Nakanishi's WC over

PARIS, June 23 (AFP): FIFA's disciplinary committee ended Japanese defender Eisuke Nakanishi's World Cup here on Monday when they suspended him for one match.
The 24-year-old, who was one of four players handed one match suspensions, will miss Japan's final Group H match with Jamaica on Friday.
Even if Japan win their cannot qualify for the second round because both Argentina and Croatia have six points, while they do not have any.
The other three players to be suspended were Belgium midfielder Gert Verheyen, for being sent off against Mexico on Saturday, Jamaica midfielder Daryl Powell, who was sent off against Argentina on Sunday, and Mexico defender Pavel Pardo, who was sent off against Belgium.

Playing in the WC is all that matters

AIX-LES-BAINS, France, June 23 (AP): No team could be more upbeat after two World Cup losses.
The tournament will be over for Japan after their game against fellow newcomers Jamaica Friday. But the players are proud to have conceded only one goal each against the far more experienced Croatian and Argentinean teams.

"It's like a field trip. The World Cup isn't over until you go home," said 30-year-old forward Masashi Nakayama, who almost scored Saturday.
"We have to defend and defend, then we have to move up front and go for the goal," Nakayama said Monday after morning training.
Coach Takeshi Okada gave his players the rest of Monday off to allow them to recharge mentally and physically.

The team is not going to change in two or three days. But we'll do our best against Jamaica," Okada said, adding that he expected to fare better in the next game.
Jamaica, who lost to Argentina 5-0 on Sunday, was defeated earlier by Croatia 3-1. Japan suffered narrower losses to Argentina and Croatia — both 1-0.

Yutaka Akita, who played well in defense against two of the world's top strikers — Gabriel Batistuta and Davor Suker — acknowledged he was disappointed about not advancing past the first round.

Australia may cash in on hooliganism

PARIS, June 23: Australia, hoping to host the World Cup early next century, could gain something from England's hooligan problem, French sports newspaper L'Equipe reported on Monday, reports AFP.
England supporters created havoc in Marseille and festivities were cancelled in Toulouse, where England were due to meet Tunisia on Monday evening.

And northern former coalmining town Lens is bracing itself for the arrival of English fans for the Colombia game on Friday night.
L'Equipe reported Australia were ready to step in and "gain something from hooliganism" — hosting the 2006 World Cup.

The paper quoted Australian football official George Negus saying they could apply to organize the 2006 tournament instead of the 2010 event, should the hooligan problem scupper England's 2006 bid.
France deported four English fans on Monday after a confrontation by 300 supporters with 50 riot police ended peacefully.

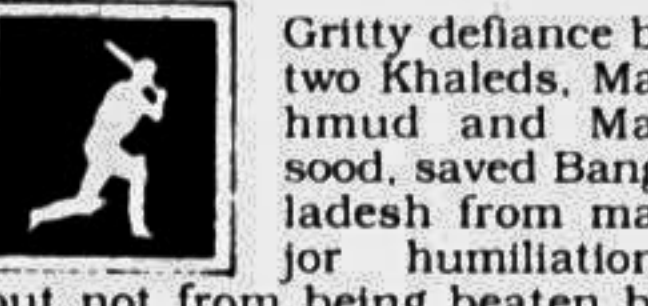
England's hosting of Euro '96 went without incident and hopes of a potential World Cup bid had looked rocky before the latest outbreak of violence.
England and Germany have both been lobbying FIFA for some time, though new FIFA president Sepp Blatter is said to favour an African application for 2006.

Bangladesh go down to strong Leicestershire

K Mahmud's vain arrogance



Gritty defiance by two Khaleds, Mahmud and Masood, saved Bangladesh from major humiliation but not from being beaten by Leicestershire County Cricket Club by 42 runs at Grace Road on Monday.
According to a faxed message received here yesterday, Bangladesh were heading for a massive defeat against the 1996 county champions when, chasing a commanding Leicestershire total of 262 in 50 overs, they were at one stage tottering with six down for 61 as the top order once again performed its routine plummeting act.

The imminent doom seemed destined to be coupled with embarrassment until the Khaled duo picked the day for a fight against the home side with a magnificent 131-run seventh-wicket partnership. And, thus the visitors pulled off a saving grace.

The stand was broken on 191 when Mahmud, the unassuming right hander, was castled by Maddy after hammering a workman-like 79 off just 72 balls. Masood joined Mahmud in the dressing room soon afterwards. He added a patient 45 off 72 balls.

After Khaled Masood's departure with Bangladesh on 196, Hasibul played some superb shots and scored a quickfire 18 off eight balls to help Bangladesh reach 220 at last. Although the target set by the hosts was at best far reaching, the way the Bangladesh top order threw the towel was scandalous. Athar (2) and his opening partner Azam Iqbal (5) returned when Bangladesh were on 11. Vice-captain Aminul (2) followed suit with the score on 26. Skipper Akram (6) then

helped to puff the panic when he was forced to leave the crease with his side on 47. Things went from worse to the pathetic as Faruque (20) and Naimur (9) found themselves idle after adding another 14 runs.
Earlier, Leicestershire's fighting total, after electing to bat, was built around a superb century from opener I J Sutcliffe. The number two batsman scored 101 off 124 balls which included two sixes and nine boundaries. The other opener D Maddy (32) and one-down Dakin (25) were the other notable run-getters for the home side.



Right-arm medium pacer Khaled Mahmud, before going wild with his willow, and left-arm spinner Mohammad Rafique were the most successful Bangladesh bowlers sharing four wickets, while Hasibul, Athar and Naimur took one wicket each.
It was Bangladesh's second successive defeat in England having played three matches so far.
The next match, another limited over engagement against MCC Young Cricketers, is scheduled today at Finchley.

Graf, Sampras get going

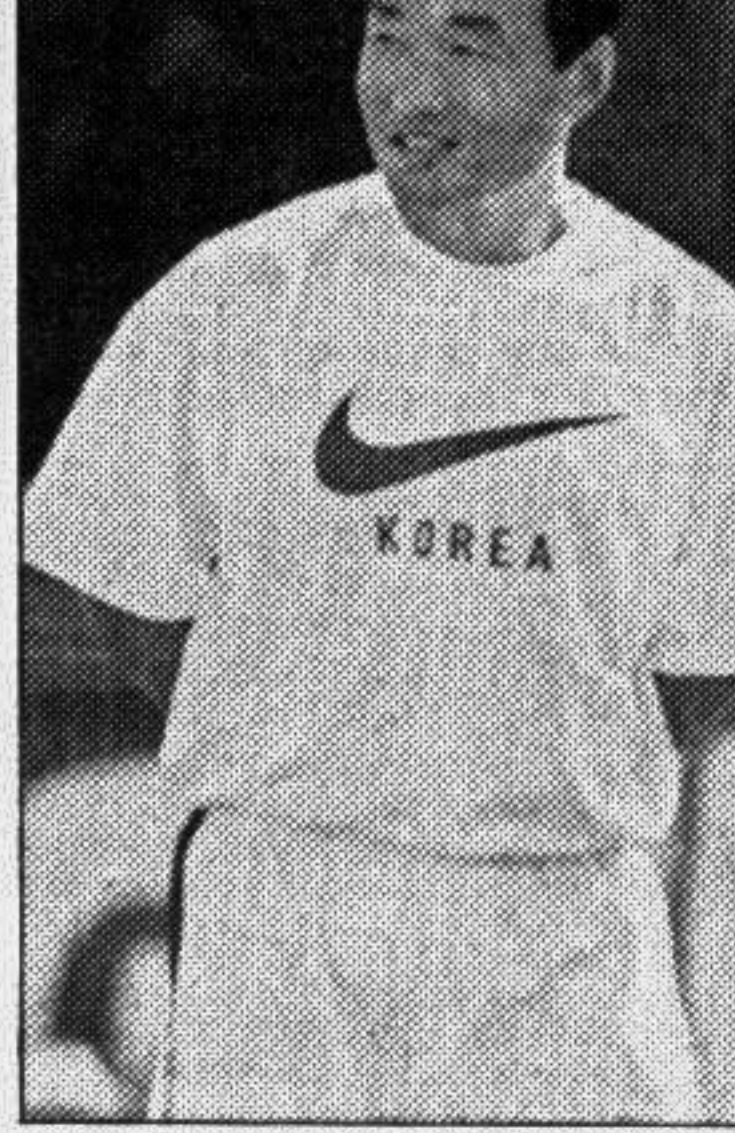
LONDON, June 23: A tearful Steffi Graf made an apprehensive return to her favourite hunting ground but for Pete Sampras it was business as usual as the two opened their Wimbledon campaigns with straight-sets victories on Monday, reports Reuters.
Seven-times champion Graf, who has endured a wretched 18 months mainly off the court with injuries and personal problems, revealed after her 6-4, 6-1 victory over Gala Leon Garcia that she very nearly quit tennis a couple of months ago.
The German, who missed Wimbledon last year with a knee injury, sobbed when she

spoke of her emotional return to Centre Court, saying she was overcome by the crowd's rapturous welcome.
