# India's WC hopes outmuscled, outhit and outrun

NEW DELHI, June 24: Indian footballers dreaming of qualifying one-day for the World Cup will have to speed up, beef up and learn how to kick the ball a magazine said, reports AFP.

India Today said Indian strikers were at least a yard (metre) slower than Brazilian striker Ronaldo over 10 yards (metres) and could only kick the ball 60 miles per hour (96 kilometres per hour) compared to his 90 miles an hour (144 kilometres per hour).

The magazine quoted East Bengal coach PK Banerjee as saying Indian players were also not tough enough to compete at the top.

"There isn't a single Indian player who will be able to rise for weeks after one of those typical tackles," Banerjee said.

India has never qualified for the World Cup and is currently rated at 115 in the world football rankings. The game is largely re-

stricted to the east and south of the country but cannot compete with the country's national game, cricket. India also excels at hockey —

although its national team is currently in a slump after winning the last of their eight Olympic titles in 1980 — tennis and chess, with Indian Grand Master Viswanathan Anand one of the best in the world.

The magazine concluded: "If India has to run with Ronaldo then it must sprout wings in its feet and cement in its shoulders. Otherwise a chess board will rest as the only alterna-

# Martina, Jana advance



LONDON, June 24: Defending champion Martina Hingis weathered the valiant challenge of American

Lisa Raymond and twice runner-up Jana Novotna made short work of her lowly-ranked Czech rival on a rain-affected second day at Wimbledon on Tuesday, reports Reuters.

Hingis who last year became the youngest player in the Open era to win the Wimbledon singles title at 16 years, nine months and five days, started

gingerly but benefited from a 90-minute rain break to dispose of Raymond 7-5, 6-3.

Novotna, the form grasscourt player leading into the tournament following her success in Eastboure last week, was less troubled by her first-round opponent Sandra Kleinova who managed to take only four games off the third seed.

The weather called most of the shots on a typically fickle June day in London, play starting some 40 minutes behind scheduled on the show courts and nearly three hours late on the outside courts.

B ut the interruption did not help her as last year's losing fimalisit came out with all guns blaz ing, finishing off Kleinova in a matter of minutes.

Circly 11 of the 64 matches sche duled were completed as the play ers spent most of the day in the locker-room, and the spectato rs spent their money on pim ms and strawberries and crea m.

The problem of fouled players "asking" for cards with hand gestures was put to the attention of the referees, FIFA spokesman Keith Cooper said Tuesday.

The problem was discussed in the refereeing community and it has been brought to their attention that if they feel it's necessary they could take more action," Cooper said. "It's an act of dissent and bad sportsman-

ship."
The teams have not been specifically warned about the heighten vigilance for the card asking.

"There's no need to tell players they shouldn't do something they shouldn't be doing any-

way." Cooper said.
The informal discussion between refereeing officials and referees was not the same as the "edict" issued by FIFA president Sepp Blatter on the sanctions for the tackle from behind, FIFA said. It's more of a preventative measure.

"The more players that start to do it the more it's going to escalate," Cooper said.

The spokesman pointed out that in all matches so far the places for which the tickets where reportedly stolen were filled with "peaceful supporters" with tickets in the name of PSI.

#### **NAUGHTY** APOLOGISES

South Africa's Naughty Mokoena on Tuesday asked his country to forgive him for ig-noring rules that led to his expulsion from the World Cup team in France.

Speaking to reporters on his arrival back in South Africa. Mokoena said: "It's my fault. I strongly regret my action, but I did not think it was going to cost my place in the squad."

Mokoena, 23, and Brendan Augustine, 27, were suspended by the South African Football Association for violating a team curfew and going out Saturday night, SAFA officials

### WC REACHES ANTARCTICA

World Cup fever has struck the personnel manning three isolated British Antarctic Survey stations on the remote icecapped continent.

Unable to get terrestrial or satellite television, the teams are dependent on the BBC World Service for news but the signal

is often too weak to reach them. To counter this, staff at the survey's Cambridge headquarters said they are sending regular e-mails and page after page of football news to the 37 engineers and scientists hungry for details about how Scotland and England are faring.

The research teams are enduring 24-hour-a-day darkness and have just celebrated midwinter in Antarctica. They will not leave the continent until October.

Two of the bases are on the ice-cap itself while the third. Bird Island, is on the northern tip of South Georgia.

More people watched England's World Cup loss to Romania than any other soccer match telecast on a single channel in the last two decades. The Broadcast Audience Re-

search Board said Tuesday that as many as 30 million people had watched ITV's telecast of the game, including 21.6 million people who tuned-in at home. Monday's match in Toulouse

attracted 71 per cent of all home viewers who were tuning in at that time.

England's 1990 World Cup semifinal against Germany was seen by 25.2 million viewers on two channels. The 1996 European Champi-

onship semifinal between the same two sides gained a combined audience of 23.8 million Initial research puts the av-

erage home audience at 19.5 million for the match - but that figure was two million higher in the final quarter of an hour when Romania kicked the winning goal.
