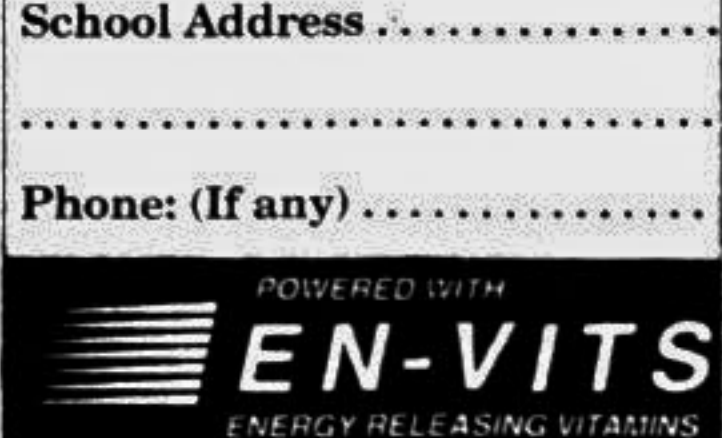

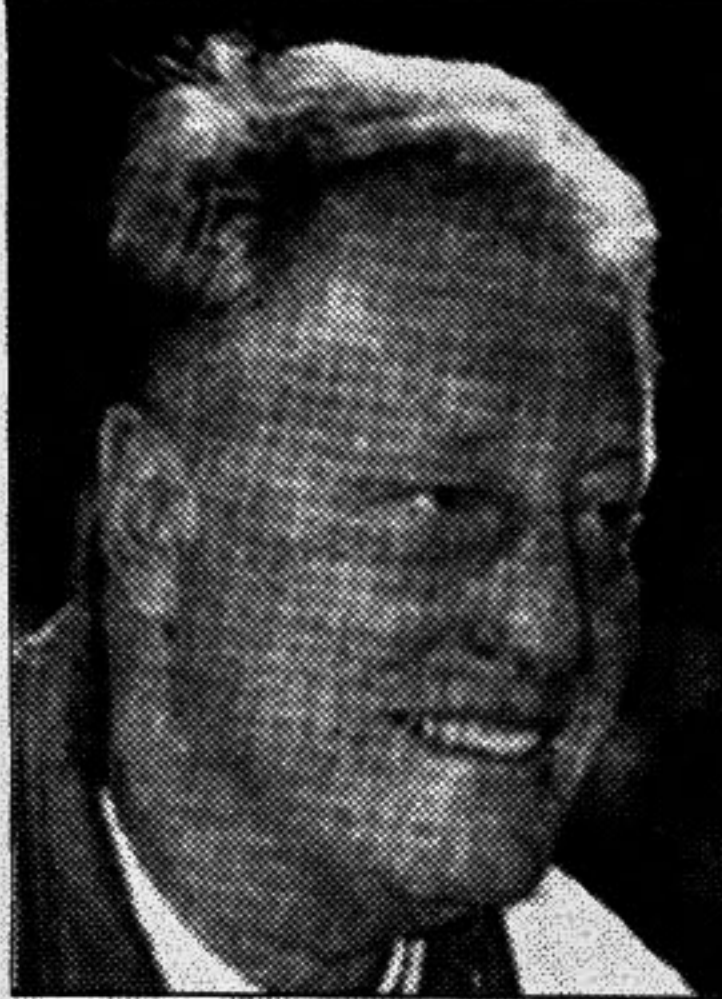

ABSORBING ANECDOTES

PARIS, July 4 (Reuters): Facts and figures of Friday's World Cup quarterfinals:

Italy were knocked out of their third successive World Cup finals on penalties when they went down 4-3 to France in a shootout following a 0-0 draw. They lost 3-2 to Brazil in a shootout at the end of the 1994 final, another 0-0 draw, and went down 4-3 to Argentina in the 1990 final after a 1-1 tie.

Italy missed seven penalties out of 15 in these three shootouts — almost half. Roberto Donadoni and Aldo Serena missed in 1990. Franco Baresi, Daniele Massaro and Roberto Baggio failed in 1994 and Demetrio Albertini and Luigi Di Biagio were the unlucky ones this time.

France have reached the semifinals of the last three World Cup tournaments they have played in. They got into the last four in 1982 and 1986 but failed to qualify for the next two World Cup finals. They have never reached the final.

The French scored only one goal in almost four hours play in their second round and quarterfinal matches — Laurent Blanc's 114th minute Golden Goal which gave them a 1-0 win against Paraguay in the last 16.

Martin Jorgensen of Denmark scored the 150th goal of the World Cup finals with his second-minute effort in the 3-2 defeat to Brazil.

Denmark had never before lost an international in which Brian Laudrup had scored. The younger Laudrup netted his side's second to equalise at 2-2 before Rivaldo grabbed the winner.

Peter Schmeichel set a Danish record of 105 caps against Brazil. Michael Laudrup was appearing in his 104th and last before retiring from professional soccer.

Denmark have never failed to score in a World Cup final match. They netted 10 in four games at their only previous appearance in 1986 and nine in five matches in France.

Brazil have kept only one clean sheet in their five matches at the finals — their 3-0 group win over Morocco. Two teams have scored twice against them, both Scandinavian. Before Denmark, it was Norway who put two past the South Americans in an upset 2-1 victory.

Of the 14 World Cup finals penalty shootouts, only two have ever passed the regulation 10 shots — the first such decider in 1982 when (West) Germany beat France 5-4 and the 1994 quarterfinal when Sweden beat Romania 5-4. In both cases, 12 shots were taken.

Surrey stay on top

LONDON, July 4: Leg spinner Ian Salisbury took seven for 45 as Surrey consolidated their lead at the top of the county championship with a six-wicket win inside three days over champions Glamorgan on Friday, reports Reuters.

After Salisbury had wreaked havoc in Glamorgan's second innings total of 212, Alastair Brown scored 100 to pilot Surrey to a comfortable win.

Phil Simmons also took seven wickets a career best 7-49 in Leicestershire's innings and 103-run win over Durham. The West Indies Test player polished off Durham's first innings with four wickets inning balls.

Leicestershire's spinners completed the rout. Crowe and Matthew Brimcom each taking three wickets to help dismiss Durham second time around for 177.

Nottinghamshire, beaten in five of their first eight championship games, reversed that trend with a welcome innings and 92-run victory over Middlesex at Trent Bridge.

All-rounder Paul Franks did the damage with career-best figures of 5-58 in 14 overs. Middlesex collapsing to 123 all out.

Derbyshire, routed for just 70 in their first innings, completed an emphatic 181-run triumph over Essex who were all out before lunch for 143.

Seamer Trevor Smith took 6-32 in only his second first class game to finish with 10 wickets in the match. The Kent have a total of 24 goals into the final day of their game with Yorkshire thanks to opener David Fulton's 142 not out in their second innings total of 332-4.

Pete, Goran reach final

LONDON, July 4: World number one Pete Sampras fought off a spirited challenge from Tim Henman on Friday to join Goran Ivanisevic in the Wimbledon men's singles final, reports Reuters.

The top seed beat Henman — the first Briton to reach the men's semis in 25 years — 6-3, 4-6, 7-5, 6-3 and now seeks his fifth title in six years here.

Earlier, Ivanisevic survived an attack of nerves to win a thrilling five-set marathon 6-3, 6-4, 5-7, 6-7, 15-13, against 1996 champion Richard Krajicek.

A patriotic Centre Court crowd roared Henman's every shot but, although he took a set off Sampras for the first time this tournament, he could not keep the defending champion at bay.

After coasting through the first set Sampras suddenly ran into trouble with Henman stroking winners almost at will.

The 12th seed broke Sampras twice in the second set to win it 6-4.

A see-saw third set saw Henman hold break points in each of Sampras' service games but he was unable to convert and a volley into the net at 5-6 handed Sampras the set.

ITALY VS FRANCE: 0-0
 (France win 4-3 on penalties)

The two best defences in the world basically cancelled each other out. The game could have gone on forever and no one would've scored. The two teams were so focused on getting a result that the emphasis was more on not slipping up at the back and less on creating opportunities up front.

The match was a nightmare for playmakers. For the French, Zinedine Zidane and Youri Djorkaeff ran around like headless chickens to no avail. Italian golden boy Alessandro Del Piero was conspicuous by his anonymity. And Roberto Baggio... who?

The Lillan Thuram and Paulo Maldini duel was the most interesting thing about this game. Although the Past Master Maldini can pass the ball better, the younger, fitter Thuram looked like he had the edge as the game went on.

Why on earth did Aime Jacquet let the nauseated looking Bixente Lizarazu take a penalty? He looked more likely to vomit than convert his kick.

DS Man of the Match: If it wasn't for Alessandro Costacurta's timely interceptions and tactical mindfulness, the French would've wrapped up the game well before extra-time.

BRAZIL VS DENMARK: 3-2

Though they work hard for each other, without the Laudrup brothers, the Danes would be... Michael Laudrup is a wily old fox. Though he is now at the end of his international career, he still had the awareness to exploit a momentary lapse in Brazilian concentration.

And there are few players in the world as dazzling with the ball at their feet as Brian Laudrup.

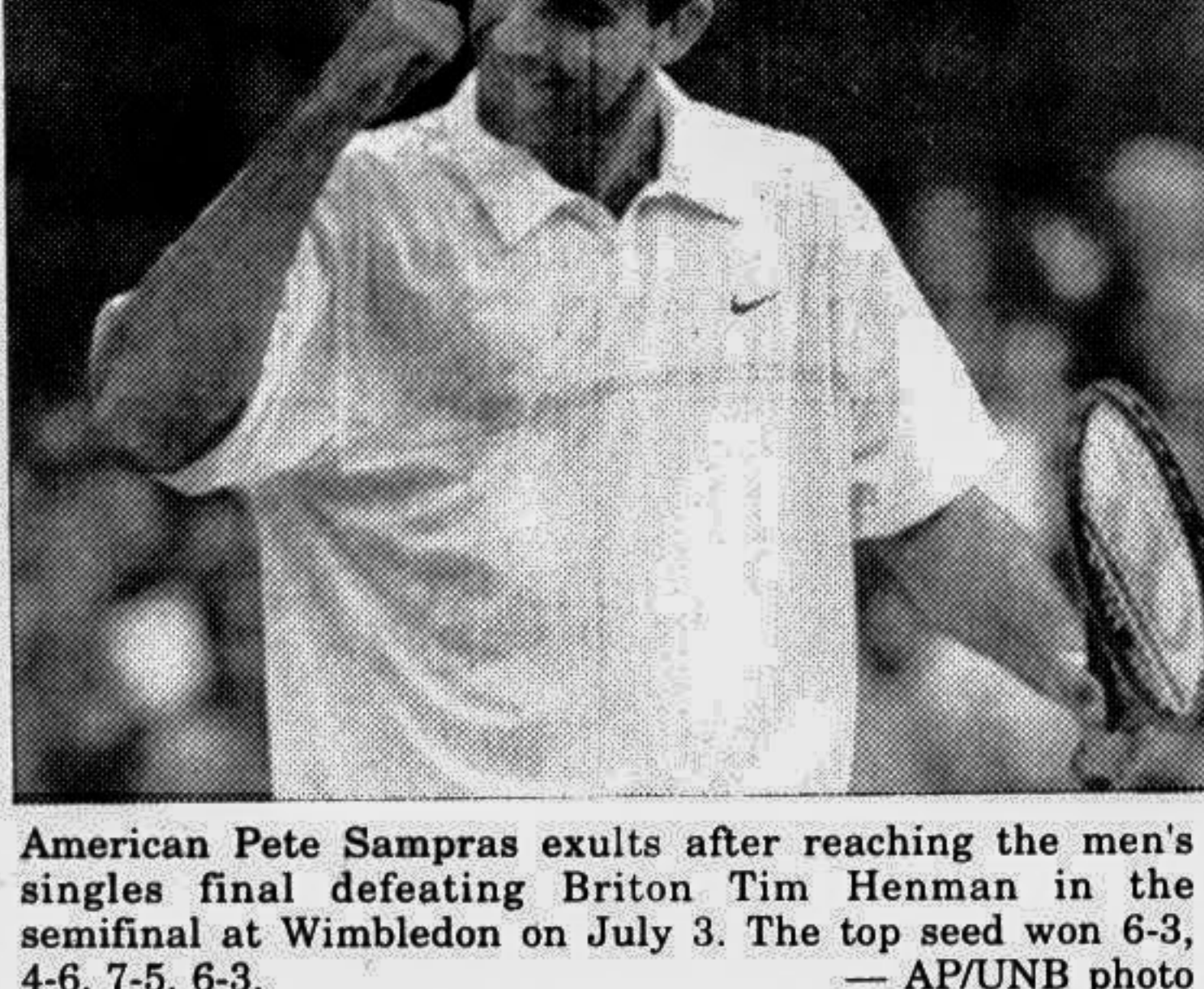
Brazil showed that they can easily step up a gear but are too quick to take their foot off the accelerator. They are clearly less able to put their foot on the ball and control the rhythm of a match than Brazilian teams of old. Their taste for histrionics hinders their digestion of more mundane tasks. A prime example of this is Roberto Carlos.

The man widely acclaimed as the best left-back in the world had an embarrassing evening. His attempt to fire one of his trademark fifty yard thunder freekicks was farcical, the run-up was so long that he looked fatigued by the time he reached the ball and fluffed his shot. Later, he should have been sent off for a vicious two-footed tackle from behind on Brian Laudrup. Soon after that, he failed to execute a spectacular overhead bicycle kick clearance. The ball fell invitingly into the path of Brian Laudrup and natural justice was served.

It was the less celebrated players in the Brazilian team who impressed the most. Dunga excelled in his plugging role and his distribution was first class. Junior Baiano produced a more controlled performance. But Brazilian defensive concerns will not be eased because Calu, foolishly booked for time-wasting, is suspended for the semifinal.

DS Man of the Match: Rivaldo's two goals were things of beauty. The first, a delectable flick under pressure. The second, an exquisitely angled left foot drive following a deceptive meander from midfield.

Gary grinds down English hopes



MANCHESTER, England, July 4: Gary Kirsten ended any England victory hopes with a record-breaking 210 as South Africa reached 487 for four at close in the third Test at Old Trafford on Friday, reports Reuters.

Resuming on the second day at 237 for one wicket with Kirsten on 98 and Jacques Kallis on 117, South Africa remorselessly ground the tiring England attack into near submission.

Just three wickets fell all day, captain Hansie Cronje was 27 not out at the close with Jonty Rhodes on 12.

Kirsten posted South Africa's highest individual Test score since their readmission to world cricket in April 1992 when he passed Andrew Hudson's 163 made in the one-off Test against the West Indies in Barbados.

On a day of records, Kirsten, installed himself at the top of the list of 'long innings' for his country, passing the 575 minutes Jackie McGlew took to score 105 against Australia in Durban in 1957/58.

By the time Kirsten was caught by Alec Stewart off Angus Fraser, his innings had lasted 650 minutes in which he faced 525 balls and hit 24 boundaries with one six a top-edged hook off the persevering Dominic Cork.

Afterwards Kirsten made light of his heroic innings.

"When I got to 30 on the first day I knew the wicket didn't suit me so I just decided to try and hang in there. It was probably my worst Test innings ever," he joked.

"Then he became serious. The century is dedicated to

older brother) Peter, as all my hundreds are. He never had the opportunities at Test level that I've had. He was a great player," Kirsten said.

It was only his country's ninth double century in Tests with only seven men reaching the landmark. Graeme Pollock and Dudley Nourse each have two.

After a miserable opening day for England on which just one wicket fell, the home side were forced to wait five hours and 57 minutes for their second when Darren Gough produced a magnificent delivery which straightened past the outside edge to bowl Kallis for 132.

Kallis' innings, his second Test century, was scored from 266 balls with 16 boundaries.

The stand of 238 between Kallis and Kirsten, teammates at Western province, comfortably passed the previous highest stand for South Africa in seven Tests at Old Trafford of 171 scored by Johnnie Waite and Paul Winslow for the sixth

third Test between England and South Africa at Old Trafford on Friday.
