**Well-attended Round-6 Draw held Babul bags Philips Mini**

The colourful draw of the Daily Star World Cup '98 Quiz Round 6, graced by a host of participants and specially invited guests, was held at the Jatiya Press Club auditorium yesterday.

Babul, a 31-year old businessman from Dhanmondi, won the first prize --- a Philips CD Mini System. Tarannum Ferdous of West Dhanmondi clinched the second prize---a Philips 14" black and white television. The third prize ---a Philips Blender--- went to Saiful Alam Patwary of East Haji Para, Khilgaon.

Five entry coupons were picked for the fourth prize --- a pack of four dozen Philips bulbs--- while 25 persons were lucky with the fifth prize---a Daily Star cap and a T-shirt.

Tapan Choudhury relished his days as an active supporter of Abahani and recounted anecdotes with his favourite team, Ashrafuddin Ahmed Chunnun, the lightning-like winger of the yesteryears, spoke with optimism about the future of football in Bangladesh.

Thanking the invited guests for their amenability and Transcom Electronics Limited for sponsoring the prizes, the Acting Editor Tawfik Aziz Khan reasserted the Daily Star commitment of continuing to promote all sports, including football.

**Donald destroys England**

LONDON, June 21: Allan Donald's 12th five-wicket haul in tests condemned England to follow on 250 behind South Africa in the second Test at Lord's on Saturday, reports Reuters.

His five for 32 sent England spiralling to a miserable 110 all out.

England fared considerably better second time around, finishing the third day on 105 for two following a stand of 94 between Mike Atherton, who scored a century in the drawn first Test, and Nasser Hussain.

Having looked capable of batting through to the close after the early loss of opener Steve James, Atherton fell for 44 just five overs before the close when he swept spinner Paul Adams to square leg.

Starting the day on 40 for three, England slumped to 94 for seven at lunch as Donald, having bowled seven of the fastest overs of his career on Friday evening, continued in the same controlled, aggressive manner.
