Round-8 draw held

Henman reaches last four

LONDON, July 2: Tim Henman lifted English spirits on Wednesday by crossing Petr Korda at Wimbledon, to become the first British man in 25 years to claim a semifinal place at the championships, reports Reuters.

The 12th seed helped lift a nation depressed by the national side's soccer World Cup elimination at the hands of Argentina on Tuesday, by defeating Australian Open champion and world number three Korda 6-3, 6-4, 6-2 on Centre Court.

Henman, the first British man to reach the last four since Roger Taylor in 1973, now faces world number one and top seed Pete Sampras.

Sampras, champion here in four of the last five years, hammered Australia's Mark Philippoussis in straight sets 7-6, 6-4, 6-4.

The bottom half of the draw sees twice finalist Goran Ivanisevic meet 1996 champion and ninth seed Richard Krajacek.

Croat 14th seed Ivanisevic needed three tie-breaks to defeat Dutchman Jan Siemerink while Krajacek cruised into the semis with a straight sets victory over Italy's Davide Sanguinetti, ranked 65 in the world.

The Dutchman defied the effects of a knee injury to defeat the Italian 6-2, 6-3, 6-4.

In the women's draw second seed Lindsay Davenport and sentimental favourite Monica Seles fell by the wayside, handing unexpected semifinal places to Nathalie Tauziat and Natasha Zvereva.

France's Tauziat, the 16th seed, and Zvereva of Belarus, beat their highly fancied opponents in straight sets to earn a shot at Saturday's final.

In the top half of the draw, defending champion Martina Hingis resisted a gallant fight-back by French Open champion Arantxa Sanchez-Vicario, the fifth seed, to move through 6-3, 6-6, 6-3.

Hingis will meet Jana Novotna in the other semifinal after the third seed Czech beat 18-year-old Venus Williams in straight sets in an emotion-charged match on Centre Court.

Williams, the seventh seed, Seles, the sixth seed, has lifted nine Grand Slam trophies but walked away from Wimbledon for the sixth time without the prized trophy after falling 7-6, 6-2 to Zvereva, the world number 22.

"It's terrible... I just don't know what really happened," she said. "Even on bad days you've got to win the match and today I didn't have that in me."

Zvereva, who beat Steffi Graf in the third round, reached her first Grand Slam semifinal since making the final of French Open final in 1988, credited her victory to her baseline dominance.

"If I carry on like I did today I have a really good chance," the 27-year-old from Minsk added.

Hingis, the top seed, survived her toughest encounter yet after progressing through to the quarterfinals without dropping a set, beating Vicario in an entertaining baseline duel.

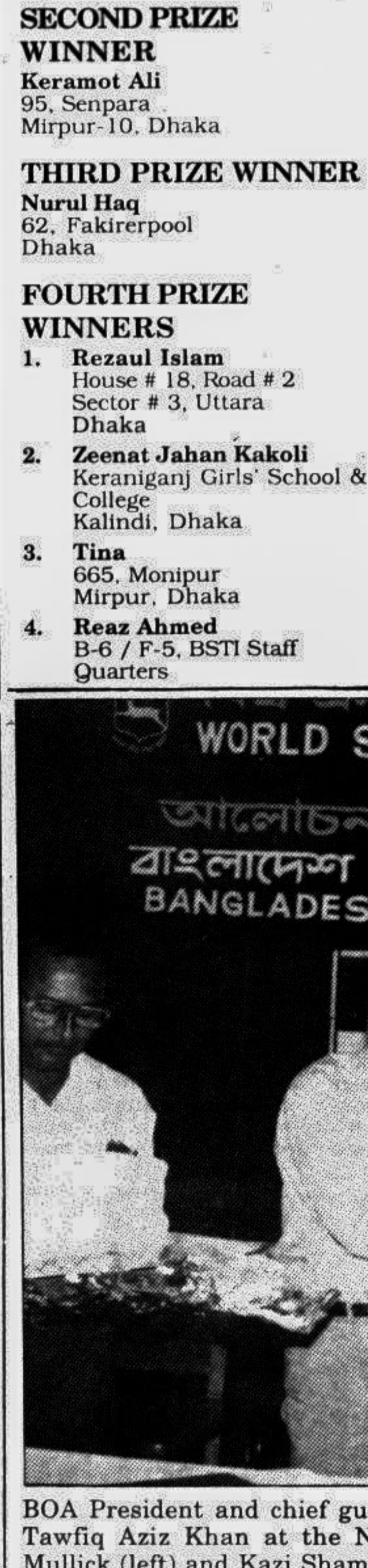

SL down India

COLOMBO, July 2: India went down to Sri Lanka by eight runs in a rain affected but thrilling encounter in their triangular one-day international here Wednesday, reports AP.

Chasing a target of 172 in 36 overs, India were all out for 163 with two balls remaining after producing 41 runs in the first six overs and appearing set for a cruise to victory.

India had to make 10 runs in the last over with three wickets in hand.

But left-arm spinner Sanath Jayasuriya struck thrice in four balls to give Sri Lanka a win, which put them on top of the points table.

WORLD CUP WITHDRAWAL

There were no games on last night and I didn't know what to do with myself. In the last three weeks I watched 55 matches, amounting to over 5000 minutes of play. So consumed by events in France, I have forgotten that there is life beyond football.

These rest days have served as an ominous harbinger of the emptiness I will feel when the final whistle goes. A huge whole will be left when it is all over. I will be totally distraught. My existence will be devoid of meaning.

I will have to write to Mita and consult her advice on what to do about World Cup withdrawal. The symptoms are absurd. My body-clock is synchronised to a European time zone. My concentration span is limited to 45 minute periods. I am obsessively humming the theme from the Pedrollo pump commercial. I woke up screaming last night after having a nightmare about David Beckham emerging from my stomach a la Aliens.

Match against MCC drawn

Rain interrupted three-day match between touring Bangladesh and Marylebone Cricket Club (MCC) ended in a draw at Wilf Slack Memorial Ground in London on Wednesday, reports UNB.

Bangladesh were all out for only 118 runs in 60.1 overs in their first innings on the third day. Two openers Athar Ali and Azam Iqbal had a 50-run partnership but other top-order batsmen failed to reach a respectable score.

Opening bowler Francis claimed 4 wickets, giving away only 21 runs in his 10.1 overs. Another new-ball bowler King took two wickets for 10 runs in 9 overs and Zimbabwean Andy Whittall two for 31 runs in 18 overs.

Earlier, MCC scored 262 runs for 9 in 89 overs on the opening day on Monday. Second day's play was washed out without a ball being bowled.

The Bangladesh team arrived in Scotland yesterday to play Cairns Trophy one-day series against the hosts with the first match scheduled for Saturday. They will also play a three-day match against Scotland on Tuesday.

Two matches will be held on the inaugural day. Khulna will meet Rajbari at the Khulna District Stadium and Mymensingh DSA will take on BKSP at the Divisional Stadium.

Boycott back in business

LONDON, July 2: Geoffrey Boycott returns to the BBC commentary team today after an assault conviction, since set aside, saw him dropped earlier this year, reports AP.

The 58-year-old Yorkshire cricket legend was convicted in a French court in his absence after ex-lover Margaret Moore claimed he had assaulted her in a hotel room. Boycott offered to take a lie detector test after the court case in January to prove his innocence.

The court case resulted in a three-month suspended sentence and a 5,100-pound fine. The BBC decided to drop him from coverage of the Test series against the West Indies.

The former Test batting star will broadcast as part of the live television coverage of the third Test match between England and South Africa at Old Trafford.
