CATW discloses at press briefing

500 Bangladeshi women illegally transported into Pakistan daily

At least 500 Bangladeshi women are illegally transported daily into Pakistan, 150,000 Filipino women are trafficked for so called entertainment industry in Japan every year and 7000 Nepali girls are sold yearly to the brothels in India.

These were disclosed by the leaders of Coalition Against Trafficking in Women (CATW). Bangladesh at a press conference at the National Press Club yesterday.

The briefing was organised on the eve of a 4-day regional conference on "Organising Against Sexual Exploitation Regionally" which begins at the CIRDAP auditorium in the city from today (Friday).

A total of 150 participants

including 36 from 15 foreign countries are expected to attend the conference. "This conference aims to

raise public and official awareness of the magnitude and urgency of repression and crimes against women and to mobilise support and action" Advocate Salma Ali, the coordinator of Publicity Committee of CATW. Bangladesh told the press con-

Emphasising the need for new effective national, regional and international legislation and for inter-governmental cooperation in this regard, the CATW leaders said that political will is a must to address the cultural, social and economic roots of problems faced by

women and children while ensuring that women are not further victimised by policies and measures that may be put in

They also urged all, irrespective of beliefs and opinions, to come forward to contain the violations of human rights triggered by trafficking in women and children, prostitution, pornography, rape and child sexual exploitation.

Advocate Sigma Huda, Advocate Salma Ali, Dr Khaleda Salauddin and Shaheen Akhter Munir from CATW, Bangladesh and Dr Janice Raymond from USA, Cecilia Hoffman from Philippines and Jean D'Cunha from India among others were present at the press conference.

Town-dwellers in Mymensingh suffer from acute shortage of water

"Town-dwellers in Mymensingh have been suffering from acute scarcity of water due to shortage of supply since long,

reports UNB. Public Health Engineering Department sources said the department can supply only 20 to 22 lakh gallons of water daily as against the demand for

about 44 lakh gallons. Local people complained that they are not getting smooth and adequate supply despite regular payment of bills. They also complained about double billing for water supply by PHE

and the municipality. Residents said the authorities used to supply water for six hours in the morning, noon and afternoon in the recent past. But, they complained, the duration of supply has reduced to

about three hours. Sometimes,

no supply is available through-

out the day, they added. Long queues have become usual scene at each street hydrants and public supply taps in

different parts of the town. Mymensingh Nagorik Parishad, a civic group, de-

manded adequate supply of wa-

ter and protested the double billing by the two authorities terming it as "Illegal."

The Parishad submitted memorandum to the municipal authorities containing its 17point charter of demand including stoppage of charging double bill for water supply.

Chairman of the Municipality, Delwar Hossain Khan Dulu. said the higher authorities have been informed about the matters relating to double billing and expanded area of the municipality.

500,000 poor men, women employed during '97-98 work season

About 500,000 rural poor men and women were employed during the 1997-98 work season through different Rural Development (RD) programmes as-sisted by the World Food Pro-

gramme (WFP), reports BSS. This benefited around two million people all over the country, a WFP press release said in the city yesterday.

A large number of development projects at an estimated cost of Taka 335 crore were implemented by using 220,000 tons of WFP and bilateral food assistance during the recently completed work season.

A number of government agencies including Bangladesh Water Development Board (BRDB), Departments of Fisheries and Forest, and NGOs implemented these projects, the press release said.

During the 1997-98 work season, 1384 km of embankments, 728 km of canals were rehabilitated and about 3924 km of embankments were maintained.

In the road sector 1000 km of growth centre connecting roads were completed and some 1684 km were maintained.

In the fishery sector, 711 hectors of ponds were developed for the long term benefit of more than 10,000 households. About 18,000 poor people mostly women received food assistance for planting eight million of trees in 6100 km of roads during this period.

It is expected that this project will strengthen the continued work of integrated community development in the CHT. especially making it possible for the children to enjoy the betterment of education and for the community to get together in socio-economic activities to improve their lives.

'Govt keen to set up Nat'l HR Commission'

The Law Minister and the US Ambassador in Bangladesh yesterday discussed the government's plan to establish human rights commission, office of Ombudsman and separation of judiciary, reports UNB.

US Ambassador John C Holzman called on Law Minister Abdul Matin Khasru at his office in the morning.

During the meeting, they also had talks on bilateral issues and matters of mutual in-

terests. Khasru told Holzman that the government is keen to set up National Human Rights Commission and the office of Ombudsman as two separate institutions to ensure transparency and accountability in administration and protect human rights and uphold its values.

About separation of judiciary from administration, the minister said intention of the government is clear and a bill in this regard has already been placed in parliament.

WFP representative in Bangladesh, Werner Kiene expressed his determination to further enhance the effectiveness of food as a valuable development assistance for the rural

poor in the country. He appreciates the government's commitment to the RD programme, particularly for al-location of Taka 50 crore from the ADP to pay part of the wages

In order to strengthen the project effectiveness, WFP together with the various implementing partners have taken a series of steps, some of which are expected to expedite project effectiveness in the coming

in cash.

As a policy of integration of food aid with the national planning process, 1997/98 has been the first year of the entry of WFP food assistance into the Annual Development Plan of the government in the RD programme, increasing level of resources are being channeled to-wards targeted interventions benefiting the poor, particularly women, the press release

Collaboration has been sought with the United Nations Development Programme to promote a long-term sustainability of these beneficiaries. the press release said.

Over 4,500 cases await disposal in three dists

More than 4,500 cases have been lying pending for long with Forest Courts of Khulna, Satkhira and Bagerhat districts due to various complexities, reports UNB.

Of the total, some 2,355 cases are pending with Bagerhat Forest Court while, 1,788 with Khulna and 393 with Satkhira courts, forest office sources said adding that some of the cases had been filed 10 to 12 years

The unusual delay in disposing of the cases leads to massive plundering of forest resources in the Sundarbans, complained the officials concerned and the local people.

AIDS declining in richer states while going up in poorer ones

UNITED NATION, June 25 AIDS is declining in richer countries and going up in poorer ones; according to the first-ever country by-country study of the epidemic, which was released here Wednesday. reports Xinhua.

The study pointed to a "preventive gap" while most industrialised nations and a handful of developing countries are seeing the spread of HIV level off or even decline, infection rates are reaching alarming new highs in most of the developing world.

The report on the global

HIV/AIDS epidemic, produced by the joint United Nations programme on HIV/AIDS, blamed the gap on uneven access to drugs that combat HIV and forestall the development of AIDS-related infections and

By the end of 1997, an estimated of 30.6 million people worldwide were living with HIV including over 1 million children, according to United Nations estimates.

Africa has the highest prevalence of HIV, with some 21 million infected people. In Botswana and Zimbabwe, one out of every four adult has HIV.

Thailand and Uganda are the only developing countries in the world where HIV rates are declining, thanks to prevention programmes, according to the study. Other developing countries have the potential to achieve similar success through sustained and focused prevention efforts.

2,25,000 defective vehicles heavily polluting city air

The thick black smoke emitted by nearly 2,25,000 defective automobiles is heavily polluting air and pushing millions of the residents of the capital city. into jaws of fatal diseases, experts told BSS yesterday.

"Ninety per cent of total air pollution is caused by the emission of black smoke which contains high toxic acid," said a senior official of Department of Environment (DOE).

He said the incidence of dangerous diseases like cancer, tuberculosis, chronic bronchitis and lung irritation would increase rapidly in the next decade unless such intense air pollution is effectively curbed.

The vehicle operating in the capital discharge through smoke about 100 kg lead, 3.5 tonnes of harmful particles, 60 tonnes carbon monoxide, 16 tonnes nitrogen-oxide, 14 tonnes hydrocarbon and 1.5 tonnes sulphur dioxide everyday, according to a survey re-

According to Bangladesh Road Transport Authority (BRTA) Bangladesh had a total of about 4,25,000 vehicles till the end of 1997. Dhaka city alone had about 2,25,000 vehicles till that time.

But the number of vehicles plying in the capital city increased to about 300,000 because many vehicles enter the Dhaka city from other parts of

the country everyday. The DOE official said the main source of the pollution was some 1,95,000 defective vehicles operating in the city. Most of those vehicles emit heavy black smoke and are unfit for operation, he said.

(DMP) officials say at least 70 per cent of the total number of vehicles plying in the capital release black smoke everyday. DMP records also indicate

that the defective vehicles responsible for black smoke represent all kinds of automobiles such as car, minibus, truck, auto-tempo and motor-cycle.

US daily covered opening of BJMB prominently

The Washington Times, a prestigious US daily, has prominently covered the grand opening of the Bangabandhu Bridge over the mighty River Jamuna and highlighted the achievements of the present government in different sectors, a message received in the city yesterday said, reports BSS.

The daily gave well coverage with photographs of the father of the nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman and the magnificent bridge which not only reduced the distance between the north-western part and the rest of the country but also narrowed down the psychological barrier so long existed in the minds of people. Apart from covering the gala

opening of the bridge the daily also published on June 23 a two-page supplement in its main section marking the success of the present government. The supplement is the first-ever published in an American newspaper on an important event in Bangladesh. Messages of President Jus-

tice Shahabuddin Ahmed, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, Communications Minister Anwar Hossain and Bangladesh Ambassador to the USA KM Shehabuddin were also printed in the daily.

Manik Miah Avenue were the worst affected areas by air pollution, mainly due to emission of black smoke.

In Hatkhola and Manik Miah Avenue areas 1946.47 and 930.96 microgram per cubic meter Suspended Particulate Matter (SPM) respectively were found in the air against the permitted standard of 200 microgram per cubic meter SPM.

Similarly, 506.60 microgram per cubic meter Parts Per Million (PPM) sulphur-dioxide and 973.23 microgram per cubic metre PPM nitrogen-oxide are mixed with the air in these areas as against Bangladesh standard of 100 microgram per cubic meter PPM.

In Hatkhola and Manik Miah Avenue, according to DOE, the pollution problem had aggravated due to lack of adequate number of trees which could absorb the pollution.

However, there is a good news for the residents of Lalmatia where the presence of sulphurdioxide and nitrogen-oxide are well bellow the standard although the SPM is above the permissible limit.

The quality of sulphur-dioxide and nitrogen-oxide on an average in this area is 15.2 microgram per cubic meter PPM and 24.8 microgram per cubic metre PPM as against the permissible limit of 80 microgram per cubic metre PPM while the SPM in this area is on an average 312 microgram per cubic meter as against the standard of 200 microgram per cubic metre

According to former director general of DEO Syed ANM Wahed one of the main reasons for air pollution is the high lead content in petrol used by vehicles and sizeable quantity of unburnt fuel in motor-cycles and auto-tempos which send out carbon dioxide and carbon monoxide in the air.
