



DOMINIC'S DIARY

Sepp Blatter has been elected 8th President of world football's governing body known all over the world as FIFA on 8 June '98, in the 51st Congress in Paris.

The 62-year-old Swiss had been holding the post of FIFA General Secretary for the last 17 years.

Blatter was actually the nominee of the outgoing President 82-year-old Dr. Joao Havelange of Brazil who staged almost a 'coup' against Sir Stan-ley Rous of England in 1974. It was very interesting to

note that only eight Presidents have been elected in the 94-year history of FIFA since its formation in 1904. Sometimes vacancies occurred due to death of a President while in office. On such occasion other senior members took over until the next Congress.

The first President of RIFA. Robert Guerin, a Frenchman, was elected on 23 May 1904 in Paris. The election took place two days after FIFA had been founded by seven Associations - France, Belgium, Denmark, the Netherlands, Spain (Madrid FC), Sweden and Switzerland in

Paris. Daniel Burley Woolfall of England was elected in Berne (Switzerland) in June 1906. He died in office in 1918. Carl An-

Japan learns from France

AIX-LES-BAINS. France, June 22 (AFP): Japan's football chief said on Sunday that his country, due to co-host the 2002 World Cup finals with South Korea, was determined not to repeat the "shame of France" in handling match tickets.

Ken Naganuma, head of the Japan Football Association (JFA), said the international fiasco over phantom tickets for France '98 had given the Asiahco-hosts valuable lessons.

"How to issue tickets in a fair and orderly manner will be the priority for the host nations and the sport's governing body FIFA in planning the 2002 event," said Naganuma, who is also a vice-chairman of Japan's organising committee.

Japanese football fans were among the hardest hit of the tens of thousands of people hit by the unravelling World Cup ticketing fiasco, where many were only informed when they arrived at the airport to get their flights to France that they had been sold "bogus" tickets.


