Man of the Match:** Rashied Yekini's entry late in the second half was an inspired move. His experience and fresh legs were integral to Nigeria's comeback.  
**KOREA VS. MEXICO: 1-3**  
The fate of South Korea was sealed, rather ironically, when they scored. Ha Seok-ju got so excited after his freekick was deflected into the Mexican net that straight after the restart he flew into a tackle and was promptly sent off. Even though they were still in the lead at this point, the Koreans were left chasing the game.

**DS Man of the Match:** Composed, creative and exemplary, Ronald Boer was an inspiration for all aspiring liberos.

Though the Koreans looked very fit and passed the ball around neatly, their diminutive physique meant that they were easily knocked off the ball and the Mexican's always looked like they could win the game if they wanted to.  
That Mexican attacker Luis Hernandez has a strange bone structure. Sometimes I mistook him for a blond woman and at other times he looks like a hideous beast.  
**DS Man of the Match:** Cuauhtemoc Blanco was by far the best player on the pitch. His unorthodox but effective style was encapsulated when he jumped out of a melee of Korean defenders carrying the ball between his legs.  
**HOLLAND VS. BELGIUM: 0-0**  
A series of stunning performances in their warm-up matches has made Holland one of the most feared teams in the competition. And the Belgians proved this by playing cowardly defensive tactics.  
The Dutch never looked stretched at the back, confining Belgium hopes to long-range efforts. They also look accomplished in midfield, winning most of the possession. Yet the Dutch, excepting Marc Overmars, look sketchy in attack and this lack of firepower meant that their inordinate amount of possession was never exploited. Patrick Kluyvert is temperamental and inconsistent, and my grandmother has more chance of scoring than Jimmy Floyd Hasselbaink.  
The game was summed up when Kluyvert, provoked by a comment made by Lorenzo Staelens, inflicted some kind of Kong Fu elbowing move which left the theatrical Belgium defender writhing around in agony.  
Dutch impotence and Belgian spinelessness made an exciting fixture mundane.

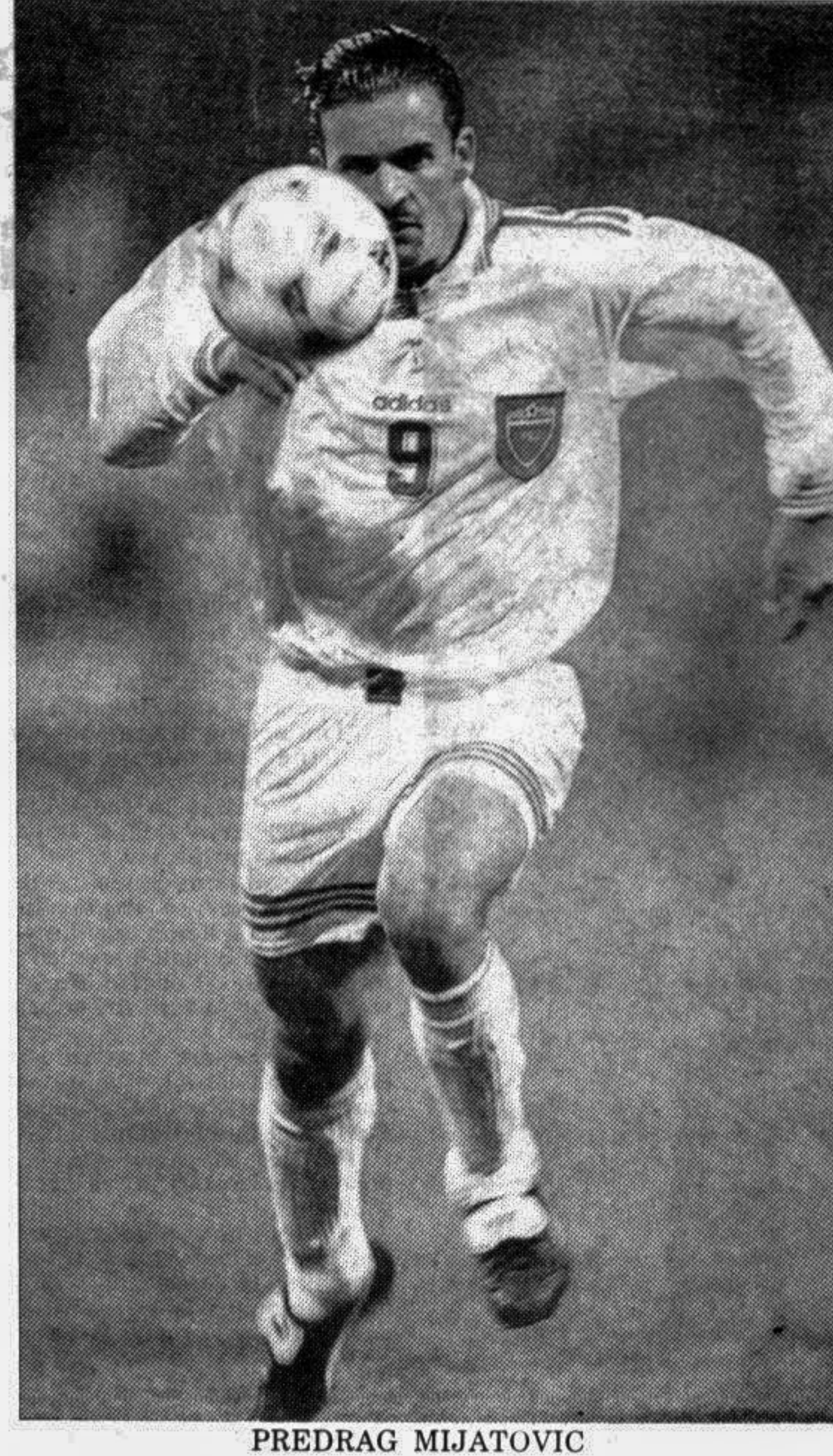

### Youths battle at Khulna from June 27

Holders Khulna will take on Rajbari at the District Stadium in the opening match as the eight-team final round of the Gazi Tank 18th national youth cricket championship which begins at Khulna from June 27. In the other match billed for the inaugural day, Mymensingh will meet Bangladesh Krira Shiksha Prothahan (BKSP) at the Divisional Stadium.  
The winners of Day One will then face each other in the first semifinal scheduled for June 29.  
On the second day of the six-day meet last year's runners up will play against Dhaka at the District Stadium while Sylhet will face Rajshahi at the Divisional Stadium. The second semifinal between the winners of Day Two will be held on June 30.  
The final is scheduled at the District Stadium after a day's break on July 2.

## Nervous start for England

LONDON, June 20: Jonty Rhodes' second Test century after a five-year wait and fine pace bowling by Allan Doland and Shaun Pollock left South Africa firmly in charge of the second Test against England at Lord's on Friday, reports Reuters.  
Having recovered from 46 for four to make 360 all out on the second day, South Africa struck twice in the space of three balls to remove both openers with the total on 15. England captain Alec Stewart was then dismissed in the penultimate over.  
His side ended the day perilously placed on 40 for three.

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# FRANCE '98 SIDELINES

UNDATED, Jun 20 (AFP/Internet/AP): Chelsea's Romanian defender Dan Petrescu has made it clear where his loyalties lie by naming his baby daughter after the club.  
Beatrice Chelsea Petrescu was born just three weeks ago but the proud father hasn't been able to see her yet as he concentrates on Romania's World Cup campaign.  
Chelsea teammate and French defender Frank Leboeuf remarked it was lucky for little Beatrice that her dad wasn't playing for a different club.  
"Beatrice Bolton Wanderers Petrescu doesn't have the same ring to it," says Leboeuf.

**LOSING HIS SHIRT**  
Hristo Stoichkov's launching of his shirt towards Michel Platini, who, of course, heads the World Cup organising committee, confused onlookers as to his motives at half-time in the Bulgaria versus Nigeria match.  
On the one hand, there are those who say Stoichkov has never concealed his admiration for Platini, one of France's greatest footballers and indeed the world during their semi-final appearances in both the 1982 and 1986 World Cups. Not for getting of course Platini's starring role in France's 1984 European championship triumph.  
Stoichkov even said before the tournament that it would be a success because Platini was in charge.  
However others may believe it was a protest. Some said Stoichkov was complaining against what he believed was below par refereeing by Frenchman Joel Quiniou in the 1994 World Cup semi-final between Bulgaria and Italy.

**GOAL DIFFERENCE'S IMPORTANCE**  
Goal differential again will be the primary tiebreaker for deciding second-round teams at the World Cup, FIFA said Thursday.  
Teams that end first-round play tied in points in their group will be ranked according to several criteria: First, by the difference in goals they have scored and given up, then the number of goals scored, then head-to-head results.  
If the teams still are tied after that, the higher spot would be decided by a blind draw, FIFA said.

**BIG AUDIENCE**  
An estimated 2 billion people around the world watched telecasts of Brazil's 2-1 victory over Scotland in the opening game of the World Cup, organising committee officials said Thursday.  
Jose Carlin, a committee spokesman, emphasised that the number was a best-guess and that more accurate figures would be available later in the week.  
Organisers said before the tournament that they expected World Cup audiences to total some 37 billion viewers by the end of the tournament July 12.

**BRAZIL'S POPULARITY**  
The Brazilian team is so popular the French postal service gave them their own postal address.  
"For the moment we're getting about 30 letters a day," said Jean Paul Cueille, the manager of the Ozoir-la-Ferriere post office. "Obviously most letters are for Ronaldo or Ronaldinho."  
The letters are given to the head of security of the Brazilian team each morning. "We haven't actually seen the players," said Cueille.  
That might change, because some smart fans have sent their letters by registered mail.  
The French post office has gotten letters simply addressed to "Brazil team, France."  
One registered letter from a young woman was addressed to: "The most beautiful, the most sexy, the most wonderful of animals, Mister Edmundo," Cueille said. "And she stuck a nice flower on the envelope."

**LEBOEUF READY FOR ACTION**  
Chelsea's Frank Leboeuf stands a good chance of gaining his first taste of World Cup action in France's final group game against Denmark on Wednesday.  
Fellow central defender Laurent Blanc of Marseille is on one yellow card and the signs are that coach Aime Jacquet may rest him and give Leboeuf a run-out for his 14th cap.  
The Chelsea man, while delighted to be in the squad ad-

ditions that "It is frustrating not to be playing."

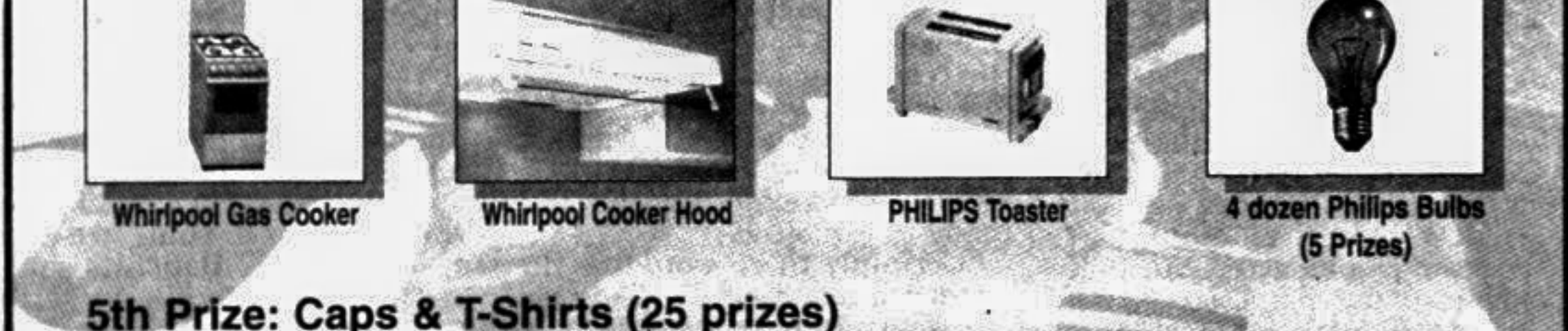
