

Saifur asks Kibria to reconstruct budget

BNP leader M Saifur Rahman in Parliament yesterday asked the Finance Minister to reconstruct the national budget in a way that would create employment opportunities and remove certain inconsistencies, reports UNB.

Taking part in general discussion on the budget Saifur Rahman, however, thanked Finance Minister SAMS Kibria for pursuing the reforms programme initiated during the BNP regime.

The former Finance Minister said he thought that the budget would reflect "plutonic vision" of the government to lead the country to the 21st century.

"You could present the budget in a way which would create a politics of partnership to advance the nation towards the new century," he said. "The country is in need of partnership in politics for progress."

Saifur Rahman, the shadow finance minister of BNP, who opposed politics of violence asked the treasury benches to desist from mud slinging.

"We need to give up politics of enmity, politics of revenge. We

should rather establish politics of partnership and competition."

Pointing his finger to Kibria, he added: "If you could use the language of partnership in the budget document, we could establish constructive politics for progress which the country needs badly."

He said lack of honesty in politics would ruin the country. The trend can only be prevented if "We recognise each others' achievements and initiatives."

"You are opposition in waiting and I am the government in waiting... If we are not respectful to each other or recognise each other, the democracy will not work and the economy will not progress as well to compete in the new globalised economy."

Urging the Finance Minister to allocate an additional Tk 1000 crore to generate employment, otherwise, he said, the inflationary effect would mount a tremendous pressure on the poorer section of society.

"The inflationary pressure is already very heavy... if there is no income generating projects, the people living in villages will

lose their buying capacity."

He said some of the facts and figures in the budget document are 'fictions not facts.'

Opposing the idea of allowing black money in the stock market, the former Finance Minister said: "It's an immorality and immorality cannot be incorporated in the state policy."

He said during his tenure as finance minister there was tremendous pressure on him to do that but he succeeded in withstanding the pressure for the sake of morality.

"You can not reward the vices and penalise the virtues," Saifur said pointing to Kibria.

Opposing the fiscal policy, he said there was no option to expand the tax network, but it should be financially prudent and fiscally sound.

Commenting that the country was facing a demand depression, he said the development budget should have been increased to Tk 15000 instead of Tk 13000.

"Because of the inflationary effect and taxes on the construction materials, the actual de-

velopment programme would be reduced," he said.

To avoid the demand depression, he suggested to allocate money in income generating programmes in the rural areas as the present GDP growth was basically from the export sector and can not be called as urban growth.

Saifur urged the Finance Minister to reconsider some of the taxes to relieve the common man from undue pressure.

Commenting that there are some irrational use of supplementary taxes, he said: "Reducing 2 per cent duty on powder milk and again imposing 2 per cent supplementary tax on it is contrary to the basic philosophy of tax."

Urging the Finance Minister to reconsider restructuring tax and duty on reconstruction cars, he said: "I do not know if you have a love and hate relationship with the free market economy. But, I believe, you are believer of free market economy and if you believe that you must honour consumers' choice. You can not compel them to buy a particular car."

Govts urged to be more active against trafficking of women, children

A four-day regional conference of women activists ended in yesterday asking governments to be more active against traffickers of women and children, supporting the victims and NGOs working for their rehabilitation.

"Sexual exploitation violates the rights of anyone subjected to it, whether female or male, adult or child, from the South or North. Local and global sex industries and trafficking networks are systematically violating women's rights on a massive scale," a declaration adopted at the meeting said.

The meeting also described "sexual exploitation as a vehicle for racism... disproportionately victimising minority and third world women." "Modern communication technology, such as internet, is being misused to promote and enact mul-

multiple forms of sexual exploitations," it added.

"We are equally determined to put an end to these human scourges," Professor Aurora Javate de Dios, President of Coalition Against Trafficking of Women (CATW) told reporters at a post conference briefing on the growing cases of trafficking of women and children.

The meeting on "Organising Against Sexual Exploitation Regionally and Globally" addressed a number of issues ranging from HIV/AIDS, the need for helping their victims, usually the prostitutes and their children, Aurora said.

She said it also stressed co-ordinating the activities of the governments and the NGOs, harsher punishment against traffickers and preventing trend to ostracise women and child victims by the society.

"The growing number of women and child victims of HIV/AIDS focuses attention and demands high priority in the face of death and suffering," Aurora said.

She demanded that the governments should become firm against traffickers, pimps and others instead of victimising women, enacting or modernising laws to deal with the situation.

"We would like to see the governments create awareness among the people, particularly in the rural areas to deter the traffickers," she said on the problem.

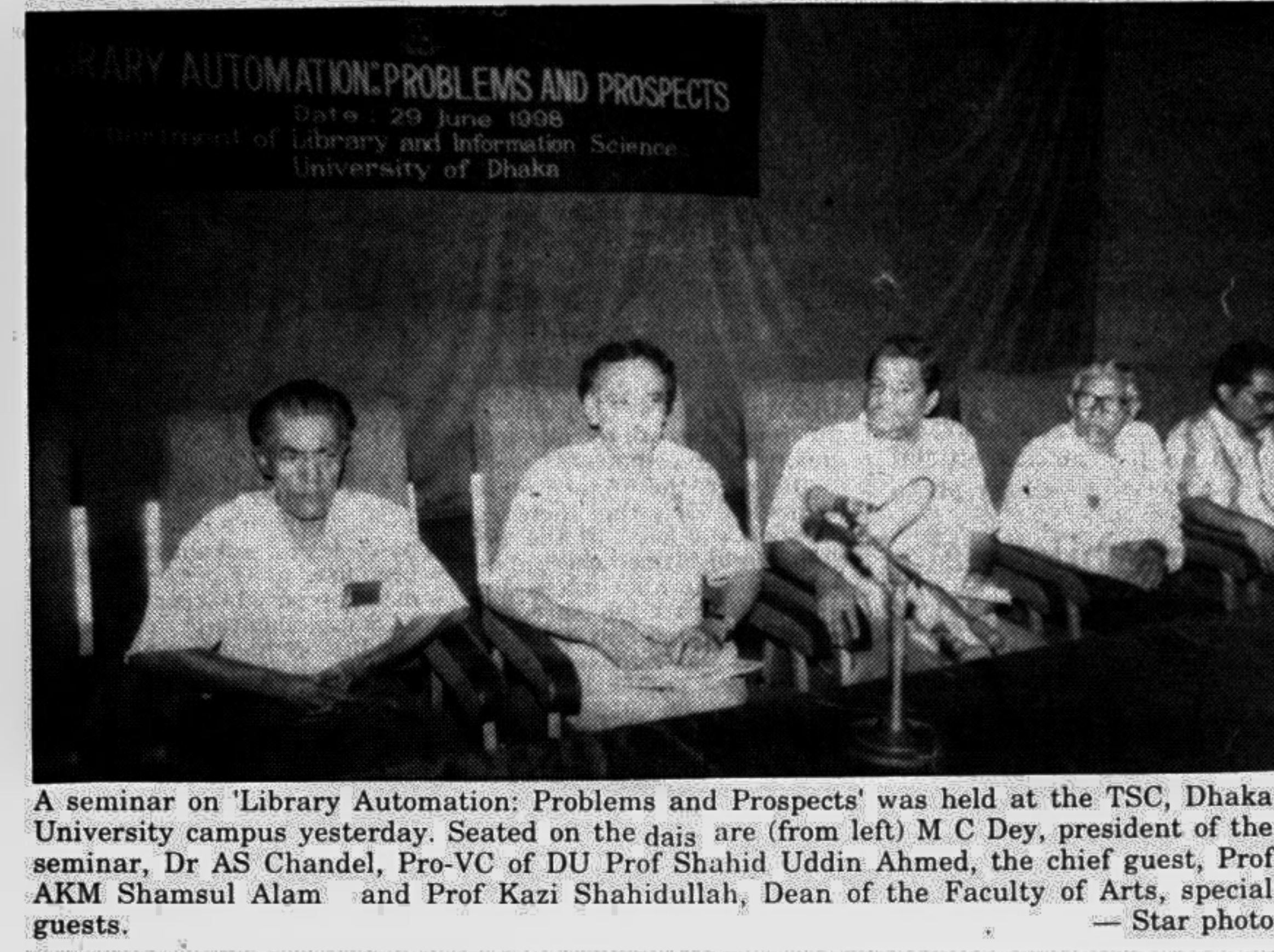
She was also critical against the governments and the health services of denying access to the prostitutes and their children.

The declaration also demanded penalising physicians

denying medical services to women and children, "that consent of the women procured for sex trafficking and prostitution should not be recognised as a defence for pimps, procurers and buyers, nor as a rationale for state-sanctioned institutionalisation of prostitution as work."

Dr Janice G Raymond, co-executive director of CATW-International said the success of the regional conference would inspire the participants of an International Conference in November in Dhaka, expected to be joined by women activists from 55 countries.

The conference was participated by activists from Bangladesh, India, Pakistan, Nepal, Sri-Lanka, Cambodia, China, Japan, Philippines, UK, Canada and USA.

A rare example in DU

Humiliated by the incident, Rahman complained against the 'arrogant' guys to their boss — Babu — the next day.

Babu, who looks after Zahurul Haq Hall on behalf of Shamim Ahmed, a well-known BCL leader controlling four dormitories, beat his disciples for harassing Rahman.

Govt, NGOs should cooperate in implementing dev programmes

Speakers at a seminar yesterday called for formation of a body comprising representatives from different segments of society to oversee whether the foreign aid is spent by the NGOs properly.

Stressing transparency, accountability and credibility in the NGO sector, they said that government and NGOs should mutually cooperate in implementing and carrying out development programmes.

Associate Professor of Political Science in Dhaka University (DU) Tasneem Siddiqui and Research Director of BISS Dr Mizan R Khan presented keynote papers in the seminar on "Sustainability of NGO Sector in Bangladesh" which was held at the BISS auditorium in the city yesterday.

Organised by BISS, the seminar was widely attended by academicians, NGO activists, development workers and businessmen with the Coordinator of Nijera Kori Khushi Kabir in the chair. Dr M M Akash and Dr Salauddin Aminuzzaman of DU took part in discussion as designated discussants.

In her paper, Tasneem Siddiqui said that the micro-credit programmes of NGOs are hardly sustainable as they survive on substantial subsidy from the foreign donors.

Pointing to lack of coordination among NGOs, she said that NGOs occasionally get involved in political activities which may make them controversial and impede their legitimacy to do development works in the minds of legislators, their own workers and clients and also among other sections of the civil society. "From programme sustainability point NGOs were not sustainable," she said.

Dr Mizan R Khan in his paper stressed on cooperation between government and NGOs and called for a policy in this regard.

Government organisations do not invite NGOs in any programme for they often think "NGOs have formed a parallel government keeping in mind of the lack of transparency of NGOs." "NGOs have been inducted in several government projects in face of pressure from the donors," he said.

In his discussion, Dr M M Akash said "NGOs are not working for poor, they are making
