#### Child murder Police yet to ascertain motive

The grand mother of Naim -the seven year old child allegedly slaughtered by his mother on Thursday, and a maid at their flat, gave judicial statements before the Chief Metropolitan Magistrate's Court yesterday.

Naim's mother Nargis allegedly slaughtered him and then tried to commit suicide by stabbing in her throat with a kitchen knife at their flat in North Kamalapur in the city.

Nargis, wife of Abul Hasan, was now at Dhaka Medical College Hospital under police custody. Her condition remained critical till last night.

DB police were yet to ascertain the motive behind the killing. DB sources said adding that Nargis had been mentally depressed for the last few

months. DB was now investigating if any third party was involved in the incident. The kitchen knife allegedly used in the killing was sent to finger print experts.

#### Gujral's statement misleading: BNP

BNP secretary general Abdul Mannan Bhuiyan yesterday protested the remark of former Indian Prime Minister IK Gujral that BNP Chairperson Begum Khaleda Zia had expressed satisfaction over the Ganges water sharing treaty, reports

The BNP secretary general termed such statement as misleading.

Guiral, who recently visited Dhaka and held talks with Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina. Leader of the Opposition Begum Khaleda Zia and former President HM Ershad, reportedly told BBC that the Bangladeshi leaders had expressed their sat: isfaction over the water treaty.

The 30-year Ganges water sharing treaty was signed in the Indian capital of New Delhi on December 12, 1996.

Referring to the meeting between Gujral and Begum Zia. Mannan Bhuiyan said that Begum Zia told Gujral that by signing the treaty Bangladesh's due share was sacrificed and the country was now incurring losses.

The BNP chief also told him that the people of Bangladesh had rejected this unequal water treaty as the country's interest was sacrificed by this accord.

After signing the treaty, Bhuiyan said that BNP had staged demonstrations protesting the treaty, which was published in different newspapers both at home and abroad. BNP is still protesting the treaty through various political programmes.

#### BCL, Shibir activists clash in Ctg Jail

#### Meghnaghat power project

#### Final negotiations with **AES resume July 8**

The Power Development Board (PDB) is at last going to hold the final negotiations with US company AES over the 300 MW-450 MW Meghnaghat private sector power scheme from July 8. breaking a year-old deadlock, sources said.

The Energy Ministry has taken another step to end stagnation in another private sector scheme led by AES, the Haripur 350 MW power plant. An inter-ministerial meeting on the scheme was held on Wednesday to resolve some technical and tax related issues. Recommendations of this meeting will be sent to the Prime Minister's office.

Another 100 MW power pro-ject in Baghabari led by British company Midland Power has become uncertain. PDB, which was supposed to provide a certain site for the proposed plant. has declined to provide that. Now the authorities are offering a different site located about

one kilometre away from the original.

Midland Power is saying that it can not proceed with the original financial and technical plans as the whole configuration of the project now requires to be changed. All the private sector power

schemes, including the Meghnaghat project, have fallen more than one year behind schedule and the country is already running the risk of facing a constant load-shedding of 500 MW daily from the year 2000. The Meghnaghat scheme was

delayed because of disagreements between AES and the negotiators-PDB over the initial operation period, technical details of the proposed plant and finally, the brand of the machinery. As per the PDB's recommen-

Inter-city passenger train Padma Express will start from Rajshahi at 6:00 am for a fivehour journey to Bangabandhu East Station at Ibrahimabad. about 110 km from Dhaka. The train will return from there at

noon, Railway officials said. The Dhaka-bound passenger, however, will have to take bus from the station to reach the capital.

"A selected number of buses will be available at Bangabandhu East Station for the Dhaka-bound passengers of Padma Express," a Railway official said. But BR will have no direct involvement in this, he added.

"We plan to operate one pair of trains in the route for the timebeing," said another source, adding that some more passenger trains and freight trains would be operated later.

Meanwhile, the authorities have already undertaken certain measures for passenger safety when train crosses the bridge, Railway officials said.

"Instructions for passenger safety will be written in each compartment of the express train," director general of Bangladesh Railway Atikul Husain Khan, told The Daily Star. Steward will make sure that the safety instructions are strictly followed, he added.

World Bank has submitted to the government a 27-year project (1998-2025) for sustainable rural development strategy to build up a food security system in the country, reports UNB.

A six-member delegation of the Bank, led by its Director of Rural Development Alex Mc-Calla, submitted the project proposal to LGRD and Coopera-tives Minister Zillur Rahman at his office in the city yester-

The delegation said WB would provide financial, institutional and technological assistance in implementing a long-term rural development strategy to build up a strong ru-ral infrastructure, development on agriculture and irrigation system, and for procurement, supply, preservation and mar-keting of cooperatives-based agricultural products.

### Italy out of race

ST DENIS (France), July 3: France beat Italy 4-3 in a penalty shoot-out here today to book their place in the World Cup semi-finals, reports AFP. France will play the winner of Saturday's Germany-Croatia

quarter-final match. France won the shoot-out when Luigi di Biagio fired his attempt off the bar.

There was little hint that the match would go to a penalty shoot-out when, in a pulsating start, Zidane blazed a half-volley from Emmanuel Petit's corner over the bar and then raked a low drive just wide of Gianluca Pagliuca's far post.

Seconds later, Emmanuel Petit sent in an overhead kick which the Italy keeper palmed



over at full stretch and lone striker Stephane Guivarch'h volleyed in Didier Deschamps' cross from the narrowest of an-

It was one-way traffic, but Italy nearly stole the lead after eight minutes when Francesco Moriero chipped over a cross for Christian Vieri, only for the tournament's joint top scorer to

send his header wide. France immediately wrested back control, with Zidane and Djorkaeff probing an unsettled Italian defence, while Italy's rejigged midfield failed to make

normal rainfall in June, the month when monsoon starts. the data compiled by the Meteorological Department shows.

This abnormally poor rainfall during the month of June can well be attributed to a number of reasons, said senior meteorologist Sajedur Rahman.

The appearance of a powerful cyclone in the Arabian Sea, which ran havoc on the Gujrat

coast of India, is one such rea-

laying the arrival of monsoon, which usually gets set on the tenth of June, he said. There had been less rain-bearing activities in the Bay of Bengal due to the affect of the cyclone.

Around mid-June a depression in the Bay of Bengal moved towards the Orissa coast, sweeping away with it the rains towards north-west India.

Finally, a strong presence of Tibetan anti-cyclone pressure,

Bangladesh at 10,000 feet and above the surface. Because of its strong influ-

ence, the southerly current of south-westerly monsoon could not enter the mainland Bangladesh, deflecting to the north-west, towards India. In the lower part of the at-
