**Comilla reach last four**

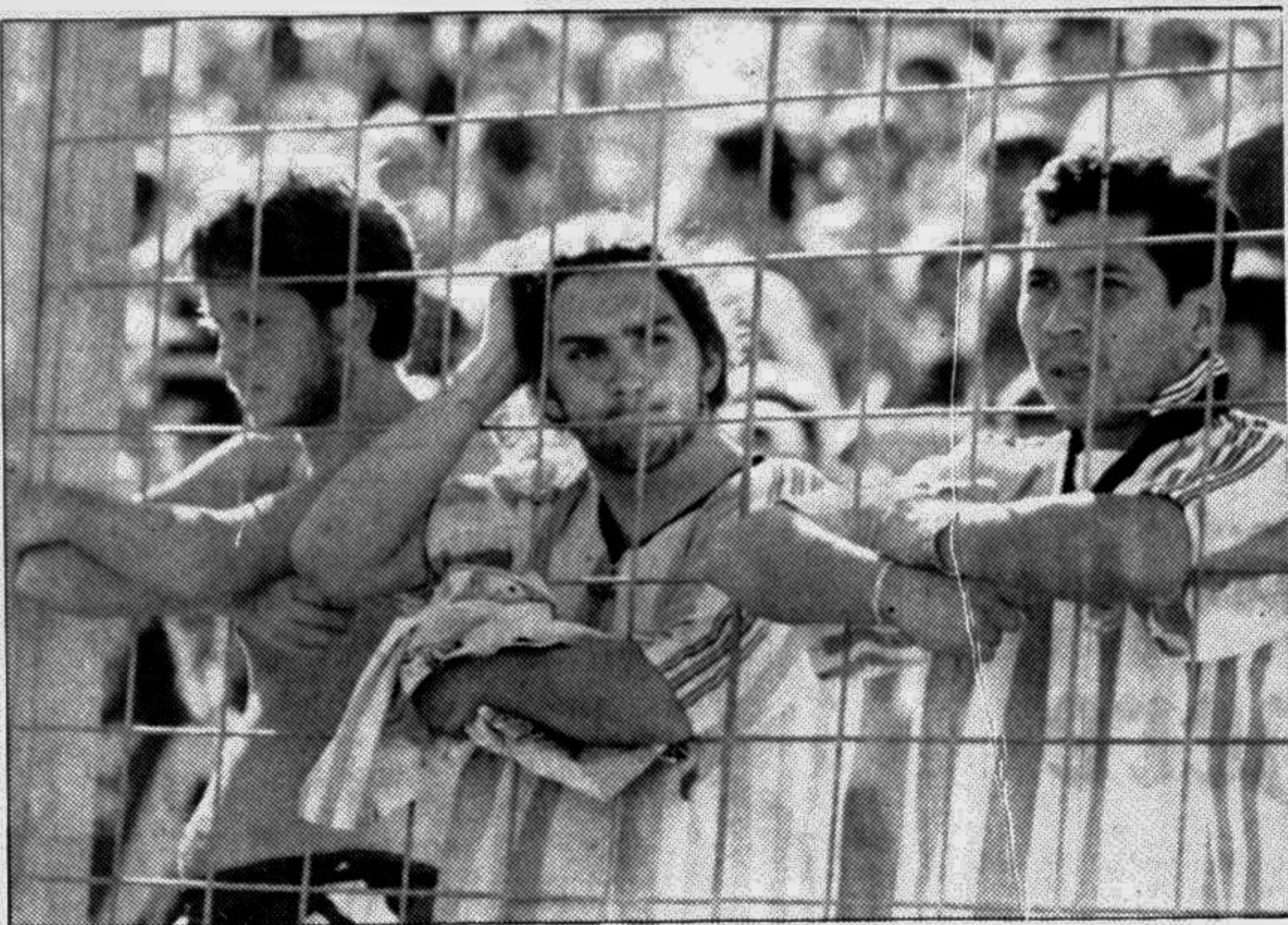
Comilla reached the semifinal of the Gazi Tank 18th national youth cricket championship eliminating Dhaka by five runs at Khulna Stadium yesterday, reports UNB. They will play the semifinal against the winners of Sylhet and Rajshahi, who meet today. After winning the toss, Comilla batted first and scored 108 runs for the loss of five wickets in a rain reduced 20-over-a-side match with Bulbul making highest 35. Lablu of Dhaka captured three wickets giving away 11 runs. In reply, Dhaka were dismissed for 103 runs with Rehan contributing 32 runs and Ishique 27. Hassan and Babu of Comilla took two wickets each conceding 16 and 21 runs respectively.

**Jacco, Paul clinch doubles crown**

LONDON, July 5: Australians Todd Woodbridge and Mark Woodford were denied a record sixth consecutive Wimbledon men's doubles title by Dutchmen Jacco Eltingh and Paul Haarhuis on Saturday, reports Reuters. Top seeds Eltingh and Haarhuis won an epic four-hour final 2-6, 6-4, 7-6, 5-7, 10-8 to become the first pair in the Open era to win all four Grand Slam doubles crowns. The Australians assumed early control with two breaks in the opening set, but Eltingh and Haarhuis fought back to the brink of victory in the fourth set. The Dutch pair carved out the first of their three championship points on Woodbridge's serve with the number two seeds trailing 4-5, but Eltingh's volley fell just wide. Woodbridge proved the more vulnerable in the final set and his serve was broken in the 18th game to hand the Dutch duo their first Wimbledon doubles title and their fifth Grand Slam crown.

**Juventus' Owen mission fails**

LONDON, July 5: Juventus failed in a bid to sign exciting young England striker Michael Owen before the World-Cup finals, the News of the World reported, says Reuters. Luciano Moggi, the Italian club's general manager was quoted in the paper as saying: "We have known about Owen for two years, we were receiving information about him long before he emerged in English football."

**Dutch revelry**

AMSTERDAM, July 5: Euphoric Dutch soccer fans dance in the streets of Amsterdam Saturday after their team's World Cup quarter final victory over Argentina, reports Reuters. Dennis Bergkamp's late winning goal was watched by thousands on television screens rigged up outside the capital's bars. "It was a beautiful build-up, a beautiful goal," enthused one young supporter. As television showed the ball hitting the back of the net over and over again, cheers echoed across the city. Then the fans, many dressed from head to toe in orange, spilled on to the canal-side streets ringing bicycle bells and sounding car horns. "We're going to be world champions, I'm telling you now, we're going to be champions," a passing cyclist shouted as he headed off towards the central Leidseplein square where the bars overflowed with jubilant supporters. Many shops had closed in the early afternoon before the kick-off, supermarkets reported a run on giant beer kegs in the hours leading up to the game. In the port city of Rotterdam, police were on guard for a repeat of the exuberant festivities that followed the Netherlands' victory over Yugoslavia earlier in the week. Several arrests were made after that game. Traffic police had cordoned off the main Hooplein where fans took a dip in a fountain of orange water. Early reports suggested the revelry was good humoured.

Not at any other time during the competition has so much quality graced the field. Increasing in intensity as it went on, the match ended with a climactic cacophonous crescendo. The first half was played at breakneck speed with chances coming thick and fast at either end. Holland opened the scoring when Dennis Bergkamp's cushioned header invited Patrick Kluivert to tuck the ball home. Argentina replied swiftly when Claudio Lopez beat the Dutch offside trap and steered the ball between the legs of Edwin van der Sar. The second half was a much cagier affair, both teams aiming to pounce on the other's mistakes. The stage was set for a dramatic finale when Arthur Numan, who had been the best Dutch player on the pitch, was sent off in the 76th minute. The Argentinians raided Holland's box for the remainder of the match. At one point, Gabriel Batistuta broke free and discharged a shot which appeared to have goal written all over it. But it crashed against the post. Soon after that, Ariel Ortega jinked one way, jived the other and took a tumble in the penalty area. The referee was all too aware that the "Little Donkey" — as he is affectionately known to his fans — was trying to lure Jaap Stam into committing a foul. The towering Dutch goalkeeper immediately rushed over to beat the diminutive Argentine midfielder for play-acting. Then, in a moment of madness even more preposterous than

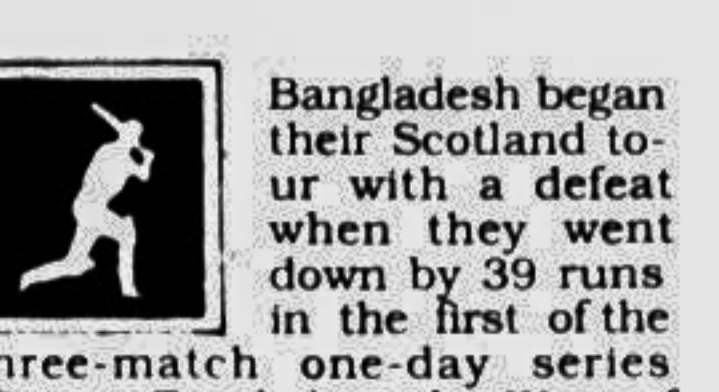

**Bangladesh go 1-0 down**



Bangladesh began their Scotland tour with a defeat when they were down by 39 runs in the first of the three-match one-day series (Cairns Trophy) at the West of Scotland Cricket Club ground in Glasgow on Saturday. According to an incomplete scorecard provided by Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) yesterday, Bangladesh, chasing a fighting Scottish total of 246 in 50 overs, were all out for 207 in 48 overs. After the departure of veteran Athar Ali (0), new cap Azam Iqbal (9) and Faruque for 23, it was left to Mohammad Rafique and vice-captain Aminul Islam to pick up the pieces. Unfortunately, the number of runs for the stand remained a mystery as the official BCB score sheet did not mention the fall of wickets. Aminul, the right handed middle order, hammered highest 70 off 86 balls while Rafique scored 58 of 84 balls. The remaining six batsmen collectively added only 26 runs. Scotland's Steindle captured three for 29 runs while new-ball bowler Brinklay captured two wickets. Scotland's fighting total was built around a superb 81 from middle-order and skipper G Salmond. Opener Patterson (46) and lower middle-order Brinklay (32). Bangladesh were scheduled to play the same side in a non-Cairns Trophy over-limit fixture today. The remaining two one-day matches of Cairns Trophy will

be held in Edinburgh July 11 and 12. Besides, Bangladesh will also play two three-day matches against the Scots. The first match will be held in Greenock from July 7 to 9 while the other match is scheduled in Linchithgow from July 14 to 16.

**Azzuri debate**

PARIS, July 5 (AP): So confident of their ability, Italy's players only negotiated bonus money for an appearance in the World Cup semifinals. They had reached the semifinals three times since 1982 — including the final twice — so it seemed like a good bet. Their quarterfinal elimination on penalties to France not only left the Azzuri stunned, but disappointed their millions of fans who look forward every quadrennium to a chance to win the title and who consider their domestic league the best in the world. More than that, Italy's elimination came at the end of an overly defensive match, a game in which tournament co-leading scorer Christian Vieri and forwards Alessandro Del Piero and Roberto Baggio rarely threatened French keeper Fabien Barthez's net. The blame was quick to be doled out. Coach Cesare Maldini, rated the most popular man in Italy following the second-round victory against Norway, was bitterly criticised as the champion of old-fashioned soccer. Maldini defended himself saying he fielded the best team available, representing a league by now dominated by the presence of foreign players in key midfield roles — Italy's weakest element in France.
