Seven Iranian dissidents detained

LYON, France, June 22: Seven Iran football fans were arrested at Lyon stadium Sunday night after demonstrating their support for the Iranian political opposition, reports AFP. Police said the seven had been taken from Gerland Stadium and placed in custody. Nearly an hour after the end of Iran's match against the United States in which it defeated the US team 2-1, thousands of supporters of the Iranian opposition National Resistance Council (NRC) were milling outside the stadium.

Tokyo's biggest audience

TOKYO, June 22: Japan's World Cup soccer match with Croatia posted the highest television ratings in the Tokyo area for a sporting event in over 30 years, a ratings monitor said Monday, reports AP. A total of 9.135,000 households in the capital and its surrounding areas watched Saturday's game, for a rating of 60.9 per cent, Video Research said. There are about 15 million households in the capital region. Japan lost the match, played in Nantes, France, by a score of 1-0. It was shown nationally by public broadcaster NHK. It was the highest rating for a sports TV programme since 1966, when the World Boxing Commission bantamweight title match between Japan's fighting Harada and Eder Jofre of Brazil drew a rating of 63.7 per cent, Video Research said.

Tawfiq Aziz Khan Sepp Blatter has been elected 8th President of world football's governing body known all over the world as FIFA on 8 June '98, in the 51st Congress in Paris. The 62-year-old Swiss had been holding the post of FIFA General Secretary for the last 17 years. The 62-year-old Swiss had been holding the post of FIFA General Secretary for the last 17 years. Jules Rimet of France was first elected as ad-interim President in Antwerp (Belgium) and later confirmed on 1 March 1921. Jules Rimet was in office for 33 years. On 21 June 1954 Rodolphe Seeldrayers of Belgium was elected FIFA President in Berne (Switzerland). He died in office in October 1955. Arthur Drewry of England took over as interim President. He was elected President on 9 June 1956 in Lisbon (Portugal) but died in office on 25 March 1961. Ernst B. Thommen of Switzerland took over as interim President. On 28 September 1961 Sir Stanley Rous of England was elected FIFA President in London and was in chair for 13 years. Dr Joao Havelange of Brazil was elected on 11 June 1974 in Frankfurt (Germany). As the tradition goes Dr Havelange is still the President of FIFA until after the end of the 16th World Cup now being held in France, when his successor takes over charge from him. Daniel Burley Woolfall of England was elected in Berne (Switzerland) in June 1906. He died in office in 1918. Carl An-

Tudor's terrible distinction

LONDON, June 22: Surrey fast bowler Alex Tudor made cricket history of the embarrassing kind on Sunday by conceding 38 runs in one over in the English county championship match against Lancashire, reports Reuters. Tudor was smashed for 34 runs by Andrew Flintoff — the sixth and fourth fours — in an eight-ball over which cost him a further four runs in no-balls. Unlike some similar feats, the runs were not scored off contrived bowling as Lancashire beat the championship leaders by six wickets at Old Trafford. The over eclipsed the 36 conceded by Malcolm Nash of Glamorgan to Nottinghamshire's West Indies great Gary Sobers in 1968 and by Baroda's Tilak Raj, who was also hit for six sixes by Ravi Shastri of Bombay 16 years later.

Sports Reporter Bangladesh went down by eight wickets to the England and Wales Cricket Board (ECB) Eleven in a limited over match played at the Sheny Cricket Centre ground in London on Sunday. According to faxed message received here, sent into bat first, careless batting by Bangladesh's top order restricted them to a meagre 118 before they were all out in 48.1 overs. Middle-order Naimur Rahman hammered highest 41 while veteran opener Athar (24) and skipper Akram Khan (15) were the only other two to have reached double figures. Bangladesh made a change in their batting order, promoting one-down Faruque Ahmed as Athar's partner. But the gamble back-fired when Faruque was out on duck after facing seven balls. On the other hand Rafique, who was brought down the order to number eight, scored only one run. ECB Eleven's new ball bowler K Arnold captured highest three wickets for 13 runs from his 9.1 overs while Scott and Foster evenly shared four wickets. Replying to Bangladesh, an unbeaten 78-run third-wicket stand between D Clarke and S Foster helped the home side reach the target of 119 with the loss of two wickets and with more than 11 overs to spare.
