ABSORBING ANECDOTES

PARIS, June 30 (Reuters): Following are facts and figures of Monday's matches at the World Cup finals:

Yugoslavia's Predrag Mijatovic became the first player to miss a regular penalty in more than eight years at World Cup finals when he blazed his spot kick against the bar against the Netherlands. Since Italy's Gianluca Vialli hit a post against the United States in 1990, 38 penalties and been awarded and all 38 had been converted. The statistics do not include shootouts.

Juergen Klinsmann's goal against Mexico was his third in the tournament and his 11th altogether in World Cup finals. He is now joint fourth top scorer with Sandor Kocsis of Hungary. The only other players to score more are Gerd Mueller (Germany) 14, Just Fontaine (France) 13 and Pele (Brazil) 12. Klinsmann has scored in seven of Germany's last nine matches in the finals.

Dennis Bergkamp scored his second goal of the tournament to equal the Dutch international record of 35 set by Faas Wilkes more than 35 years ago. Bergkamp has scored in five of the Netherlands' last seven games in finals.

Germany reached the last eight of the World Cup for the fifth time in succession when they beat Mexico 2-1. The Germans have lost only one of their last 16 matches at World Cup finals — to Bulgaria in the 1994 quarterfinals.

Mexico have been eliminated by the Germans three times in the last 20 years. Apart from 1986 and 1998, they were hammered 6-0 in the 1978 tournament.

DOMINIC'S DIARY

MEXICO VS GERMANY: 1-2

There was an overwhelming sense of inevitability about this game. No matter how much the Central Americans scamped about the pitch, they were not going to escape the Deutsch storm. Even when the Mexicans were one up with twenty minutes to go, I didn't think they would win. And neither did they judging from the stupefied look on the face of Luis Hernandez when he found himself unmarked in the penalty area and gently passed the ball into the arms of the grateful German goalie.

Many thought that the Germans would pay for picking such an elderly squad. However, this wealth of experience has proved priceless. When their backs were against the wall, it was the ageing stars such as Juergen Klinsmann and Lothar Matthaus who inspired the Germans to raise their game. Instead of losing their heads as a less seasoned side would've done, they went about their comeback with a confidence in their own ability that bordered on arrogance. Nevertheless, their comeback may be the only thing that Mexico let the game slip through their hands because they showed the Germans too much respect. However, the other teams left in the competition will not do this: if the Italy or Holland go one up against the Germans, they will not allow them the time and space to muster a recovery.

In football, there is a time for patience and poise and there is a time for urgency and risk-taking. The Germans are well capable of doing the former, but

I doubt whether they are hungry enough to do the latter.

DS Man of the Match: I thought veterans Klinsmann and Matthaus would flop in France, but I have to give credit where credit is due.

HOLLAND VS YUGOSLAVIA: 2-1

Marc Overmars and Dennis Bergkamp have taken much of their time in the English Premiership. It has added a necessary rough edge to their polished game. It has given a bite to their bark. Bergkamp's goal reflected this. All those cold and windy afternoons he has spent brawling with aggressive English centrehalves helped him keep his balance and his nerve to slot the ball home.

When Jaap Stam tried to undress a Yugoslavian in the penalty area, the Balkan side were presented with an opening to go into the lead. Of all people I thought Predrag Mijatovic would make sure of it. But he didn't. And in the dying seconds, a half-chance fell to the tigerish Edgar Davids, a man who doesn't let such opportunities pass him by.

DS Man of the Match: In phases Holland carved out opportunities with such ease that they look inevitable. Yet at other times they appeared smug, tending to pass themselves into trouble. What holds them together is Ronald De Boer who, in my humble opinion, is the most complete footballer in the world. Admiring Ronaldo is a common, trite characteristic, like enjoying commercial chart music or square dancing. Admiring Ronald is a mark of higher sensibility, like appreciating opera or ballet.

Rafique restricts MCC

Brilliant spin bowling by Bangladesh restricted Marylebone Cricket Club (MCC) to 262 for nine at the end of the first day of the three-day match at the Wilf Slack Memorial ground in London on Monday, according to a faxed message received here yesterday.

Electing to bat first after winning the toss, the home side's dream of collecting a big total was dashed by Mohammad Rafique. Tanveer Khan and Naimur Rahman who shared seven wickets among themselves.

Left-arm spinner Mohammad Rafique, who ripped through the MCC top-order, was the most successful capturing four wickets for 71 runs in 26 overs. Rafique's first victim was Zimbabwean opener Grant Flower who was out for 30 giving a catch to Naimur. He then took three more including the prized wicket of one-down J Wileman who hammered the highest 61 runs for the home side.

Rafique apart, leg-spinner Tanveer bagged two wickets for 37 runs while Naimur got one wicket for 42 runs. Besides, medium pacer Shafiqul Ahmed grabbed two wickets for 48 runs from his 14 overs.

MCC fielded as many as four foreigners including Grant Flower and his teammate A Whithall. The other two are South African A Lawson and West Indian fast bowler Reon King who visited Bangladesh with the West Indies under-19 team in 1996.

Watch it on big screen

Good news for city's avid football fans who are tired of watching the World Cup matches on tiny television screens.

The giant screen has arrived, thanks to the joint efforts of the Embassies of France and Germany, who in collaboration with Alliance Francaise de Dhaka and the extended cooperation from the Ministry of Youth and Sports, installed a big screen at the gymnasium of the National Sports Council.

The big screen, promised to offer quality picture and sound, will cover eight matches including the grand final on July 12. The live coverage will commence from July 3.

Admission fees for the first seven matches, four quarter-finals, two semifinals and the third place decider — have been fixed at Taka 10 while for the July 12 final, it will be Taka 30. Tickets will be available at Alliance Francaise de Dhaka, Aredit Agricole Indosuez at Motijheel and at the NSC on the day of projection.

Meanwhile, in a press briefing arranged in this connection yesterday, French ambassador Mrs Renee Veyret and German ambassador Uwe Schramm said they have taken the plan with the idea to take the TV viewers of Dhaka closer to the ambience of the World Cup football.

PARIS, June 30 (AFP/ Internet): Some interesting snippets from the World Cup:

Argentine's coach Daniel Passarella doesn't tolerate long hair, jewellery or homosexuality in his team.

So he might be alarmed to hear that one of his players faced a curious dilemma going into Tuesday's crunch match against England.

The unnamed player is a big fan of England midfielder David Beckham.

Such is his admiration for the Manchester United star that an Argentine rival was overheard to say: "He's so good looking I won't know whether to kick him or kiss him."

CESAR CAN PLAY WITH HIS EYES CLOSED

Brazil's goalscoring midfielder Cesar Sampaio revealed a little secret on Tuesday — he can play with his eyes closed.

"During the Brazil v Chile match, I scored with my eyes closed in the 11th minute.

"When Dunga hit the free kick, I headed the ball without looking at it for fear of it hitting me right in the face," he explained.

ASIANS CLEAN UP

Stadium officials were sad to see Japan and South Korea go home after their first-round knockout.

Fans of both teams brought plastic bags with them to matches which they waved enthusiastically before using them at the end to put their litter in.

"They leave their section of the ground cleaner than it was when they arrived," said FIFA spokesman Keith Cooper admiringly.

He surmised that some En-

glish fans would probably dump the bags in people's gardens.

PRINCE ALBERT LOSES HIS SHIRT

Prince Albert of Monaco, who watched the France match against Denmark in Lyon last week, lost his luggage after an overnight stay in the French city, police said.

Three suitcases belonging to the prince and his entourage vanished without trace from the lobby of the deluxe Grand Hotel. Prince Albert has filed a complaint with local police. The value of the missing property was not disclosed.

BILL CLINTON BACKS BRAZIL

US President Bill Clinton is backing Brazil to win the World Cup. Clinton, who jogs and plays gold, is passionate about basketball and loves to watch a game of baseball or American football.

But he admits he knows very little about soccer.

So when a Chinese fan put him on the spot during his presidential visit to China, Clinton played safe and backed the four-time champions.

During a radio phone-in show in Shanghai, Clinton said: "I am not an expert on soccer, but I think the Brazilians are always hard to beat."

LOST IN TRANSLATION

Something got lost in translation at a press conference by England coach Glenn Hoddle when he revealed that England would be wearing all-white kit for their match against Argentina, just as they did when the two met in 1966.

An interpreter caused some

consternation among Argentine journalists by informing them that Hoddle had said England would not swap shirts at the end of the game.

An Italian journalist pointed out Hoddle had said something completely different.

IORDANESCU TO EARN ANOTHER STAR

Romania coach Anghel Iordanescu, named a one-star general following Romania's quarter-final spot at USA 94, is set to become a two-star general because of further success at this World Cup.

CHARITY TO BENEFIT FROM ALL-STAR SELECTION

FIFA's technical study group is already mulling over its all-star tournament selection with finalists selected on the basis of the first 56 of the 64 matches.

The final selection of 16 players will be made after the semi-finals at a gala dinner in Paris on July 10.

On behalf of those selected, official sponsor Mastercard will donate 50,000 dollars to FIFA's charity SOS Children's Villages.

ENGLAND THE FAIREST

England is the fairest one of all in this World Cup.

The English team leads the competition for the FIFA Fair Play Award, FIFA spokesman Keith Cooper said.

Norway and Yugoslavia are tied for second place.

Since the Fair Play Award was set up in 1978, Brazil has won it three times (1982, 1986 and 1994), England won in 1990 and Argentina in 1978.

Rafter fails, Sampras sails

LONDON, June 30: US Open champion Pat Rafter was ousted in the fourth round at Wimbledon by local favourite Tim Henman on Monday while world number one Pete Sampras led by example as a posse of seeds advanced, reports Reuters.

Rain again stole a two and a half-hour chunk out of the All-England Club schedule but the seeds on show took it in their stride.

A packed Centre Court crowd rose in their seats as 12th seed Henman applied the killer blow to finish off sixth seeded Rafter 6-3, 6-7, 6-3, 6-2 to make the quarterfinals for the third consecutive year.

He next meets third seed Petr Korda who ousted John van Lotum 6-3, 6-4, 7-6 in the fading light.

Defending champion Sampras charged into the fourth round after a faultless display on Centre Court.

The top seed brushed aside 17th ranked Swede Thomas Enqvist 6-3, 7-6, 7-6 in a match carried over from Friday.

He now meets Sebastien Grosjean of France who upset Spain's Felix Mantilla in straight sets.

Mantilla was one of the rate seeded casualties although his 6-0, 7-6, 6-2 defeat came as no real surprise.

The Spaniard's seeding of a 16 was based on a world ranking of 11 which is almost entirely underpinned by his prowess on clay courts.

In the women's draw second seed Lindsay Davenport wasted no time in destroying Spain's Magu Serna 6-1, 6-0, while Monica Seles justified her sixth seeding by comprehensively beating French 14th seed Sandrine Testud.

The American was runner-up in the French Open earlier this month and continued her resurgence by winning 6-3, 6-2 on a day of few upsets.

Men's 14th seed Goran Ivanisevic recaptured the form that saw him reach the final here twice in the early 1990s beating Daniel Vacek for his 500th career win.

The personable Croat is having fun again. It shows and after defeating the Czech 6-7, 7-6, 6-3, 6-4 to book his last 16.

Ninth seed Richard Krajicek, champion in 1996, eased

through against German Nicolas Kiefer in three tight sets.

The Dutchman, many pundits favourite for the title here, won 6-4, 7-6, 7-6 on court one.

WIMBLEDON, England, June 30: Defending champion Martina Hingis and last year's runner-up, Jana Novotna, eased into the Wimbledon quarterfinals Tuesday with straight-set victories, reports AP.

The top-seeded Hingis beat Thailand's Tamarine Tanasugarn 6-3, 6-2, while No. 3 Novotna downed No. 10 Irina Spirlea 6-2, 6-3.
